

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

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From May misery to September glory

e bask in glory. A special kind of glory. The frenzied excitement of September 5th and its celebratory follow-up has subsided. A quiet but intense satisfaction stays with all Tipp folk. The 26th senior All Ireland title will long be held in affection. After all, it was won against the odds, the overwhelming weight of prediction and hurling's second four-in-a-row holders. In that last aspect it emulated the feat of John Maher's 1945 team which stopped Cork and took over from them in possession of the national title. Eoin Kely's name will be linked similarly with a historic success. So will Liam Sheedy's managership assume a role and a profile unheard of in distant times.

The story of 2010 deserves to begin, as above, with its happy end, its sensational All Ireland final. Still, the order of events has its claims too. It was a sequence in six stages, a tale of initial and discouraging defeat followed by recovery through the "phase" process, re-entry to the main highway - capped ultimately with the victory which, after nine years absence, brought the McCarthy Cup to the Premier County - the old tag gaining high validity once more.

A LEESIDE LESSON

We had grounds for reasonable confidence going to Cork on May 30th. Over confidence? The assertion was made in the light of what happened, though it would be hard to visualise it from mentors or players. Cork, after all, has fierce motivation – three losses in a row to Tipp; their need to pull off a first substantial success under Denis Walsh and after the lengthy and controversial strike. In addition, they had suffered a big reverse at the hands of Galway in the League Final. We had done nothing great in the League but the display in the '09 All Ireland, luckless from the stage where hopes of victory looked well-founded, had Tipperary the general nominees as top challengers to Kilkenny.

Close to 40,000 at Pairc Ui Chaoimh on a dull, grey day were to witness an eye-opener that made a disturbing spectacle for visiting onlookers. Our lineout: Cummins, Stapleton, Maher, Curran, Fanning, O'Mahony, Cahill, Brendan Maher, Shane McGrath, Noel McGrath, Callanan, O'Brien, Kelly, O'Meara, Corbett. There were no doubt which of the fifteen had been most discussed in the build up to the game. Brian O'Meara (Kilruane MacDonaghs) was an out

of the blue choice at full forward, coming to light in camp games and friendlies, a prospect as little known to us as to the Cork

Cork, too, were fielding a full forward of interest in Aisake Ó h-Ailpin, towering even above Padraic Maher. He was to have a prompt impact, being held for a free. Horgan drilled it in for our first unwelcome shock. A Cusack stop from Corbett had denied Tipp already. The flow of play was quickly adverse. Cork's Gardiner-Curran-Ó h-Ailpin line had been questioned on League Final form but were here hurling with purpose, to our cost. A pattern of short puck-outs to Gardiner saw him lob at ease to the Blackrock end. He found Aisake. The lay-off to Horgan brought their second goal – the locals were in full chorus in the audience. Our defensive set-up was amended - Curran to full back, Maher to the wing, Cahill to corner.

SLIDE TO DEFEAT

Somewhat of a settling down followed. We scored four against one in points to the welcome interval, standing 2-5 to 0-8 in arrears. O'Brien, Kelly and Brendan Maher took us to just two down. On sixty minutes our rearguard was breached for a terminal third goal. Jerry O'Connor laid off against a stretched defence, found Aisake alone inside. He beat Cummins with easy finality. Our fabric was now torn apart. Cork topped it off with a string of superfluous scores to the extent of 3-15 to 0-14. Their supporters greeted it with the emotion of people long waiting relief and now entitled to relish it. For our brigade of travellers and for all at home with screen or radio the fact of the loss made less impact than the manner and the margin of it. Our place in the pecking-order was under serious question, a two year reign in Munster ended and the "phase" sector to be explored. For the record, we had called in five reserves: Hennessy (for O'Meara); Gearoid Ryan (O'Mahony); Hammersley (Noel McGrath); Brennan (John O'Brien); Conor O'Brien (Shane McGrath). O'Meara's debut was luckless. A brief switch to wing forward was followed, in retrospect, by a suspension under the review

In longer, and happier, retrospect one wonders how a cryptic but accurate forecast that we had seen the All Ireland winners in action that day by the Lee would have been received! Cork would definitely have seemed to be the obvious candidates. Thirteen of our starting All Ireland fifteen began in the game that promised so little but proved to be an affordable loss, as well as a sharp lesson.

Shorn of provincial prestige we tuned to the Saturday sector that involves early losers. Liam Sheedy, Eamon O'Shea and Michael Ryan had five weeks to re-group, the players as long to re-think. We couldn't be as bad as the flat display in Cork suggested. Changes were inevitable for the visit of Colm Bonnar's Wexford. A wholesale revision took place in the inner defence. Conor O'Brien, Fanning and Cahill were the trio.

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Outside were David Young, O'Mahony and Padraic Maher. Young had done well in the camp games. Midfield stayed as before. Not so the attack. Gearoid Ryan and Lorrha's Patrick Maher were promoted. The suspension of Brian O'Meara ruled him out. Young, Ryan and "Bonner" Maher were to be significant recruits in the long run.

SATURDAY SUCCESS


The Stadium venue was a bonus. In the circumstances it was a very welcome one as we faced into the knock-out category. Wexford had lost to Galway after doing well to the brink of half time and being later overwhelmed. The game began with a curio among injuries – Fanning's first dealings with Banville ended with helmet tugged and blood drawn. Instant call for Curran who had been out with injury - so had Paddy Stapleton. A fairly level opening had us a couple of points ahead on three occasions before a second quarter surge took it to 0-15 against 0-7 at the break. No doubting the first eye catcher for Tipp. David Young drove three long points with great assurance. The issue was speedily settled on resumption - we registered 2-2 in eight minutes, the points from Eoin Kelly, Young to Shane McGrath to Noel McGrath to Corbett – a brilliant move for goal number one. "Bonner" Maher to Corbett for number two – it was almost a preview of games to come for the lethal Lar. Veteran 'keeper Cummins preserved a clean sheet against the late efforts of the losers as Daragh Egan made it three for the victors in a tension free finish. Final score: 3-24 to 0-19 and another Saturday

Joe Dooley's Offaly came next. They had pulled off a great draw with Galway in Leinster and done respectably in the replay. Portlaoise was the neutral venue. The mentors came up for this test with a newsmaking midfield for Young and a centre forward one for Shane McGrath. We fielded Stapleton, Curran, Cahill at the back. Fanning was back to line up with O'Mahony and Padraic Maher. Ryan. McGrath and Patrick Maher were the outer attack. Noel McGrath, Kelly and Corbett completed the offensive choice. No great stress was experienced in a smooth performance – we could afford to send in reserves for late innings – Callanan, Hennessy, Bourke, Conor O'Brien, John O'Brien. Eoin Kelly put his name to eleven points. Offaly "never built" up any threatening momentum with nine first half wides depressing their followers. Our top men on the day were probably Fanning and Brendan Maher. Many onlookers were no longer looking on when Shane Dooley raised a cheer of no great enthusiasm with a goal in injury time. Tipp had already outpointed and out-hurled the Leinster side, moving on to a higher hurdle, namely Galway.

GALWAY HURDLE

The Wexford and Offaly games hinted at Tipp recovery. The Galway one strengthened the evidence. A quarter final with quality hurling and such ups and downs as to make one alternately worry and rejoice, it had a fair claim to "game of the year". The finale was brow-mopping time as Tipp character fashioned a marvellous recovery to win what could as readily have been lost. In the context of September it was a key to the emergence of Tipp from the gloom of May. Pa Bourke's deft feeding back to Corbett for his angled winner will go down as the crucial third score of the team's late, late flourish. A Sars duet of skill and nerve won the fluctuating day; it opened Tipp's way to a later and greater triumph.

We chose as against Offaly. The Young at midfield and Shane McGrath on the "forty" ploy was repeated, a tribute to David's impact and a hope that McGrath's attacking style would work closer to goal. After thirty minutes, a revision took place, Callanan coming in to his familiar place and McGrath reverting to his. Both moves were to be of benefit. Though we took the day's first goal on Patrick Maher's setting up of Eoin Kelly, six



unanswered Galway points in a row had Tipp on the back foot. Damien Hayes was a particular threat, though Joe Canning had been seen in that role in the previews. Eanna Ryan latched onto a puck out and left defenders trailing before finishing high to the corner of the net. Then came a Tipp spell that enabled us to go in at the break at 2-8 to 1-9. Kelly and Brendan Maher pointed before Noel McGrath glanced an overhead ball inside to Callanan The skilful provision was matched by an emphatic finish and prospects brightened.

We shipped a second blow on 36 minutes. A ground ball of no obvious threat was fluffed and an attempted defensive prod on the ground only put it into Damien Hayes' patch. The goal was a big reverse but, thankfully, the damage was repaired by Gearoid Ryan off a Patrick Maher lay-off. We went a reassuring four up but there was to be no smooth success. If Joe Canning was held scoreless from play he availed of a penalty award to reopen the issue. Galway subs Hynes and Callanan pointed and had them two ahead at 3-16 to 3-14. We drew on our squad in this critical situation - John O'Brien and Pa Bourke for Noel McGrath and Patrick Maher. Conor O'Brien came on for Declan Fanning. The dividends from the fresh legs were to be huge. John O'Brien tapped over for one, Gearoid Ryan for a second and, climactically, Lar Corbett for the flag that signalled recover and victory. Some late Galway attacks had us on edge of seats. Would they perhaps gain a levelling free, as so often tends to appeal to referees. Not in this instance. A semi final beckoned. We were back in the mainstream after meeting three fellow losers, Galway by far the strongest under John McIntyre's direction. In the process such as Gearoid Ryan and Patrick Maher had claimed places on merit and on effort in a stronger selection all-round.

DOWNING THE DECIES

Kilkenny had destroyed Cork in the first semi final despite losing Sheflin early on. The consensus in media and general opinion was now even more adamant – it didn't matter who came through to face the five seeking Cats! Somebody had to take on the task and it might as well be the county that had come close to toppling them a year earlier. To get there, we had to beat the side that had beaten Cork in a provincial final replay and Cork, of course, had hammered us. The logic of form was to be contradicted before 50,000 at Croke Park, where our record against the Decies had not been good - the '08 semi final the

Tipp selection: Cummins; Cahill, Curran, Stapleton; Fanning, O'Mahony, Padraic Maher; Brendan Maher, Shane McGrath; Corbett, Noel McGrath, Patrick Maher; Ryan, Kelly, John O'Brien. The placing that was to work a "treat" was that of Noel at centre forward. At the rear, Paddy Stapleton went to the left corner to mark John Mullane. A wing berth for Corbett and a corner for Ryan were other options in the attack.

For fifteen edgy minutes neither side had really found a rhythm - scores were level four times. We shot early wides, including some frees of scoreable range. Mullane was an early threat, drawing some frees in our holding operation. Came our first big move, a Corbett advance on Hennessy at the Railway posts, and a kicked finish. The goal was quite an uplift. Noel McGrath was drifting well away from "Brick" Walsh's reach. He and John O'Brien figured large in our interim lead of 1-10 to 0-8. Waterford's defence, so tight in smothering Cork's attack, was here being stretched by Tipp's space-exploiting tactics. Noel also prospered when given the free taking role. Curran held firm at full back, Fanning very active at right half in a generally alert rearguard. Our midfield, too, was in fine form. The half time picture was healthy, at five ahead, but the Decies might find their Munster dash after hearing Fitzgerald's dressing-room homily.

They did respond, coming within three. Ken McGrath was now in. Noel McGrath and Corbett came up with steadying points before the contest changed sharply our way. A Noel McGrath line-cut found Kelly for a neat finish – eight up. Callanan came on as mentors repeated their policy of the Galway game. Corbett dashed through with light footed grace and Kelly had his second goal to clinch superiority. He had 2-3 on the day. To compound the Decies problems Mullane found Cummins equal to his goal bound hit. The clean sheet, though, did get spoiled on an Eoin McGrath goal in injury time – to nobody's concern. We'd beaten now both League and Munster champions to send us on to Sept. 5th with a decent C.V. The '08

defeat had been reversed, by John O'Brien in particular with six points from play. Noel McGrath's part was singled out in the analysis of the game. At 3-19 to 1-18 the margin was encouraging. Our attack had gained in menace.

FINAL ODDS ADVERSE

The build up to the All Ireland reached saturation point in the media. For most commentators the issue wasn't even half open. Such tags as "best ever" gave advance command to Kilkenny. News of Shefflin's availability added to the near certainty. A record fifth would be a target surely within reach for so strong a panel – evident in the way they shrugged off Sheflin's exit in the Cork game. Tipp would find it hard to cope with a side alerted by their '09 escape – such was a common and understandable belief. We would certainly have sympathy from many quarters but that doesn't convert on the scoreboard!

The four time champions trained before large and expectant crowds, Tipp before a good gathering of hopeful well wishes. The rival colours were flown on houses, streets, cars. The Kilkenny motif was a confident number five. Slogans wished success to respective counties and to club representatives. The politicians made sure to be in on line with local sentiment! Plainly the hurlers were bidding for something immense and of deep concern.

For the huge task on hand, for the quest for a first title in nine years – what a contrast with the title rich Cats – we chose: Cummins; Stapleton, Curran, Cahill; Fanning, O'Mahony, Padraic Maher; Brendan Maher, Shane McGrath; Ryan, Corbett, Patrick Maher; Noel McGrath, Kelly, John O'Brien. Henry Shefflin duly lined out on the "forty" for the defenders of a quarter of crowns. The preliminaries, loud and colourful, built tension to maximum height – a severe test of composure for a player and anxious, too, for a mere spectator.

TIPP SETTLE TO TASK

Tipp, it was soon evident, were not short of composure. The '09 experience was probably a reassuring factor for most. It was great to see Kilkenny's early advances coped with by alert and



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decisive defence, no openings conceded. The Cats' own recipe of physical, tight battling was being copied. Our midfield settled promptly, too, and soon we had taken the fight upfield with heartening success. In ten minutes it was 1-3 to 0-1. Lar Corbett supplied the ideal boost with a breach of their rearguard so emphatic as to make his goal an uplift for us and a considerable blow to them. From a Shane McGrath lob he outfielded Noel Hickey in an isolated duel, turned and rammed past P.J. Ryan. A Cummins stop from Reid added to the positive beginning.

Shefflin's exit after twelve minutes as his cruciate yielded to the strain was soon a Kilkenny negative. Team mate Tenyson's similar ailment did not prove as vulnerable. The "King's" loss hadn't counted against Cork but was to be no help on the biggest day. Their attack lacked his vision as a provider as well as his personal aspect as a scorer. General applause showed respect for his status as he limped to the line.

Concession of frees ate into our lead as Power converted. Eddie Brennan snatched at a chance in dangerous ground – not like Kilkenny at their lethal best. The lead was re-built by Kelly, a Cummins free and two each from Brendan Maher and John O'Brien

We were hurling smoothly and Kilkenny's repute for close and co-operative marking was not being lived up to. On twenty minutes the lead was six. The run-up to half time, though, was of growing concern. The champions response gained a large dividend when a Larkin run found Power loose on the left. Richie drove across Cummins to the net. Referee Wadding's interim whistle found the scoreboard giving Tipp only minimal edge, 1-10 to 1-9. Their goal looked a morale-lifter. On the run of possession and the quota of play, we had cause to worry. Yet it was great to have seen Tipp in combative mood and certainly up to the level of the '09 performance.

CORBETT'S CLINCHER

Kilkenny's flair for second half, even last quarter, demolition of the opposition had carried them through on many a day.


How would Tipp react to the erosion of the good early margin? Answer: In thrilling fashion. Brief parity on the restart. Then a patch of the sort called purple but better tagged blue-and-gold. Noel McGrath to Corbett goal! McGrath himself onto the break of a Cummins free – goal! At 3-11 to 1-10 we had stretched well clear. Kilkenny were far from quelled – four points in a row for only three between. The position was repeated when Reid answered a Kelly free. Injury to O'Mahony now had Conor O'Brien in and – importantly –Padraic Maher to centre back.

The class and striking of Seamus Callanan had earlier in the year given way to the energy and threat of Lorrha's Patrick Maher. Now, with ideal timing, Callanan re-appeared for John O'Brien. Instantly Seamus was drifting into space and hitting two precious points. Kelly made it six up. Again the Cats narrowed the gap, Mulhall and Power the contributors. If anxiety remained, Benny Dunne and Seamus Hennessy eased it - again six to the good on 69 minutes. The great feat was looming as followers bayed in delight. They had one further and climactic thrill in sore. Patrick Maher somehow flicked to Lar Corbett though stretched on the sod. With deft stickwork Lar controlled, paused and beat the advancing 'keeper. At 4-17 to 1-18 – Rice had an academic last flag – Tipp had not only won but done it devastatingly against the bookies' odds and the general consensus. The 26th All Ireland was and forever will be, a special won.


Far from being flawed by the backward step that began the journey, the victory gains in merit from the recovery. To get the team back on track was a feat of management and of psychology. Judicious additions to the selection, especially in attack, gave us the balanced side which had the grit and the skill to do what few expected and limit record seeking Kilkenny to what they had so spectacularly achieved since 2007. The link with 2001 through captain Eoin Kelly, goalie Brendan Cummins and fleet-footed Lar Corbett was a tribute to all three for long service and great persistence. The baton has been handed on in optimistic prospect.





Tipperary rush on to Croke Park to celebrate their win in the All-Ireland in September.














Win over Kilkenny the League highlight

Every sport has its special rivalries - Ali and Liston, Arkle and Millhouse, Celtic and Rangers. In the past few years the hurling equivalent has been Tipperary and Kilkenny.

And so as Liam Sheedy steps aside there's no doubt his threeyear management has been defined by that rivalry with Kilkenny. We had our significant days against others but really Kilkenny was the business. And when we look back on the league of 2010 that snow-stalled fixture with Kilkenny stands out from the list as the most significant fixture in the schedule. In other ways it was a mixed league for Tipperary as we failed to make the final but that wintery win over the 'cats', the night when Sheedy and Cody barked at each other on the sideline, stands apart.

As ever the year begins with the Waterford Crystal, that preseason warm up as the players re-acquaint themselves with playing conditions. Did I say warm-up? This was the year when Arctic conditions moved south. Some claim ice-hockey in Canada is hurling adapted to polar conditions. We might have played icehockey hereabouts too last spring such was the nature of the weather.

Anyway our year began on a stinging frosty night, Tuesday January 26, under lights at Borrisoleigh. Clare, under new manager Ger 'Sparrow' O'Loughlin, were the visitors having dispatched WIT in an opening bout. They'd beaten us in the previous year's final at Ogonnelloe. An historic aspect of this game was the fact that players for the first time were compelled to wear helmets. For Brendan Cummins particularly it must have been a strange

I'm ever mindful that this publication serves as a valuable record of events so let's note the players who began our 2010 season: Brendan Cummins; Conor O'Brien, Declan Fanning, Paul Curran; David Young, Thomas Stapleton, Shane Maher; Benny Dunne and Gearoid Ryan; Pat Kerwick, Hugh Maloney, Paul Kelly; Pa Bourke, John O'Brien, Eoin Kelly. By end of season, September 5, only six of the same personnel would start against Kilkenny; such is the flux that a year can bring.

As for the game, well, we lost by 0-17 to 1-12. Clare looked sharper, led five-two after ten minutes and by ten-six at half time. Eoin Kelly had a penalty batted away in the third quarter and it wasn't until substitute, Noel McGrath, turned in a goal near the end that we threatened a late win. It didn't happen, however, Clare holding out for a two-point success. Again for record purposes the substitutes employed on the night were: Micheal Webster for Pa Bourke, Lar Corbett for Paul Kelly, Noel McGrath for Pat Kerwick, Shane McGrath for Gearoid Ryan and Patrick Maher for Benny Dunne. All bar Webster would start in September.

Snowed off

Anyway nobody was too perturbed about a January defeat to Clare in the Crystal Tournament because already eyes were on a February league opener under lights at the Stadium against Kilkenny. The game was fixed for Saturday 20 and a real gala event was promised. Having lost the 2009 league and championship finals to Kilkenny this game had added significance for Tipperary. A 'must win' you might say, unless the prevailing order was to be endorsed.

In preparation for the game Tipperary won a challenge match against Dublin the previous Saturday and everything was in order for the big opener. But then it snowed - and snowed with devilish timing. The All Ireland vocational schools' senior hurling final went ahead (Tipperary beating Kilkenny by 2-13 to 1-13) but when time came for the senior game the snow fell with a vengeance and made under-light conditions almost impossible. In the end ten thousand fans were disappointed as referee, Barry Kelly, decided to call off the game as throw-in time approached.

With the league running to a tight schedule of games the match was re-fixed for the following Tuesday evening, February 23, with

no admission charge. Off we headed again ... and once again the snow came. This time referee, Kelly, wasn't in the mood to hang around and make a late decision; some of us were only on our way to the pitch when a radio announcement told us to turn back once more the game was off.

This was anti-climactic stuff, two false starts to our league opener, an opener that had been talked about all winter. And now another difficulty arose because Tipperary were scheduled to play Dublin the following Sunday, so the Kilkenny match went back to Sunday March 7. It was no longer a league opener – and no longer under lights. The best laid plans etc.

Versus Dublin

So, Tipperary eventually got their league campaign going on Sunday February 28 at Parnell Park. The Dubs shipped a hammering from Waterford the previous week and Tipperary probably felt that this would be a routine assignment to sharpen them up for Kilkenny. It was to be anything but routine. A ninepoint defeat for Tipperary (1-21 to 1-12) was the shock outcome, a result that ultimately would prove very costly before this series was over. Perhaps it's as well the Kilkenny game had those false starts because Tipperary looked visibly unready for heavy action on the evidence of Parnell Park.

It was Eoin Kelly's first game as captain and once more let's record the line-out: Darren Gleeson; Conor O'Brien, Paul Curran, Brendan Maher; Padraic Maher, Conor O'Mahony, Shane Maher; Benny Dunne and Gearoid Ryan; Seamus Hennessy, Seamus Callanan, Hugh Maloney; Eoin Kelly, Lar Corbett, Noel McGrath.

We got away to a flier, Corbett fouled and Kelly goaling the penalty in the opening minute. A false dawn if ever there was one. Dublin showed all the pep and initiative as they settled from that setback. They eventually led, we retrieved the lead but the final push of the half was from the Dubs and we trotted off five adrift at the interval, 1-12 to 1-7.

We managed just five points in the second half as Dublin refused to back off from what was a rousing occasion for them. Eoin Kelly hit the post and late in the game cannoned a penalty off the crossbar as the day's fate was underlined. In fairness Dublin might have had goals too, Darren Gleeson, holding his ground admirably. 'We were beaten in every line', declared Liam Sheedy afterwards and that admission just about summed up a miserable league opener for Tipperary. Again for the record we introduced four subs: Declan Fanning for Gearoid Ryan, Paul Kelly for Seamus Hennessy, Michael Cahill for Conor O'Brien and Jody Brennan for Seamus Callanan.

When they went to their dressing room after the match at









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Parnell Park Tipperary didn't emerge for almost an hour. Tough talking, one suspects, with everyone conscious that Kilkenny were coming to town a week later and a second reversal would almost certainly end our league ambitions so early in the series.

Kilkenny at Last

Sunday March 7 dawned snow-less and the hurlers of Tipperary and Kilkenny finally got to tangle at the Stadium. There were changes from the Dublin game. Cummins was back in place of Darren Gleeson. In defence Declan Fanning came in for Conor O'Brien and there was a reshuffle too with the six now reading Brendan Maher, Padraic Maher and Paul Curran on the full line and Fanning, Conor O'Mahony and Shane Maher on the 'forty'.

We had a new midfield of Shane McGrath and Thomas Stapleton and the attack too saw significant change. Noel McGrath, Benny Dunne and John O'Brien started on the half line with Kelly, Webster and Corbett inside. Clearly there was a shake up after the Dublin game with only three players wearing the same numbers as the previous week.

Over twenty thousand fans availed of the free entry on a bitterly cold March afternoon. Kilkenny were without iconic names like Shefflin and Brennan but still looked formidable given their depth of talent. Recent history between the sides meant that this was going to be an edgy affair, an edginess that very briefly overflowed onto the sideline during the second half.

Eoin Kelly opened with the first two points of the game from frees but this was going to be a tough, tight encounter throughout. Four times the sides were level in the first half with both defences on top. An excellent save by Cummins to deny Aidan Fogarty and then a moment of brilliance from Eoin Kelly were crucial items in that first period. The game in fact was in added time before the break when Kelly took a pass from Noel McGrath and with a swivel and strike planted a peach of a goal. It gave Tipperary a 1-6 to 0-6 interval lead and ultimately would prove the crucial score of the game.

The second half remained on a knife-edge, though crucially Tipperary stayed ahead by a few points. Uncharacteristic wides by Kilkenny were a feature too as the game built to a tense climax. Briefly the tension saw Sheedy and Cody exchange pleasantries on the sideline as the outcome remained in doubt. Tipperary clung to a two-point edge before Jody Brennan and Noel McGrath sealed the win with two precious points at the 'death'.

It all ended 1-14 to 0-13 for a psychologically-essential win for Tipperary. A stonewall defence and that individual moment of brilliance from Eoin Kelly were the twin pillars on which this outcome was built. It wasn't championship hurling and it wasn't a full-strength Kilkenny but it did lay down a marker in this ongoing rivalry. We'd beaten Kilkenny – that was all that mattered. For the record the subs that day were: Hugh Maloney for Benny Dunne, Jody Brennan for Thomas Stapleton, Seamus Callanan for John O'Brien and Paul Kelly for Micheal Webster.

Versus Galway

There was little time to bask in the glory of the Kilkenny win because the following Sunday, March 14, saw Galway visit the Stadium. This was another tricky one and for the job Sheedy and co. opted again for a strong line-out, though with a few significant changes from the previous week. Michael Cahill and Paddy Stapleton came in as corner backs either side of Padraic Maher. The half line stayed the same but Brendan Maher was sent to partner Shane McGrath at midfield. Even in early March the All Ireland line-up was taking shape.

Half forward was the most problematic area of the team and for this assignment we started with Seamus Hennessy, Seamus Callanan and John O'Brien. A full line of Kelly, Corbett and Noel McGrath had a familiar appearance.

It was to be the proverbial game of two halves. Just over six thousand paid at the stiles to see a Galway side, minus the Portumna element, take Tipperary apart in the first half. Their interval lead was only four points (0-13 to 1-6) but it could easily have been double, even treble that amount. Tipperary were lucky. Cummins saved from Iarla Tannian and Paddy Stapleton did a marvellous flick to deny Joe Gantley another goal. Then at the other end Tipperary got a 'softish' goal when John O'Brien seemed to get a touch on a mis-hit Kelly '65'. We were thankful for small blessings to be only four down at half time.

Remarkably all changed, changed utterly in the second half. The turnaround didn't happen instantly but gradually Tipperary came to terms with the Galway challenge and remarkably the Tribesmen wilted. An inspirational Noel McGrath point immediately on resuming set the altered mood music. Curran came in at full back with Padraic Maher going centre in place of the off-colour Conor O'Mahony - he'd been ill during the week. Small elements combined to build a bigger picture. Tipperary chipped away at the lead and when Noel McGrath tapped in a goal at the three-quarter stage the home team was in front. Thereafter they never looked back as Galway, remarkably, could only manage a single secondhalf point.

It was encore stuff from Tipperary throughout the final quarter. Timmy Hammersley came on for Seamus Hennessy and joined in the parade with two points. Other subs employed on the day were Gearoid Ryan for John O'Brien, Paul Kelly for Noel McGrath and Micheal Webster for Lar Corbett. In the end Tipperary won by nine (2-17 to 0-14). Galway and John McIntyre were left bewildered by a second half collapse while Tipperary and Liam Sheedy were left pondering a sleep-walking first half. League games can be strange, erratic affairs.

Versus Limerick

The following Sabbath, March 21, we were off to Limerick for round four in the series. Given the Limerick 'strike' and with Justin McCarthy fielding an alternative fifteen we were expected to collect another win without much fuss. The occasion gave Liam Sheedy an opportunity to experiment and the line-out reflected that outlook. Darren Gleeson got his second game in goal. Conor O'Brien was back corner back beside Paul Curran and Paddy Stapleton. David Young got his first league start at wing back beside Padraic Maher and Hugh Maloney. Midfield stayed the same – Brendan Maher and Shane McGrath. In attack the half line this time featured Seamus Hennessy, Seamus Callanan and Gearoid Ryan with Eoin Kelly, Micheal Webster and Timmy Hammersley on the inside line.

It would be a stroll in the park. Thirteen minutes in and Limerick were down to fourteen when midfielder Dean Madden was dismissed. Tipp led 1-10 to 0-2 at half time, Timmy Hammersley the goal scorer. In the second half Tipperary continued on the rampage to eventually win by twenty-two, 2-24 to 0-8. Seamus Hennessy hit six from play. Inevitably we introduced a full compliment of subs: John O'Brien for Seamus Callanan, John Devane for Shane McGrath, Paul Kelly for Eoin

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Waterford at the Stadium

Next up on March 28 was Waterford at the Stadium, a game that was sure to test our growing momentum since that early lapse against Dublin. Cummins was back in goal as we reverted to near full strength. The defence had Stapleton, Maher and Curran inside with Fanning, O'Mahony and Shane Maher outside. The Maher/McGrath midfield partnership was again on view. Unusually Lar Corbett started at number eleven between Gearoid Ryan and Noel McGrath. Eoin Kelly was out with a hamstring problem so the full line featured, unfamiliarly, Timmy Hammersley, John O'Brien and Paul Kelly.

We played well in the first half taking some textbook scores. Corbett in his new role hit four points, Gearoid Ryan and Paul Kelly firing two apiece. It might all have been consolidated but for Clinton Hennessy denying Noel McGrath with a marvellous save. Then at the other end Stephen Molumphy goaled for Waterford so we carried just a minimal lead to the interval, 0-13 to 1-9.

Waterford introduced John Mullane for the second half but some of Tipperary's best hurling was seen in the third quarter. A Noel McGrath goal was an important lodgement as we went five-up and seemed to have this game in our grasp. But it was Waterford who came strongest in the final quarter. Tipperary's attacks began to break down and the Deise chipped away at the lead. An Eoin Kelly goal from a twenty-metre free was important in their rally. In the end a foul on Dan Shanahan gave Eoin Kelly the leveller. It ended 1-19 for Tipperary, 2-16 for Waterford.

A dropped point on top of our defeat to Dublin meant the next game 'away' to Cork was going to be critical in deciding whether or not we made the league final for the third successive year. To complete the record we introduced just two subs against Waterford: Seamus Hennessy for Shane McGrath (injured) and Micheal Webster for Paul Kelly.

The Cork Game

The penultimate round of the league then took us to Pairc Ui Chaoimh on April 4 for a crunch tie that would decide our fate. Win and we would most likely be through to the final, so there was a lot at stake, especially with the game doubling as a dress rehearsal for the championship clash on May 30. The management opted for maximum strength when they chose the line out. Cummins was fronted by Stapleton, Maher and Cahill. Conor O'Brien got the nod at wing back beside O'Mahony and Fanning.

By now Maher and McGrath was our regular midfield partnership. The evidence of the Waterford game saw Corbett again at centre between Noel McGrath and Gearoid Ryan. Eoin Kelly was back fit at full between brother Paul and Timmy Hammersley.

