



NEW CENTURY, NEW JOURNAL

or the past five issues, the Tipperary Historical Journal has commemorated the 150th anniversary of the Great Famine of the 1840's. Dominated by an annual article from the pen of Denis G. Marnane, the Famine was analysed and recalled in no less than 28 articles, filling over 350 pages - all of it original research that will be used by future students of the Famine. Now, with Des Marnane's final article - based in part on archdiocesan baptismal and marriage records - all that comes to an end, and the Journal returns to more conventional topics!

A major contribution for the 2000 Journal comes from William Jenkins,

author of the recent history of Tipperary "Co-Op", who, in a long article, traces the history of the butter markets of South Tipperary in the 100 years or so before the rise early in the twentieth century of the creameries. Clonmel native **Áine** Chadwick, now resident in rural England, writes on two war memorials at Kickham Barracks, Clonmel, which survived the destruction of the barracks during the Civil War. The names of many Tipperary men who took the Queen's shilling are on

these two handsome monuments. The American Civil War of the 1860s, in which many Irishmen participated, is the background of a short piece by New York lawyer Ed Shaughnessy, who traces the career of his ancestor William Walsh of Cahir who, as a U.S. marine NCO, took part in that war. The prelude to the Irish War Of Independence forms the backdrop to an extract from the memoirs of the late Eamon Ó Duibhir of Clonoulty who, as an IRB man and Irish Volunteer officer in pre-1916 days, met the Labour leader James Connolly in Dublin.

Going back several centuries earlier, Fr. Ignatius Fennessy OFM, who is librarian at the Franciscan house in Killiney, Co. Dublin, recounts the mysterious theft of a sacred relic from Holycross Abbey, restored in the 1970s by the patron of the Society which produces the Tipperary Historical Journal, the late Archbishop Thomas Morris.

Irish Times journalist Brendan Ó Cathaoir, specialist in 19th century nationalism, traces the colourful career of Young Irelander and 1848 man John Blake Dillon, grandfather of Fine Gael personality, James Dillon, T.D. Remaining in the same period, Thurles writer Proinsias Ó Drisceoil, in a short essay, ponders the decline in popularity of Charles Kickham of "Knocknagow" fame. Fethard historian Michael O'Donnell contributes the first of several instalments on the parliamentary representatives for Co. Tipperary in the 240-year period from

1560 to the abolition of the old Irish parliament by the Act of Union in 1801.

Two articles, which between them deal with what might loosely be called the minority community in Co. Tipperary, come from the pens of Cahir graduate **David Butler** and Cornwall resident **Arthur Carden**. The latter attempts to rescue the [un-]popular reputation of his collateral ancestor "Woodcock" Carden of Barnane, near Templemore. The former contributes the first of two scholarly accounts of Presbyterianism in the Fethard area from 1690 to 1919. Clonmel-woman **Nellie Beary-Ó Cléirigh**, an expert on Irish lace, recalls the efforts of "do-gooder" Lady Aberdeen, wife of a Viceroy of Ireland, to promote an embroidery industry in the pretty village of Marlfield.

Devotees of archaeology are unusually well catered for in the Tipperary Historical Journal this year. In a major article - the first of several, the Editor hopes - Queen's University archaeologist John Ó Néill, with the co-operation of many named colleagues, presents a summary of the multitude of archaeological finds made by the Lisheen Project as the Galmoy mining got underway.

Tipperary UCD graduate, Richard Clutterbuck, traces the history of a late medieval settlement at Graystown, near Fethard, while Richard O'Brien of Cashel records some recent archaeological finds at Killea graveyard, near Templemore.

In an unusually long Books Section, Seán Connolly of Queen's University and John Logan of Limerick University pass generally favourable treatment on Tom McGrath's monumental two-volume tomes on Bishop Doyle of Kildare & Leighlin of the 1800's. Another review worth careful reading, by Raghnall Ó Floinn of the National Museum, castigates the editorial "work" on two posthumous volumes by the late Fr. Colmcille of Clonmel & Mellifont, which Ó Floinn regards as falling well below the expected scholarly standard. Finally, Carrick litterateur Michael Coady gives a glowing account of Angela Bourke's new study of the case of Bridget Cleary, burned alive over her kitchen fire by her husband Michael as recently as 1895.

