

THE GREAT FAMINE COMMEMORATION COMMITTEE

To commemorate the forthcoming 150th anniversary of the Great Famine in 1995, The Great Famine Commemoration Committee has been established to co-ordinate events and increase awareness of the various activities which will take place during the anniversary. However, one of the prime objectives of the Committee is to produce a map of famine related sites for the country, to be published in September, 1995 coinciding with an international conference being organised in Trinity College.

The compilation of information relating to Tipperary, both North Riding and South Riding, is being co-ordinated by the County Library. We would, therefore, appreciate any information on the names of places across Co. Tipperary which might help tell the story of the Great Famine, in the years leading up to it and its aftermath. Specific information is required on the following subjects in Co. Tipperary:

Meeting Houses, Historic Churches/Chapels

Great Houses

Workhouses/Auxillary Workhouses, Soup Kitchens, Soup Schools

Fever Hospitals

Famine Roads, Walls or other public works

Famine Burial Grounds, Monuments or Memorials

THE O'FFOGERTY HARP

ne of the finest items on display in the Local Studies Department at the County Library here in Thurles is the 17th century O'Ffogerty Harp, an instrument steeped in history. Although not highly ornamented, it is of particular interest to Tipperary as it belonged to one Cornelius O'Ffogerty.

Said to be a very fine harper, Cornelius O'Ffogerty, of O'Ffogerty Castle just outside Thurles, was born in 1661. He married Mary Kearney of Miltown, Co. Tipperary, and they had six children:

Timothy, Dr. Thomas, Bryan, Malachy, Mary and Catherine.

After his death in 1730, the harp was cherished by succeeding owners of Castle Ffogerty where it remained until it was given on loan to the County Library in 1985 by the then owner, Mr. Charles F. Ryan.

The present owner is Mr. Michael J. Ryan, Hull, England.

The harp itself is just over 3½ feet in height and is in an excellent state of preservation. The box is formed out of a solid block of black sallow, undecorated and unvarnished. It seems that the harp at no time had any more than thirty-five strings.

Cornelius O'Ffogerty had a famous uncle, Dr. William O'Ffogerty, who was accused of being a conspirator in the "Gunpowder Plot" by the infamous Titus Oates. After his arrest, he was incarcerated in Newgate Prison, where he died in 1678.

His niece, Elizabeth, inherited Castle Ffogerty and married William Lanigan. Her grand-daughter, Anna Elizabeth, married John Denis Ryan who subsequently inherited Castle Ffogerty. Sadly, the Castle was burned down in 1922.

Cornelius O'Ffogerty is buried in Holycross.

Dominic Bowles, 128 Gosford Road, Shannon, P. Quebec, G0A 4NO, CANADA, wonders if anyone can help with the following:

My great-great grandfather, John BOWLES, was born in SPRINGHILL, Co. Tipperary and baptised in Killenaule, 1790. As John was a Catholic, and as his father Joseph and his grandfather lived in the KILLENAULE area, I am asking anyone who would happen to go to the RC Killenaule graveyard, if they would kindly jot down any headstone inscription which has the name Bowles. Since John later moved to THE COMMONS with his brothers George and Charles, I would also appreciate any Bowles headstone inscriptions from the BALLINGARRY and GORTNAHOE graveyards. Such help would be gratefully received by John's descendants here in Canada.

Also, has anyone any more information on the Fr. BOWLES mentioned in the 1990 TIPPERARY HISTORICAL JOURNAL, in Danny Grace's article "The Barricading of Nenagh Chapel in 1849"?

John SPEARMAN, born c1760; wife Elizabeth, son John, born 1786 and daughter Elizabeth born 1796 married Patrick CORBETT. The family emigrated from BORRISOKANE, Co. Tipperary to Canada in 1818 with the TALBOTs. Also Rebecca DAGG, born 1802, came to Canada c1820, marrying John, born 1786, after arrival.

All the following emigrated to TASMANIA in 1843/1844:

Father: ?Keefe, died before family emigrated; Mother: Margaret nee SADLIER, born c1781; Known Family: Patrick Richard, born c1808 who married Johanna HAYDEN on 26 August, 1836, Emly/Cashel. They had 2 children, Johanna baptised Mar. 22 1838, Rathduff and Margaret, baptised 27 Jul. 1840 at Golden. Catherine, born c1811, married William RYAN, Bulliver. They had 5 children, Michael c1833, Tipperary, John 2 Oct. 1835, Margaret 31 Mar. 1838, Judith 30 Mar. 1840, David 27 Mar. 1842, all baptised at Clonmaine. Michael, born c1812, married Johanna HICKEY and their children Edmund, baptised 17 May 1835, Ballintemple, David 12 Mar. 1837, Lacken, Denis 9 Jun. 1839, Golden. Thomas, born c1815, married Sarah (Sally) RYAN on 21 Feb. 1841 at DRUMINURE/DRUMINACLE?, had one child Margaret, baptised 21 May 1842. Mary, born c1825. David, born c1826.

John Mitchel, in his "Jail Journal" writes that Michael O'Keefe and his family were turned off the HAWARDEN ESTATES - on arrival in Tasmania, Michael was requested by the Archbishop to start a Catholic school at Richmond.

Heather can find no baptism/marriage records for Michael or his brothers or sisters, and with the baptisms of his children in three different places, no clue is given to his place of abode. Can anyone help?