Early evidence was worrying for Tipperary. Aisake O'Hailpin was bothering Padraic Maher - a foretaste of May 30 - and we could easily have leaked some early goals. Michael Cahill denied O'Hailpin on one occasion and Cummins did likewise to Paudie O'Sullivan. Half forwards were being well beaten so our defence was under strain until Cork, strangely, moved O'Hailpin to the 'forty'. By half time we were four down, 0-11 to 0-7.

We brought an altered mood to the second half. Brendan Maher stepped up form considerably at midfield and was involved in the lead up to a fine Paul Kelly goal. Paul fed off brother, Eoin, for a pair of smart points too and the net effect of our improvement was to go from four-down at the interval to four-up in the third quarter.

But in a game of swaying fortunes Cork came again. Pat Horgan did a neat one-two over Cahill's head to volley a classic goal. We lost Brendan Maher to injury, a critical blow for the final phase. The game went

point-for-point, Tipperary baffled by some odd refereeing. In the tightest of finishes Jerry O'Connor gave Cork the lead and yet another 'soft' free gave Pat Horgan the insurance score. Darragh Egan got one back for Tipperary but in a frenetic finish we failed to save the day. It ended 1-16 to 1-15, a narrow and perhaps luckless loss to Cork. Perhaps we should have been forewarned before returning to the Pairc at the end of May.

Once again our record is completed by including the five subs employed on the day: John O'Brien for Timmy Hammersley, Jody Brennan for Brendan Maher, David Young for Declan Fanning, Hugh Maloney for Gearoid Ryan and Darragh Egan for Paul Kelly. Offaly Match

The league was gone for Tipperary, though there was one final game to be played, an academic exercise against Offaly. The game was played at Tullamore on April 18 and given the lack of incentive Liam Sheedy opted to try out a few fringe players. Darren Gleeson got his third trip of the series in goal. Stapleton, Curran and Cahill fronted the Portroe man with David Young, O'Mahony and Padraic Maher on the half line. Hugh Maloney and Shane McGrath patrolled midfield. Hennessy, Callanan and Jody Brennan filled the half line with Eoin Kelly, Darragh Egan and Michael Heffernan on the inside line.

It was a low-key event, with nothing at stake for either side. Tipperary led 0-11 to 0-7 at half time. In the second half Eoin Kelly had to retire with a hamstring problem. Tipp were still leading entering the final quarter but then Shane Dooley goaled twice to snatch the initiative for the home side. Deep into injury time Tipperary were still trailing by two points when Seamus Callanan goaled a last-puck free to snatch a most unlikely win. It ended 1-18 to 2-14 to finally close accounts on a league campaign that had mixed quality from a Tipperary perspective. For the record Tipp introduced the following subs in Tullamore: Patrick Maher for Eoin Kelly, Shane Maher for Conor O'Mahony, Brendan Maher for David Young, John O'Brien for Michael Heffernan and Pat Kerwick for Darragh Egan.

So, it wasn't the most memorable league series from Tipperary though I suspect that win over Kilkenny was worth more long term to the blue and gold than a league title that eventually fell to Galway. Certainly it's a league that will long be remembered for the snow and the cancelled games, the sight of Sheedy pushing Cody and the win that ultimately acted as a precursor to September. Championships aren't won in February or March but little straws in an Arctic wind can sometimes be telling.

U21s cap memorable year

Tipperary's ninth All Ireland U21 title capped a truly memorable hurling year for the county. Galway were the luckless victims who arrived into a county en fete six days after the senior win; the Tribesmen had to endure the heaviest defeat ever in the history of U21 deciders. For Tipperary it was the crème de la crème of All Ireland wins, achieved with a star-studded team eight of whom had been part of the senior panel the previous Sunday. For a magnificent seven of those eight it was the completion of a coveted treble pack of All Ireland medals in minor, U21 and senior grades. Historic stuff indeed.

Yet as the crowds celebrated wildly in Semple Stadium that Saturday evening it was perhaps easy to forget that the path to this All Ireland win wasn't exactly a primrose one. How near we came to exit in Cork must still cause a shiver in the spines of the management. And in the early phases of the Munster final nobody was dreaming of All Irelands either as Clare threatened to derail the project. The story then of this win is a deal more complex than the final would suggest.

Munster was treacherous, a veritable minefield, one where we could so easily have tripped up. And tripping up wasn't an option in this grade, lest the team go down in history as the greatest U21 combination ever not to win an All Ireland. Remember the 2009 team, the successful minor class of '06, who got caught in the first round by Waterford a few days after the Munster senior final. The pressure was on to avoid a similar fate this time - this was a 'must win' grade for Tipperary.

After that '09 exit Declan Carr's management team was replaced by a new quartet comprising Ken Hogan (Lorrha), Tommy Dunne (Toomevara), T.J. Connolly (Cashel K.C.) and William Maher (Ballingarry). It replicated a structure that has now become the favoured model in Tipperary with Ken as overall manager, Tommy as coach and T.J. and William as selectors. There's was an onerous task, knowing that there was a talented side at their disposal but knowing also that nothing bar an All Ireland would satisfy expectations.

Versus Cork

With a bye to the Munster semi-final Tipperary's first outing was on July 14 when they had to travel to Pairc Ui Chaoimh to face a Cork team that had already dispatched Waterford quite impressively (1-16 to 1-3). It was just about the toughest opener you could imagine facing into fortress Cork against a county that made no secret of the huge effort they'd invested in this grade. Adding to the task was the fact that Brian O'Meara and John O'Neill were unable to start because of injury, though both would be pressed into service during the game.

For the record we began our campaign with the following fifteen: James Logue (Ballingarry); Kevin O'Gorman (Sarsfields), John Coghlan (Moyne/Templetuohy), Michael Cahill (Sarsfields); James Barry (Upperchurch/Drombane), Padraic Maher (Sarsfields), Brendan Maher (Borrisoleigh); Seamus Hennessy (Kilruane Mac Donagh's) and Noel McGrath (Loughmore/Castleiney); Denis Maher (Sarsfields), Patrick Maher (Lorrha), Paddy Murphy (Nenagh Eire Og); Michael Heffernan (Nenagh Eire Og), John O'Dwyer (Killenaule), Adrian Ryan (Templederry).

3,598 paying fans turned up for the game and they were about to witness an extraordinary spectacle as the match went to extra time before eventually Tipperary came through by just two points, 2-17 to 0-21. What a game and what an escape by Tipperary in the original hour!

Tipperary had the better of matters in the first half. Noel McGrath immediately moved to corner forward in a swop with Adrian Ryan. The teams traded a brace of points each before Cork goalie, Darren McCarthy, made the first of a number of top-class saves, this time denying Noel McGrath. Seamus Hennessy was impressing at midfield at this stage hitting some great scores. Another save denied John O'Dwyer a Tipperary goal but there was a let off at the other end too when a Cork forward blazed wide. Tipperary were leading approaching half time before a typical Patrick Maher solo set up Michael Heffernan for a superb goal to leave Tipperary in command at the interval, 1-8 to 0-7.

The third quarter was uneventful. John O'Dwyer was again denied by the Cork goalie but Tipperary were holding their lead. The last quarter, however, was to see Tipperary teeter on the brink of championship exit. Our midfield and half forwards faded and Cork got on a roll, going from three-down to three-up as the game entered the final two minutes. It was crisis time for Tipperary but cometh the hour, cometh the man. Substitute, Kieran Morris, was fouled near goal and Seamus Hennessy stepped up to rifle home an unstoppable free. The ball actually cracked off the stanchion supporting the net and rebounded into play, so Tipperary could be grateful for an alert umpire who instantly raised the flag. Tipperary had come back from the brink to send the game into extra time on a score line of 2-11 to

It was in the first period of extra time that Tipperary really put their stamp on this tie. Noel McGrath became fore influential scoring three points and setting up two more for Sean Carey. Padraic Maher and Brian O'Meara also emerged as big contributors. Seamus Hennessy's re-relocation to the half back line was also a key factor. The net effect saw Tipperary carry a 2-16 to 0-18 lead to the break in extra time. In the end it was enough, Cork unable to claw back this time and Tipperary emerging relieved after a truly epic battle against the old foe. As minors they'd beaten Cork in Munster and All Ireland finals and now three years later that edge was maintained.

For the record Tipperary used the following subs over the seventy plus minutes: Tom Butler (Clonoulty/Rossmore) for Denis Maher, Sean Carey (Moyle Rovers) for Adrian Ryan, Kieran Morris (Moycarkey/Borris) for John O'Dwyer, Ciaran Hough (Lorrha) for James Barry, Brian O'Meara (Kilruane Mac Donagh's) for Paddy Murphy and John O'Neill (Clonoulty/Rossmore) for Kieran Morris.

Munster Final

At a busy period for Tipperary hurling there was little rest time as the U21s faced into a Munster final on Wednesday July 28, just three days after the senior All Ireland quarter-final against Galway. Reigning U21 champs, Clare, came to Thurles for the final and were in no mood to roll over. The team showed just two changes from that which started against Cork. Sean Carey was in at wing forward in place of the injured Denis Maher and Brian O'Meara started at full forward with John O'Dwyer moving to the corner and Adrian Ryan slipping down to the subs.

Clare made a whirlwind start hitting a stunned Tipperary for 1-3 in the opening few minutes. It might even have been worse. Tipperary goalie, James Logue, atoned for an initial lapse by twice denying Clare a further goal, first from Darach Honan and then stopping a John Conlon 'penalty'. It took a great interception by James Barry to prevent another possible Clare goal so that the Tipperary fans in the crowd of 11,450 shuffled uneasily in the opening phase of this game.

We might easily have gone eight or ten points into arrears against a Clare team that contained ten of the panel that won the '09 All Ireland. Rattled and ruffled it took great nerve by Tipperary to weather that opening onslaught from the 'Banner'. But weather it they did. Key players settled to the pace of the game and by the twentieth minute a John O'Dwyer point had the teams level, 0-9 to 1-6. Clare regained the lead but then came

one of those golden moments that will linger in the memory. Brian O'Meara fed Michael Heffernan with a hand-pass (albeit a dubious one) and the Nenagh man, without putting hand to ball volleyed spectacularly to the roof of the Clare net. Tipperary led at the interval 1-12 to 1-9, a far cry from being six-down in the opening minutes.

In the second half Tipperary kept a modest distance from Clare for most of the trip, mainly a three-point gap. A Seamus Hennessy 'penalty' might have closed it out after Brian O'Meara was fouled but the shot was tipped over for a point. At the other end Michael Cahill made one vital interception to prevent another Clare goal. In the end four points in succession from Paddy Murphy in the final five minutes clinched the title for Tipperary. It was a smashing encore from the Nenagh man. It ended 1-22 to 1-17.

It was Tipperary's twentieth provincial title in the grade. Big displays from players like Padraic Maher, Seamus Hennessy, Brendan Maher (who got a nasty facial injury in the opening minutes), Paddy Murphy and Brian O'Meara were central to the success. Above all else we'll remember that wobbly start and how the team eventually came to terms with a brave Clare bid to hold their titles of '09. For the record Tipperary used just one sub, Kieran Morris replacing John O'Dwyer at the end.

The remaining chapter of this story it easily told because the hard work was done in Munster. Outside the province, the All Ireland series was to prove a stroll in the park. The pair of All Ireland semi-finals was played at Tullamore on Saturday August 21, Tipperary facing Ulster champions, Antrim, in the opening bout. We fielded the same fifteen that started against Clare.

It was a non-event. The scoreboard read six-nil at the end of the opening quarter and a whopping 1-18 to 0-1 at the interval, John O'Dwyer getting the goal. And there was no let-up in the second half, John O'Dwyer adding a second goal in a final score line of 2-32 to 1-7. O'Dwyer got the man-of-the-match award as Tipperary were simply in a different class to hapless Antrim. Galway beat Dublin in the second semi. For the record we used our quota of substitutions as follows: Christy Coughlan (Templederry) for Kevin O'Gorman, Ciaran Hough (Lorrha) for Brendan Maher, Kieran Morris (Moycarkey/Borris) for Patrick Maher, John O'Neill (Clonoulty/Rossmore) for Seamus Hennessy and Adrian Ryan (Templederry) for Noel McGrath.



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In the first half of the semi-final Tipperary full back John Coghlan was booked for a frontal tackle. We thought little of it at the time but there was a Croke Park sequel which led to his yellow card being upgraded to a red and, despite a late appeal by Tipperary, he would miss the All Ireland final. In the reshuffle for the final Padraic Maher went back full back with Brendan Maher going centre and Ciaran Hough coming in at wing. Otherwise the team remained the same.

All Ireland Final

The final was played in Thurles under lights on Saturday September 11. The venue was a controversial one having been decided early in the year as the set location for future U21 finals. Galway objected and threatened at one stage not to travel. In the end they turned up, though their supporters refused to travel, the attendance of 21,110 dominated by celebrating Tipperary fans.

If you hadn't taken your seat on time, this match was over before you got settled. In just over thirty seconds full forward Brian O'Meara had out-muscled and out-fielded his opponent to fire home the opening goal. Two minutes later O'Meara fed John O'Dwyer for a second. Before the first quarter was over Patrick Maher had supplied Sean Carey for a third goal. Tipperary now led 3-5 to 0-2. Game over.

In fairness Galway kept trying and enjoyed some success in the second quarter as Tipperary slackened. Fine goalkeeping by James Logue and some wayward shooting by the Galway

forwards prevented too much encroachment on the lead and Tipperary still led comfortably by 3-7 to 0-9 at the interval.

However, the third quarter saw Tipperary come with renewed energy. Noel McGrath was no excelling after a quiet opening period and soon Patrick Maher streaked through for our fourth goal. Galway hit the crossbar and then a booming free by Noel McGrath from out the country somehow deceived the Galway goalie for our fifth goal. And all the time the points kept coming with relentless regularity. It ended 5-22 to 0-12, the largest margin ever in an U21 final. Inevitably in such circumstances we used up our quota of five subs: Christy Coughlan (Templederry) for Kevin O'Gorman, John O'Neill (Clonoulty/Rossmore) for John O'Dwyer, Adrian Ryan (Templederry) for Paddy Murphy, Joe Gallagher (Kildangan) for Noel McGrath and Kieran Morris (Moycarkey) for Michael Heffernan.

It was a party night for Tipperary, the game a no-contest. In truth this championship was won in Munster. With an overlap of eight from the county senior panel this was a particularly tricky team to manage and in that regard Ken Hogan and his colleagues take major credit. Besides, many of the U21 games are fixed for a few days after major senior events so keeping the players focused and ready is no easy task. In the event it was a task that Ken Hogan, Tommy Dunne, T.J. Connolly and William Maher accomplished with distinction. It was our first U21 All Ireland in fifteen years, an overdue win, one that offers great promise for the future.

Larry Ryan of Cashel remembers the 1937 All-Ireland

For one spectator at Sunday's All-Ireland hurling final there will be a guaranteed cause for celebration even before the ball is thrown in. Larry Ryan from Cashel will be 80 and hoping that history repeats

When he was just seven his father brought him to the 1937 final between Tipperary and Kilkenny, played that year in Fitzgerald Stadium, Killarney, as the original Cusack Stand was being constructed but was 11 months behind schedule leaving Croke Park unusable for the hurling final.

The counties had each won 11 All-Irelands at that stage and the six previous final meetings had been evenly shared. But Tipperary were a younger team, which was to be a significant advantage on the vast new playing surface (180 x 100 yards) in Killarney.

An ageing Kilkenny, for whom the great Lory Meagher made his last appearance in a county jersey, went down to their heaviest All-Ireland defeat, 0-3 to 3-11.

"The special train left Cashel for Killarney on the morning," remembers Larry Ryan. "There was a branch line there. Although we were living in Cashel my father's people were from Bishopswood, near Dundrum out Clonoulty-Rossmore country. I had four uncles on the Bishopswood team that narrowly lost to Tom Semple's Thurles Sarsfields in 1904."

When Tipp next faced Kilkenny, a neighbour Jim Devitt, a neighbour of the Ryans on Cashel's John Street was playing and again Tipperary won – a trend that stretched from the early 1920s until eight years ago.

"It was an article of faith with us growing up. We assumed that we would beat them," he says.

"I have one flashing memory, a Tipperary goal as I looked down from what seemed to me very high up," he recalls of the afternoon, which had started alarmingly for him.

"There was mayhem outside the ground and the crush was immense. It must have been quite dangerous. In the movement of the crowd I was separated from my father - I remember him calling in the distance.

"A great big man picked me up and passed me overhead from one person to another, like a rugby ball, until I reached my father. I'd imagine my father was more frightened than I was."

There were 50,000 estimated to be in attendance on the afternoon and Killarney was swarming with visitors. There wasn't the same colour at matches in the 1930s: "the only colours were the crepe paper hats that always ran in the rain," he remembers.

"We went to a restaurant afterwards and shopped for souvenirs to bring home.

As an adult Larry Ryan took a position teaching English in the Christian Brothers Greenpark grammar school in Armagh in 1956 before moving to Belfast in the 1960s where he has lived since.

Born on the 5th September – just two days before his county recorded the famous 1930 All-Ireland win, becoming the first county to sweep the boards (senior, minor and junior) he has shared his birthday with a number of All-Ireland finals and specifically a number of Tipperary triumphs.

As well as 1937, the county won the MacCarthy Cup on the same date in 1965, against Wexford, and once more by beating Kilkenny in 1971 so Sunday will be his third birthday watching the two counties in action.

The Westmeath author John Weldon, who was better known by his nom de plume Brinsley MacNamara under which he wrote Valley of the Squinting Windows attended the final and wrote an account for The Irish Times, which concluded on an elegiac note.





In the All-Ireland Final, which Tipperary entered as outsiders against four-in-a-row champions Kilkenny, the team provided an thrilling display of hurling in what was seen as a great final. This year Tipp were not to be denied and the victory will stand well in the list of Tipperary's 26 All-Ireland championships. It was a great moment for all Tipperary supporters when Eoin Kelly, captain, raised the Liam McCarthy Cup. That evening the panel and management got a huge reception from the Tipperary supporters gathered in the Burlington Hotel for the traditional banquet organised by the Tipperary Association, Dublin, in conjunction with the Tipperary County Board and the Tipperary Supporters Club.

The minor team were knocked out of the Munster Championship by Clare in Ennis. The Under 21 team won the Munster Final in Thurles against All-Ireland champions Clare, and went on to become All-Ireland champions in a powerful display against Galway in Thurles six days after the senior final. The Tipperary Supporters Club provided significant support for under age hurling in Tipperary, including financial assistance with the expenses of underage hurling teams. Also, the Tipperary Supporters Club was again delighted to sponsor the All-Ireland Under 16 Championship, which is organised very professionally every year by County Tipperary Bord na nÓg. We would also look forward to a full return to action for James Woodlock, Paul Kelly and Pat Kerwick, all of whom suffered serious injuries.

In October came the announcement that Liam Sheedy, Eamonn O'Shea and Michael Ryan had decided not to continue as manager, coach and selector of the senior team. The Tipperary Supporters Club would like to record our sincere thanks to Liam, Eamonn and Michael for the outstanding service which they gave to Tipperary for the past three years, culminating in the terrific All-Ireland success of this year. Go néirí libh.

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

Tipperary Senior Football

While it would appear that Tipperary football took a step back in 2010, the fact that they didn't hit the headlines this year shouldn't hide the fact that the premier county are still going in the right direction at senior inter-county level.

Successive promotions in 2008 and 2009 saw Tipperary play in division two if this year's National League but while their stay, for the moment, has just been one year, it was still a very positive league campaign.

Tipperary found themselves in a very competitive division and at the start of which, if you had offered Tipperary five points from their seven games, they would have believed that it would have been good enough to stay up.

In the other three divisions, a fine-point haul would have been good enough to avoid being in the bottom two but in the end Tipp came up short by just a point of earning a second year in the second tier.

Reflecting on the league, Tipperary will rue the defeat to Donegal in round five as the costly one. It was made even more disappointing that it came just six days after the superb win over Meath. However, they were not able to get back down from the high of that win and the single point defeat to the Ulster side ultimately proved crucial.

Poor starts dogged Tipperary's league campaign yet again. In the opener at a foggy Portlaoise in early February, Tipperary allowed Laois open a ten-point lead at one stage before reeling in the home side to level but weren't able to kick-on. However, they were to get their revenge later in the summer.

When Tipperary suffered a heavy 12-point defeat at home to Kildare in round two, we wondered were Tipperary out of their depth in the division but we got our answer in round three as Tipperary galvanised themselves and earned a superb draw in Newry against subsequent All Ireland runners-up Down who

started ten of the side that began the All Ireland defeat to Cork.

The point gave Tipp the boost they required as they went onto beat Meath in round four in what was the highlight of the league campaign. The subsequent defeat to Donegal proved costly as it meant Tipperary had to earn something from the trip to Crossmaglen to take on Armagh.

Tipperary again started slowly with Armagh leading by 12points at one stage early in the second half. Yet again, Tipperary made a dramatic comeback to level with five minutes to go before the Orchard men found their stride to win in the end by four points.

The defeat meant that the final game against Westmeath was immaterial with both teams already doomed to relegation but Tipperary ended on a high with a good six-point win as thoughts turned to the championship.

It couldn't have been much tougher for Tipperary in their Munster Championship opener as they welcomed All Ireland champions Kerry to Semple Stadium in mid May.


A superb goal by Philip Austin in the fifth minute got Tipperary off to a superb start and while Kerry recovered to lead by one-point at half time, Tipperary were struggling to stem the tide as Kerry's movement plus the presence of Kieran Donaghy at the edge of the square posed major problems.

A Barry Grogan goal in the 50th minute ensured Tipp were still in the game trailing by two points but Kerry pulled away in the end to record a comfortable victory.

Tipperary had to endure another long wait until their All Ireland Qualifier when they were drawn to meet Laois in Semple Stadium. With key players, Ciaran McDonald and Christopher Aylward having left for the US for the summer and Sean Carey opting off the panel to concentrate on the Tipp Under 21 hurlers, it appeared a bridge too far again for Tipp.


However, that wasn't the case as Tipperary recorded another notable victory in what was a close game from start to finish, decided by Brian Mulvihill's match-winning point, deep in injury time.

Tipperary's reward was a trip to Croke Park to take on Dublin.

At that time, the Dubs were reeling off the back of a five-goal humbling at the hands of Meath in the Leinster semi-final.

John Evan's charges travelled to GAA headquarters confident of getting a result. However, the occasion got to some of the Tipp players and they allowed Dublin to get the first five points of the game and it appeared ominous.

However, despite also conceding a goal to Michael Dara McAuley, Tipp once again battled back and with the help of a Barry Grogan goal trailed by just two points at the break. Tipperary were dictating the game at this stage but were never able to gain parity against their illustrious opponents who were under severe pressure from their supporters.

The Dubs found a way to pull away in the end and while the result appeared disappointing at the time considering Dublin's problems, that they went onto reach the All Ireland semi-final, before losing to Cork in a game they should have won, provides an indication of how well Tipperary played.

The question as we face in to 2011 in what will be John Evans' fourth year at the helm will be is there any more to come from the team. In what is a relatively young squad, they are all a year older and more experienced while the success garnered by those on the Under 21 team will be invaluable in terms of confidence going forward.

In terms of what to expect in 2011, the main aim will be to earn promotion back to division two straight away. Division 3 is a tough division with all eight teams harbouring ambitions of getting into the top-two berths.

The league will probably be the main focus because of the draw for the Munster Championship which has seen Tipperary paired against Kerry once again, this time in Killarney. What will be in Tipp's favour will be the lack of expectation as the home side will be overwhelming favourites but will be under pressure after what was a poor 2010 when they exited the championship at the quarter final stages.

Overall, it was a good year for Tipperary at senior intercounty level and that some people see it as a disappointing one shows just how far we have come over the last three years and

with football at underage level thriving, better things appear in the offing in the years to come.

TIPPERARY UNDER 21 FOOTBALL REVIEW 2010

Historic Munster title for Under 21 footballers

The full set is now complete.

Until a cold and crisp night at Austin Stack Park in Tralee on March 31st last, the Under 21 Football title was the only one that eluded Tipperary from having the perfect set of Senior, Intermediate/Junior, Under 21 and Minor at both hurling and football.

To win for the first time in any competition is memorable but this will live long in the history of Tipperary GAA.

If beating Kerry wasn't big enough, to do so in their own backyard was a remarkable achievement which was acknowledged by a knowledgeable home support who did not begrudge Tipperary their deserved victory.

Tipperary got to the final by virtue of an impressive semi-final win over Limerick at Semple Stadium where they outscored the visitors by 0-16 to 2-5 with Sean Carey the star of the show kicking seven points, six from play.

Less than two weeks later, Tipperary travelled into the lion's den to take on Kerry in Tralee and won in fairytale style. To do so coming from behind, playing in to a strong wind in the second half showed the strength of character within the side, under the leadership of senior star Ciaran McDonald who finally banished the memory of the 2009 defeat, which acted as his and the panel's motivation ahead of the game.

You would have expected that if the game, as expected, was tight in the closing stages that the tradition of success in Kerry would come to the fore in the closing stages but it was Tipperary who finished the game the stronger, a feature also of the first half which indicates that the premier men were in better physical condition that their rivals.

Accounting for such a victory, it is probably unfair to pick out

certain players over others but for Tipp to prevail, they needed big performances.

From 1 to 17, they left nothing out on the field. One thing was certain before the game, Kerry were not going to have things all their own way. Much like the senior set-up, Tipperary defended diligently, never allowing Kerry to create many clearcut scoring opportunities.

Playing into the teeth of the breeze, Kerry made a blistering start and were 1-2 to 0-1 ahead after the opening quarter. Crucially, Tipperary managed to get the upperhand before the break and helped by a goal by Bernard O'Brien and points from Alan Moloney and Sean Carey, swept to a 1-4 to 1-2 lead at the break.

As expected, Kerry took control on the restart but Tipperary defended with great resilience only allowing the homeside to get into a one-point lead. The character of the Tipperary team shone through in the final quarter.

It took Tipperary a full seventeen minutes to score in the second half and it was man of the match Peter Acheson who drew the foul with Sean Carey converting. Between the 49th and 53rd minutes, Kerry kicked four wides and at this stage you wondered if it was going to be Tipp's day after all.

Super-sub Shane Egan proved to be the hero kicking two points from play in the final ten minutes with the final whistle bring unbridled scenes of joy on the pitch.

In their first All Ireland semi-final in the grade, Tipperary took on Ulster champions Donegal in Parnell Park. Lady luck wasn't on Tipp's side that night. The night before the game, midfielder Peter Acheson was struck down with a virus which ensured he wasn't at 100% but still gave what he could to the cause.

With the game still in the melting pot early in the second half, captain and full back Ciaran McDonald was harshly sent off for two bookable offences. Added to that, Donegal goalkeeper Peter Boyle pulled off two fantastic saved from Alan Matassa and Peter Acheson, goals which could have changed the course of the game.

However, Donegal pulled away to win by eight points in the end but only after a gutsy Tipperary effort.


Holycross man only Tipp representative on London Hurling Legends XV

Tipperary. As a sixteen year old he lined out for Holycross in a senior Mid final against Thurles Sarsfields in 1957, when he faced the legendary Mickey 'Rattler' Byrne. Johnny's intercounty career for London spanned sixteen years and included a junior All-Ireland medal in 1963 (when he scored 1-4 against Antrim in Casement Park) and an intermediate All-Ireland medal in 1967 as well as playing in five other All-Ireland semifinals during that golden era for London hurling in the 60s and early 70s.

But Johnny Barrett's finest hour in a London jersey was undoubtedly playing a man-of-the-match performance against Galway in the Exiles' famous All-Ireland quarter-final victory over Galway in Duggan Park, Ballinasloe in 1973.

"That match was undoubtedly the pinnacle of my playing career. I won eleven senior championship medals with Brian Boru and also played with Treaty Gaels for a few years," said Johnny who also confirmed that a number of other Tipperary men who hurled in London in the 60s and 70s could be considered unlucky not to have made the London Hurling Legends XV.

Among the other fine Tipperary players not considered from the same era are Cappawhite's Patsy O'Neill and Pat McDermott, Lattin's Fonsie Condon, Paddy Ryan from Drom and Inch, the Hickey brothers Johnny and Christy from Rockwell, Paddy O'Dwyer from Boherlahan, Michael Loughnane from Roscrea, Fonsie Farrell from Rahealty, former All-Ireland minor medal winner Michael Craddock from Thurles Sarsfields and goal-keeper Willie Barnaville from Gortnahoe. During his long service to London GAA, Johnny Barrett was also a top referee.

A life-long supporter of the blue and gold, Johnny Barrett was indeed a very proud Tipperary man as he watched the Premier County's hurlers win their twenty-sixth All-Ireland title on September 5th this year.

"I thought they were absolutely superb that day and it was one of the best ever Tipperary performances in an All-Ireland final during my lifetime" concluded Johnny.

We won the All Ireland 2

All during the grand month of September we lived in a contented glow but I suppose the "we" requires a slight explanation. This is not the royal "we" beloved of Queen Victoria (of saintly memory) monarch of Great Britain and Empress of India. It doesn't even apply to the "people of Tipperary" on whose behalf Eoin Kelly accepted the Liam McCarthy Cup in a wonderfully emotive speech. Many of an older generation versed in comics and western films are familiar with the border town of El Paso and all that it means. In Tipperary there are five such villages or towns, namely Gortnahoe, Ballingarry, Mullinahone, Grangemockler and Carrick on Suir. Across the border are the hostile badlands of Urlingford, Tullaroan, Graigue, Callan (of the disturbances), Windgap and Piltown. The ancient rivalry between Tipp and Kilkenny has always been keen but no place is it keener than in the El Paso lands. Only those who live there can really appreciate the razor sharpness of that rivalry. Perhaps the football rivalry along the borders of Tyrone and Derry might sometimes hint at it.

I was made aware of this rivalry at an early age but the Rio Grande was only a mile from the home of my birth. I was on holidays with my mother at our cousins. I was five years of age. We were listening to the match on a radio in the kitchen. Many of their neighbours were also in. I know now that the game was the 1950 All Ireland hurling final. The match was exciting and there was plenty of shouting. Then Kilkenny got a 21 yards free and the deadly Jimmy Langton came up to take it. He blasted for goal and the Tipp backs stopped it. My mother jumped up dancing and cheering around the kitchen. What would a five year old boy do only follow suit? We suddenly realised that we were the only ones dancing and cheering. We were surrounded by the silence of the grave. I forgot to mention that our cousins were the O'Haras and that they lived in Thomastown. Bearded Viking Dick O'Hara was to appear half a generation later, a swashbuckling corner back.

Another true story of that famous day. The late Jack Gardiner was born in Poulacapple in the parish of Mullinahone. When he married he moved to the town of Callan, four miles away. He kept a pub in Callan and lived in an alien land, like Ruth in the bible, for the rest of his long life. Jack had a son Michael who was a good hurler. He was good enough to be on the Kilkenny team which defeated Tipp in the 1950 minor final. Jack cheered for his son and his team but as soon as the Irish Press Cup was presented Jack's hand went into his pocket and out came his blue and gold paper cap for the senior game. Jack's allegiance to the black and amber lasted barely an hour.