A WORD FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The Society continued to progress in 1999/2000. There was no major initiative to mark the millennium - our interests lie in the past! Apart from the successful launch of the Society's Journal ably edited by Marcus Bourke, members were active in a variety of ways promoting research and understanding of the county's past. In July 1999 a very successful Summer School was held in Killenaule under the auspices of Slieveardagh Rural Development Limited on the theme The War of Independence and the Civil War in Tipperary. The large audience was treated to a veritable feast of history and were privileged to hear lectures from Marcus Bourke, John Hassett, Jim Maher, Eamonn Gaynor, Seamus Leahy, Michael Laffan, Joost Augusteijn, Liam Ó Duibhir and James O'Shea who gave the annual Canon Lambe, Don Byard memorial lecture on John Sadleir. Many of those who spoke knew those who played central roles in the early years of the state - indeed Eamonn Gaynor and Seamus Leahy were talking of their respective fathers - and it was this connection which gave such authority and the rare quality of eyewitness accounts to the week's proceedings. Chairing the sessions was for me a pleasant task and the contributions from the floor enlivened the proceedings. The theme of Slieveardagh 2000 is a retrospective look back at the twentieth century and speakers will include Dr. Martin Mansergh, Rev Dr. Liam Ryan, Professor John Coolahan, Fintan Vallely and Seamus King. It will take place in Killenaule from 3rd to 7th July, 2000.

Since the Journal was issued there has been a variety of publications issued on Tipperary's history. Donal and Nancy Murphy continue their good work under the *Relay* imprint from Nenagh. Among their recent publications were Fr. Roger Kennedy's *From Bun Ciamalta Vale to New South Wales*. This is an account of Fr. Kennedy's life or lifes (1916-1994) at opposite ends of the globe from his early years in the shadow of Keeper to his missionary work in the Diocese of Maitland, New South Wales. Such biographies greatly illuminate the role of Irish people overseas and distance often sharpens their

perspective of the home ground. Siobhan de Buitleir takes us back to a Tipperary Childhood of the 1920s in *Meitheals and Wanderings* which is an evocative account of growing up on a farm in the parish of Inch near Thurles. Both books are now out of print.

Our Journal launcher, Michael Coady, had his collection of prose pieces also published by *Relay* under the title *Full-Tide-a miscellany*. Carrick-on -Suir and its tangential places which concern Michael are fortunate that they have a chronicler with such astute perception. Michael is passionately interested in the coming together of the past and present and has, with courage and vigour, highlighted many of the great gaps between theory and practise in the planning process. His book is in paperback at £9.95. Future plans for *Relay* include the publication of Danny Grace's *History of the Famine in the Poor Law Union of Nenagh* which will nicely complement Des Mamane's recent articles in issues of the Journal. They also intend to bring out a revised edition of Dermot Gleeson's classic *The Last Lords of Ormond* in the Autumn.

Teachers have played a central role in transmitting history not only in the context of their work in the schools but also as creators of the texts which record past times. A recent book, In and out of school - in the home of the Macdonaghs, by Roche Williams uses the schools of the parish of Cloughjordan as a focus around which the wider history of the area is discussed. The book sells for £12 and is a welcome addition to the literature on North Tipperary. Apart from historians, Tipperary has its share of poets and novelists. It is particularly gratifying to be able to offer my congratulations to Dennis O'Driscoll on the publication of his fifth collection of poetry under the title Weather Permitting and on his major international award for the sustained quality of his work. John Meagher, also a past pupil of Thurles CBS, published his novel A Bluebell in a Quarry about growing up in Thurles in the 1950s from his Canadian base but it is available locally.