A thing about children, they can be depended on to let you down. A generation later in 1987 my son Brendan then aged 11 and myself went to Croke Park to cheer on Tipp and John Leahy in the minor final. We lost but saw Galway defeat Kilkenny in the senior game. It was a rainy wet evening and we went into a crowded chipper in Kilkenny on the way home. The special that evening was a double burger. I ordered one and Brendan, then a small weed of a lad, did the same. "Could you eat a double burger" asked the man behind the counter? The café was crowded but in a twist of fate a silence fell just as Brendan replied."I could eat anything once Kilkenny were bet". We left for home rather quickly. Now Brendan has a year old daughter. On the evening of the All Ireland she was being delivered to our house by her other grandmother. She was slightly nervous to be passing through Mullinahone in a car flying Kilkenny flags. At least they weren't flying in triumph. The little one has two sets of GAA gear. Could Brendan yet have to copy the lead of the late

When I was young the 1960s were great years for Tipp hurling and football was the game of Mullinahone. Those were the days of the hoodoo when Kilkenny couldn't beat us in an All Ireland final.1922 was the last time that they had lowered our colours. We had trimmed them in Killarney in 1937 and in 1945 John Maher led us to another victory. I have told you of 1950 and then came the great Tipp wins of 1964 and 1965. In 1967 Kilkenny won in a bad tempered final. The hoodoo had lasted 45 years. In 1971 the status quo was restored and hoodoo no. 2 was on its way. The famine intervened and when it was over we crowned its end with another win in 1991. The archbishop got it right when he said "Michael Cleary went for a point but all he got was a goal". It was to be 2009 before Kilkenny again beat us in a final. This time the hoodoo had lasted only 42 years. On that reckoning it must be written in the stars or be an undiscovered law of mathematics that hoodoo no. 3 will last 39 years until 2048 AD.

Life in the border lands can be tough. At the sad homecoming of 2009 I met Olivia from Gortnahoe. She was lamenting because her cousin PJ Ryan from Johnstown was man of the match in the All Ireland and won an All Star. The Johnstown Fenians who came from junior ranks in the later 1960s are credited with firming up Kilkenny teams. Prior to the Hendersons and Pat Delaney weren't Kilkenny regarded as the great stylists? Thurles CBS can take some of the credit (blame) for some of the change. While inter-county rivalry is understood by most it is only lived by those in border places or maybe by some of those forced to live like the biblical Ruth in alien fields. Rivalry among "borderers" is full time and not just confined to the times that Tipp play Kilkenny. It is there when Tipp or

Kilkenny play anyone or nobody at all. The loyal Kilkenny supporter is one who if Tipp were playing Uzbekstan would cheer for Uzbekstan. The feeling is mutual. An old Tipp Sean Gael was in his local one night enjoying a pint. The tv was on and England were playing a world cup match. The younger crowd in the pub were cheering for England but Sean Gael remained silent. "Could you not support England" they asked Sean Gael and proceeded to quote the number of Irish working in England, the number of Irish men playing soccer with English clubs et al. Sean Gael was unmoved until near the end of the game when he gently nudged one of his friends "I think" he said "that I could support England "and he paused "but only if they were playing Kilkenny".

Loyalty is deep and consists of making statements like the Mullinahone men who would find an excuse in days of yore to visit Callan on the day after a big game and walk up and down Green Street. Making a statement sometimes led to a fracas in border public houses but nowadays we are more civilised and the old practice has been replaced by psychological warfare. Callan before their bypass, in 1987 greeted Tipp traffic on the road to Dublin with the message "Croke Park this way". On our return journey home the signs read "Goodbye for another 16 years". We remembered. No wonder we cheered four years later in 1991 when Michael Cleary shot for a point and all he got was that goal. The battle of one upmanship goes on. In the lead up to the All Ireland final I myself was interviewed by TG4 for the Nuacht (as gaeilge no less). The interview began with me standing at the county bounds bridge less than two miles from Mullinahone. As all bridges are black and yellow (amber) the colours showed up well on the tv. Some nights later painters had changed the black to blue and the bridge has remained blue and gold so far. This war is fought with colour and sound as well as any other available weapon. The new battle grounds are the airwaves. Thank God for local radio, the local papers, mobile phones and U tube. These have replaced the ballads

The All-Ireland jokes must have made Vodafone a fortune. As we drove home from Croke Park in September we began to get some of them. The greatest scud missile in the whole campaign was fired on youtube by the lady who binned the Kilkenny cat. I hear that the original lady in Sheffield didn't do too well. Still my own favourite is two lines from Seamus Doran's "Were you there? "Brian Cody's Cats did drown, beneath the raging sea of blue and gold". Did I mention the Callan bypass? Strange to relate we forgot to take it coming back from Dublin on September the 5th. Earlier that evening the infamous "5 in a row my a..." blue and gold car from Mullinahone had paid a flying visit to Callan. Luckily when the engine blew on the way home it was well inside the Tipp border.

Prior to the final I was hopeful of a Tipp win but also fearful. Brian Cody was far too sensible a manager. He didn't do hype. Had we warned Kilkenny in 2009? Would they heed the warning? What about Pairc Ui Chaoimh early in the year? In the end Kilkenny were hit with the same over confidence in September that we were hit with in May but in September there was no back door. Tipp's greatest allies in the battle were the Kilkenny supporters. They were magnificent in their drive for five, turning out in their thousands in Nowlan Park and witnessing miracles. They got to the team like we never could. It happened to myself before the 1960 final and that is a lesson that I have never forgotten. Up under the roof of the Cusack stand that day in September I hoped, but I didn't believe until Benny Dunne and Seamus Hennessy scored their points. Lars third goal was the icing on the cake.

I have to return to the "we" who won the All-Ireland. It was certainly the borderers. I have lived through All-Ireland wins over Kilkenny seven times with only two losses. In six of those games we were mere spectators. In 1991 we had a presence on the team and a bigger one in 2009 but in 2010 the captain who brought McCarthy home was one of our own and he also had some of our own for splendid backup. Only one little parish in the country has two 2010 hurling All Stars. Oh yes we played our part in derailing the drive for five. We were very much under the cosh as titles piled up across the border since 2001. We fought the good fight and kept the faith in the ongoing psychological battle. Did Uachtarán Cooney depart from protocol when he presented McCarthy first to "a great Mullinahone man"? Oh yes we won the All-Ireland this year.

Lest anyone accuse us of cat-bashing, I conclude with this story. Long, long ago when the Kilkenny men still played football (1900) Tipp played Kilkenny in the All-Ireland home semifinal in Carrick-on-Suir (10-6-1902). Kilkenny won but Tipp objected. Clonmel Shamrocks had been beaten by Mullinahone 1-4 to 0-4 in the county semi final, but had got through on an objection. Kilkenny were represented by the Slate Quarries who had five Tipp men in their ranks from neighbouring Grangemockler Ballyneale. The Shamrock were awarded a replay which Kilkenny refused and Tipp advance to the home final against Galway which they won easily. The Shamrocks did, however, use the Grangemockler Five in the home final as they did also in the final against London for whom a certain Sam Maguire lined out. Tipp won narrowly. When it came to presenting the medals the Shamrocks left out the Grangemockler Five, but and here's the rub. The Kilkenny County Board presented the Five with five Leinster medals. So if you come across a Leinster SF medal for 1900, down in Ballyneale or Faugheen or Grangemockler it is probably genuine. Two lessons to learn from the above (1) there is some good in the Kilkenny men (2) never trust townies.

A letter of thanks to Tipperary management

Tipperary, October 2010.

Dear Liam & Colleagues,

Just heard the news, Liam. Devastating. Brendan Cummins has been on the radio describing it as like a death in the family. Exaggeration of course, but I think I know how he feels. All Tipperary knows how he feels. Just as we were getting comfortable with our new-found glory this unwelcome news has jolted us back to reality. We feel like late night revellers when the music stops and there's work to be faced in the morning.

You know what else it reminds me of, Liam? 2001. On 9/9 we began a party of parties as Nicky and the boys delivered that All Ireland. Two days later, Tuesday 9/11, and the music stopped. Other events, life-and-death events, took over our screens and newspapers and an All Ireland win was relegated to the back pages of irrelevancy. The shortest All Ireland party in history.

Anyway back to the present. I've never spoken to you, and, you know, your colleagues, Eamonn and Michael, wouldn't recognise me if I bumped into them on the street. Actually bumping into Michael wouldn't be the wisest, would it? I remember him as a corner back, 'tough out' as they used to say. He knew how to beat Kilkenny in a final too, from 1991, and I'm sure his words encouraged the lads before September 5. I remember Eamon from UCD and with Kilruane and various Tipperary teams, a pacey wing forward in his time, unlucky to arrive during the famine. It was at the University in Galway that his coaching first drew notice and by now it's legendary – even Jamesie O'Connor rayes about the man.

Since I heard the news, Liam, that you were all stepping aside I've been thinking about the past three years and what it has all meant to us. We're a proud old county, aren't we, maybe too proud at times. Having to sit back and watch those Kilkenny lads play Molly Bawn with the hurling world hasn't been easy. I fairness now they were mostly humble enough about it all but the odd crack was beginning to appear. Wasn't D.J. Carey, a sound fellow normally, talking about Kilkenny winning a possible six or even seven in a row. And on the way up to the final didn't I hear Liam Fennelly say on the radio that Tipp don't like being beaten by Kilkenny but they better get used to it. Hard to take that, Liam, isn't it?

So, you'll understand where I'm coming from lads, and I think I can speak for the entire county when I say a huge thank you for what you've done. You see we're a hurling county. Our self-image is built around the 'caman' and 'sliotar'. When we do well at that we walk tall. Life is suddenly good, recession or no recession. When we meet there's a buzz of conversation about the great day. We can look back at the tape and note this or that little ploy that Eamon worked on with the boys. We can pick up the papers and read about ourselves, about the great exploit and the admiration of outsiders. Suddenly we're the epicentre of the hurling world. Look at us world, we're the kiddies. That's what you've done for us.

You know one of the features of your management record, Liam that I admire most is the way you've been able to turn adversity on its face. Didn't you do it with the minors in '06, losing Munster and reinventing the mission to take the All Ireland? Remember that league trimming by Kilkenny in the spring of '09 and how you turned that around too. It was a different story when they came to town for the league final.

But your biggest turnaround of all had to be this year. Liam, I have to confess I thought we were banjaxed after Cork. O my God! The skinning we got that day! How you managed to resurrect the campaign after that is a mystery to most of us. Didn't some of the lads even see a smirk on Cody's face as he left the Pairc that afternoon? And why shouldn't he smile? The rest of us were in tears.

It's with a sense of shame now that I must admit that I doubted everything after Cork. I've just been re-reading an excellent article that Kieran Shannon of *The Sunday Tribune*, e-mailed to me recently. He wrote it the week after the All Ireland. The word 'Trust' figures prominently. You and Eamon and Michael embedded massive trust in

the panel. As Kieran Shannon wrote, 'Trust in the system, trust in 'the family', and above all, to trust themselves as individuals'. We doubted, you trusted.

Stop obsessing about defending, as others like Galway did to their cost against Kilkenny. Instead attack and trust. We're sad to lose you and your colleagues, Liam, but we understand your decision. You owe us nothing; the debt is all on our side. And when we're old and feeble we'll look back on 2010, the year of Sheedy and his team, and say like Churchill said about the RAF, 'This was their finest hour'.

All-Ireland Hurling Final

"Heard the men coming from the fair at Shinrone . . ."

If by the end of this article you deem it to have been unduly sycophantic, reader, don't blame me. Really, don't. Look: the editorial committee of this august publication having requested an outsider's view of Tipperary's All Ireland triumph, plain good manners, not to mention simple cop-on, mean that I'm going to be minding my p's and q's and generally giving credit where credit is due. Not that that's difficult in the circumstances, for this was a famous victory won in exhilarating fashion against the most successful hurling team of all time – which, of course, made the victory even more famous, more worthy, more treasurable. Too much praise is barely enough.

Anyway, what else could I do but be nice to the new champions given that some of my best friends, etc. Brendan Cummins has long been the man in charge of my Pips and Peps at AIB; granted, the less said about their recent performance the better, but that's hardly Brendan's fault. And Eoin Kelly and Lar Corbett occasionally send me text messages; far more impressive than being on Angelina's speed dial, eh? And on the All Stars trip to Buenos Aires last December it was abundantly clear that the current Tipperary players are a bunch their families can be proud of, indeed a bunch the county at large can be proud of. Come to think of it, on the same All Stars trip I gave Liam Sheedy a book about the US ice hockey team's famous victory over the Russians (who were professionals – the US were college students) at the 1980 Winter Olympics. Liam reminded me of that on All Stars night at Citywest two months ago and added that it had "made all the difference" for Tipp this year, though admittedly I might possibly have dreamed that last bit.

Just so that this piece isn't all wine and roses, a couple of small caveats. Splendidly and all as Tipperary performed on the big day, it was a back-door All Ireland win, meaning that a front-door All Ireland win will be required sooner or later in order to erase that (very) small asterisk. By the same token, intoxicating a win as it was, it cannot be allowed to become a one-off; this has to be – to be made to be –the start of something big for the county, a comma rather than a full stop. And of the numerous grounds for disappointment arising from Sheedy's departure, the most notable from an outsider's point of view is that we'll now never know how well or otherwise Tipperary on his watch would have dealt with success. Would the Portroe man have ensured that one All Ireland, irrespective of its sweetness, was not enough? How would he have gone about the task? It is a small pity this story will remain untold.

Still, he and his troops certainly dealt with failure extremely well. Therein lay another cause for jubilation. Not every team that finishes second manages to go one better the following season. There is nothing written in the stars to say so. Thus Tipperary could have spent the year feeling sorry for themselves after the 2009 All Ireland final, or assuming that because they'd hurled so well in defeat to Kilkenny they were the natural and inevitable heirs to the throne, or both. In truth, they probably did do both for a time. But the defeat to Cork at Páirc Uí Chaoimh – and more so the manner of it – helped flush the toxins out of the system. From there it was, because it had to be, a case of back to basics and an arrival at the realisation that 2010's was the championship they were trying to win, not 2009's.

They teetered on the brink once thereafter. The five minutes that decided the destination of the MacCarthy Cup, that ultimately deprived Kilkenny of the five in a row and that have written the introductory narrative for Tipperary's fortunes in the first half of the new decade? Not five minutes at Croke Park on September 5th: five minutes at Croke Park on July 25th. The closing five minutes of the All Ireland quarter-final. The five minutes that might have seen Tipperary stumble off the precipice and into the abyss. The five minutes that instead saw them inch their way back to safety and into a potentially glorious new dawn.

A friend from Clonmel had texted me that morning. This was the big one, he said. This was a match Tipperary simply had to win, otherwise their hopes would be over for another year, Sheedy would step down and next season the county would be starting all over again under a new management team. He said – or texted – a mouthful there.

And it was, like Waterloo, a damned close run thing. What if Ollie Canning hadn't gone off injured in the closing stages? What if Galway, two points ahead, hadn't decided to play a grisly game of pat-a-cake with a chance that could have put them three ahead? Yet it would be wrong to say that Tipperary were lucky. They hurled their way out of a corner, and that had nothing to do with luck. Instead it was to do with good habits and

experience, with maintaining one's composure and doing the right thing under pressure, with being calm enough to take a point instead of panicking and pressing the Hail Mary button, with Pa Bourke looking up and picking out a teammate (and clubmate) in a better position rather than going for glory from an unlikely angle

In the macro it was all about the collective. John O'Brien, mar shampla, had had an unhappy afternoon on Tommy Walsh in 2009. Now it would be overdoing it to say he was Cuchulainn reborn 12 months later, but in the rematch he scored two points from limited possession. In other words, he did his bit. Not dissimilarly, Lar Corbett reputedly had six touches in the final. Has there ever been a higher yield-from-input ratio? Under the imaginative coaching of Eamon O'Shea, who one

suspects will be missed as much as Sheedy if not more so, Tipperary pulled and tugged at the fabric of Kilkenny's jumper until they ripped holes. (As an aside: both in 2009 and 2010, Tipp improved ten lengths between the All Ireland semi-final and the final. That wasn't a coincidence. That was Eamon O'Shea.) It was all about movement, about fluidity, about hitting the spaces. Many moons ago at Anfield, Bill Shankly instructed a young Kevin Keegan to get behind the opposition defence "and drop a few hand grenades". That is precisely what Corbett and the phenomenon that is Noel McGrath - not since the days of Jimmy Doyle and Eddie Keher has there been a teenager as gifted – did in the All Ireland

The fact that the winners had less possession than their opponents turned out to matter not a whit; it was what they did with it, the manner in which they moved the Kilkenny defenders around the chessboard and the positions the runners took up off the ball that mattered. Granted, the winners may not have been quite eight points a better team on the day. Then again, they most definitely had not been five points an inferior team the same day a year earlier. Swings and roundabouts.

To put their achievement into further context, the entire hurling world had for ages beforehand been saying, to the point of tedium and beyond, that it was "up to the other counties" to come up to Kilkenny's level. Tipperary did. Under Sheedy, a man who learned from his few errors as he went along and who never made the mistake of believing he was bigger than the job, they accepted the challenge, met it and in the end surpassed and unhorsed the champions, not by playing them at their own game but by playing them at a game of Tipp's devising. This was new-age hurling.

There's one other point it's incumbent on a member of the national Gaelic games media to make here. If Tipperary have of late been doing things right on the field, they've been doing them right off the field also. Painstaking, helpful and thoughtful, Ger Ryan is everything a PRO should be, as was Ed Donnelly before him. Prior to each big match Ger emails us out an information pack crammed with useful facts and figures that one suspects Seamus O'Doherty, the Sultan of Statistics, has a large hand in. When it came to the pre-All Ireland media event at the Horse and Jockey, moreover, the Sunday papers were given 20 minutes in a room with one of the players – 20 minutes that swelled to 40 minutes when the man on the door saw how well the encounter was going and had the sense to leave the player to continue chatting away. The player in question? Only the chap who'd proceed to score three goals the following week. And no, these may not be matters of great import to the man on the Clonmel omnibus, but as an indication of how professionally Tipperary go about their business these days they're immensely informative. It's the little details, as Sherlock Holmes would say, that are the most important.

There. Now that wasn't too sycophantic, was it?

Yes it was a glorious feeling to be on top of the hurling world and as the rain poured, so too did the adulation of the multitudes onto the heroes who had us all laughing at clouds. The recession was forgotten as the celebrations kicked in and with Semple Stadium rocking like never before, Eoin and Liam Sheedy introduced Liam McCarthy to Tipperary once more. It was a memorable moment which had been building so brilliantly courtesy of the various entertainers who warmed up the massive crowd of devoted Tipperary people. The national media caught a glimpse of what hurling and the GAA means to Tipperary folk and thankfully they were able to capture the mood expertly. It was the stuff of legend and it was all being recalled in Semple Stadium at the homecoming and for many weeks afterwards.

There was a spring in the step of Premier County folk - as Archbishop Dermot Clifford put it - "It lifted us all and gave us new hope". He was right - a smile had returned to the faces; children were proud to wear their blue and gold jerseys; parents were happy to buy the gear; Tipp were back and so were the good old days.

The cup has been on tour ever since in the company of the players, management and County Board Chairman Barry O'Brien who deserves enormous credit for his role in bringing the GAA into every nook and cranny of Tipperary. Together with Board officials Timmy Floyd, Sean Nugent, Eamon Buckley, Ger Ryan and the divisional officers they have overseen a massive tour de force of The Premier County where Liam McCarthy has been welcomed. The warmth of the welcome has not diminished - Tipperary people are still feeding off the vapour trails of September, even as Christmas approaches.

In a sense the homecoming is still in full swing, even though many of the players have returned to the grind at this stage -it makes it a little easier to return when the spoils of victory have already been tasted. But, as Christmas turns over to the New Year, thoughts of retaining the title come to mind. The Waterford Crystal will begin soon; then the National Hurling League - Kilkenny up first; followed by the championship again.

Plenty to look forward to then, and loads to look back on.

The year has been a memorable one for this great Tipperary man whose exploits are now being prepared to be published in book form next year. That's a publication which will be eagerly awaited by hurling fans everywhere.



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Paul Curran a model in adversity

The words of the patriot Lord Mayor of Cork, Terence MacSweeney, who died on hunger strike on October 25th 1920 keep going round and round in my head." It is not those who can inflict the most but those who can endure the most, who will prevail". Written in a different context but still relevant. It was the evening of Friday at October 15th. I was seated at a family gathering in the Little Italy Restaurant in Kilkenny City. My mobile beeped at 7.20pm. It was a text message from my son Kevin in Cork. "6 Tipp all stars, 2 from Mullinahone". My heart lurched. For once, I thought justice has been done and years of hard work often in adversity has been rewarded. Truly 2010 has turned out to be a wonderful hurling year. Some people it is said are born with a silver spoon in their mouths while others must labour hard to earn an honest crust. It is the same with hurlers. Some are born with all the abilities and they find it easy to hone their silken skills to almost perfection.

Others have to work hard at their game and much of the journey is filled with setbacks. The whole country knows of the skills of Eoin Kelly, Tipperary's top championship scorer of all time. His 6th All Star award caused hardly a ripple. The elevation of his club-mate Paul Curran to all star status was the triumph of a man making the most of his talent. Paul's story should serve as an inspiration to the many because most of us are born without that silver spoon of awesome talent.

Had Paul been born seven weeks later both he and Eoin Kelly, born the following January would have been of an age as regards playing the games. Instead Paul all through his underage career had to battle against lads almost a year older than himself. With Kelly a dynamic forward it had to follow that Paul Curran was doomed to defend for Mullinahone, for Scoil Ruain, for Tipp minors, for WIT and eventually for Tipp seniors. His was a road with lots of setbacks. An example of this was the 2001 Tipperary All Ireland senior hurling panel. The two hurlers who did not make the final cut were Terry Dunne of Toomevara and Paul Curran of Mullinahone. On the records of Croke Park Paul Curran does not appear as an All Ireland medallist in 2001. Paul came back from disappointment and made his championship debut for Tipperary against Offaly in 2002. To date he has played in another 32 championship games.

I have known Paul since his schooldays. He always had a mind of his own. Some would call that being stubborn. Courage was always a trait of his. Without that quality Paul would not have made the WIT Fitzgibbon Cup team as a "fresher" and full back. Because of loyalty and length of service he was made WIT captain. A wise choice as he led them to Fitzgibbon Cup honours in 2003. The future looked bright for Paul. He had been full back for Tipp on the losing All Ireland minor team of 1999. He was a Tipp under 21 in 2001 and 2002. In the 2001 Munster U-21 final against Limerick Paul's courage led him to put his body on the line one more time, going down over the ball in the last minute. Bad choice Paul. In those days the referee usually threw in the ball in such situations. Not this time. A free was awarded for lying on the ball. The winning point came from the free. Paul had to shoulder the blame. Paul Curran has always had a sense of injustice. Selectors found this out when a team-mate was improperly informed that he had been dropped from a panel. Paul didn't put himself or his county career first in this

In his final year in college Paul, while he was a senior panelist, wasn't able to command a place on the team so he left the panel to concentrate on his studies. Suddenly a serious injury to Philip Maher caused management to recall Paul. Completely in character Paul responded to the call and he has been by and large a team member since. While training as a primary teacher in Wales Paul returned to Ireland each weekend to train with the rest of the Tipp panel. He is probably one of the old school, being completely loyal to club and county. I vividly recall the

2002 county final between Mullinahone and Thurles Sarsfields. Over the draw and replay Paul was probably Mullinahone's best player over the 120 minutes though he was not "man of the match" in either the drawn game or the replay. In the middle of the week (November 11th) between the two games Paul was 21. There were no birthday celebrations for Paul Curran (his choice).

2010 has turned out to be a wonderful year for Paul Curran but it too had its setbacks. On May 30th following the debacle in Cork it was Paul who was wheeled out to face the media. It was the same Paul who earlier in the afternoon had stepped into full back where the floodgates had opened. He acquitted himself well on both counts. What was his reward? Rumour had it that he was dropped for the qualifier against Wexford. Injured! Yet he was fit enough to come on as a" blood sub" for the rest of the game when Declan Fanning was "banvilled" out of it in the first minute. Game by game Tipp improved and Paul Curran began to hurl better and better. What better place to play your best hurling of the year than in Croke Park. September 5th was a wonderful team day for Paul Curran, the Tipperary team and the people of Tipperary. This year after the number 3 on the Croke Park lists will go the name Pól Ó Corráin after nine long years of waiting. The homecomings to Thurles and to Mullinahone were great but I suspect that carrying the McCarthy Cup into Scoil Muire Kilvemnon his oldest alma mater was maybe the greatest thrill of all. Paul was always a team player and September5th took care of that. Twice before this Paul had been nominated for an All Star award. In the past he lost out to J J Delaney and also unluckily to Noel Hickey. This year on October 15th it was announced that the man in the no.3 All Star shirt for 2010, the best in the land, would be Paul Curran. Sometimes but only sometimes those who have to earn their crust triumph. For the essential team man it was a great individual achievement.

Young men, before life can soften them can be very macho. Twice in my life I have been surprised by the kindness shown, to others in trouble, by macho young men. One of those young men was Paul Curran. We remember the words of the poet

"If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster and treat those two impostors just the same,

Yours is the Earth and everything that's in it, And -which is moreyou'll be a man, my son."

Paul Curran the Man and All Star Hurler we salute you.

'Tipp's future will still be bright without me'

Declan Fanning knows the time is right to hang up his boots

On Wednesday night, Declan Fanning stood at the front door of his terraced house in Killenaule, peering out at the slicing rain and boogeying street lights of a brewing November tempest. Winter's handwriting was everywhere.

Inside, Lucy readied one-year-old Owen for bed and the operatic roll of Handel's 'Zadok the Priest' announced kick-off time in the Ukraine where Arsenal were on Champions League duty. Turning away from the inky blackness, Fanning closed the door behind him and put the kettle on.

And he smiled the smile of a man for whom retirement felt like a warm duvet.

His decision hadn't entirely been unexpected in the Tipperary dressing-room. Declan, after all, is 31. Genetic miracles like Tony Browne aside, that equates to a well-travelled road in intercounty hurling.

Actually, a year ago, he drove to an autumn meeting in Horse and Jockey, determined to step away from Tipp's epic pursuit of the Liam MacCarthy Cup. Owen was just three months old at the time and, much as Fanning loved being a county man, he sensed imbalance in his days.

Everything was haste and urgency. Deadlines. Snatched moments with the family then, always, out the door again. He'd hate anyone to paint the five-nights-a-week training schedule as any kind of burden, for Fanning would willingly have done seven. But his appetite was waning.

Liam Sheedy, Eamon O'Shea and Michael Ryan seemed "taken aback" by his decision. They talked of how their own three-year commitment was only two-thirds complete and expressed an absolute conviction that Tipp could win the 2010 All-Ireland.

Above all, they said they wanted Declan Fanning in that dressing-room. And, driving home that night, he knew their words had won.

Maybe the most beautiful moment was seeing tears in 'The Rattler's' eyes. Mickey Byrne was wheeled into the dressing-room as the showers began to hiss and it was as if the sight of the old cup tossed him into an unguarded moment. To see a man whose greatness reached back more than 60 years now blink away the salt felt deeply humbling. Honouring Tipp's past was always Sheedy's way and that moment set the thermostat perfectly.

This was where the snowy road had taken them. That first January night when Fanning sat into his car with Pat Kerwick for the spin to Thurles, they couldn't help themselves but take pictures with their phones. They were slip-sliding in a winterwonderland.

Yet, 'Hotpoint' (John Hayes) had all the training-gear laid out when they got there and, with the pitches white as talc, they did two hours of hurling drills and circuit training in The Dome. Tipp would start the year as they intended to continue. No excuses.

It all seems tidy and easily navigable in recall now. Losing that epic '09 final to Kilkenny simply stiffened the group resolve. There'd been tears that Monday night when they saw the throng waiting for them in Thurles and, to a man, they vowed there'd be no empty-handed reprise.

But the best of intentions promise nothing and the first serious questions asked of Tipp in 2010 would decant some brutal answers. On May 30, Cork devoured them at Pairc Ui Chaoimh. Afterwards, they needed the oxygen of leadership like never before.

And Sheedy quickly delivered.

"I'll never forget it," recalls Fanning. "Going into the dressing-room and it no bigger than the kitchen there. We're all sat around, almost in each other's faces. Heads down.

"Liam told us to get the heads up. He went round to every single one and said: 'We'll win the All-Ireland!' He was showing the faith he had in us. It was a brave enough thing for him to say, because we were after getting a right hammering. I actually said it to him after we beat Kilkenny.

"We all had to leave that dressing-room and face the music then, which wasn't easy. People were saying things in the tunnel, but they weren't saying them to our faces.

"We didn't train that Tuesday night. Just all met in the 'Jockey and that was a fairly intense meeting. Everyone involved, whether you were number 30 on the panel, the doctor, the physio or the water carrier. Whoever you were, you were inside that room and you had your say if you wanted it.

"I remember especially James Woodlock spoke very well from the heart. He was still on the crutches, so maybe he'd been able to watch it from a different perspective to the rest of us. But that was a vital meeting. The most important we had all year. I remember going home and, even though the county was still in shock over the drubbing we had taken, thinking that I could it leave it behind now."

In Cork, there had been a cumulative meltdown of the full-back line and, when Tipp got back on the carousel in a qualifier against Wexford at Semple Stadium, Fanning was given the No 3 shirt. He'd won an All Star for the position in '07 but had since thrived in his more natural habitat of the half-back line.

The Wexford game passed un-dramatically for Tipp. They won in a canter, yet their full-back's involvement lasted maybe 90 seconds

Fanning's tussle with Stephen Banville is easily accessed on YouTube and looks largely innocuous. Yet, the Wexford full-forward's decision to pull his opponent's helmet resulted in a ripped ear for the Tipp man and the need for 25 stitches.

Declan recalls the incident with quiet equanimity.

"After the full-back line not going so well in Cork and me been drafted back in there, my attitude was, 'There's nobody going to bully us here today!" he says.

"I'll be honest, I have to hold my hand up and say I was as much a part of what happened as Stephen. It was definitely 50-50. I went in to lay down a marker, that there'd be no messing today. In fairness, t'was just handbags, a bit of shouldering and digging. You could pull my helmet off a hundred times and what happened wouldn't happen.

"And I swear it wasn't sore. You'd hear sometimes of someone losing a finger and saying they didn't know they'd lost it until they looked down. That's the way it was.

"But I knew there was something wrong, because t'was kind of flapping. Only when I went in did I realise the extent of it. Our doctor, Peter Murchin, took one look and said, 'No way are you going back out!' Someone else was saying, 'Throw in two staples there, he'll be grand.'

"Peter kind of looked at him as if he had two heads. T'was fair funny, well maybe not ... But I would have absolutely no issue with Stephen Banville. I haven't ever spoken to the man, but he definitely didn't go out to do that."

Sitting in the stand later, a friend would helpfully advise Fanning that he had been foolhardy to pick the fight he picked. Enquiring why, he was told that Banville's nickname among the Wexford supporters was 'Horsebox'. He laughs at the memory now.

"I was telling John O'Brien in the dressing-room after," Declan grins, "and he said, 'I've heard a fella called a horse of a man, but he's actually called what carries the horse? Holy mother of God!"

They stitched the damage without anaesthetic - that wasn't pleasant. And for maybe a week after, the ear seemed to become badly swollen and disfigured. Yet, it healed perfectly. The only visible remnant today is a twine-thin burgundy line running from the lobe.

He was restored to wing-back the next day against Offaly and, thereafter, that would be his perch.

There is an easy humility to Fanning, franked by the emotional breadth of a career never quite dusted with privilege. Though he won a Munster minor medal, he was never a prodigy and, by the time Ken Hogan called him up to Tipp's senior panel in late '03, he had become better known for his exploits as centre-back on the county football team under Tom McGlinchey.

The hurlers' '04 Championship ended with a defeat to Cork in Killarney and that game would set in train a calamitous sequence of thoughts in one Tipperary man's mind.

Dinny Cahill, manager of Cork's next opponents, Antrim, unloaded himself of some pretty saucy narrative in an apparent effort to demythologize the Rebels. He questioned the longevity of certain Cork players, confidently predicting even that Antrim would win the All-Ireland.

And then he tossed a grenade at the shoes of Declan Fanning. "He more or less said that I wasn't good enough as a minor, so why would anyone think I was good enough for the seniors?" recalls Declan. "And that knocked me back for a while. I remember thinking, 'Jesus is this what playing for Tipp is all about? Getting slated in the paper?'

"Now today I could nearly thank Dinny because it battlehardened me. He had a go at a few of the Cork players the same day. Sean Og was one. But I was disappointed over what he said. I trained under him as a minor and I liked him. He was even down here with the club, helping us out at U-21.

"So I was fair hurt. But in the years after I'd have always had it in my head to prove him wrong. I never met him after, though he'd have been involved with a good few teams I played against. But it definitely battle-hardened me.

"I think the only time I ever shouted for Cork was when they played Antrim that day! I was hoping they'd give them a right beating. I suppose when you're backed into a corner, you come out fighting.

Potential

It was Babs Keating who subsequently identified his potential as a full-back and who, he says, must be thanked accordingly for the All Star in '07.

Yet, it was Sheedy's arrival after Tipp's eventual meltdown in that year's Championship that breathed fresh life into the county. Fanning recalls being called in to meet the new management team in the Anner Hotel and driving away thinking, "This is going to be serious."

Today, he likens the triumvirate of Sheedy, O'Shea and Ryan to key pieces of a refined clock. Take one piece away and the clock ceases to work. The key was the union of Sheedy's empathetic man-management, O'Shea's maverick hurling brain and Ryan's

Yet, that '09 final might easily have tossed them into a downward spiral.

Indeed, it was Fanning who took it upon himself to loudly declare his support for Benny Dunne in the dressing-room immediately after the Toomevara man's sending-off for an intemperate pull on Tommy Walsh.

Brian Cody had just departed, having offered words of commiseration, when Fanning got to his feet. "I just remember looking at Benny and he had a different look to him than anyone else in the room -- a look of real hurt.

"I really felt for him because I remembered getting sent off with the club seniors when I was an U-21. They got to their first county final the same year. I was the captain and I missed it all over the sending-off.

"So something just clicked in me. Something just said to me, 'We need to row in behind Benny straight away!' I mean we'd

talked all year about being a team. And here was one of my friends across the dressing-room who needed support. And, to be fair, everyone rowed in behind Benny immediately."

The gesture found perfect closure when Sheedy put the socalled enfant terrible on towards the end of this year's final and Benny air-mailed a glorious point. By then, all the old worries were evaporating. Fanning himself had been hauled ashore after going over on an ankle and, as he sat with the substitutes, each beat of the clock felt tortuous until Larry Corbett's third goal drew a lyric line under business.

Then and only then did the weight come off their chests.

He didn't anticipate a change of management. If there were worries about O'Shea and Ryan being in a position to continue, Fanning saw nothing to signpost Sheedy's departure. Yet, when he heard the news, it brought a sense of personal clarity.

Lucy is due with their second child next Friday and, if there was the tiniest seed of doubt in his mind about leaving a team at the summit of hurling, Liam's decision has now killed it.

"I had a great relationship built up with the three lads," he says now.

"They knew my form. If I needed a rest or time off, it was never a problem. But a new manager coming in, you're kind of starting from scratch again. Thirty lads, it's dog eat dog again. And who am I to be going in looking for time off?

"So I wanted to make the announcement before any appointment was made. I thought Liam would stay, I really did. That said, the future is bright for Tipp now. People worry about the young fellas winning so much so soon, but I can't see them getting too carried away. They're very level-headed and a very hungry bunch.

"They carry themselves very well off the field. Look, there's no God-given guarantee that Tipp will win another All-Ireland. But I think all the boys understand that. They all know it comes down to hard work."

And if the new man happens to put a call through to Killenaule? "I won't answer the phone," Fanning says with a hoot of laughter. "Nah, I think the future is bright without me. It's not something I'd go back on."

Golden Days

It was sometime after the peace process had taken hold and in Belfast a fellow with a hat sang for President Bill Clinton about how fine the world would be if "Every day is like this" - or words to that effect.

I have forgotten precisely what the occasion was or who the fellow with the hat was but I know exactly how he felt because I had precisely the same feeling on the evening of September 5, 2010. I was sitting outside the first watering-hole between the Cusack Stand and the car which would carry me back to the Premier County. Eoin Kelly had raised the cup, every Tipp man and woman not reduced to a croak at the final whistle had joined Pat Kerwick as he bellowed out The Galtee Mountain Boy and if Osama Bin Laden had decided that this was the moment for a lightning strike on Croke Park we wouldn't have minded one bit. We were in heaven already.

How often in the few weeks that followed did we remark on how difficult it was to meet a Tipp man who wasn't wearing a smile. A friend of mine told me he had met a man who at the final whistle smiled for the first time since he had counted his First Communion money. And my friend informed me that your man's wife says he hasn't stopped smiling since, not even when he is asleep.

A common subject of discussion with men at street corners or outside the church or after a match is how close the previous game of our dreams comes to the final of 2010. And with our innate loyalty to old prejudices most of us have a game or two to which we must give a nod before conceding that September 5, 2010 had a quality which surpassed anything we had previously ******

There was another occasion when Tipp toppled a team which was heading for five All-Irelands in a row and when you see the fall of the mighty at the hands of your own team and you are only nine years old, you fancy that life has no greater delight in store for you. So it was with me on a June day in 1945.

Cork had won the All-Irelands of 1941, '42, '43, and '44 and Tipp's stock was so low that we kept consoling ourselves with the reflection that only for the Foot and Mouth disease the four would only be three-in-a-row.

But they came to Thurles on June 1st 1945 - only a few weeks after Hitler went to his reward - full of the kind of confidence that only Corkmen can exude - the prospect of five in a row dangling before them. They poured into Thurles on bicycles in the way we had imagined the Allies flooding across Germany a short time before. And on an afternoon of glorious sunshine their dream of five-in-a-row was shattered by John Maher and his men.

The Thurles sideline was at the time below the level of the pitch and young fellows in the front seats on fine days could throw themselves up onto the pitch in front of them. From that vantage-point I watched the Tipp captain pull his cap down over his eyes and drive a mighty seventy over the bar at the Killinan end. That was the beginning and the rest was triumph all the way until the final score read 2-13 to 3-2.

Well, that's the way I remember it – and if 65 years of turning it over in my mind may have left the actuality slightly distorted, it doesn't dim the glory of the memory. It was a great, great day.

There were other great days and one of them was July 19, 1987 when Cork came to Killarney intent on winning an unprecedented six Munster titles in a row. Again they exuded a confidence they were hardly entitled to have, since this was a replay of a game that had been drawn in Thurles.

And again it was a drawn game. While we waited for the teams to come back on the field we swapped reminiscences of a torrid day in 1949 when the Cork team lay in the sunshine waiting for the re-emergence of the men in Blue and Gold. But

this was Killarney and that had been 38 years before.

It took three goals in the extra time – two from Mick Doyle and one from Donie O'Connell - before Richard Stakelum could make the official pronouncement, "The Famine is Over!" and all the pent-up frustrations of sixteen years were released in one mighty roar that echoed from Carrantouhill to Slievenamon and bounced off Keeper. I had thought that the greatest sporting thrill imagineable was the victory over Cork in 1945 and I had lived with that belief for 43 years until that golden day in Killarney. And now, I told myself, I have walked on heaven's floor, I have touched the stars and there is no more to be said.

But it is never too late to change one's mind and I decided on my way home from Dublin on the evening of the first Sunday in September this year that, hard as it might be to say it, I have not in a lifetime of watching great games, seen greater than the All-Ireland of 2010. All the great moments of all the hurling games ever played and all the skills of all the great masters I have seen the Mackeys and Rings, the Doyles and Kehers, the Rackards and Smith and all the immortals - seemed to me to be on display that day. The skill levels were only matched by the excitement levels as the great battle was fought to the final moments of extra time, with each one of us made breathless by the realisation that we might be about to see the downfall at the

last hurdle to immortality of what most of us would admit to be the most talented, most coordinated hurling team we had ever seen. And until the final whistle the outcome was in doubt, so that it was not until it sounded that we could safely claim even to ourselves that once again the men wearing the Blue and Gold were the best hurling team in Ireland.

For those of us who motored home that evening, the journey never seemed shorter. Mile after mile we savoured the magic of it all - the tenacity of our backs from beginning to end, the phenomenal commitment to work of our centrefielders, the unprecedented accuracy of our forwards – is it possible that we only sent one ball wide in the first half? Every minute detail of the game was examined – the glorious team-spirit – one for all and all for one – the committed leadership of Eoin Kelly (as the parade rounded the corner in front of the Cusack Stand and Hill 16, I had said to my daughter, "Look at the cut of Kelly. He has no intention of being beaten today!") - and, boy oh boy, the flashing blade of Lar Corbett – three times it flashed and three times the net bulged as the course of hurling history was changed.

It was the goals of Corbett that led me to reflect that the greatest feat of scoring in Tipperary's hurling history was that of Paddy Riordan of Drombane who in the All-Ireland final of 1895 with a personal tally of six goals and eight points accounted for all of Tipp's scores on a day when Tipp also took the All-Ireland football title and on the football team was Paddy's brother, Jim.

Lar Corbett has ancestral roots in Drombane. And his three magical goals on that memorable day in Croke Park will be remembered as long as those of us who witnessed them are above the sod. And longer, sure, since isn't all that magic captured for us by the technology boyos! And many a dark night in the hard times the economic boyos tell us are ahead of us will be brightened as with the click of a switch we are back to a day in our lives when men from our county proved themselves the best in the country in the greatest game God has allowed man to invent and which He gave as one of His greatest gifts to the Irish people.

They may tax the rich and they may tax the poor, they may make life more miserable for us all. They may do their damnedest to us, but they can do nothing that will take from us the treasured memory of a September day in Dublin that was at times gloomy and drizzly but that in the hearts and minds of Tipperary people everywhere is forever bathed in golden

So here's to you, Captain Kelly and your men – and to Liam and Eamon and Mick - and to all who sailed with you!

The County Senior Hurling Championship 2010

Thurles Sarsfields justified their favourite's tag with a comprehensive win over Clonoulty-Rossmore in the county senior hurling final played in murky and damp conditions at Semple Stadium on October 31. The smallness of the crowd, the second lowest in twenty years, was an indication of how the general public expected things to go. Clonoulty had done nothing during the year to indicate that they would pose a serious problem to the star-studded Sarsfields side. The only hope for them was to produce the top class performance that the team seemed capable of but hadn't delivered during the year. As it turned out there was no inspirational performance and, apart from the ten minutes before half-time, Clonoulty did not threaten the Sarsfields, whose four county senior players delivered fine performances on the day. The game itself never reached any great heights of enjoyment and the subdued crowd were probably happy when the final whistle sounded.

Similar Format to Last year

The format of the county senior hurling championship remained essentially the same in 2010 as it had been in 2009. There were a number of voices raised against the increase in the number of senior teams in the county but they didn't carry much volume. The championship was divided into two competitions, the Dan Breen Cup and the O Riain Cup. All teams that made it to the divisional semi-finals qualified for the former while all the remaining teams took part in the latter competition.

There was a bit of variation on 2009 with thirty-two rather than thirty teams taking part, as 2009 intermediate champions, Carrick Davins, and new combination team, Galtee Rovers/Sean Treacys, were added. The voices raised against this format wondered where it would all stop as the number of senior teams increased every year and the number of intermediate teams declined. The option open to any senior team to relegate to intermediate level, which was allowed in the 2008 format, wasn't taken up by any club.

The granting of entry to the Dan Breen Cup to the finalists of the O Riain Cup continued. Nenagh Eire Óg and Loughmore-Castleiney were the two clubs involved. In order to accommodate them, they were allowed in at Round 2. Round 1 brought together the eight beaten divisional semi-finalists and the four beaten finalists in a playoff of six games. The six winners were joined by the two O Riain Cup finalists in Round 2 to produce four winners. The four winners played the four division champions in Round 3 to produce the semi-finalists.

As stated above thirty-two teams in all participated in the senior hurling championship 11 from the North, 8 from the Mid, 7 from the West and 6 from the South. The sixteen teams who didn't qualify for the divisional semi-finals entered the O Riain Cup, Round 1

The teams that qualified for Round 1 of the McCarthy Cup were the eight beaten divisional semi-finalists and the four beaten finalists. The losing semi-finalists were Kickhams and Galtee/Treasys from the west, Mullinahone and Carrick Davins from the south, Upperchurch-Drombane and Holycross-Ballycahill from the mid, and Burgess and Kildangan from the north.

Beaten Divisional Finalists

The beaten finalists in the south were Killenaule, who lost, 1-16 to 2-11, to Carrick Swan. The latter bridged a ten-year gap to claim their 22nd South senior hurling final in an exciting encounter at Fethard on August 22. Killenaule led by 0-8 to 0-7 at the break but the Swan had the greater reserves in the second half and deserved their two-point victory.

Eire Óg lost out to Clonoulty Rossmore in the West final, played at Sean Treacy Park on the same day. Clonoulty had nine points to spare at the end, having led by 0-8 to 0-5 at the interval, and thoroughly deserved their victory, which gave them a fourth-in-a-row title. Defending champions Drom Inch lost to Thurles Sarsfields by 1-16 to 2-11 in the Mid final at

Templemore on September 19. Sarsfields led by 1-10 to 1-6 at half-time in a tight encounter, which went down to the wire before they could claim their 41st title.

Borris-Ileigh went down to Toomevara by 1-12 to 0-13 in the north final, played at Nenagh on September 19. This was a close game in which Borris-Ileigh held a one point lead, on a scoreline of 0-6 to 0-5, at the interval but Toomevara just about deserved their two-point victory in the end.

Round 1

Four of the Round 1 games were played on the weekend of September 18/19 and two on September 23. There was a double bill at Boherlahan on the 18th in which Galtee/Treacys defeated Carrick Davins by 1-13 to 1-9 and Upperchuch-Drombane had an easy win over Killenaule by 1-19 to 0-9. On the following day at Holycross, Kildangan defeated Eire Óg Annacarty by 3-13 to 1-15, while Burgess defeated Holycross-Ballycahill by 1-20 to 0-15 at Borris-Ileigh.

The two games on the 23rd were played under lights at Semple Stadium. In the first game Borris-Ileigh proved too good for Kickhams, defeating them by 1-20 to 0-8, while Mullinahone had a good victory over Drom Inch by 2-15 to 1-12.

Round 2

The six winners in Round 1 were joined by the finalists in the O Riain Cup, Nenagh Éire Óg and Loughmore/Castleiney, to produce four games in Round 2. These games were played on the weekend of September 26/27. The two games on Saturday were played at Templemore. Kildangan came out on top by 3-15 to 2-13 against Galtee/Treacys. Burgess got the better of Upperchurch-Drombane by 1-21 to 0-14.

The two games on Sunday were played at Semple Stadium. Mullinahone took another important scalp when they defeated Nenagh Eire Óg by 2-15 to 1-15, while Loughmore-Castleiney got the better of neighbours, Borris-Ileigh, by 1-16 to 1-13.

Quarter-Finals

All was now set for the quarter-finals of the championship with the four winners of Round 2 facing the four divisional champions, The four games were played at

Semple Stadium on the weekend of 2/3 October.

On Saturday Carrick Swans played Kildangan. A 59th minute goal by sub Brian Kelly helped the North side to a 1-14 to 1-9 win over the south champions. Kildangan led by 0-6 to 0-3 at the interval and just kept in front during the second-half but a Danny O'Hanlon goal for the Swans in the 57th minute left only a point between the sides. However, in a dramatic finish Kelly turned a Tommy Connor delivery into the net to clinch Kildangan's place in the last four.

The second quarter-final was a much more one-sided affair. In this game a Timmy Hammersley inspired Clonoulty-Rossmore had an easy win by 2-21 to 1-13 over Burgess. Hammersley scored 1-11, 1-9 from play, as the winners recovered from a bad start to finish in style. Burgess led by 1-7 to 0-4 after Damien O'Brien's 17th minute goal. This score inspired Clonoulty rather than Burgess and goals by Tom Butler in the 19th minute and Hammersley five minutes later helped Clonoulty to a 2-9 to 1-7 interval lead. There

was only one team in the second half with the outstanding Hammersley scoring eight points to help Clonoulty to a comfortable victory.

On Sunday Toomevara faced Mullinahone in the first of the remaining quarter-finals. Mullinahone came into the game with expectations on the back of impressive victories over Drom Inch and Nenagh Eire Óg. However, they were a disappointment on the day and failed to match Toomevara in most facets of the game. In the end Tommevara well deserved their sixteen point

victory on a scoreline of 1-26 to 0-13.

Despite trailing 0-3 to 0-1 in the opening minutes, Toomevara upped gears and led by five points, 0-12 to 0-7, at the break. Within four minutes of the restart they led by double scores and even though Mullinahone fought back to trail by four, it was all in vain.

Toomevara raised the pace and struck ten points to Mullinahone's two before Willie Ryan sealed their victory with a fine goal in the 29th minute. One of the stars of Toom's victory was midfielder, Ken Dunne, who hit eight points in the course of the hour.

In the last quarter-final Thurles Sarsfields defeated Loughmore-Castleiney by 2-19 to 2-13. Sarsfields were four points adrift after five minutes but improved considerably after a slow start and led by 0-10 to 0-8 at the interval. Denis Maher was excellent, grabbing four points from play and he was ably

Semi-Finals

As a result of the quarter-finals Sarsfields and Toomevara were installed as having the better chances of winning out so the draws were looked forward to with interest. As it was an open draw the two couldn't be separated and when the draw took place on the Monday after the quarter finals the two were drawn againt one another and Clonoulty-Rossmore and Kildangan were drawn in the second semi-final.

The semis were played at Semple Stadium on October 17 and expectations came to nought as the whole afternoon was a disappointment to the expectant crowd. Probably the only real excitement was reserved for the final minute of the second game, when Pa Bourke converted a controversial 20-metre free to give Thurles Sarsfields victory by one point over Toomevara, who were leading by two points at that stage. Following the score a melee erupted in the middle of the field as the tension between the sides, which had erupted twice in the course of the hour, found more ugly expression. It contrasted with the united euphoria which had enveloped the county following the double All-Ireland victory in September.

In the first game Clonoulty-Rossmore claimed the spoils by 1-19 to 1-16 despite having played second fiddle to Kildangan for long spells. The latter, All-Ireland intermediate champions in 2005, who had never won a senior title and had last qualified for one in 1938, raced into a 1-3 to 0-1 lead after five minutes, the goal from Eoin Gleeson Kildangan went further into the lead but were gradually hauled back to two points, 1-9 to 0-10, by half-time. Clonoulty had taken a long time to get into any kind of scoring rhythm but scored five crucial points during the last seven minutes of the half.

Kildangan resumed as they had during the opening of the first half and looked impressive as they went into a five-point lead. But Clonoulty dug deep and improved performances by John Heffernan and John Devane closed off Kildangan's route to goals. By the 48th minute Kildangan were still in front by 1-13 to 0-13 but then a super leap by Fiachra O'Keeffe in a crowded square, to grap a perfect delivery by John O'Neill, and finish to the net with a one-hand flick had the sides level. Building on that goal Clonoulty went on to win getting six points to Kildangan's three during the remaining minutes to leave the final score 1-19 to 1-16 at the final whistle. Clonoulty can thank goalkeeper Declan O'Dwyer who, following one slip, went on to perform extremely well making some key saves during the remainder of the game. Another major contributor to the victory was John O'Neill, who returned to some of his former glory with a dazzling display that produced four points from play.

Sarsfields Just Make It

Thurles Sarsfields qualified for the final by the minimum of margins over Toomevara on a scoreline of 1-17 to 1-16. Sarsfields were favourites going into the game and justified the tag with a good start, which saw them lead by 0-7 to 0-3 after the first quarter.. Four players contributed to Sarsfields total while Kenny Dunne had done all the scoring for Toomevara. The latter had the better of the second quarter, during which Dunne added five more points to Sarsfields two to leave only a point between the sides, 0-9 to 0-8, at the interval. It was a poor game livened up only by virtue of a couple of skirmishes, which resulted in several yellow cards.

Toomevara resumed better and had gone into a 0-11 to 0-9 lead within five minutes. The introduction of Eoin Brislane at full-forward improved their chances and they began to play long and direct ball up the middle. He was off target with a number




Thurles Sarsfields' Padraic Maher goes to the sky to gain possession against Clonoulty-Rossmore in the County Final.

of shots initially and during this period Sarsfields had reestablished their momentum and retaken the lead, 0-15 to 0-13, by the 48th minute. At this point Brislane collected a long delivery from Benny Dunne before coolly finishing to the net. It put Toomevara back in front but crucially it led to the redcarding of Redser O'Grady as a result of an incident following the goal. Everything seemed set up for a Toomevara march to victory. However, Thurles retained their composure and with Pa Bourke, Michael Gleeson, Michael Cahill and Padraic Maher driving things on, they levelled matters twice in the remaining minutes. Then in the 59th minute John O'Brien gave Toomevara the lead point and Brislane landed another on the hour mark. Toomevara were denied a likely victory when in the 63rd minute Denis Maher was deemed to be fouled and from the resultant 20-metre free Pa Bourke grabbed victory from the jaws of defeat for Sarsfields and gave them the chance of retaining their title. Toomevara did have one final opportunity to rescue the game when Paddy O'Brien hit a wonderful sideline puck from fiftyfive metres but Paraic Maher cleared the danger and the final whistle blew seconds later.

Thurles Retain Title

Thurles Sarsfields won back-to-back county senior titles for the first time since 1965 when they defeated Clonoulty-Rossmore by 1-16 to 1-7 at Semple Stadium on October 31. Sarsfields were out of traps very quickly and were six points to nil in front after thirteen minutes. Their forwards had the Clonoulty backs at sixes and sevens and it looked as if Sarsfields were going to win in a canter. However, Clonoulty eventually got their show on the road with the inspiration coming from captain and wingforward, Tom Butler, who hit over a hat-trick of points. Timmy Hammersley added a point and, in the 29th minute, John O'Neill goaled from a twenty-metre free to leave just two points


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between the sides, 0-9 to 1-4, at half-time. It should have been closer but for poor freetaking by Clonoulty.

Any hope that Clonoulty were about to create a surprise evaporated early in the second half. A great block by Padraig Heffernan, denied Lar Corbett a certain goal. Denis Maher, who had moved in centreforward, began to impose himself on the game and hit three fine points. Aidan McCormack, who came on as a sub, added two more and then in the 46th minute, centrefield Gleeson, hit a pin point accurate shot into the hand of Corbett, who duly finished it to the net. The score put Sarsfields practically out of sight at 1-14 to 1-5. However, Clonoulty did not die easily. They created three goal-scoring opportunities in the final minutes of the game. A combination of good goal-keeping and great defence contrived to prevent a last minute shock and when the final

whistle sounded Sarsfields had nine points to spare on a scoreline of 1-16 to 1-7.

Sarsfields have a good outfit with a lot of talent round the field and they will go into the Munster championship with the confidence to go one better than they have before. If they have a problem it's the tendency to go out of games in which they seem to have total control and they fail to put teams away when they're on top. It was a frustating final for Clonoulty. They too have a lot of talent but they failed to deliver to their true potential during the year and failed again in the final.

The first round games were played over the period July 16 to August 2. The eight teams that came through were Roscrea, Cashel King Cormacs, Loughmore-Castleiney. Nenagh Eire Óg, Templederry Kenyons, Kilruane MacDonaghs, Lorrha and Portroe. There was an open draw for the quarter-finals, which were played on Monday and Tuesday, 13/14 September. All the games were played at Semple Stadium.

Quarter-Finals

On a miserable Monday evening Templederry scored a comprehensive win over Portroe by 2-24 to 2-12. Star of the winner's performance was Eanna Murray, who scored 0-13 of his side's tally. It was an even game in the first half and Portroe led by a point at the interval, 1-9 to 0-11, but Templederry took over in the second half and deserved their comprehensive victory.

In the second game on the same evening Nenagh Eire Óg strolled to victory over an out-of-depth Lorrha. They led by 1-11 to 0-3 at half-time and blew Lorrha away in the second half, adding 3-8 to Lorrha's 0-1. Kevin Tucker scored 0-11 for the winners.

None of the newspapers carried reports of the remaining two quarter-final games, which took place on the following night. They weren't in time for the September 16 edition of the papers and since the semi-finals were to follow at the weekend they would have been appearing at the same time as the semi-final reports. So, a most unusual situation of two senior hurling games not reported. In the first of these Loughmore-Castleiney had a comprehensive victory over Cashel King Cormacs of 5-22 to 0-20 and, in the second, Roscrea surprised Kilruane MacDonaghs, defeating them by 2-19 to 1-11.

Semi-Finals

The semi-finals were played at separate venues on September 19. Loughmore-Castleiney defeated Roscrea by 2-13 to 2-13 at Toomevara. The winners were five points behind with fourteen minutes remaining but they put in a storming finish with goals from Noel McGrath and Cian Hennessy to claim a place in the final. Roscrea led by 1-7 to 1-6 at the interval and had pushed on to lead by 2-9 to 1-7 as a result of their second goal in the 46th minute, but they were outscored by 2-6 to 0-4 in the last quarter of the game.

The second semi-final between Nenagh Éire Óg and Templederry Kenyons, which was played at Dolla, was in no way as exciting. In fact Nenagh had a clearcut win by 0-24 to 1-6. Nenagh's victory was facilitated by the dismissal of the

Templederry corner-back, Paudie Ryan, after twenty-six minutes. The winners led by 0-7 to 0-3 at half-time. Templederry got some hope when Matthew Ryan converted a penalty in the 48th minute but it was Nenagh who pushed on to a facile victory by fifteen points.

The Final

Some might claim that this competition was debased by giving the finalists entre to the Dan Breen Cup rather than allowing it to stand on its own strength. It was further debased by the decision of Loughmore-Castleiney to field a depleted side on the day, giving priority to their date with Aherlow in the senior football final the following Sunday.

As the curtain-raiser to the Dan Breen final it provided little in the way of entertainment for a sparse crowd as a rampant Nenagh Eire Óg easily overcame the feeble challenge of the Mid representatives. After a dominant first quarter, Nenagh Eire Óg relaxed a bit but still led by double scores, 2-8 to 1-4, at the interval. The supremacy of Nenagh was even more pronounced in the second half as they added 1-9 to Loughmore's 0-2 and finished a non-event on a scoreline of 3-17 to 1-6.

The County Senior Football Championship

Aherlow lift the O'Dwyer Cup for the second time

Defeat wasn't an option for Aherlow in this year's county senior football final against Loughmore/Castleiney.

Narrowly beaten by Moyle Rovers in the 2009 decider, successive defeats would probably have left lasting damage on the team, according to their manager.

They couldn't have handled another defeat. 'We were mugged last year when we lost by a point', Liam Kerins said after his team had pipped Loughmore by the same margin in a rugged battle at Semple Stadium on the first Sunday in November.

Aherlow were the better team for much of the contest but a combination of poor finishing and wasted possession looked like scuppering their chances of lifting the O'Dwyer Cup for only the second time, and the first since 2006.

The game was heading for a replay when Barry Grogan - who turned in a man of the match performance - intervened, kicking the winning point in additional time.

Aherlow eventually got there by 2-4 to 1-6 and Grogan scored all but a goal of their tally, which came in the first half from Conor O'Shea.

Barry Grogan showed the way for his team but the industry of so many others was crucial too. His brother Seamus was the catalyst for many of their attacks, supplying the pass for Barry's goal that revived their faltering challenge midway through the second half.

Laurence Coskeran and Stuart Moloney soldiered tirelessly all afternoon while Ciaran McDonald, John Hennessy and Chris McDonald were always tough and tenacious in a sturdy defence.

Manager Liam Kerins said that the victory had got the monkey off their backs, having lost the 2009 final, and it also ended a sequence that had seen them beaten in all of their three previous finals in Semple Stadium. He said that Loughmore deserved their status as a great dual club and you hadn't them beaten until you had the cup.

After they overcame the avalanche of wides (eleven in total) and carelessness that threatened to derail their challenge, all of Aherlow boisterously celebrated the victory, as darkness enveloped the venue.

In his acceptance speech, captain Mark O'Brien summed up the enormity of the success for the men from the Glen.

He said it meant the world to him to be standing there with the cup because this was the best bunch of players he had ever played with, and he had played with them since underage.


Typically, Loughmore proved awkward opponents. They played their best football in the first half and led at the interval by 1-5 to 1-1. Michael Webster was an effective target man while another former county senior hurler, David Kennedy, gave his all in the middle of the field. James Egan also contributed well while defenders Tommy Long, Aidan McGrath and Tom King had Aherlow's forwards under lock and key in that opening period.

But they totally lost their way in the second half, when they had just a single point to show for their efforts.

To compound their misery Loughmore finished the game with just 13 men, although this could never be classed as a dirty game. James Egan received a second yellow card with ten minutes remaining, a fate that also befell Aidan McGrath in additional time.

Earlier Defeat

As well as ensuring a return journey for the O'Dwyer Cup to the Glen, Aherlow's one-point win was also sweet revenge for their defeat by Loughmore in the second round of the

championship in Cashel in mid July. Aherlow were beaten that day by 5 points (1-8 to 0-6) before they resurrected their challenge for county honours as West champions.

At the end of the year Loughmore had the consolation, if you could call it that, of being beaten by teams that went on to become county champions in both senior hurling (Thurles Sarsfields) and senior football.

If Barry Grogan proved Aherlow's saviour in the final, he came to their rescue again in the semi-final in Cashel, when his 10points haul (including seven frees) was instrumental in their defeat of Cahir.

Aherlow won by 2 points but they sailed close to the wind, as they played the last twelve minutes (including five minutes of stoppage time) with just 14 men after Ciaran McDonald was sent off for a second bookable offence. A grandstand finish was on the cards when Benny Hickey's free cut the gap to just a single point.

Aherlow, however, shrugged off the handicap of that numerical disadvantage and further points from Laurence Coskeran and Barry Grogan closed out the victory, with another Benny Hickey point coming too late to retrieve the situation for the 2003 champions.

Despite the best efforts of Benny Hickey, Paddy O'Flaherty, Robbie Costigan and Gavin Berry, Cahir's wait for their second title will be extended to another year.

Moyle Rovers' hopes of capturing back-to-back titles were dashed when they were beaten by Loughmore in the other semi-

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final at Cashel on the same afternoon. All Star hurler Noel McGrath was instrumental in sending the Mid team through to the final against the holders, who struggled without the services of experienced duo Declan Browne and Liam Cronin.