Returning to mainstream history three books on aspects of Tipperary's past were published before Christmas by Geography Publications. Sean O'Donnell's Clonmel 1840-1900- anatomy of an Irish town was ably launched by Tom Ambrose and it is a fitting complement to Canon Bourke's work in terms of the detail and political analysis it presents. It retails at £25. In early December John and Phil Flood's Kilcash: a history 1190-1801 was launched in the Community Hall, Kilcash by Professor Vincent Comerford. This book marries history, archaeology and Irish literature in reconstructing the cultural and material fabrics and the people

who created them through the centuries of this most haunting and evocative of Tipperary's buildings. James O'Shea's compelling analysis of the life and times of one of Tipperary's most able and ultimately tragic sons is delivered in Prince of Swindlers, John Sadleir MP 1813-1856. Apart from his detailed reconstruction of the Scully-Sadleir money nexus which dominated Catholic Tipperary right through the nineteenth century, James O'Shea illuminates the wider contexts of Dublin and London's political and commercial worlds in this major book. Early in the new year to round of a busy publishing season in the county William Jenkin's study of Tipp Co-op; Origin and development of Tipperary Co-op Ltd. was issued at a well-attended function in Dundrum House where it was appropriately launched by the doyen of Ireland's farm leaders, T.J. Maher. Jenkin's book is a welcome addition to works on Tipperary's most important industry and it is lavishly illustrated with photographs and maps which supplement a well-researched volume. Angela Bourke's study of the Burning of Bridget Cleary, published in 1999, makes excellent use of court records and the vivid testimony elicited at the trials in Clonmel to present an interesting thesis on the degree of modernisation in South Tipperary in the last quarter of the nineteenth century. More recently Liam Kennedy of the Queen's University and a native of Borrisoleigh co-authored a volume of maps with analyses in Mapping the Famine. Finally I wish, on behalf of the Society, to extend my congratulations to Dr Thomas McGrath, a founder member of the Society, on receiving the National University of Ireland award for his twovolume study on Bishop James Doyle.



The 1999 edition of the Co. Tipperary Historical Journal was launched by Michael Coady in the Co. Library, Thurles on Saturday 12th June. Michael is a well known poet, writer and historian from Carrick-on-Suir. In welcoming him the Chairperson of the Historical Society, Dr. William Nolan congratulated him on his two published volumes of poetry, Oven Lane and All Souls. He also congratulated him on being elected to Aosdána in 1998. He complimented him as a writer who has remained faithful to his local area and it gave him great pleasure to ask him to formally launch the Journal.

Launching the Journal, Michael Coady said that he felt very intimidated speaking before such distinguished gathering of people. He had to confess that his Tipperary identity was very

diluted as his mother was from Waterford, half of Carrick-on-Suir is in Co. Waterford and is also very close to Co. Kilkenny. He has admired the journal since its inception.

Michael congratulated the Editor, Marcus de Burca on producing a journal that is so rich in range of content. It will be a delight to read. He complimented Professor Vincent Comerford on a great editorial which he was very pleased to read. Some of the articles refer to the human condition and experience like that of the twelve year old boy found at the gate of Nenagh Workhouse during the famine. This is part of a fine series on the famine by Dr Des Marnane. It is the written part of the picture but not the whole picture. He also referred to the articles on language by Donnchadh Ó Duibhir and Micheal Ó Gliasáin. He said it was to important to preserve our particular speech forms. "We have reached an extraordinary point in our culture. There is a wide cultural divide in Irish society. The generation gap is also very wide as a large percentage of the population is under twenty five. A vast change has taken place in our country. At the beginning of the century women didn't have the vote. We were still under the rule of the empire. Now we have freedom, prosperity, our rightful place in Europe and forced emigration has ceased. We have also seen the emergence of women in public life."

HISTORIC DAY

In the 1989 Journal, Marcus Bourke outlined the history of the controversy over the Abbey Erasmus Smith Grammar School in Tipperary Town and the struggle to gain the benefits of the endowment for Catholic children [THJ, 1989; pp82-99].

On Thursday, February 24, 2000 the President of Ireland, Mary McAleese, visited the school and unveiled a memorial to the Erasmus Smith Grammar School which was on the site 1680-1922. The Abbey is now a boy's school under the trusteeship of the Christian Brothers. Making the day an episode of historic reconciliation was the presence of the chairman and governors of the High School, Dublin. This school continues the Erasmus Smith tradition and represnts the other half of the division of assets laid out in the 1938 Erasmus Smith Schools Act.

In her speech, the President referred to part of the inscription on the memorial, a quotation from Standish James O'Grady, who was a pupil at the Abbey in the early 1860s. "In individuals, hope is a stronger spring of life than memory, and it is the same with nations".