Rovers were well in contention at halftime when they were behind by just 2 points (0-7 to 0-5) but they didn't score again until two minutes from the end. But that stage the game had slipped from their grasp and Peter Acheson's goal only served to put a more respectable appearance on the scoreline.

The Powerstown/Lisronagh club didn't finish the season empty-handed, as they got the better of Cahir in the final to win their fifth South title in-a-row. Their progress through the county competition saw them defeat Thomas MacDonaghs before they proved too strong for Arravale Rovers in Cashel in June. Declan Browne's contribution of 1-11 from their tally of 1-15 in that latter game only

emphasised how sorely his absence was felt when they lost to Loughmore.

Brian Jones, Damien Kiely, Ger Mulhair, Timmy Dalton and Robbie Kiely bravely led an Arravale challenge against Moyle Rovers, one that ran out of steam in the final quarter of an hour. Arravale, who last won the championship 25 years ago, had earlier beaten Moyne/Templetuohy.

In the quarter-finals Cahir were pushed all the way by Swans before eventually beating the Carrick team by 3 points. Swans had enough chances but they didn't make their possession count and reached the end of the road, despite having taken the notable scalps of Clonmel Og and Eire Og Annacarty along the way. Stephen Hahessy gave a fine display in that game against Cahir as did Alan O'Sullivan, Keith Walsh, Jamie Sweetman and Benny

Swans advanced to the quarter-final thanks to goalkeeper Alan Ryan, who saved Damien O'Brien's penalty deep in additional time in their 1-9 to 1-6 win over Eire Og Annacarty in the second round. Eire put it up to the Carrick team, principally because of the leadership shown by Brian and Kevin Fox, Diarmuid Ryan, Padraic O'Dwyer and Philip McLoughlin, but ultimately their effort fell short.

In the other last eight tie the North combination side of Thomas MacDonaghs gave a good account of themselves before bowing out to Aherlow. Thanks to the efforts of Philip Austin, Liam England and the Hannigans, George and Alan, MacDonaghs showed great character to produce a late rally that yielded goals from Andrew Byrne and Tommy Connors.

Their performance was all the more admirable considering they had beaten another combination team, Fr. John Kenyons, in the North Final only three days previously.

Aherlow, however, were always in the comfort zone once Barry Grogan (that man again) converted a penalty to put them 9 points ahead five minutes into the second half. Aherlow's 1-13 to 2-5 success meant that they proved a stumbling block for MacDonaghs at the quarter-final stage for the second year running.

The team that went on to finish on top of the pile in November breezed through the opening round when they eased their way past Killenaule, enjoying a 16-points margin of victory.

Clonmel Commercials haven't won the championship since 2002, although the host of underage titles won by the club during the year, a rich harvest that included the county minor and under-21 crowns. suggests a return to the good times may not be too far away.

At the beginning of June they lost by 5 points to Loughmore, a

club with whom they have enjoyed many a famous battle down the years, in a second round replay at Holycross.

Jason Barnes, Donal Lynch, Eamon Hanrahan, Paul O'Mahony and John Harney were all to the fore as the Clonmel team led at the break by 0-5 to 0-3. But they couldn't sustain their challenge in the second period, when they missed some good chances.

Extra time couldn't separate the teams when they met at Boherlahan in the first match. Commercials got their campaign underway by beating JK Brackens by 6 points in the preliminary round back in April.

In a repeat of the 2008 final Cahir and Galtee Rovers clashed in the second round, although this time the honours went Cahir's direction. James McGrath's goal six minutes into second half injury time put the seal on their 4-points victory. However Tony Egan, who had earlier converted four frees and was a hero of an earlier victory over Fethard, missed a glorious opportunity to level the scores from another free and possibly force extra time.

Those Egan points and the impact of Colin Morrissey, Mark O'Brien and Kieran Bergin had given the Bansha team every chance of taking another step towards capturing a seventh title.

Clonmel Og made their senior debut in the 2009 championship, when they gave a very good account of themselves in defeat in the first round against Fethard. This year, however, they again fell at the first hurdle. They scored 2-14 to draw with Carrick Swans in the first game in Kilsheelan before losing the replay at the same venue. The real damage was done in that first game when they surrendered a 9 points lead on a day when their best were Conor Morrissey, Shane Kearney, Christopher Aylward, Johnny Cagney and Matthew Norris.

Fethard are the club with most county championships, 21, but next year will be the tenth anniversary of their last success in 2001. Once again they made little impact in this year's competition and slumped to a 7-points defeat against Galtee Rovers in a first round game in Cahir on May 1st.

Brian Coen, Alan O'Connor, Chris Sheehan and Cian and Carl Maher couldn't be faulted for their efforts for a Fethard side gunned down by Tony Egan, who kicked a total of 1-9, all but 2 points of which came from play.

Ardfinnan, another club with a proud tradition, also fell on hard times as they tried to regain the cup for the first time in five years. They were at the receiving end of a shock 2-11 to 2-7 beating by Eire Og Annacarty in the first round when the performances of Jonathan Ryan, David O'Sullivan, Michael Phelan and Brian Lonergan couldn't prevent them from sliding to defeat.

Michael Frawley 1932-2010

On behalf of the GAA, I want to extend our deepest sympathies to Michael Frawley's family, daughters Margaret, Mary, Cathriona and Anne, sons Michael and Ger, grandson Jamie, son-in-law Pat, sister Nora Bartley, sisters-in-law Mary Frawley, Joe and Alice Fitzgerald, brother-in-law Sean Fitzgerald and his extended family.

On Sunday the 1st August the news broke that Michael Frawley, better known as Mick to all of us, had died. We were all hit with a deep sadness as one of the linchpins of the Gaelic Athletic Association had left us to join his dear wife Nellie and his brother Jim who had predeceased him.

Michael Frawley was born on the 9th June 1932, to his parents Michael and Margaret Frawley and was the eldest in a family of three. He was passed on a proud family tradition and carried on this with great distinction.

He went to national school in Emly and when he completed his education, he took up farming full-time. In time he took over the family farm and built up a successful dairy operation, which he completely modernised to meet the needs of the day. He was elected to the management committee of the Tipperary Cooperative Society. The management skills he acquired were put to good use later with his involvement in the GAA.

On the 29th April 1965 he married Nellie Fitzgerald, and they were blessed with six children. Micahel and Nellie ensured they were well-educated so they could avail of opportunities in life.

Apart from his family and farming, it was in the GAA that he really made his mark. He was very proud of Jack Raleigh's hurling exploits with Toomevara, also Malachy O'Brien who was a member of the Limerick Commercial team that won the first senior football All-Ireland, as well as Jim Mitchell's exploits in the athletics world. Of course they were all Emly men. The abovementioned three men and others were a source of inspiration to

He had a long playing career with his beloved club Emly, culminating in divisional medals in Junior football, Junior hurling, Senior football and a County Junior football medal in 1968.

In 1968 he was part of the panel as well as the management of St. Ailbe's (Emly/Aherlow) that won a West Senior football title.

In the early 1960s, he was invited by Ardfinnan to be part of the Tipperary Senior football selection committee. Ardfinnan were champions and in the process it was their call to put the county senior management in place. He spent in the region of twelve

years as senior selector, as well as serving, on occasions, as selector in other teams. This commitment meant regular trips to Clonmel for training, attending club games and travelling with the team to different venues all over the country.

Fr Tom Marsh and Mick Frawley are legendary figures in the annals of Tipperary football. It was during their reign that Jim 'Tot' McGown was brought in to advance the fortunes of Tipperary football. McGown was a successful footballer with Mayo and was, by profession, an engineer working with the local authority in Clonmel. During this time they had some close calls with Cork and Kerry but could not make the break. They did however win the Division 2 National League title in 1971 and were later beaten by Down in another final.

He was a Railway Cup selector with Munster for a number of years and during his tenure the Railway Cup was won. Mick did not travel empty handed as he had good players from the county – Michael

'Babs' Keating, Denis Burke, Eddie Webster, Sean Kearney and James Kehoe, in successful teams of 1972, 1975 and 1976.

During these years of playing and as a county selector, he was representing his club at West Board meetings and was shortly elected as one of four to represent the West Division on the County Board. At the same time he was club chairman and was central to the development of the new field, dressing room and stand, and later gave assistance with the lighting of the field.

In 1969 he was elected delegate with Donie Nealon and served for eight years representing Tipperary on the Munster Council. It

was during this time that a big push came within the GAA for every club to vest their property in the GAA and to have their own field and dressing rooms. In this area, clubs throughout the county are deeply indebted to him for all the assistance he gave them. He had earlier been one of the driving forces in Emly and all the experience he had gained, he gladly passed it on.

In 1973 he was elected chairman of the West Board, a position he served with distinction. He, amongst others, helped the west to be competitive in all grades for county honours.

In 1977 he was elected chairman of the Munster Council. The first task facing

him was to appoint a secretary as Sean McCarthy (Kerry) died in office. His Tipperary colleague on the Council, Donie Nealon, was elected secretary. He enjoyed his three years on the Council and Donie Nealon, Tadgh Crowley (Treasurer) and himself worked as a great team. The Council was in debt but this did not stop the authorisation of support for county and club projects. The management of the council under his direction put the plan in place that has led to the Council being in today's healthy position.

It was under his direction that coaching schemes to assist the four unsuccessful counties was put in place. The star Kerry players Denis 'Ogie' Moran and Pat Spillane were amongst some of the coaches that came to help the Tipperary minor team. This almost paid off immediately as in 1980 the County Minor football

team were eight points up with as many minutes to play but were beaten. The Kerry team went on to win the All-Ireland.

During his days as chairman of the Munster Council, he served on management in Croke Park. For at least two years of his time on management his close personal friend, Con Murphy, was President of the Association.

He was county chairman from 1982-84. He led the campaign to stage the All-Ireland Senior hurling final in Thurles. The campaign was successful and Thurles was awarded the final, which went off without a blemish. The county senior hurlers had been in the doldrums since winning the All-Ireland in 1971 and with the final in Thurles, the pressure was on for Tipperary to be there. Unfortunately, Tipperary were beaten, in their first Munster final since 1973, in dramatic fashion by eventual All-Ireland winners Cork. For the centenary final the preparation work was big but the issue of how to finance it was even bigger. Mick Frawley was to the front of this work, ably assisted by John Lanigan, Mick Maher, Pierce Duggan Tommy Barrett and others. They came up with the double your money scheme and went all over the county, province and country to raise the money. They succeeded and this has led to the fine stadium we enjoy today.

In 1984 the County Minor footballers reached the All-Ireland Minor final, only to be beaten by Dublin. However he was proud that we were there and had won the Munster title for the first time since 1955.

In 1984 I personally was glad he was chairman as he came to my rescue. The Senior footballers were to play Fermanagh in the N.F.L. in Enniskillen. As secretary of the football board, I was a member of the old fixture and finance committee, of which he was chairman. Permission was not forthcoming to travel Saturday evening. The late Hugh Kennedy, chairman of the football board, instructed me to write and inform the county secretary that we were travelling overnight. The Monday night after Enniskillen, the afore-mentioned body met and the footballers were criticised for travelling overnight. The chairman, Mick Frawley, came to my rescue and it is now the norm for the footballers to travel overnight on a long journey.

At the same time as chairman of the county board, he was trying to keep the books balanced. He did his best to introduce the draw which later came under the chairmanship of Noel Morris, who appointed Mick as chairman of the draw committee. The draw was a success and this was helped by the appointment of Tim Floyd as co-ordinator. The draw has 20,000 members and without it the county could not survive.

The last major position he held in the GAA was trustee and this involved being part of management in Croke Park once more. He was elected from 1985 to 1988 inclusive. He later ran for President but the position eluded him.

The last position he held in the county was football board chairman. He was chairman for eight years 1997-2004 inclusive. During his tenure, the county contested two Munster Senior football finals, one of which went to a replay only to be beaten; an U21 final. However we won the Junior Munster and All-Ireland in 1998 under the guidance of Seamus McCarthy.

Mick worked tirelessly for the GAA and when the history books will be written, he will stand favourably with Cusack and Davin. The challenges were different but he rose to them. It must be remembered that what he did for the Association could not have done without the support of his wife Nellie, his brother Jim, and his six children. When GAA duty called Mick, which was often, the work had to be done and it was done.

To sum Mick up, he could be stubborn and loyal. No task was too big for him and while in the Chair for the various bodies he upheld the rules of the Association.

In 2008 the Munster Council, under the chairmanship of Jimmy O'Gorman, acknowledged his work on the administration front by making a presentation to him.

Mick was a member of the Pioneer movement all his life and was a devout Catholic.

The manner and the dignity in which the Emly GAA club assisted in the funeral arrangements and the guard of honour, Mick your contribution to the GAA has not gone unnoticed.

I hope Mick that I have done you justice as we lay you to rest alongside your dear wife Nellie.

Finally, I hope the soil of this graveyard rests gently on you. Ni beidh a leitheid ann aris.

Sean, was also a very staunch defender of the divisional system and his term as Chairman of the Mid Board from 1994 -1997 was most noteworthy.


However, in spite of his love of Mid Tipperary and The Premier County, nothing could come close to the affection he held for his beloved Loughmore Castleiney. A man who dedicated his life to the famed club, Sean was central to everything associated with Loughmore Castleiney and was not slow about putting his shoulder to the wheel when hard work was needed.

He delighted in the success of the club on and off the playing fields and had a particular gra for football - the club winning it's 57th Mid senior title this year bringing a smile to his face. Sean would have been present for the vast bulk of those victories.

While the games enthralled Sean and gave him much enjoyment, he would readily acknowledge that it was the many many friends he made through his involvement in the GAA that gave him most satisfaction. He had friends in every parish of County Tipperary and many of those descended on Templemore, Castleiney and Templeree to pay their final respects as he was laid to rest in his native soil. With a rye smile, he would have entertained many of them with his lamenting of the difficulties of the 'poor country club' while at the same time delighting in the rapport as they dismissed his comments and mentioned the many titles secured in any given year by the green and red army. It was vintage Sean Mockler - a humble, gentle and gracious soul.

The former Bord na Mona employee who was called ashore by the Great Referee is survived by his wife Rose, family, neighbours, GAA colleagues and many, many friends. A void has been left in their lives -to them all, sincerest sympathy is tendered

Club Development in the County

Dr. Morris Park and its recent addition

One of the jewels in the crown of what is Tipperary GAA has to be Dr. Morris Park. One cannot but applaud the visionaries who purchased the original parcel of land comprising approximately eleven acres from local farmer Stephen Smee in the second half of the nineties. While it did not cost the King's ransom at the time it still represented a huge financial challenge to the county board. The board draw at the time was growing by the year and it enabled the board to be positive and optimistic with regards their financial commitment.

At that particular time in the GAA world it became obvious to the administrators that as a result of the growth in ladies football and camogie, the increasing demands on facilities for primary, post- primary and third level games that a facility was required to take the pressure off the clubs whose pitches were unable to accommodate the demands being imposed on them.

While the county senior hurling training was always accorded the use of Semple Stadium the other grades in hurling as well as football needed a place to prepare their teams for their championship engagements.

Predominantly a Training Ground

With that in mind the county board set out to prepare two flood light pitches on natural terrain and they turned out to be of excellent quality and despite being used the year round they stood the test of time and became an invaluable acquisition to the GAA locally and nationally. Despite numerous requests for its use for championship games both divisionally and at county level it has only been used for that purpose on exceptional occasions. It has been mainly used as a training ground and its ability to recover from excessive use has been one of its hallmarks.

While many county board officers, who have presided over the administration in the county since the birth of Morris Park, take satisfaction from their involvement there is no doubt but the most influential man in its development has been former county development officer and Munster Council representative, John Ryan, from the Holycross-Ballycahill club. He is widely recognised within the county, province and nationally as one of the most knowledgeable men in field development and land husbandry and his advice and direction is much sought and widely and willingly given.

Further Expansion

In 2008 when the money accrued from the renting of Croke Park to the I.R.F.U. and F.A.I. became available, the Tipperary county board explored the possibility of securing a further field at Morris Park and after negotiations with the Smee family a further piece of property was purchased and under the guidance of John Ryan has now been developed, grass sown, properly fenced and hopefully in twelve months time will be field three in the Morris Park complex.

This new field while not boasting synthetic surface will be an all weather addition and having been developed to the most modern specifications and with the most up to date drainage system will be able to host games the year round and should even in the depths of winter host two or perhaps three games a

This new addition will be of great help to second and third level schools and will be invaluable to development squads who oftentimes do part of their programmes in the winter months. The county board have been very generous to both camogie and ladies football over the years and this new addition will enable them to continue their support.

Going forward it is envisaged that further development will take place at Morris Park in the near future with the board officers and county development committee planning the course of action needed to make the facility one of the best of its kind in Ireland.

Development a Tribute to One Man

While many people have played their parts in making Morris Park what it is today, there is one man above and beyond the rest that Morris Park will be forever a memorial to his expertise, efficiency, negotiations skills and dedication that is John Ryan. The county and the many young men and women that enjoy those marvellous facilities there owe him a deep debt of gratitude.

Programmes

However I must tackle the clubs to who fail to comply with the prescribed team line outs.

It has happened in two north finals this year when in one case the sheet was completely ignored while on another occasion four players were listed incorrectly. It's only a matter of courtesy to have the teams lined outs properly. Putting a programme together takes up a lot of time.

THE LOW POINTS

Tipp FM celebrated the Tipperary All-Ireland homecoming with fervour last September. Many congratulations to the station. The coverage was well received amongst the public.

On other weekends, the station continues to cover GAA affairs

on a limited time scale with inter-county games gaining the majority of the limelight. However the previews in the days leading up to the games is by and large very very poor except for the coverage given on the Saturday evening Preview Show presented by the very popular Paddy Finucane. At this juncture I have to acknowledge work of Paddy Finucane, Tom McGrath, Ian O'Connor, Walty Moloney and Ronan Quirke.

However it is sad to see that as far as inter-county games are concerned the final scoreline seems to be the end of the matter as we hear very little follow up in the subsequent sports bulletins where match quotes could be spread out over the week.

Attention to club activity over the week is extremely poor indeed. Ok the results at weekends get a mention but there is no description of the games where other local radio stations like Clare FM carry out with little fuss.

At midweek, apart from five minute on the spot reports on inter county Minor and U-21 games, other GAA matters (except team line outs) are rarely mentioned. Juvenile games, played at mid week, are entirely ignored.

The GAA & Rural Identity

"To all those who have played, fought, cried, shouted, supported, suffered, helped out, cooked, complained, cajoled, transported, refereed, complained about referees, selected, blamed selectors, objected, stormed out, came back, coached, managed, retired, came out of retirement, should have retired long ago, collected money, spent money, spilled blood, cursed and sang . . . "

This is the dedication that precedes an impressive DVD production called Hurling In The Hills - produced last year to celebrate 125 years of the GAA in Upperchurch and Drombane. It is a dedication that captures the highs and lows of GAA life at club level but above all captures the emotional connection between GAA, local place and identity.

On the Tuesday evening following this year's All-Ireland hurling final I listened on Tipp FM radio to Paul Curran and Eoin Kelly during the Liam McCarthy homecoming in Mullinahone at the foot of Slievenamon. In different ways - both players exemplified Charles Kickham's famous phrase in his novel Knocknagow 'All for the honour of the little village'. Curran (a calm and cool young man not given to sentimentality) spoke of the emotion he felt on the morning of the All Ireland as he drove through Mullinahone village and saw the many home made 'good luck' banners for the Mullinahone players. For Eoin Kelly (the first ever victorious senior hurling captain from the South division) it was a superb honour - one carried with great humility also because he knew (like all great players) that he was relatively lucky in time and place to achieve this honour. He knew instinctively that he was doing so on behalf of the Mullinahone Club and all those club members and players who laboured since its foundation 125 years ago. Similarly in Croke Park (particularly following the evocative strains of The Galtee Mountain Boy) Tipperary folk everywhere connected at some emotional level with their own identity in relation to club, parish and county.

So in these times of economic gloom, NAMA bailouts and scepticism about our political system what is it about the GAA that still affirms our identity in positive ways and makes life more passionate and worthwhile throughout Ireland? There are many factors. Firstly its structure as an essentially grass roots organisation where the local club is the anchor for all development is crucial. Those who play, coach, manage, fundraise, support, criticise or occasionally praise referees; do so because there is immediate connection to one's local place and the levels of success or failure experienced at local level. The bonds of belonging and branches of connection are deeply rooted into doing the best for one's parish. The second factor relates to volunteerism and the associated amateur status of GAA players. To be on your local club/parish team is still generally perceived as an honour and privilege. At club level however people volunteer for a variety of reasons. Parents volunteer because their children benefit from the national games, former players wish to give something back, others volunteer because they are passionate about the promotion of hurling or football, and many others volunteer because they see the GAA club as central to the mental and physical health of those living in the parish. At a cultural level others become involved in Scor competitions and enjoy the winter entertainment it provides. The social function of GAA at local level should not be under estimated. There is substantial evidence to suggest that being connected to friends, family and place can greatly enhance mental health. In the current year that has seen a 25% increase in suicide rates in Ireland, the GAA club and its social function particularly in rural areas should not be underestimated.

Those close to club life but particularly players themselves experience the inevitability of defeat as well as success. This exposure to the twin realities of success and failure in life is in itself a great training ground for resilience. The focus on team as opposed to individualism is another significant and positive attribute. The recognition that people have good and bad days is legitimated by the team mentality. For all those who have long since out grown the youthful vigour of their playing days, the GAA club still offers a lifetime interest as supporter, club official, officer or member of a development committee. For those living away from home the club website and GAA news can still be a source of great interest, connection and joy.

The recently established GAA Social Initiative (inspired by President Mary McAleese and her husband Martin) in conjunction with the IFA is aimed at enabling older rural men to participate socially and deserves support. It is currently being piloted in 80 clubs

nationwide and Sean Kilbride (national coordinator) informs me that two Tipperary clubs are part of this initial pilot (Thurles Sarsfields and Nenagh Éire Óg). Rural isolation is a real issue for many single and older men. It is likely that GAA based social initiatives if effectively promoted by clubs can improve quality of life by reducing loneliness for single men.

A further sign of the GAA's success at local level is the investment in club facilities (frequently with assistance from the national lottery sports capital funding scheme). The energy devoted to fundraising has been quite phenomenal and the weekly club lottery is now a fundamental element of servicing the successful running of clubs and associated facilities throughout Ireland. In Tipperary clubs such as Sean Treacy's in West Tipp, or Holycross Ballycahill in mid Tipp, are typical of many clubs where substantial lottery investment was coupled with the deployment of local skills and unquantifiable units of volunteered time. That so many clubs have succeeded in such levels of refurbishment is testament to the importance of people's identity with and commitment to local place.

Despite all these developments and our immense pride as Tipperary people this year, the GAA generally is not without its challenges however. The new reality of emigration will be particularly challenging for rural based clubs. One club official told me that in just one week in October his club lost 5 players to emigration. This in addition to: the population shift towards urban centres, the financial challenges of continuous fundraising, the reliance on small numbers of volunteers in many clubs, the challenges of responding to health and safety legislation, the expectation of high standards of coaching and welfare from parents of juvenile players and the insistence on 'the parish' rule for those who have relocated to new centres are all part of a complex reality.

The GAA has however shown its capacity to be adaptable, to respond to emerging issues and to generate new structures appropriate to modern society. Even the smallest clubs have survived since their foundation and many have endured cycles of sharp decline and some prosperity. Con Houlihan one of Ireland's greatest sports journalists wrote (May 12, 2010) that three institutions have played a big part in Irish life. These he named as: the Church, Fianna Fail and The GAA. Houlihan having assessed the current condition of each - concluded that the GAA is now the only one "sailing into clear water."

While there are however obstacles in the clear water as outlined, we cannot underestimate what the GAA has given us, what it continues to enable within local communities and its acknowledged success as an amateur organisation worldwide. Its success at a local level has never depended on commercialism (despite some corporate leanings at HQ) and it still remains firmly rooted in the local club where volunteering and amateurism in the best sense are driving forces. These are key attributes to be celebrated at a time when we are all compromised by the excesses of corporate institutions, a dysfunctional professionalism in high places and an associated disconnection from reality.




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Launch of GAA / Library archive initiative

In July at Thurles Library, a joint initiative between Tipperary Libraries and the Tipperary GAA County Board was officially launched. For over a year, John O'Gorman of Thurles Library has been working with a number of people involved with the GAA in Tipperary to find a secure and safe location for archive materials such as match programmes, minute books, scrap books, photos etc.

The most renowned collector of GAA archive material in the history of the Association dating back to 1884 is Sam Melbourne, a native of the Moycarkey-Borris GAA club. Sam began collecting GAA memorabilia back in 1935 and pieces of his collection such as hurleys, balls, jersey's, medals etc. helped to inspire GAA Museum's such as the one in Croke Park and also Lar na Pairce in Thurles. Sam has now kindly donated a number of scrap books to Thurles Library in the knowledge that the material will be stored securely in to the future and for the enjoyment of generations to come.

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A Tipp man in Kilkenny

As a group of Slievenamon natives filed disconsolately towards our bus to face the return journey to Kilkenny after the All-Ireland final of 2009, one of our heartbroken number ventured the opinion that "the Liffey looked very attractive". The comment was made in jest but summed up the depression which every Tipp native felt on the day. With 10 minutes left in the match, Tipp looked to be in the ascendancy but a couple of questionable refereeing decisions inspired Kilkenny to complete their 4-in-a-row.

It had been a decade of Kilkenny dominance over Tipp. We couldn't seem to get the upper hand against the stripey men: the All-Ireland semi-final of 2002; the NHL final of 2003; the All-Ireland semi-final of 2003; the NHL final of 2009 and now the All-Ireland final of the same year, all had ended in defeat for the Blue and the Gold. Many of these games were termed classics by the media. Poor consolation especially for Tipp people living in Kilkenny. The old jibe that Kilkenny couldn't beat Tipperary in an All-Ireland final for 45 years was now answered with the quip that Tipp hadn't beaten the cats in the championship since the last millennium.

Perhaps even more important to Kilkenny supporters than the winning of the 4-in-a-row, was that it was achieved by defeating Tipp in a final. Enda McEvoy, Sunday Tribune hurling columnist and a native of the marble city, relates a conversation, which he had with an elderly Kilkenny supporter, who stated that the victory over Tipp made him feel 10 years younger.

Why should this be so? Many Kilkenny people of a certain vintage had before the current decade grown accustomed to losing to Tipp. A Kilkenny acquaintance, who spent many years in London, before returning home, can list successive defeats to the Premier County in All-Ireland finals, which he listened to on a transistor radio on the higher points of Hampstead Heath. He told me that when he returned to his bachelor flat he would shed tears for his native county. A current referee in Kilkenny, when a child, would clam up and refuse to speak as his father drove through Tipperary. Seems excessive? Let us remember that there is only one sport that matters to almost every man, woman and child in Kilkenny.

So 2009 was a time of joy for Kilkenny natives. The black and

amber colours were everywhere and the 4-in-a-row was widely celebrated. Before the year was out, the slogan "the drive for five" was coined and many supporters and indeed almost all the national media thought that victory in 2010 was but a formality. After Tipp's defeat to Cork at the end of May this year, this conviction grew stronger.

But the clouds over the Premier were soon to lift. Successive victories over Wexford, Offaly, Galway and Waterford steeled the resolve in this Tipp team. The Slievenamon bus in Kilkenny rolled on through the summer and a quiet inner confidence developed among Tipp supporters.

In the build-up to the All-Ireland final many cats supporters were ultra confident. It seemed that every house in Kilkenny was festooned with black and amber bunting. It was estimated that 8,000 had turned up to watch Kilkenny training on one night alone. Half the dogs I met on my daily walk were called Cody. On *Up for the Match* on the night before the final 2 former Kilkenny players could not envisage a Kilkenny defeat. On the way into Croke Park on All-Ireland final day, a former Kilkenny All-Ireland winning captain predicted that Kilkenny would win by 8 points at least.

But Deliverance Day was at hand! There is no need to rehash the Tipp performance for all who were in Croke Park or who watched on TV. Tipp's wonderfully wholehearted display of commitment and skill left no room for argument. To describe the achievement as merely the winning of a hurling match would be like saying that Tiger Woods likes the female of the species, that Brian O'Driscoll is a fine rugby player, that Brendan Behan was fond of a few scoops. Words alone cannot articulate the sense of joy, satisfaction and most of all relief as Eoin Kelly climbed the steps to collect the Holy Grail. The natural order was restored and normal service had resumed!.

The u-21 final on the following Saturday harvested more bounty. We Tipp natives in Kilkenny are set fair for anything the winter may throw at us. A reversal of the ageing process has passed from Kilkenny supporters to Tipperary followers. In the words of the Pink Floyd song "Wish you were here".

In what has been a memorable year for Tipperary G.A.A. our Post-primary Schools were not found wanting when it came to sharing in the reflected glory of our Senior and Under-21 hurlers and Under-21 footballers. THE PREMIER COUNTY' by John Ryan 'Sandy'

Here we have a collection of 106 first and unique achievements, granting Tipperary the title of 'The Premier County' and to many 'The Home of hurling'. Kilkenny people would disagree. Many of these you will know, then again many of these you mightn't know.

- *• They were the first team to win the All Ireland senior hurling title in 1887 against Galway.
- The first GAA president was a Tipperary man named Maurice Davin, from Carrick-on-Suir, in south Tipperary.
- Tipperary won the first Munster & All-Ireland Under-21 Hurling Championship in 1964.
- The first club to win the All Ireland Senior club title was Roscrea.
- · The first GAA Congress was held in Hayes' Hotel in Thurles.
- The first auto-biography of a hurler was that of Tommy Doyle 'A Lifetime in Hurling', which was published in 1955.
- Tipp have won the most National Hurling League titles with 19, Cork and Kilkenny are both tied 2nd with 14
- Tipp have won the most Munster Minor hurling titles with 36, Cork are second with 32
- Tipp have won the most Munster Under-21 hurling titles with 20, Cork are second with 18
- Tipp have won the most National hurling league titles in a single decade with 6 (1950, 1952, 1954, 1955, 1957 and 1959). Limerick are the nearest with 5
- They also are the only county in GAA history to win an All Ireland title in every decade since 1887
- They won the Hurling-Football Double twice in 1895 and 1900, 90 years before Cork finally caught up in 1990 having won the double in 1890.
- In 1895, Tipp became the only county to win the All-Ireland Senior hurling and football double on the same day and repeated the feat in 1900. This will never happen again due to the finals now being played on separate days.
- In 1887, Tipp were the first county to bring off the inter-county double on the same day by beating Clare in both hurling and football on the same day in Nenaoh.
- They won the Senior, Minor and Junior All Ireland's in 1930 to become the first county in hurling or football to win 3 All Ireland's in one year, otherwise known as the Grand Slam.
- Tipp are the only county to have twice won the Senior hurling and two other grades in the same year (1930, 1989)
- Tipp were the first county to win 3 Minor All Ireland Hurling titles in a row (1932, 1933, 1934)
- In 1967, they were the first team to lead the Roll of Honour in every present hurling Grade (Senior, Intermediate, Minor and Under-21).
- In 1961, Tipp won the first Intermediate Munster final
- . In 1910, Tipp won the first Junior Munster Hurling final
- John Doyle Has 8 All-Ireland Senior hurling medals, tied with the great Christy Ring
- John Doyle was the first hurler to win 10 Munster Senior hurling Championship medals, now tied with Jimmy Barry-Murphy.
- John Doyle also holds 11 National Hurling League medals, which is unrivalled
- Jimmy Doyle is the only player to contest 4 Minor All Ireland Hurling finals and the only to win 3 Minor All Ireland hurling medals.
- Jimmy Doyle is the only player to have won 4 Munster Minor hurling medals.
- Tony Wall became the first player to receive the Texaco Hurler of the Year award in 1958.
- In 1912, Tipp won the first All-Ireland Junior Football Championship final
- In 1910, Tipp won the first Munster Junior Football Championship final
- In 1910, Tipp became the first county to win the Munster Junior hurling and football in the same year
- In 1911, Tipp became the first county to win two Munster Junior hurling titles in a row.
- . In 1888, Tipp won the first Munster Senior Football Championship final
- Tipp won the first Munster Senior Ladies' Football Championship final and All-Ireland Senior Ladies' Football Championship finals in 1974.
- Tipp were also the first county to win back to back All Ireland Senior Ladies Football Championship (1974–1975)
- Tipp make up one half of the most played meeting of all, Tipp v Cork. This

- is the most numerous meeting in all of hurling, amassing a magnificent 83 matches, 37 wins for Cork, 36 for Tipp, 7 Draws and 3 Walkovers. 2011 will be the 84th meeting.
- In 1911, Tipp became the first county to win back to back Munster Junior hurling titles.
- In 1963, Tipp became the first Munster county to win the All-Ireland Intermediate hurling championship.
- In 1889, Tipp became the first county to win both the All-Ireland Senior Hurling and Senior Football titles.
- In 1934, Tipp were the first county to win the Munster Minor hurling and football in the same year.
- In 1934, Tipp were the first county to win the All-Ireland Minor hurling and football in the same year.
- In 1961, Tipp were the first county to win the Munster Senior and Intermediate hurling titles in the same year
- In 1965, Tipp were the first county to win back to back Munster Under-21
 titles
- In 1965, Tipp were the first county to win the Munster Senior and Under-21 hurling titles in the same year, back to back.
- in 1965, Tipp became the first Munster and Irish county to win back to back All-Ireland Intermediate hurling titles. London had won back to back titles beforehand
- In 1991, Tipp became the first county to win 4 Munster Junior hurling titles
 in a row (1988–1991) Cork had won three titles in a row from 58-60 and
 then the competition was halted. When the competition was reinstated in
 1983, Cork won the first two making it 5 titles in a row, but is not counted
 due to the halt in the running of the competition.
- The first and only GAA president that served two terms was a Tipp man Maurice Davin, from Carrick on Suir
- Tipp were the first hurling county to win back to back Doubles (National League and All-Ireland Senior Hurling title) (1949–1950)
- Feile na nGael was a Tipperary brainchild and was held for the first time in Thurles in 1971.
- The first radio broadcast of a G.A.A. game was of the replay of the Munster Senior Hurling Championship game between Cork and Tipperary at Thurles in 1926.
- Tipp were the first hurling county to reach the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Championship Final through the 'back door', but unfortunately lost to Clare. This was in 1997, the first year of the new system.
- Tipp became the first county to have held the All-Ireland Senior championship in Hurling, Football, Camogie and Ladies' Football in 1999 and are only joined by Cork and Galway in achieving this feat, though both of these achieved this after Tipp.
- In 1964, Tipp became the first hurling county in Munster to have won all inter-county Munster titles (Senior, Minor, Under-21, Intermediate and Junior)
- In 1964, Tipp became the first hurling county to have won all inter-county All-Ireland titles (Senior, Minor, Under-21, Intermediate and Junior).
- Johnny Leahy holds the record for captaining the most teams to Munster Senior hurling glory (5 times)
- Johnny Leahy is the only man to captain a winning All-Ireland team before and after the McCarthy cup was introduced in 1921
- Philip Kennedy of Nenagh Éire Óg was the first man to captain any team to either 2 or back to back All-Ireland Under-21 titles. Dan Murphy (Cork) equalled this in 1998. In 1980, PJ Maxwell was captain of the Under-21's, he was injured for the final, so Philip lifted the trophy as final captain.
- Jimmy Doyle (6 Senior and 3 Minor, John Doyle (8 Senior, 1 Minor) and Christy Ring (8 Senior and 1 Minor) are the only players to have won 9 All-Ireland medals won on the field of play.
- Babs Keating and Mick Roche were the first players to have played in an All-Ireland final in all present grades (Senior, Intermediate, Minor and Under-21)
- John (10 Senior and 2 Minor) and Jimmy Doyle (8 Senior and 4 Minor) are
 the only players to have started 12 All-Ireland finals. Jimmy Doyle came on
 as a sub in 1971, which makes him the player with the most All-Ireland

- appearances with 13.
- Thurles Sarsfields is the only club in Ireland to have provided 10 All-Ireland Senior hurling winning captains
- Tipperary also have the unique distinction that they were the last winners of the original Liam McCarthy cup in 1991.
- . Tipperary have the unique distinction of being the only county to have won All-Ireland senior titles in Hurling, Football, Camogie, Ladies' Football, Hardball singles and doubles, Softball singles and doubles and 40x20 singles and doubles. This means Tipp have won a Senior All-Ireland title in all 7 Major Senior competitions in the GAA (Rounders being the exception as there is no Senior Inter-county competition)
- Eoin Kelly is the only player to have been Young hurler of the year two times in a row (2001-2002).
- To date, Tipp has had the most Young hurlers of the year (5), Eugene O'Neill in 1997 Eoin Kelly in 2001 and 2002, Noel McGrath in 2009 and Brendan Maher in 2010. The nearest is Cork with 3 and Kilkenny and Galway with 2
- Tipp were the first county to have back to back Young hurlers of the year. Eoin Kelly in 2001 and 2002. Cork finally got 2 in a row with Setanta O'hAilpin in 2003 and Brian Murphy in 2004.
- Tipp are the only county to twice have back to back Young hurlers of the year. Eoin Kelly 2001-2002 and Noel McGrath (2009) and Brendan Maher
- · Nenagh's W.J. Spain was the first player to have won both an All-Ireland Senior hurling and Senior football medal. Although these weren't with Tipperary, he won his Senior Football medal with Limerick (1887) and his Senior Hurling medal with Dublin (1889).
- Brendan Cummins holds the record for least Pucks (48) in the Poc Fada competition. He is the only Tipperary man to have won the competition.
- In 1926, the Tipp senior hurling team made the first ever trip to America. This was the first tour of its kind by an All-Ireland winning team.
- In 1910, along with Cork, Tipp were the first team to embark on a European
- . Mikey Maher of Tubberadoora was the first man to captain a team to 3 All-Ireland victories (1895, 1896, 1898)
- In 1974. Tipp acquired the coveted distinction of topping the roll of honour in three out of the four Senior codes at different times. (Hurling, Football and Ladies Football).
- In 1895, Tipp club Arravale Rovers, who represented Tipp in 1895, were in the first All-Ireland Senior Football final played at Jones Road (Now Croke Park). They also have the distinction of winning the first All-Ireland Senior Football final at Jones Road.
- . Tipp hold the record for being in the most consecutive Munster minor hurling finals, 9 in a row from 1980 to 1988 (not including the replay in
- . From 1930 to 1935, Tipp became the first county to win 6 Munster minor titles in a row, they completed it again from 1952 to 1957 and are the only county to do it twice. Cork have won 7 in a row, but after these two
- Tipp were the first county to win 8 Minor munster titles in a single decade, winning them in the 50's (50, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 59). Cork finally achieved the same feat in the 70's.
- Tipp also have a remarkable record in Munster minor hurling as from 1945 to 1962, they never went two years without winning the Munster title. They won 15 out of a possible 18 finals, only missing out on making the final twice and losing it once.
- Tipp are also the first and only county to feature in 50 munster minor finals (58 in all), winning more than half with 36 and losing 22.
- Tipp are the first and only county to win 6 All-Ireland Minor hurling titles in a single decade in the 50's. They won in 52, 53, 55, 56, 57 and 59.
- Declan Carr and Tommy Carr are the only brothers to have won All-Stars in different codes. (Declan in hurling with Tipperary and Tommy in football with Dublin).
- Jovita Delaney became the first player to win an All-Star in camogie.
- Tipp became the first county to have an All-star in every code (1971 in Hurling, 1980 in Ladies Football, 1998 in Men's Football and 2003 in Camogie). Cork can also claim this, but in terms of position, Tipp were the first.
- Tipp and Cork are also the counties to have players featured on the most first All-Star teams. Tipp had players on the first Hurling, Ladies Football and Camogie teams, while Cork had players on the first Hurling, Men's Football and Camogie teams. Tipp have an advantage on Cork, they had a

- player on the first Cú Chulainn hurling team in 1963. So officially, Tipp have players on 4 first teams and is a record by itself.
- Tipp became the first county to be in Three Senior Ladies football All-Ireland finals in a row, losing two in 1978, 1979 before winning in 1980.
- In 1980, Tipp became the first county to win Three All-Ireland Under-16 Ladies football titles in a row and in 1981, became the first county to be in 4 finals in a row.
- In 1962, Tipp became the first county to have two hurlers of the year in a row (Liam Devaney in 1961 and Donie Nealon in 1962).
- In 2001, Tommy Dunne became the first GPA hurler of the year.
- In 1931, Tipp became the first county to play under floodlights. This happened on their tour of America when Tipp played a team drawn from many parts of California in San Francisco. Tipp won 7-5 to 5-4.
- In 1945, Tipp beat Cork in the Munster semi final. Tipp became the first hurling county to stop another at any stage from getting five All-Ireland
- In 1900, Tipp became the first county to play in both a 'Home' All-Ireland final and Real All-Ireland final in both hurling and football. They beat London in both real finals and beat Galway in the 'Home' hurling and
- Tipp are first and only county to hold a team scoreless in both an All-Ireland Senior Hurling and football final. Tipp beat Galway in the hurling in 1887 (1-1 to 0-0) and beat Laois (3-6 to 0-0) in the football in 1889. Tipp also held Galway scoreless in the 1975 All-Ireland Senior ladies football final too, with the score of 1-4 to 0-0.
- JJ Callanan (Thurles Sarsfields) is the only man to have captained a team to an All-Ireland senior hurling title (1930) and then refereed an All-Ireland senior hurling final (1940).
- . In 2010, Shannon Rovers became the first club to win back to back St. Jude's All-Ireland Junior hurling seven's titles.
- In 2010, Tipp (For the second time) became the county to stop a team going for 5 titles in a row, Cork (1941-1944) and Kilkenny (2006-2009).
- In 2010, Tipp took part in the first All-Ireland Under-21 Final to be held Under floodlights. They also won it.
- Tipp also have the biggest ever win in an All-Ireland Senior hurling final. In 1896, Tipp beat Dublin 8-14 to 0-4, which was a 34 point difference in today's scoring, but back then a goal was worth 5 points. So, it was 52 point difference.
- Tipp also have the most players to have won an All-Ireland Senior hurling medal in three different decades with 4.
 - * Tommy Doyle (1937, 1945, 1949, 1950, 1951)
 - * John Doyle (1949, 1950, 1951, 1958, 1961, 1962, 1964, 1965)
 - * Jimmy Doyle (1958, 1961, 1962, 1964, 1965, 1971)
 - * Declan Ryan (1989, 1991, 2001)
- Brendan Cummins, with 61 Senior Championship appearances, is the player with the second most appearances ever. Christy Ring is first with 64, but its likely that Brendan will continue in 2011, beating Christy Ring's record.
- Tipp have the biggest score in an All-Ireland Under-21 hurling final with 5-22 against Galway in 2010
- In 2010, Tipp became the first team to lose their first championship game of the year and still go on to win the All-Ireland Senior hurling championship. This was almost achieved in 2002 by Clare, who were beaten by Tipp in their first Munster game and went on to lose the All-Ireland final to Kilkenny.
- 1937, Tipp won the 50th All-Ireland Senior hurling final, beating Kilkenny, 3-
- In 1962, Tipp won the 75th All-Ireland Senior hurling final, beating Wexford 3-10 to 2-11
- In 1964, Tipp won the 75th Munster Senior hurling final, beating Cork 3-13 to 1-5
- In 1989, Tipp won the 100th Munster Senior hurling final beating Waterford 0-26 to 2-8
- In 2009, Tipp won the 120th Munster Senior hurling final, beating Waterford 4-14 to 2-16
- In 2010, Lar Corbett became the first hurler to score 3 goals in a 70 Minute All-Ireland Senior hurling final.
- The Gaelic Athletic Association was founded in Hayes hotel, Thurles in 1884 making Tipp the home of the GAA.



Keeping The Faith

Attending last September's homecoming of the Tipperary senior hurlers to Semple Stadium, I happened to sit beside Ann Mulcahy of Cashel. Ann, the eldest of seven girls, is the daughter of the late Jim Devitt who played with Tipperary in the forties and is a holder of two All-Ireland senior hurling medals won in 1945 and '49.

Later I was introduced to Ann, and she showed me the All-Ireland medal her father gave her. She had worn it on a chain around her neck. It was the 1949

Jim Devitt first played for Tipperary in 1944 in a career that lasted five years. Described a slim built defender he stood at nine stone eight pound. Michael O'Hehir described him with the words "as a solid as the Rock of Cashel,".

Born in 1922, Jim won an All-Army final in '43 with the 7th Brigade of the Southern Command. In '45 he won a

Munster and All-Ireland with Tipp defeating Kilkenny. He also won three Railway Cups. In the '49 season, he sustained an injury in the Munster campaign and had to sit it out on the subs bench for the

After retiring he continued to follow the fortunes of Tipperary often meeting up with some of his fellow inter-county team mates.

"I remember being brought to all county finals. Meeting people like the 'Rattler' (Byrne), you felt your father was a hero.

With Ann as the eldest she received a present of the 1949 all-Ireland medal from her father. She takes up the story.

"Dad got sick a year before he died. We just thought it was an ordinary flu. He went to hospital and all the tests were negative. He had given the 1945 medal to my mother but that medal was stolen. My mother was devastated. Jim wanted to give her the 1949 medal but she insisted that the 49 medal be given to me as I was the eldest. That's how I got the medal. I then wore it on a chain because I was afraid it would be stolen.

Ann's father passed away in November 1988.

Catherine Gleeson, Kildangan is a daughter of Paddy Ryan Sweeper who won two All-Ireland senior hurling medals with Tipperary in 1937 and '45. Steeped in the GAA, she followed her

father's footsteps into administration becoming Treasurer of the North Tipperary Board.

He first came into prominence when winning an All-Ireland Minor medal in 1930, the famous triple crown year in Tipp GAA circles. Three years later he won a Junior All-Ireland and he joined the senior team to later win an All-Ireland senior after Tipp defeated Kilkenny in Killarnev.

He continued to be a regular with the senior side but it was

until 1945 when he won his second national medal. Playing in the forward line he was joined by his brother Mutt in attack. Another brother, Johnny, was also on the team but missed the final through

He had a long and rewarding career with his club Moycarkey-Borris winning five county senior medals, 1932, '33, '34 '37 and '40 continuing his career until right into the 1950s where he finished up in goal.

Catherine became assistant secretary in 1985 and remained in

that position for two years until she married Roger Gleeson from Puckane. Kildangan heartland!.

Moycarkey- Borris had a productive period, winning two county senior titles in 1982 and '84. They won minor in 1983 and added a County Intermediate in '85.

The 1984 senior win was significant in that history was made by the club having won county honours in 1934 and '84, the Jubilee and Centenary years in the GAA calendar.

A fire side chat one night led to the conversation of medals. "I remember asking Dad if I could have his 1934 county medal. He said, not the All-Ireland medal. I said no,"

"I replied that because I was involved with the Moycarkey team in 1984, I would really love the '34 medal.

The subject of medals was not mentioned for some time. Catherine got married in 1987. Over time, her father had developed Alzheimers and on another visit in September 1991, to her surprise - Catherine was presented with the 1934 county medal with the 1945 all-Ireland medal added.

"What he had done was, he had an envelope with all our names on it. My biggest regret to this day was when I came home to Puckane, I actually threw away the envelope. I should have kept it because his hand writing was on it."

Paddy Ryan passed away on New Years Eve 1991.

Fionnuala Gaynor was born on the 6th September 1971, a day after her father Len had played wing back in Tipperary's eighty minute All-Ireland victory over Kilkenny.

It was Len's third All-Ireland medal having colleted Celtic crosses in 1964 and '65. He also won and All-Ireland U-21 medal in 1964. He won five Munster senior hurling medals, three National Hurling League as well as three Railway Cup medals in 1968, '69 and '70.

As a player, coach and radio analyst with RTE Radio he remains one of the best known GAA personalities of our time.

However it was the 1971 All-Ireland win that meant so much to Len and Fionnuala.

"There as always a connection there. I am an All-Ireland baby," she said.

"Mam was at the match having checked in at The Coombe previously and later went back and I was born (the following day). It was always mentioned, oh you are the girl born after the All-Ireland. There was a long famine after that All-Ireland and I was teased for bringing bad luck.

"It is still a proud moment and you would be proud of him and his hurling and what he has done since. 1971 will always mean something because of that connection."

Len's involvement with coaching many teams brought Fionnuala and her siblings in contact with a lot of people outside the parish.

"We would always support him. We travelled far and wide. If you were to name a place you'd think of what club is there, know the hurling pitch and that's how we know parts of the country. Be it club or county we got to meet great people and made great friends,"

In July 2001, Fionnuala married Eamon Devaney from Ballycommon. Len, as father of the Bride, made a special speech on wedding day.

"I was the first of the family to get married. I enjoyed every minute of the day but my father took me by surprise with his speech when he mentioned I was born the day after the All-Ireland final. The next thing he was handing over the 1971 All-Ireland medal. I never thought I would be getting it in such happy circumstances and he had gone to the trouble of making it into a brooch. I would be able to wear it either as a necklace or a brooch rather than just hiding it somewhere."

"It is smashing and it is amazing when you would have it, how much it means to other people to see it. The beauty of it as well. The quality. It's a very different piece of jewellery.'

While it can be argued that the GAA in general needs to undertake a serious review of hurling and the direction it's headed, there is a danger that unless action is taken at grassroots level that hurling is in danger of losing ground rapidly to other sports. Recognizing that the school environment is where children are very often introduced to the game of hurling for the first time, one of the key issues identified by the Nenagh Éire Óg club as part of its club development plan, is the need for greater liaison between the club and all the local schools.

We are all aware of the key role that our schools play in the overall development of hurling. However, the promotion of hurling in the schools offers a huge challenge, especially now in recessionary times with greater cutbacks on extra-curricular activities. In many schools especially in large urban centers and towns, hurling is not the sport of choice and many children never get the opportunity to play as much hurling as they would like. The Nenagh Éire Óg club have been actively involved in trying to address this issue on a number of


Firstly a "Nenagh Post-Primary Support Group" under the chairmanship of Nenagh Éire Óg club Chairman Jim Nagle and made up of officials from the County Board, local feeder clubs and representatives from Nenagh CBS and Nenagh Vocational school including club members Tony Slattery and Liam Heffernan was put in place last year to assist with coaching and games development in both schools.

Secondly, through the work of the club Juvenile committee under the direction of Martin Morris, a club juvenile coaching officer and school liaison officer has been appointed and the club have worked with St Mary's Junior Boys' National School, Nenagh Gaelscoil and Nenagh CBS Primary school to put structures and systems in place to the mutual benefit of the club and the schools. Under the guidance of Phil Hennessy and Noel Coffey with club coaches Robert Ryan and Liam Flannery, the club is now active in promoting hurling in all three schools. The club is grateful to the schools for their commitment to the programme and to the Principals John Martin, Inez Heenan and Gerry Ryan for their co-operation in allocating regular slots for hurling practice. Part of the mutual benefit of the programme is shown in the fact that club members in Nenagh CBS Transition Year are also involved in this coaching programme and give much need assistance to the club coaches. Many thanks are due to Karen O'Donnell in Nenagh CBS for facilitating this aspect of the program.

Thirdly, aside from the provision of personnel in the form of coaches, further tangible commitment to the programme was evident this year with the commencement of a unique initiative by the club aimed at giving every child in town the opportunity to try the game of hurling. The club presented over 80 hurleys to St Mary's Junior Boys' National School and every child in Senior Infants and First

Classes was presented with their own hurley. The club is very grateful for the ongoing support of Principal John Martin and all the teachers especially Patricia Harte and Michelle Madden. A further pool of 30 hurleys was made available to the Gaelscoil and the CBS primary school for general use.

Evidence of the success of the overall programme thus far was seen in the numbers arriving to the hurling field in MacDonagh Park for extra training. 90 Primary School children participated in an indoor blitz after Christmas which was enjoyed by all the children and parents,

with each child getting a medal and refreshments after the days hurling. A very successful hurling camp was also run during Easter with up to 70 boys from ages 5 to 12 attending, the highlight being the visit of our U12s to the Dome in Thurles. County Board Games Development Officers Tadhg O'Connor and Andy Ryan came to Nenagh to coach during the camp. Indeed the good relationship between the different clubs in the town was evident when Nenagh AFC provided their astroturf facility for this coaching. Furthermore 140 boys and girls attended the annual Nenagh Éire Óg summer camp

The club will continue to coach the children in the schools and also extends a welcome to parents to bring the boys to the hurling field for extra coaching outside of school hours. Training times for under 6s, under 8s and under 10s are Wednesdays 5pm to 6pm and Saturdays 10am to 11.15. The Nenagh Éire Óg club welcomes all newcomers and helmets will be provided for use during training if required. Subsidised rates for the purchase of hurley's and helmets are on offer and the club would like to see as many new boys as possible in attendance at training during 2011, where they can enjoy qualified supervised coaching carried out in a safe and friendly environment with their friends - no child will be refused!

Recent & Forthcoming G.A.A. Publication

ocal G.A.A. publications are scarce on the ground this year. Jimmy Morris got the ball rolling with the launch of *The* Morris Code at the Hibernian Hotel, Nenagh on September 30 with no less an eminence that the president of the association, Christy Cooney, to do the honours. Born in Borrisokane, Jimmy immersed himself in the G.A.A. in his native parish, first as a player and later as an administrator before moving to Nenagh in 1964 where he continued his involvement with the Eire Óg club. Throwing in his lot with his new club was natural because, as he says in the book 'Nenagh would now be my home and I felt it only right and proper that whatever I had to contribute, be it little or great, should be given to the club attached to the town where I now lived.' This personal memoir is about Jimmy's attachment to the G.A.A. over many years – he is now 81 years of age – but it's also about what the G.A.A. has done for people and communities all over Ireland.

This book is a lively read, written in conjunction with Gerry Slevin. It started out as an article and evolved into a book and is on sale for €20. It is published by the *Nenagh Guardian*.

A significant publication is the history of the the Galtee Rovers/St. Peacaun's Club, which was launched on December 4. Too late to review for this publication, it is the work of Seamus McCarthy and Liam Bergin. The significance of this book is that it includes portraits of a number of national figures, such as St. George McCarthy, who was one of the founders of the G.A.A.. William Cullinane, who was an M.P. and an early referee in the G.A.A., Darby Ryan the Bansha Bard, etc. The club is also the home of the famous referee, John Moloney, and the recently retired Governor of Mountjoy Jail, John Lonergan. As well the

model for the *Tipperary Hurler*, the famous painting by Sean Keating, is none other than Ben O'Hickey, also from the parish. We look forward to the book.

On Friday, 11th December, 2009, too late for the 2010 Yearbook, the Cahir G.A.A. Club held the launch of its club history entitled Memories and Achievements, 124 years of the G.A.A. in Cahir. The launch was performed by Sean Kelly M.E.P and former G.A.A. President. A large crowd of present and past club members supported the function. There was a special welcome for John F. O'Donnell who had played such an important role in the revival of the club in the 1940s and had as a player and officer of the club made a lifetime's contribution to the club. His fellow life president Willie Kiely was also present. Willie also had played a significant role in club administration over many decades. Tom Kelly who was on the club's first championship winning team, i.e. the minor footballers of 1943, was also present. Indeed every decade of the club's history was represented by former players from the late 1930s to the present. The night was kindly sponsored by Gerry Enright, of Eurospar, Dungarvan. Gerry was a former club player and had also represented Tipperary in all grades of football and indeed was a Munster Railway Cup player.

The book was compiled by Colm O'Flaherty and Mattie Hussey from a variety of sources e.g. press-cuttings, minute books etc. Extensive use was made of the Thurles library local-studies facilities, where extracts from past local newspapers were accessed. The book also contained almost 300 photographs. However, a unique feature of the book was the contribution

from captains of county winning teams. This ranged from John O'Meara, captain of the county minor winning team of 1953 to Liam Meehan captain of the county minor winning team of 2008. All these contributions were unique in their style and content and gave an insight into life during each period recalled.

The McNamee Award.

The value of the club's history was recognised at national level, with the award for "the best G.A.A. history publication 2009" As 2009 was the 125th anniversary of the founding of the G.A.A., there were significantly more entries in this category, so the award was all the more meritorious. The citation for the award was as follows

"As well as the men who wrote the background of the story of the presence of the G.A.A. in Cahir most recent decades were illuminated by the contribution of successive generations of players and officials."

From the lovely piece written by John O'Meara (who was born in 1936) to the brilliant funny gossipy contribution on the 2003 Tipperary senior football winning team, there is a wonderful chorus of opinions" it concluded.

Club representatives attended the awards night function in Croke Park, which was hosted by the G.A.A. President Christy Cooney. Club representatives were also guests of the G.A.A. at the inter-county games in Croke Park i.e. Dublin versus Louth and Kildare V Derry.

Secrets of Kerry . . . A Captain's Story: Celebrating almost a Century of Kerry All Ireland Triumphs 1903 – 2009 is a DVD rather than a book and that fact may make it all the more interesting.

For the past two and a half years, one of Ireland's most knowledgeable GAA experts, Award Winning Radio Kerry Broadcaster Weeshie Fogarty, together with close friend Christy Riordan, C/R Videos Caherciveen, have been working on a major project, the biggest GAA project of its kind, documenting the triumphs and near misses of Kerry's journeys to Croke Park since 1903, when Kerry won it's very first All-Ireland championship.

The project, a DVD set called Secrets of Kerry . . . A Captain's Story is now completed and was launched in Cáitíns Pub, Kells on Friday 22nd October and at The Gleneagle Hotel, Killarney Tuesday 26th October.

Each of the 36 Kerry wins and some of the near misses have been documented by the captains of the Kerry teams - in their own words – or in the words of their closest living relatives in a 4 hour documentary, that spans 2 DVD's of the highest quality production. The project includes some amazing stories with over 100 interviews in total - tales never heard before, well known legends brought to life and behind the scene dramas of the various journeys to the All Ireland, the battle on the pitch and what happened to the various captains after the cup was lifted, including the desolation of the near misses since 1903.

Fogarty and Riordan trace each of the 32 winning captains, 16 of whom are still alive. Of the captains that have passed on, their relatives recount their story after each of their famous wins.

Updating Club Histories

There has never been a better time for updating club histories. Many existing histories were written during the eighties and need updating badly. Toomevara are already engaged in updating their history which was brought out in 1986. So also are St. Mary's, Clonmel.

What makes the work so much easier today are the outstanding records that are available. Three of the divisions now have histories and they give the general picture of the story of Gaelic Games in their areas. They include the achievements of every club in a general way. The next important source are divisional reports, compiled by secretaries at convention time. They contain a wealth of information on games played in the division during the previous year. Of particular importance are the dates of games, which allow the researcher to go directly to the match report in the local newspaper. There are the local

newspapers, whose coverage of games has expanded dramatically and, whereas every game won't be covered in detail, there will be some reference to every game. All adult games are covered in detail. Then there is the County G.A.A. Yearbook, which strives annually to give as comprehensive coverage as possible to all G.A.A. activity in the county.. Many clubs will have efficient secretaries who will keep a detailed account of what transpired during the year, but will also produce a comprehensive record of the club's achievements at convention time. Such reports can be another valuable resource. Since we live in a visual age any club history must include plenty of pictures. The club may be lucky to have a good snapper, who attends most of its games. If they are not so lucky we are blessed with many photographers in every division, who have comprehensive collections of photographs. Overall then the material for club histories is there in abundance. All that is required is someone with the ability to bring it all together in a decent club history. This might be the time to look around to see if you have such a person in your midst. There are many educated people around and some of them are unemployed.

Other Publications


One of the most important contributions to our knowledge of what is happening in the hurling world is The Agony and the Ecstasy by Damien Tiernan. This book provides an account of the emergence of Waterford as a major hurling force in the late 1990s and the endeavours of the county's hurlers to win an All-Ireland over the last decade. This is a tale of a team that produced outstanding displays, usually one a year, but were usually denied crucial victories by the narrowest of margins. Many may well believe now that some of the greatest hurlers of our generation may never win the elusive Celtic Cross. Tiernan's book recounts the many selectorial blunders, organisational cock-ups, misunderstandings, misfortune and inability to learn, which dogged the team. Because the book is based predominantly on the testimony of players, there are contradictory versions of events. What comes across is the sheer difficulty team management faces in melding into a single fighting unit the great variety of individuals who make up a county senior panel - people who differ in terms of age, experience, ability, personality, education, social background and urban/rural upbringing. The book seems to indicate that Justin McCarthy failed in this very task concentrating on what he regarded as his primary duty getting the players to master the skills of the game and performing them to the best of their abilities on the day of a match.

A related book is *If you Don't Know Me, Don't Judge Me* by Dan Shanahan. Dan Shanahan is a legend in modern hurling, a threetime All Star and winner of 'Player of the Year' in 2007. His time as an inter-county senior hurler coincided with the remarkable revival in Waterford's fortunes, which saw them win the Munster final four times in the last decade. He's probably best remembered for his refusal to shake Justin McCarthy's hand after being taken off in the Munster championship of 2008, though that episode me be eclipsed by his goal in extra time in the 2010 Munster final. The title of the book is taken from a tatoo on Dan's arm.

Another Waterford book is My Father: A Hurling Revolutionary by Conor Power. This is a biography of one of the greatest goalkeepers from one of the most golden eras of hurling, written from the perspective of his son, the journalist Conor Power. Many readers will recall seeing that great photograph of Ned Power overleaping Christy Ring to grab the ball in the 1959 Munster championship. Having played at the highest level from 1957 until 1966, Ned Power won one All-Ireland medal, three Munster medals, an Oireachtas medal and a National League medal with his native Waterford. But it was as a skills coach and motivator that he made a lasting impact on the hurling scene. From the very beginnings of formal coaching at Gormanston in the mid-1960s, Ned was a revolutionary bringing change firstly and most dramatically to his native Tallow and then to many





Other books of interest include *My Club* by Christy O'Connor who followed St. Joseph's Doora-Barefield for a season in 2009 as they looked to re-establish themselves as force in Clare hurling. One of Clare's finest hurlers Tony Griffin tells his remarkable story and his gruelling charity cycle across Canada in Screaming at the Sky. 100 G.A.A. Greats by John Scally celebrates the most significant players the Gaelic games have brought us in their 125-year history. He selects those footballers, hurlers, managers and camogie players who have lit up Irish

sport, becoming national treasures in the process, and highlights their remarkable skills.

For 16 years, Darragh Ó Se has worn the number 8 jersey for Gaelic football's most celebrated county. With six All-Ireland medals, he is the most decorated of the present batch of Kerry footballers. Darragh's name is synonymous with his county's unrelenting appetite for success, but throughout his illustrious career he has held his counsel, allowing his football to do the talking. He now claims

to reveal all that his tight lips kept quiet over his playing career in *Darragh: My Story*.

Voices from Croke Park by Sean Potts is a series of articles by leading G.A.A. writers on great hurlers and footballers, who have exhibited their talents in the great arena. The emphasis is more on football and there is no Tipperary representative.

Finally, a special word of praise for Ger Corbett and company,

who excelled themsleves once again with their programme for the county senior hurling final. This publication gets better by the year and is a wonderful keepsake for the winners, Thurles Sarsfields.

Finally, many readers will be interested in *GAA Gold*, an important archive of All-Ireland hurling finals from the 1950s, which has been compiled by the Irish Film Institute from a series of films shot by the National Film Institute for distribution to cinemas.

The original films have been digitised and the sound clarified. The DVD will be of particular interest to Tipperary people as it contains four All-Irelands featuring Tipperary in the period covered, 1948 to 1959. This is the first of GAA highlights releases, and an equivalent DVD featuring football finals is due next year followed by similar discs covering the 1960s. GAA Gold is available from the IFI shop and all leading DVD retailers, priced €19.99.

Cill Beag Gaels make hurling history

Since its inception the Cill Beag Gaels Club has made an enormous contribution to gaelic games in the county. Having won a number of County Football titles, it could be perceived to be given greater recognition to the big ball game. For those close to the core this is far from being the case. Both codes were always given equal prominence but for some reason or other winning Football titles was the main reason for putting our club in the picture.

During this time the club produced many fine hurling teams and in doing so reached a number of County Finals. Reaching the holy grail always eluded us as the teams seem to come up short on the big day. A key player getting injured or a refereeing decision sometimes played a role thus depriving us of silverware.

All was to change in 2011. For some years now the juvenile club had excellent structures in place and this was paying off at Divisional level in both codes. This coincided with the arrival of Denis O'Connell who was appointed Principal in the National School. He came from a staunch hurling background, having won a number of Limerick championship medals with his club. His burning ambition to raise hurling standards was quickly realised by club officers and he was put in charge of the U/16 team in 2009. While they did not win anything Denis saw great potential in them. For this year he put his name forward to manage the Minor team and he was duly elected. One of his conditions was that he would nominate his own Selectors and this was agreed to.

There is a great tradition in the GAA that selectors involved would invariably have sons of their own on the team. This occasion was no different. Selector Tom Dunne had twins on the panel. Many in the club felt that John should have been called for Minor trials earlier in the year but it never happened. Tony Doyle never played the game but rarely missed any club match. Some say that his ability to spot talent ensured he was a valuable member of the backroom team. John Mc Carthy was a former player and with no ties with the team Denis saw him as a valuable acquisition.

While everybody else was welcoming in the New Year, Denis saw this as a test of character by organising a training session on New Years Day followed by a chat, or as one might say in modern times a bonding session. On arrival at the pitch he was taken aback as only eleven of the twenty four contacted turned up. While seething under the collar Denis kept his cool and quickly got the session over. Next day he approached the missing players and with his classroom skills he got a commitment from one and all.

Over the following weeks twice weekly sessions were held under lights. Denis paid special attention to the alleged weaker players on the panel and they gradually improved their skills. The championship was played on a weekly basis with eight teams in the group thus ensuring each team got seven matches. As so often happens, in rural clubs like the Gaels, they often struggled to have fifteen players good enough, but with Denis's attention to detail, there was now fierce competition to get on the team.

In the first three matches they had relatively easy victories. In order to freshen things up those who had not played got their opportunity in the next match. For Denis he saw for the first time that he could put out any combination with a fair chance of winning. Going into the Final game they were

unbeaten. A number of players were carrying injuries while others were on holidays. Old rivals Kiltubrid were going to be the acid test. The Gaels led going into injury time but a last minute goal by Kiltubrid meant their unbeaten record was gone. Denis and his Selectors saw this as a blessing in disguise and felt it was a wake up call for the knockout stages.

In the Semi Final they were at full strength and never looked in danger of defeat. The Final now beckoned. Experienced observers were of the opinion that this team had something special and every increasing numbers came to see them at training. Once again Kiltubrid stood between them and Divisional honours. On Final day the backroom team had all eventualities covered with key players down the middle the team answered all the questions and were the better team all through. The final whistle was greeted with delight by the large number of supporters. In his post match comments Denis issued a word of caution that it was only a work in progress. Going into the County Semi Final was new territory. They struggled somewhat but held out for a narrow win.

Once again, it was opportunity knocks for the club to break that hoodoo. Their exploits had captured the imagination of the parish. All roads led to Thurles for the Final. The match was played before the Senior Final. It was a proud day for the club as they took to the field. They looked resplendent in their new gear. Not for the first time garage owner Denis O'Brien provided a new set of jerseys, Publican Tony Nagle showed his generosity by sponsoring shorts while socks were with compliments of shopkeeper Ollie Moore.

It was an absorbing contest all through and our lads were behind for most of the game. Going into the last quarter the mentors made a couple of inspirational switches which had the desired effect. Despite conceding a last minute goal they never looked in danger and there were emotional scenes at the final whistle. Such was the invasion of the pitch, one wonders was there anyone left at home. For John Dunne it was a moment of sheer joy as he accepted the cup from the County Chairman. Being eligible for Minor again next year his talents should not go unnoticed.







Camogie in Tipperary continues to grow in popularity, as more girls take up the sport. The work that all the clubs throughout the county put into the promotion of the game must be commended. With all this superb work at the grass roots, hopefully it will translate into success at county level in the not too distant future.

At inter county level this year, Tipperary competed at the top level in all competitions, and while the coveted All Ireland titles eluded the County, some Munster titles came our way in 2010.

The senior panel started off their year with some of their experienced players hanging up their boots after serving the county with great distinction. Despite this, Tipp competed with great gusto in all their games. Unfortunately, despite some spirited performances, Tipp failed to reach the final four in the All Ireland championship.

Our intermediate panel also tried hard in the All Ireland series, but unfortunately failed to reach the final four, while in the Munster championship; Limerick had a comprehensive win over the Tipp girls in the Camogie grounds.

The U18s recorded a good win at home against Wexford, but unfortunately found the challenge from Clare too strong, which ended their interest in the All Ireland series. Meanwhile, the hard working u16s again played their way to the All Ireland final, putting in some commendable displays along the way. However, the final saw them pitted against their old rivals from Galway, and again the title went west across the Shannon. Some consolation for the panel later in the year when in the Munster championship a thrilling victory over Cork in the semi final was followed with a well deserved win over Clare in the final.

The work being done with the county U14s throughout the year again reaped its rewards for the two panels as they competed in various inter county blitzes throughout the year. The highlight of their year was their fantastic double victory in the Tipperary hosted blitz in August, when Semple Stadium was the venue for the two finals.

The club scene in Tipperary continues to be as competitive as ever. In the senior, Cashel came into 2010 as All Ireland club champions, so all eyes were on this year's club championship. Following a replay in the semi final, Cashel narrowly lost to Burgess/Duharra, setting up a final with Toomevara. 
REFEREE COURSE

Biddy Phillips, one of camogie's greatest ambassadors

An Appreciation

When news broke of the untimely death of Biddy Phillips in July, an air of gloom descended on all associated with Camogie in Tipperary and further a field.

Biddy, a native of Ballytarsna which was her first club, later transferred to Thurles Camogie club. Throughout her long association with Thurles, Biddy won 5 senior county titles, 2 Munster club championships. In 1972 Thurles embarked on a 14 day American tour, and the club had the honour of playing in Gaelic Park new York.

Biddy also represented Tipperary at junior and senior level. In 1980 she became involved at administrative level with Tipperary County Board. From 1988 to 2000 Biddy served as assistant secretary and as treasurer. In addition, she was a selector of the senior team with Timmy Delaney and Bernie O'Dowd. Throughout to 1980s, Biddy was totally committed to the rehabilitation of Tipperary Camogie, and was synonymous with the development of the game from junior to senior levels, which culminated in winning the All Ireland Senior title for the first time for Tipperary in 1999. Tipperary went on to win three in a row under the stewardship of Biddy, Michael Cleary and Jim Madden. Also in 1999, Biddy was awarded with a Tipperary sports star Cidona award for her contribution to Camogie.

Refereeing was another of Biddy's major inputs into the game. She served on the National referee's committee for many years, and she took charge of the All Ireland Junior final in 1993, a Senior final in 1997, and had the honour of refereeing the senior All Ireland club final in 1999.

Biddy will be sadly missed by all who knew her, and her passing leaves a huge void in Tipperary Camogie.

our semi-final clash and so it proved as they came from 5 points down with 5 minutes remaining to snatch a late draw (0-14 to 1-11). The presentation of the O' Dowd cup to Captain Fantastic Eimear McDonnell, created a scene of euphoria never again to be experienced when the history of Burgess/Duharra is recorded. With bonfires blazing, banners waving and hooters blowing, the arrival of the cup to the Burgess/Duharra locality on Sunday evening the 10/10/10 was a scene of unrivaled happiness to be savoured forever and a day.

This was the last if the 28 games our seniors had played in 2010.

Juveniles At u8 and u10 we have over 40 players coming to the field. Their enthusiasm knows no bounds and much fun is had by all, young and old alike. During the year they competed in a number of blitzes and challenge games. Much thanks must go to the mentors of these groups as this is where they learn their basics to become the senior players of the future.

In the u12 section we fielded a very young panel with several u10s making up the first fifteen. Though they were not successful in their competitions a big improvement in their camogie skills and concepts was seen during the year, which bodes well for the future.

Our girls played superbly throughout the weekend and became the first team from the club to reach the All-Ireland Final of Division A. 

The eternal now

A carefully conceived philosophy of coaching, as he related to P. M. O'Sullivan, underpinned Eamon O'Shea's work with Tipperary and his views on the game

Eamon O'Shea smiles and the world draws in.

He leans forward, pleased his point is understood. There is charisma in this smile but nothing of the hardness, the edge, often the partner of charisma. Five minutes in his company and it is easy to see why players trust him.

Say no more than that he is an economist who works on social gerontology. This field centres on care of the elderly, society's duty to the bigger picture, the raindrop pulsing in the fountain.

He reserves antipathy for the likes of Milton Friedman, the influential figure who advocated a minimal state, deregulation across the board for business interests. If there is a bridge between the Professor of Economics in NUIG and the Tipperary coach, it must be absorption in the consequences of structure.

A week's time exactly and Eamon O'Shea will be making last preparations around the dressingroom in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Now he is talking about why he does what he does, why he goes a certain road in trying to find improvement for hurlers.

Soul, he calls it. Hurlers have to have soul.

"This goes deeper," he says. "This is to the soul, if it exists. It's deeper than simply the physical aspect. This has to flow."

There on the sideline in Croke Park against Kilkenny last September, he felt he was plugged into something far bigger than the two counties. "It was the genuine article in terms of a game reaching somewhere new," he says. "Opera... Yes, opera."

Eamon O'Shea believes in structure but it must be alive, constantly renewing itself. He worries about what he terms "the lack of instinctiveness" when he watches some young hurlers being coached. "You need to feel the confidence, the self-assuredness, running through you," he emphasizes. "Then that takes over."

He has no iron specifics to impart, no lamps to rub. If Eamon O'Shea is a markedly different character to Brian Cody, there is the shared emphasis on spirit. Follow the right emotion and the results will come.

He makes it simple: "My view is that the coach should be someone almost outside the process, which should be directed by the players. And that they eventually should know so much that the coach becomes redundant. Then the manager only has to manage them."

Simpler again: "The standard is set by the top player. That's where natural competitiveness kicks in. The top players lift everyone."


This coach needs no schedule, no charts, nothing rigid: "Often I'd say to them: I'm not sure what we're going to do next, lads. You go to the pitch and see how they are, see what you'll do that night. The main thing with hurlers is to get them playing in the now. Not the last ball, not the next ball: this ball. Not the last game, not the next game: this game."

"It's no secret that we don't do a lot of drills in training," he continues. "We spend an awful lot of time connecting with each other on hurley passes. We spend a lot of time trying to find each other." Pat Kerwick's extraordinary pass to Séamus Callanan in the All-Ireland Final was the result.

Eamon is bemused by any idea of formula: "People sometimes say: what sort of drills do ye do for goals? My response is: *none*. We don't do any drills for goals because, you know, in all the probabilities of a goal chance, to capture them all, you'd want to have a fair amount of drills."

The logic is obvious: "It's better to put this into the heads of the guys: okay, here's a framework - rather than say: you're going to draw the man, you're going to handpass the ball, and then he's going to score a goal. Yet people will say: give us some drills for goals..."

He is happy to borrow from other codes - tennis in particular. Visualization is a valued technique. "Everything we do is game focused," the coach says. "We constantly try to improve the

players' skills in the context of a game, even if it is only a tenminute game."

For all his strong and clear views, Eamon O'Shea is a pragmatist. He breaks his laugh with a nod when I remind him of the advice Brian Clough most prized: 'Buy good players.'

GAA context sharpens his agreement: "The players you have make or break you. We can't go out and buy Joe Canning. If you've got really talented players, it's a helluva lot easier than if you don't. You can always make excellent players better."

He drew the relevant moral: "You have to set up something around the players to let them express that ability. There's no point in saying: we need to play a different game. You start with the players and you end with the players. They have to be comfortable with the clothes they're given."

Also, there has to be animation on both sides, a crisscross of surprise. Eamon's voice quickens as he relates his own satisfaction: "When I go home from a training session, I'll tell you, I could be sustained all the way home by running through some of things that these guys can do."

Michael Caine accent: not a lot of people know Eamon O'Shea, the player, has every medal except a Celtic Cross. Certainly does: Minor, U21, Fitzgibbon Cup with UCD, Club All-Ireland with Kilruane MacDonaghs, four Tipperary Senior titles.

Quite a stack. Hurling with Tipperary in the late 1970s and the early 1980s grants an honourable pass on the one missed. Four times, there was a championship start with his native county: Cork in 1979, Cork in 1980, draw and replay against Limerick in 1981.

Then he went to York for a year of graduate study. Back home, he worked in Dublin in the Institute of Public Administration before moving to UCG in September 1985. The hurling seasons of 1983 and 1984 were spent with Crumlin and Dublin. Edel, his wife, has strong Crumlin connections.

The coaching bug caught him early. He read Tony Wall's *Hurling* (1965) and remains an admirer ("Tony was way ahead of everyone").

As a Minor, he found important influences: "Mick Minogue and Brother O'Grady always encouraged two things: high skill levels and willingness to take a risk. That always stayed with me." Len Gaynor was a constant and energizing presence in Kilruane.

Nor were the two seasons in Dublin wasted. "Jim Boggan was a great man there," Eamon says. "He actually asked me to take a few sessions with Dublin. So that was something to think about too."

PJ Maxwell, who has compiled all Tipperary teams on the website www.tippgaaarchives.com, was full-back on 1976's champion Minor side. "Eamon was the original roadrunner," he

says. "Fleet of foot, tremendous skill. Most of all, he was a strong leader and always let his hurling do the talking."

Séamus O'Doherty, another contemporary, is equally well placed to comment: "What always impressed me was Eamon's ability to make a decision on the spot. If the best option was to finish himself, he'd go himself. If the best option was to pass, he'd pass. You wouldn't want to be a genius to realize this ability was going to make him a fine coach."

A renowned hurling historian, Séamus remarks: "I'd go back to the brilliant display he gave in the All-Ireland Minor Final against Kilkenny in '76. Eamon distributed the ball brilliantly, dropping his hurl to handpass accurately. The rule about dropping the hurl changed the next season but it never bothered Eamon. He was always in control."

Séamus concludes, an edge to his tone: "Some people might have said back then that Eamon O'Shea wasn't breaking enough hurls. The reality is that he was ahead of his time. When Tipperary started to win again, the forwards were hurling like Eamon had hurled. Really, he should have been around to win an All-Ireland medal in 1989."

A sterling club campaign 1985-86 brought him back into the intercounty picture. He came on for Liam Stokes in the traumatic defeat to Clare in 1986. Then, at 28, he was gone.

UCG sustained him in retirement until he coached Kilruane out of Intermediate in 2003. It was intimate and it was private. "We had great fun in Galway," he says. "There was nobody to watch us in training. You could try things out without pressure."

Jamesie O'Connor attended UCG between 1990 and 1994, hurling Fitzgibbon each year. "The less said about the first two, the better," he says. "But it got a lot better once Eamon was on board."

The improvement was immediate. "UCD narrowly beat us in '93," Jamesie recalled. "Then we lost in extra time to UL in '94, who went on to win it. Eamon improved us in every line of the field and we were unlucky not to win."

Jamesie remains personally grateful: "Eamon was by far the biggest influence on my career. Otherwise it was mostly former defenders who coached me. Eamon made me aware of movement and space. He spoke to us on a forwards level, and he was unique in that."

Ironically enough, this advice weighed in one of O'Connor's biggest games: the 1997 All-Ireland Final, when Clare beat Tipperary by a last minute point scored by none other than himself. Jamesie laughs a touch ruefully: "Obviously, Eamon would have been rooting for Tipp. But I'd have to say his advice was a big factor in my second half performance."

He elaborated: "The first half, I stayed too much in my own

patch on the right wing, too near my marker. At halftime, what Eamon always said to us about trusting your own judgement, about drifting into space, was in my mind. The second half, I scored three points, and each time I picked the ball up on the other side of the pitch. He was right, even though Tipp wouldn't have thanked him for it...

Eamon O'Shea was never further away than a phonecall. "I used to speak to him a lot after I left," Jamesie says. "He was a great sounding board. In fact, I probably didn't use him enough in the later part of my career. Eamon is fantastic to improve a hurler simply by making him feel better about himself. Playing in the forwards is all about confidence and there's nobody better to give you confidence than Eamon."

If for no other reason than the era in which he played, Eamon O'Shea knew the value of encouragement.

Level, he summarizes: "I suppose there was the feeling, when I started off, that you'd never be another Jimmy Doyle, another Donie Nealon, another Liam Devaney. People would be saying how great the men before us were, the 1960s men. It was there."

He smiles when I remind him of people complaining there were too many UCD students on the Tipperary team around 1980: "Yes, I was one of those lads... I heard all that." I suspect what Eamon O'Shea, 22, needed was to be coached by Eamon O'Shea, 52. But life does not work that way.

Séamus O'Doherty clarified: "You have to remember that Tipp did not win a game between 1973 and 1983. They lost a 13-point lead against Limerick in '81. There was a constant turnover of players because there was constant change in the selectors. Nobody got a chance to settle in because there was constant panic about not winning."

All long ago. Now is now. "It just didn't work out for us," Eamon reflects. "Losing that huge lead over Limerick in 1981 probably was the real disaster. That year we could have gone all the way."


Suddenly puckish, he glosses such memories: "Anyway, there's no such thing as the past when you're 52...! There's too little time left."

He has to be back in Galway for five o'clock. This charming man takes his leave and strides to the car, suddenly brisk.

Here is privacy, the miles west, shining water, spooling passages of play in his head, shining water, fingers tapping the steering wheel as the ideas come, as he seeks their truth.



Paddy Finnucane - the voice of local radio

In years gone by RTE was the only outlet for gaelic games. Getting ones fix of Tipperary affairs would have been frustrating as we had to share GAA matters with 31 other counties. This was all to change when Tipp FM came on the air. In order to broaden their listenership, gaelic games were to prove a major selling point eventually leading to live commentaries and people began to ask who this Paddy Finnucane?

Tell me about your background - Where did you come from? I am from Carrickbeg in Carrick-on-Suir. After school I spent most of my life in the local tannery.

Did you play hurling and football? J.H:

I played both codes with the local Club St Mollerans and in doing so I won a number of Junior County titles.

J.H: Were gaelic games an important part of your life?

Very much so - Gaelic games were part and parcel of Irish life. For me the weekends were very special as there were always matches locally. I very much enjoyed the rivalry between the local Clubs. Going to the Inter County games was special when it came to watching the skills of Jimmy Doyle, Mick Roche, Christy Ring, Philly Grimes, Frankie Walsh, Eddie Keher and Liam Devaney.

How did you get involved in Radio? J.H:

P.F: Purely by accident. Pirate radio was popular at the time and local man Christy Butler who was one of the founder members of Clonmel Radio asked me would I do an interview with Kerry legend Mick O'Dwyer. Following which I did a further one with Sean Kelly, arguably one of the greatest sportsmen of our time and it was a thrill to interview him. In the late 80's I was reporting on a Munster Final between Tipperary and Cork. There was a problem in the studio and in order to fill the vacuum I was asked to continue in commentary. With me was Ruairi Walsh who was a member of the sports team so that was the beginning of my career in sports commentary. I will have to give special mention to the late John Moloney who was a football analyst and he taught me an awful lot.

J.H: Had you many analysts over the years?

P.F: We began with Gerry Long, followed by Dinny Ryan, John Kennedy, Liam Cahill, Liam Sheedy, Michael Cleary, Brendan Cummins and Michael O'Meara and more recently Tom Mc Grath whose knowledge of the game is priceless and we worked very much as a team. In more recent times we had Walty Moloney who has a great love of football.

What was your schedule for this year's All Ireland Final? It started about three weeks before hand, watching the training in Semple Stadium and Nowlan Park,

interviewing players and managers of both camps. I would have to point out that Brian Cody was a gentleman. I also worked in tandem with the local papers. Sound engineer Ian O'Connor is also a vital link and we travelled to Dublin together on the morning of the match. We were in the commentary position about two hours before the throw in. This was a chance to savour the atmosphere and also discuss the match with members of the media. I am always a bit nervous before the match.

What thoughts had you in your mind during the broadcast?

I am always conscious of those who cannot attend the match due to advancing years or even poor eyesight and it gives us great pleasure to bring the exciting atmosphere of the occasion into their homes. When the game was over there was no delay in trying to get to the dressing-rooms and overcoming security on the way. Like all the media, Liam Sheedy was very much the focus of attention, and I would have to say that he never left Tipp FM down whenever we sought him out.

J.H: Had you much contact with County Board officials?

Over the years we always had a great relationship with all the managers of the various grades. County Board officials were always very helpful as well including Tommy Barrett, John Ryan, Chairmen Mick Maguire, Sean Fogarty, John Costigan, Barry O'Brien and the late Tom O'Hara to name just a few. Secretary Timmy Floyd and his predecessors Michael O'Brien and Tommy Barrett, Assistant Secretary Tom Maher and South Board Secretary Michael O'Meara, Getting club results is very important to the station. In this area I would have to include PRO Ger Ryan as well as Ed Donnelly while club officials throughout the county are always very helpful. I could not let this opportunity go without thanking the Semple Stadium officials who are always very courteous.

Any plans for the future?

P.F: With God's blessing more of the same. I must not forget my wife Maureen who helped me all the way and whom I would describe as a GAA widow.

Paddy is a mine of information. One could go on for hours chatting with him. In doing so, he shows the same enthusiasm as his radio commentaries. Let's hope we can enjoy this unique character for many a day as the voice of local radio.

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





At 6.30pm on a mild Sunday, 17th of October 2010, Niall (Corry) Hogan lit the customary, now environmentally friendly, bonfire in the Fair Green. It was to welcome home the newly crowned County Intermediate Hurling Champions. Our hurlers had defeated a gallant Gortnahoe-Glengoole team in Templemore.

On their return to the capital of Lower Ormond , they boarded an open lorry to parade through the town. The blue flashing lights of the Fire- Engine heralded their arrival. The town was festooned with green and white flags and bunting and many beautifully home-made billboards. The main street was thronged with vociferous, hoarse and loyal supporters, all loud in their praise of the 26 players who had graced the sod under the Devil's Bit and had worn the 'green and white', with pride and distinction.

Bíonn blas ar an mbeagán and this encounter proved to be a sweet victory as our first previous county I.H.C win was 28 years earlier in 1982 against Golden- Kilfeakle in Semple Stadium. An indelible image etched into the memory of all who had travelled to the final was the presentation of the 'Jacksie Ryan', cup to our 'luckiest' captain, Graham McMahon by Barry O' Brien, Chairman of the County Board, flanked by our most decorated G.A.A. son, John Mackey McKenna and our current pin-up star, Philip Austin. This underlined our greatest sporting achievement to date in this New Millennium.

Borrisokane G.A.A. Club was founded in 1885, the year Huckleberry Finn was published. We have nine hurling teams and seven football teams from U/8 upwards, a credit to our current Juvenile Club Cathaoirleach, Seosamh Cleary and Rúnaithe, David and Tina Coen and committee.

Borrisokane is situated in the Barony of Lower Ormond,

nestled between Nenagh, Roscrea, Birr and Portumna. The Ballyfinboy River meanders through Gardiner Park, in Whitehall, our G.A.A grounds since 1916, on its way to Lough Derg to the west.

Borrisokane's odyssey to the 2010 Co. Final began in earnest at the club A.G.M in The Yank's in 2009. A provocative motion appeared on the agenda asking members to reconsider our then intermediate status. 2008 had transpired to be one of those years of narrow losses in league and championship. 28 years and two divisional hurling titles later was considered a sparse return. The response was what was desired. Motion withdrawn.

Our three officers, Cathaoirleach, Eddie Lillis and Rúnaí agus Cisteoir, Adrian and John Egan spearheaded a drive to improve and progress. Pádraig Hogan, (All-Ireland Senior medal winner in 1991 and U/21 All-Ireland medal in 1989) was installed as 'bainisteoir.' Seamus Gleeson, Kildangan joined us as coach and trainer along with is able assistant his son Shane. This maintained the link with 1982 as Seamus Hogan also of Kildangan and Tipperary fame had played at centre-back with Borrisokane on the victorious '82 team. Paul Dooley completed the Management team as selector in 2009 and had the honour of being captain in 1982.

The victory of the Junior Hurling Team, under the stewardship of Keith Slevin (Tipp u21 All-Ireland Winner), in winning the inaugural North Tipp Junior C Hurling Championship whetted the appetite.

The Intermediates reached the semi-final of the North Tipp Championship in 2009.Progress? In 2010 Borrisokane reached the North Final, after five wins and two losses, and faced great rivals and neighbours Shannon Rovers. Managed by Seán O Meara the Rovers won an absorbing contest, with a goal in extra time, in MacDonagh Park, Nenagh.

In the County Quarter Final, a much fancied Moyle Rovers side provided the opposition, in Boherlahan. Borrrisokane prevailed with the game breaking goal by Andrew Comerford. Classy Mid-Champions, Clonakenny were next and in a pulsating semi-final played in Dolla, an audaciously crafted goal by the evergreen Adrian Hogan was dispatched to the net by Tadhgie Slevin, to win by two points.

In the final, Borrisokane won with four points to spare on a scoreline of 2-13 to 1-12. The final has been well documented by Liam Hogan and a C.D. was presented and directed in impeccable style by Tom Moriarty and Tom Kennedy and provides unforgettable memories and indelible images of the

A goal apiece, by our captain Graham McMahon and Philip Austin vice-captain of the Tipperary Senior Football Team, proved decisive. The second goal conjured by the fleet-footed Austin was by popular consensus, 'goal of the year', in any code.

Noteworthy also was the efficient and unfussy performance of a young referee from Knockavilla, Fergal Horgan, who seemed to be on first name terms with all the participants.

There are many heroes on and off the field of play and we remember fondly those great club stalwarts who 'laboured in the vineyard', without any apparent tangible reward and those who have passed on to their eternal reward.

Most of the 1982 panel lived and worked locally. In contrast the 2010 players travel far and wide. Padraig Moriarty(man of the match) travels from West Kerry to train and play. Andy Comerford is a returned emigrant múinteoir from London. Ronan Guest travels from mainland Europe, frequently, to play. Tadhgie Slevin has returned from the U.S.A but another continent beckons. Conor (Lar) Forde (hurler of the year in Chad 2010) has returned with the Irish Defence Forces. Robert Davis (vice-captain) flies home for every match from Eindhoven in Holland. Enda Forde our resident centre-back commutes from Norfolk frequently.

The home-based contingent includes our no.1 Paul Egan, a 'rookie' goalkeeper and a 'ciotóg' to boot. Kevin (Yogi) Gleeson has hurled up a storm at no. 3 this year. Cathal Dooley the 'quiet' member of the full-back line claims dubious West-Kerry hurling lineage, as do the Moriarty brothers. Seody Cleary with 2 Munster minor medals hurls in the 'Tombricane engine-room' with Tadhgie. Eoin Larkin also a Tipp minor in 1999 is our Mr. Versatility.

Philip Austin is our 'talisman' and loves to score and along with younger brother Andy possesses different gears. Adrian Hogan, brother of the manager and a former Tipperary Minor Hurling captain retired officially five years ago. Colm 'D.J' Larkin also a Tipperary underage star is our Mr. Reliable and freetaker.

Conor Darcy, 'walked up the aisle'in Castleiney, the Saturday before the Co. final closely watched by Ronan. Gordon Harding is back,- enough said. Kevin McKenna was drafted onto the panel after the North Final and is a grand-nephew of Mackey. Darryl Sullivan recovered from injury and is the 'strongman' of the panel.

Statistics: In 11 Championship games Borrisokane scored 11 goals and 155 points and conceded 11 goals and 128 points.





Memorable double for Shannon Rovers

2010 will be long remembered in the annals of Shannon Rovers. They won a memorable double of All-Ireland Sevens and North Intermediate champions all inside a two week time frame.

The first success arrived on the first Saturday of September when they became the first club to retain All-Ireland Intermediate/Junior Sevens when defeating Padraig Pearses of Galway at Saint Judes in Templeogue.

Three weeks later the side met neighbours Borrisokane in the North Intermediate Hurling final at MacDonagh Park, Nenagh. The game was a thriller. Extra time was required to separate the teams as Rovers prevailed to win their ninth title by two points and bridge a gap of 24 years.

The club also enjoyed success at under age. The Minors joined by Knockshegowna defeated Ballinahinch to capture the North Minor C hurling decider. In October the Under -16s went on to annex the County U-16 C hurling final when overcoming Father Sheehys from South Tipp.

At football, Rovers Gaels lost the North U-21 'B' decider to Burgess while the U-16s were unlucky to lose the County decider against Grangemockler.

ALL-IRELAND SEVENS

Many Rovers fans journeyed to Dublin for the weekend first stopping off at Templeogue for the Sevens on Saturday and moving to Croke Park for the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Final the following day.

In the opening group stage, Rovers commenced an unbeaten with a round one victory over Naomh Colmcille winning by nine points which was followed by a twelve point win over Ferrybank of Waterford. The third game provided the side's biggest win of the day when they had twenty points to spare over Saint Patricks of Carlow. By now, Rovers had reached the knockout stages but they had one final game to play against Ahascragh-Foheonagh who were also unbeaten. The game resulted in a draw 3-5 each but Rovers took top spot by virtue of a better scoring difference.

In the quarter final, Rovers had to survive a tough first half before pulling away against Killomer of Galway. The semi final win over Blackrock of Limerick was much tougher. This led nicely to the final for a clash with Padraig Pearses of Galway, a game that was a repeat of last year's semi final.

By now the size of Rovers support had increased significantly. It's safe to say they had the biggest following on the day. Once the action got underway, Shannon Rovers knew they were in a real battle as Pearses led from the start. The score stood at 0-7 to

1-4 at the end of normal time. Two periods of ten minutes each way was required for extra time. Both sides had chances in the early stages before a Padraig O'Meara goal early in the first period, gave Rovers a lead they would never relinquish. Final score Shannon Rovers 1-9 Padraig Pearses 1-7. 



The late Bob Stakelum

Mid Tipperary and Munster lost one of its greatest Gaels with the passing of Holycross/Ballycahill man Bob Stakelum, President of Mid Tipperary GAA Board. Dual player, referee, administrator, historian, author Bob Stakelum gave much to the Gaelic Athletic Association at divisional, county and provincial level where his love for all things Tipperary was very much in evidence. The blue and gold jersey meant so much to Bob and it was a source of huge pride to him that he captured an All Ireland senior hurling medal with the Premier County in 1949 alongside clubmates Ned O'Gorman and his cousin Pat Stakelum who captained the side. They also won the Munster title in the same year and Bob also won a National Hurling League medal in the Tipperary colours too.

Bob was also a very accomplished footballer and as well as winning a Munster junior football medal with Tipperary in 1952, he went on to play senior with the county from 1953 to 1956 where his skills were seen on the provincial stage. He was said to have been as fine a footballer as Tipperary ever produced and would surely have been more celebrated had success been the lot of the big ball code in the county.

Despite all of Bob's prowess on the inter county scene though, it was with his native and beloved Holycross/Ballycahill that he derived most satisfaction. One of the driving forces behind the club in the forties, fifties and sixties, Bob won county senior and Mid medals in 1948, 1951 and 1954, while he also won a Mid senior medal in 1947. It was a source of great pride to him and his wife Kit that their sons Robert and Tim would play such an integral role in bringing back the Dan Breen to the parish of Holycross/Ballycahill in 1990 after a gap of 36 years while Tony too was involved for many years in the club colours.

Bob Stakelum's desire to see his club advance resulted in him taking to administration even when he was still playing. He accepted the onerous job of Secretary of the club in 1947 and continued in the position until 1957. However, such was his popularity in that position that he was re-elected again in 1960 and continued for another three years. Bob switched chairs at the top table then and served as Chairman for seven years while also serving as County Board representative for a further five years where his contribution at meetings were always well informed, well thought out and often entertaining.

Bob's interest in history led him to pen his beloved clubs account of events and happenings from 1884 to 1990. The book a comprehensive record of Holycross/Ballycahill GAA proved a real collectors item as well as an important source of reference. It was a labour of love for a man who was as mighty with the pen as he was with the caman.

Speaking of mastering various arts, Bob Stakelum was a very celebrated and accomplished knight of the whistle in both hurling and football. He refereed extensively in Tipperary and indeed on the provincial and national arenas, the highlight being his handling of the 1955 All Ireland final. He also refereed the 1954 and 1955 Munster Football finals and was the man in the middle for the 1956 Munster Hurling final also. Bob refereed the Clare county hurling final too in 1953 and he was a very highly regarded and respected official who used his encyclopaedic knowledge of the rule book along with a strong sprinkling of common sense to win players respect and appreciation.

An honour of which he was immensely proud was being named President of the Mid Tipperary GAA Board in 1993. Bob would address Convention each year and recall some aspect of the past with typical good humour and nostalgia. He was elected to the Mid Tipperary Board "Hall of Fame" in 1999.






Kilsheelan-Kilcash take home two County Football Titles

Like all clubs starting out on the championship trail, our hope was to win a divisional championship and hope for the best after that. Happily, it turned out to be a momentous year for us. Roger Doyle, Liam Corcoran and David Power took over the minor team. They had wins over Ballingarry, St Patricks and Mullinahone while they lost to Fethard. In this match they had to finish with only fourteen players as there was no replacement for an injured player. A much depleted side were also well beaten by Carrick Swan. In the Semi Final they were back to full strength when they met the Carrick side. They were intent on turning the tables and they did so by a two point margin after a tense encounter. In the Final they met Fethard in Monroe. With a full compliment to pick from, hopes were high that we would take this title for the first time in 46 years. Kilsheelan, showing great determination, were the better side all through. Despite a gallant show by Fethard we ran out winners by 0-13 to 0-7.

In preparation for the County Semi Final they played a number of challenge games. Hopes of going further received a setback when Bill Maher and Colin Gleeson got injured and had to cry off the team.

Their opponents were Borrisokane in Dr Morris Park, the team were two points down with five minutes left to play. To win any title one always needs a bit of luck and this time ours came from an unusual source as one of the goals was plunged into darkness and a replay was ordered. This took place at the same venue ten days later. Again the injury bug struck when we lost two players during the match. After another tense battle Kilsheelan emerged one point winners on a scoreline of 1-9 to 1-8.

The County Final at New Inn was against Golden-Kilfeacle and attracted a large number of supporters.

Kilsheelan trailed all through the first half. After the interval their supporters were in full voice when Conor Murphy punched the ball to the net and we led for the first time. This was short lived as Golden had a goal of their own. With five minutes remaining the sides were level. For Kilsheelan the excitement reached a crescendo when Conor Murphy found the unmarked Damien Dempsey and he drove the ball to the net as his side held out for a famous 2-9 to 1-9 victory. For the record Johnny Ormonde was the victorious Captain.

The Intermediate championship is always a competition of which we have a realistic hope of winning the South Title. Over the last ten years we have competed in three finals but defeat was our lot. This year we started off again hoping it would be the year to finally achieve the holy grail. The County League was our starting point where Franny Kelly (Manager) and selectors Liam Murphy, Martin Ormonde and Michael Dempsey gave 35 players an opportunity to play. This competition was seen as ideal preparation for the championship. The team improved with every outing and qualified for the Semi Final where they defeated Lattin-Cullen. The Final against Cappawhite took place in Cashel and after a close contest we emerged winners by 1-12 to 2-8.

In the championship we had easy wins over Grangemockler, Commercials and Moyle Rovers. We lost to old rivals Ballyporeen by a point and drew with Fr Sheehys. Despite these setbacks we still reached the Semi Final where we met Moyle Rovers. In the group stages we beat them by 3-10 to 2-2 and this time we confirmed our superiority with a 3-10 to 2-5 win. The Final was against Ballyporeen who had the Indian sign over us in recent contests. The team were well prepared and after a slow start it was 0-4 each at half time. We looked to be in trouble when Ballyporeen had an early second half goal. Our side got well on top after this and were more convincing than the 0-11 to 1-4 scoreline would suggest.

In the County Quarter Final we travelled to Dundrum to take

on Newport. From the opening whistle we never looked in trouble and took the honours by 3-22 to 3-2. The only concern was having conceded three goals. The Semi Final now beckoned and it was good to see that support for our team was increasing all the time as we took on Golden. On this occasion we had to come from behind a number of times and our superior fitness in the last ten minutes helped us to a 0-13 to 1-8 win

On County Final Day all roads led to Boherlahan for the game against Rockwell Rovers. The team was hit by a pre match blow. Adrian Walsh was unavailable and midfielder Eoin Ryan was out through injury. This had an unsettling effect on the side as the New Inn side dictated matters. We had the boost of a goal just before half time and we were lucky to be only one point down at the interval. Early in the second half Eoin Ryan was introduced and our side soon got a grip on the game and drew level. Kilsheelan got on top but many chances went abegging and in an exciting finish the game ended in a draw.

It was back to Boherlahan again six days later for the replay. Their exploits had now captured the imagination of the parish and it was great to see such a large travelling support. We were at full strength on this occasion and like several of the earlier encounters we trailed all through the first half and this time we were in arrears by 0-5 to 0-4 at the break. For us the game was won and lost in the third quarter when our side shot seven points to lead by 0-11 to 0-7. Rockwell reduced arrears to two points. In the last ten minutes our defence was magnificent and conceded no further scores and we ran out winners by 0-11 to 0-9 to take our first adult Title in 38 years thus ensuring we will be back in senior ranks in 2011.




Jerome (Jerry) Ring (pictured right) - the undefinable , indefatigable, irrepressible Corkonian who came amongst us from Ballydaly, Millstreet, Co. Cork in 1974 is, thankfully , still in our midst. However this year has brought the news that Jerry will no longer fill the position of West Board Honorary Secretary - a seat he filled with distinction for the past 28 years. He will be sorely missed by all G.A.A. personnel in West Tipperary and far beyond.

Jerry came to Tipperary to take up a teaching post in The Abbey C.B.S. in 1974, having spent 6 years previously teaching in Zambia. He quickly settled in to his teaching role in the Abbey, Gaeilge and Geography being his main subjects.

Jerry represented Arravale Rovers at divisional board meetings where his talents were soon recognised. He was appointed Hon. Sec. of the board in 1982 and has served West and county Tipperary in most distinguished fashion since then. His contribution to Gaelic Games within our county has been immense.

Can we ever forget his innovative and inspiring reports and presentations at the board annual conventions? Successive chairmen might well ask themselves if sufficient heed has been paid to Jerry's suggestions over the years. His ability to record and present a factual account of the year's happenings in his annual report was truly amazing. His extended period as a member of the Fixtures Committee often got him into 'hot water' as did his brief exploits as a referee but only because Jerry hated to say "No" to any request and always went out of his way to facilitate every member and unit of the Association.

He attended all matches and brought the camera everywhere. West and county Tipperary as well as Munster Council are deeply indebted to Jerry for the myriad numbers of photographs he holds and makes available when and wherever they are needed for match programmes, social occasions or for historic recollections.



Generous to a Fault

Yet it is something else which truly defines Jerome Ring. Since he came to Tipperary he has given of himself to all needs and causes that presented themselves. Generous to a fault with his time , resources and energy he has supported every initiative that purported to enhance the development of Tipperary, the promotion of Gaelic Games and the enrichment of youth.

His inestimable contribution to his adopted town and county and to our Association will long bear rich fruit and we are blessed that this affable and genial Corkman decided to settle among us. One might well ask if due recognition and appreciation are ever afforded to Jerry and his likes (There are not many of them) by the G.A.A. and by the country for his selfless dedication to all that is truly noble, valuable and beneficial to society as a whole. I don't think so.

However whatever the merits of the new system that is now in place from 2011 onwards are, we in Bórd na nÓg have to embrace them for the good of our young player

Snap Shot of County Bord na nÓg Activity this year

Our county U/16 hurlers and footballers delivered the silverware. Our hurlers retained the U/16 All Ireland title maintaining top of the roll of honour, while our footballers captured the Munster title for the first time.

Our $\rm U/15$ footballers also did a first in winning the Humphrey Kelleher trophy in Millstreet.

The West division hosted the U /16 All Ireland Hurling championship games .Our thanks to the following clubs Cashel King Cormacs, Clonoulty Rossmore, Cappawhite and Knockavilla/Donnaskeigh.

The U/12 Championships were played for the last time this year bringing an end to an eighteen year period of the A grade which commenced in 1972 .The B & C commenced in 1998.

Mid 12 C Football Champions Clonakenny in securing the county title this year recorded the very first for the club.

Hurling: This year's pairings in the semi finals were Mid v South and North v West.

This year was a special one for all our U /12 participants as it was the last of the U/12 championships. In complying with a ruling from Croke Park we are prohibited from staging championships in future at this grade.

We appreciate the fact that this takes a lot of cooperation between officers and clubs and I wish to acknowledge that and to thank everybody involved.

2010 saw the demise of the u-12 Championship in its present format. A new format will be drawn up for 2011 based on a les competitive structure with teams playing 11 a side maximum which will give players more involvement in the games.

Club Action This year has seen an improvement in our county title tally with four county championship wins as opposed to last years single title. Drom Inch added to last year's U-12 B title when they won the U-14 B football title. Clonakenny won their first ever juvenile title when they defeated Portroe on the scoreline of 1-1 to 1-8 in the U-12 C Football final played in Semple Stadium. J.K. Brackens won the U-12 B hurling title in style in Semple Stadium on 5th July. Durlas Og defeated Nenagh Eire Og in the U-16 A county hurling final on the 17th October.

Interdivisional Tournaments In the interdivisional football tournaments Mid Tipp gave a good account of themselves winning the U-14 and U-15. The U-16's were defeated by a goal in their competition.

Mid Tipperary won the Garda Cup U-16 interdivisional hurling tournament. The U-14's and U-15's were defeated in the finals of the Peadar Cummins and Roger Ryan tournaments respectively.

In the Munster U-16 championship the Mid got off to a great start on May 1st with three wins to qualify for the semi finals in Mallow on the following Monday May 3rd. The Mid were drawn against North Tipp in the semi final and despite not getting off to the best of starts defeated them by 2 points to advance to the final. The Mid's opponents in the final were Avondu (Cork) whom the Mid had already defeated in the league rounds the previous Saturday. The Mid won out on the scoreline of 2-11 to 0-5 to bring the title back to the Division for the first time since 1992.

Feile Peil Five teams took part in this year's Mid Feile Peil competition which concluded with Durlas Og winning the final. Durlas Og were defeated by Clonmel Commercials in the county semi final

Feile Iomaniocht The six A teams took part in the Feile iomanaiocht which resulted in a double Mid title for Durlas Og. They went on to win their county final when they defeated Toomevara. Durlas og went on to represent Tipperary in the All Ireland Feil na nGael finals in Clare.

Conor Ryan from Holycross/Ballycahill won the Mid and County U-14 long puck. Brendan Larkin (Drom/Inch) went on to win the county uU-14 skills title and came second in the national final in Ennis. Paul Maher from Moyne/Templetuohy won the county U-16 title and came second in the Munster final.

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

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



Commercials were expected to pick up the A Championship honours after they had swept all before them in the league stages but in a terrific final they were beaten by a well organised, determined and skilful Killenaule side.

Commercials, who had done so well in Péil na nOg, were impressive winners of the U/14~A title accounting for Moyle Rovers in the decider and on the same evening in Ardfinnan Fethard got the better of Grangemockler in an exciting C final. The B final was played on a wet and windy evening in Clonmel but that did not take away from a very impressive performance by Ardfinnan who defeated Ballingarry in the final.

St. Mary's, Clonmel

A couple of years ago St. Mary's made a decision to devote their main efforts to the development of the juvenile section of the club. 


Post Offices Championship Cup

In 1955 the Post Office Workers' Union donated a cup for the Post Offices football championship. In that year it was won by Tipperary Post Office, who beat Castlebar in the final. This game was played at Croke Park on December 4, 1955, as a curtain-raiser to a Galway-Dublin league fixture, in which Frank Stockwell and Sean Purcell starred for Galway.

Jackie Hannon (Lattin-Cullen) was the captain of the winning side and he has said of the occasion: 'It was a great thrill to play in Croke Park and even better to win an All-Ireland final on the one day.'

Since the cup wasn't perpetual it became the property of the Post Office team and it has occupied a place of honour in Tipperary Post Office since then. Recently the surviving members of the team, Jackie Hannon (capt.) Eoin O'Neill, John O'Neill, J. C. Fitzpatrick, John O'Dwyer, Tony Crosse, Niall O'Dea and Donie Nolan, decided to hand it over to Lár na Páirce for safe keeping and Jackie Hannon did just that to Seamus J. King, chairman, on a sunny Sunday in Tipperary in July.

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
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

Marcus de Búrca (1927-2010)


Marcus Bourke (Marcus de Búrca) was 83 years of age when he died on 2 March 2010. He lived his life between Dublin, the city of his birth, and Tipperary, the town of his paternal forbears –the Bourkes. His Dublin was that of the educated Catholic middleclass who came to prominence after the long struggle for political independence from Britain. Education was the fulcrum which shaped him and many other children of the revolutionary people. Belonging to a determinedly Irish Ireland family he was educated in the primary school attached to St.Patrick's Training College, Drumcondra, where one of his teachers was the noted Meath footballer Frankie Byrne. His secondary school days were spent with the Jesuits in Belvedere College in Dublin's north inner city. That schools most famous past pupil is James Joyce and Marcus had a bronze bust of the writer on the mantlepiece of his sitting-room in Clontarf. At his father's prompting, he enrolled for a degree in legal and political science including economics in UCD. After graduating he completed an MA in economics under the supervision of Paddy Lynch. He then, like his father before him, qualified for the bar in 1949. Charles Haughey was one of his classmates.

Marcus Bourke practised as a barrister for eleven years. During this period he also began working as a sport's reporter with the *Irish Press*, specialising in Gaelic football and he remembered fondly the great contests between Meath and Cavan in the early 1950s. He subsequently transferred to the *Irish Independent* and the position of news sub-editor and leader writer. But as a young married man with a family he found that combining the Law Library with an evening stint in the newspaper office was becoming impossible and he changed course and applied for a position in the civil service. His legal background and editing experience led him to a position as a parliamentary draftsman in the Attorney-General's Office, and he was to remain there until his early retirement in 1987. He was involved in the preparation of road traffic and labour legislation.

Marcus Bourke was well-equipped and an appropriate choice to write the first detailed history of the Gaelic Athletic Association, published under the title *The GAA: a history* in 1980. Seamus King discussed in detail the protracted negotiations leading to Marcus's appointment and it is certain that he was directed, as he wrote in the introduction, to treat 'particularly of its role in the national movement of the pre-1922 era'. There is no whiff of winter green in the book and when Marcus refers to Croke Park it is not the green sward that he had in focus but the Ard-Comhairle. The strength of the work is that he was writing from the inside out rather than from the outside in and it is his knowledge of the internal dynamics of the association that gives the book great authority. He had a sense that he should do justice to the quiet men who had revolutionised the organisational structures of the GAA, in particular, Jim Nowlan, its Kilkenny president during the early twentieth century, and two great secretaries, Luke O'Toole and Pádraig Ó Caoimh, who between them held office for sixty-five years.

It was not his final excursion into GAA history. *Gaelic games in Leinster* (1984), *One hundred years of Faugh's hurling* (1985), and *Michael Cusack and the GAA* (1989), followed. It is appropriate here to note that one of his assistants in researching the book on Faughs was Paddy Williams, a member of the great hurling family from Kilruane. It was another Tipperaryman, Con Ryan, who lobbied the Dublin County Board to write the history it had long planned to complete. Fortunately, we were able to avail of Marcus's intimate knowledge of the early years of the GAA in Dublin and the three volume study, *The Gaelic Athletic Association in Dublin*, 1884-2000, was published in 2005.

Perhaps his most controversial book was Murder at Marlhill. Was Harry Gleeson innocent? This book dealt in microscopic detail, the kind of forensic investigation which he excelled in, with the brutal murder of Mary McCarthy in November 1940.

He trawled legal records and traced people who knew both the murdered woman and the man accused of her murder. He found disturbing evidence which convinced him that Harry Gleeson was executed for a crime he did not commit. Marcus Bourke never wavered from his deep conviction that society had failed through moral cowardice and allowed an innocent man to die. 'The book,' wrote Denis G. Marnane in this journal in 2002, 'in fact is a powerful argument against capital punishment'.

It was fortuitous for the Tipperary Historical Society that its beginning and Marcus Bourke's retirement from the civil service coincided. The society was founded in Thurles on 15 August 1987 and Marcus was asked, presumably as the only barrister in attendance, to draw up its constitution. Events transpired that the editorial committee appointed to prepare the Society's first journal for publication had to resign and Marcus was approached and willingly accepted the role of sole editor. He remained in the editorial chair for thirteen fruitful years and under his direction the journal acquired a national reputation for the quality of its research, presentation and writing.

Marcus Bourke delighted in visiting Tipperary and apart from Tipperary town, he had a special liking for the Glen of Aherlow and Kickham's Vale of Anner. He was a regular attender at the annual Kickham Country Weekend seminar held every August in Mullinahone. Indeed his last lecture in the county was on the occasion of the Thurles field trip organised in conjunction with the Mullinahone seminar on 9 August 2008. It was sadly appropriate that it was delivered in Hayes' Hotel on the men, he knew so much about, who came together to found the Gaelic Athletic Association on 1 November 1884. His last public appearance in the county was on the occasion of the launch of the reprint of *John O'Leary: a study in Irish separatism* in the Excel Centre in Tipperary town on 26 march 2009. Perhaps his summation of John O'Leary, in an interview with Fintan Deere for the Clonmel Nationalist some years ago, can be also applied to Marcus Bourke: 'He was a prominent Tipperary patriot. He was a literary, ideological type of person rather than a political

Marcus Bourke was predeceased by his wife Phyllis and he is survived by three sons, Richard, Raymond and John, his sister Eileen and brother Seán.

Michael Frawley, (Emly) (1932-2010)

A native of Lisobyhane, Emly where he lived and farmed all his life, Mick was involved with the GAA as a player and later as an aministrator for many years. During his playing career he won 3 West-Tipp senior football medals, (captain in 1960), 3 West-Tipp junior football medals, 1 county junior football medal and also 3 West-Tipp junior hurling medals. He played his last match for Emly in 1972.



He was a member of Emly GAA committee 1953-1984, serving in all club positions except secretary.

During this time, he was one of the pivotal men in obtaining and later developing Emly's GAA ground, St.Ailbe's Park. He became a trustee of the club and one of its vice-presidents. In 1960 he was elected as one of West Tipperary's delegates to the county board. He was West Board chairman 1973-1976, Munster Council chairman 1977-1980, county board chairman 1982-1984. He served as county football board chairman as well and on several national committees. Even after scaling the heights with the GAA, he always kept an interest in his local club.

He will be sorely missed in all circles of the GAA, especially in his home club of Emly. Ar dheis De go raibh a ainm.

Billy Heney (Kickhams)

Billy Heney of Ballinahinch passed away on Tuesday the 21st of September after a long illness so bravely borne. Billy was a Kickhams man through and through.

From his younger days on the playing fields where he wore the amber and black of his beloved Kickhams with pride right through to his involvement in the day to day running of the club, Billy gave his all. He served as senior chairman for a number of years and was



instrumental in 1999 in initiating the development projects at Pairc Ui Ciocaim that have continued under various officerships to this day. Billy was also involved in team management over the years with the clubs senior hurlers as well as juniors, U/21s and minors and many juvenile teams and he enjoyed considerable success in those roles. As an officer he represented the Kickham club at divisional and county meetings on many occasions. He also served for many years as a steward on match days at Semple Stadium. His love for the Kickham club extended to his children, all who played for the club in hurling football and camogie.

One of his proudest GAA moments was when his son Fergal won an All Ireland minor hurling medal in 1996 and subsequently wore the Blue and Gold at U/21 and senior level.. Anna Kennedy (Nenagh Éire Óg)

It was with great sadness that we heard of the passing of Anna Kennedy on the 13th of September 2010. The Kennedy family have long been associated with the Nenagh Eire Óg club in a playing, supportive and administrative capacity. Anna was a great supporter of both club and county alike and enjoyed nothing better than heading off on a Sunday afternoon to the playing fields of Tipperary and Munster to cheer on her team.



One of the greatest servants in North Tipperary GAA circles had been Anna's beloved husband Jack who aside from holding a number of administrative positions in both the Moneygall and Nenagh Éire Óg clubs was also North Board treasurer from 1972-75.

The Kennedy boys, Michael, Philip and John were the cornerstone of many successful club and county teams. Michael won an All-Ireland under 21 medal with Tipperary in 1980 and was North Tipperary footballer of the year in 1989. Philip was the first Tipperary player to captain two All-Ireland winning under 21 teams in 1980, 1981 before later playing senior hurling for Tipperary with a special occasion being his performance in the epic 1984 centenary Munster final against Cork. John also represented his county with distinction at underage level and his high point was with the club when winning an elusive county senior hurling medal in 1995. Anna's two daughters Mary and Anne are two of Nenagh Éire Óg's greatest supporters who hardly ever miss a club or county game. Indeed, Anna's only nephew was Michael Cleary a four times All-Star and undoubtedly one of hurling's finest.

Anna was first and foremost a family woman to whom she was so dedicated and of whom she was so proud and she had a special place in her heart for her 12 grandchildren. We have all suffered a great loss, so how much greater must be the loss to her own family and extended family to whom is offered our deepest sympathy.

Jack O'Dwyer (Kickhams)

The death occurred on Thursday the 30th of September of Jack O'Dwyer, Carrigeen, Clonoulty and formerly of Clonkelly.

Paul O'Heney (Emly) 1928-2010.

Originally from Bansha, Paul moved to Emly in 1956. He had played for Galtee Rovers from 1945-1956.

He played for Emly for most of the late 1950s and the early 1960s. He was one of the people responsible for reviving St. Ailbe's athletic club, which lasted from 1967 to 1973. In this time Emly and Lattin juveniles won many track and field competitions in Tipperary, Munster and Ireland. He served for many years as a committee member in Emly GAA Club.

Paddy Ryan (TUC), (Emly), 1951-2010.

Paddy Ryan served Emly GAA in many capacities during his life. He was on both Bord na nOg and senior club committees. He was groundsman for St. Ailbe's Park and served as selector for various teams, but from his playing career he was most proud of his 1985 West intermediate hurling winning medal. He remained up to the end a staunch Emly supporter.

Tommy Sheridan (Kickhams)

We were all saddened when we heard of Tommy Sheridan's death on the 29th of July after a long illness borne with dignity and courage.

In his youth Tommy was very involved in gaelic games in the parish and wore the amber and black of the Kickhams with pride. When he got married to Catherine and moved to the Limerick Junction he still kept up his interest in the games and especially his beloved Kickhams.



Along with Catherine he attended club games up until shortly before his death. As a mark of respect to the extended Sheridan family the Kickham club provided a guard of honour on his journey to his final resting place in Knockavilla Cemetery. We extend our deepest sympathy to Catherine and son Thomas on Tommy's passing. We also offer our condolences to his brother Mickie (Knockavilla) sisters Jean Ryan (Knockavilla), Eileen Carew (Tipperary), Mai Campion (Clonoulty) and their families on their sad loss. Jack Wall (Tullamaine)

One of the great stalwarts of the G.A.A. and Coolmoyne for over 20 years (1940-1960s) was Jack Wall, who died in February after a short illness. A hurler of the highest calibre, Jack was a colossus in the number 3 position, which he made his own, closing the road to goal for many an opposing forward.

He was in his prime during the golden era of hurling in Coolmoyne, winning a South senior championship in 1951 and a second in 1956, with the combination, Na Piarsaigh. He added a junior hurling crown with Coolmoyne in 1959.



He was also an outstanding handballer, his early passion for the game born in the small alley in Coolmoyne on Sunday mornings after first Mass in Fethard. He was a delightful player to watch, had few equals in 'killing' a ball off the end wall and he won many county and provincial titles.

He was honoured with a Sean Gael award in 2007 and looked forward to Tipperary returning to All-Ireland glory with his grand-nephew, Conor O'Mahony, playing a key role. Unfortunately he didn't live to see it. The large turnout at his funeral in Fethard and the guard of honour provided by the local G.A.A. bore testimony to the high esteem in which he was held. May he rest in peace.

Mick Friend (Carrick Davins)

The death occurred of Mick Friend Pill Road, Carrick-on-Suir on August 25th 2010.

Mick was a life long fan of Gaelic games and especially of Carrick Davins G.A.A. club. Mick was a great supporter and member of Carrick Davins and took a keen interest in all teams' involvement in championship activities on the field. Two of Mick's brothers, Tom and Dick, played for Carrick Davins during the '40s and '50s. We extend our sympathy to his family and friends on the passing of Mick to his eternal reward

Stephen Cleary (Carrick Davins)

On March 10th 2010 it was learned with deep regret and sadness of the death of Stephen Cleary of Pearse Square in Carrick on Suir. He was a great family man and life long clubman with Carrick Davins. Coming from a strong GAA family he had a great love of hurling and football from a very young age. He played on many Carrick Davin teams, his career spanning through the '40s, '50s and '60s. Stephen liked nothing better that taking to the field to play hurling or football.



His skill and talent was well recognized and in 1957 was a member of the Tipperary junior hurling panel. The following year 1958 he was a member of the Tipperary senior hurling panels who were both Munster and All Ireland champions.

He played on the Carrick Davins winning team of 1962 who were South Junior No.2 hurling and football champions and the following year won the South junior hurling championship. He played his part on the great Carrick Davins team that won two county senior hurling titles in 1966 and 1967 and Munster club senior hurling championship 1967.

In 2007 Stephen was awarded and honoured with the 'Player of the Past' award by Carrick Davins in recognition for his great service to the club down through the years. The large turn out of family members and friends at his removal and funeral was statement to the man he was. We extend our deepest sympathies to all his family and many friends.

Tommy Ryan (Carrick-on-Suir, Faugheen and Carrick Davins)

It was with great sadness that the news broke of Tommy Ryan sudden death on September 7th 2010 just a few days after one of the greatest weekends of Tipperary hurling history. Tommy grew up just a few yards from the Davin Park in Carrick on Suir and had a great interest in all sports, his favourite unquestionably hurling in which he played a role in for many years.



As a minor, he played for the local Sean Treacys team and was also a member of the successful Munster and All Ireland minor hurling winning team of 1957 which was captained by his hero Jimmy Doyle. He progressed to junior grade with Carrick Davins who were in the year 1962 both No.2 junior hurling and football South Champions. The following year Tommy played on the Carrrick-Davins team that retained the South junior hurling title. In 1965 he captained the Carrick Davins team that won the first South senior hurling title. The team were unlucky to lose the re-play of the county Final against Thurles Sarsfields. 1966 was another successful year for both Tommy and Carrick Davins winning their first county senior hurling. Tommy also played on the 1967 team which retained the title. Tommy played his part in going on to win the Munster senior hurling championship that year. During all these years Tommy player along side his brothers Jimmy, P.J. and Michael with whom he shared his passion, inspiration and enthusiasm for the game in that most successful era in hurling for Carrick Davins.

His skill and stick work would rival any in the game today. Later Tommy became involved as a trainer and selector with the club. Tommy will be missed cycling around the roads of Faugheen and Carrick and also by the Carrick-on-Suir Operatic Society, where he often took to the stage as music and song were a big part of his life. A guard of honour was formed by Carrick Davins lead by his former team players for the removal and funeral to St. Marys. A huge turn out was testament to the respect in which Tommy was held as an inspiration to us all for his gentleness and self sacrifice. Tommy will be misses by all his family and we extend our sympathies to them. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

Jimmy Gibson (Kilruane MacDonaghs 1934-2010)

The sudden passing of Jimmy Gibson has severed yet another link with a golden period for the Kilruane MacDonaghs club. Jimmy rendered tremendous service to the club as a player and selector and he is rightly regarded as one of the greatest ever to wear the jersey. He tasted his first success on the playing fields in 1952 when he lined out at centre back on the Kilruane MacDonaghs minor team which



defeated Nenagh to win the club's first title in that grade. In 1959 he was in his customary centre-back position when MacDonaghs overcame their great rivals Toomevara in the North final. Six years later he once again wore the number six jersey when Kilruane defeated Lorrha in the divisional decider. Jimmy possessed fierce determination and was calmness personified under pressure. He was a great reader of the game and as strong as an ox. He wasn't renowned for his speed but compensated with uncanny positional sense and clever reading of the game.

Like all great athletes he seemed to have plenty of time on the ball and always delivered it with purpose and precision. Jimmy's talents did not go unrecognised at county level and he wore the blue and gold, winning a national hurling league medal in 1960. When the North Tipperary centenary hurling team was selected in 2001 he was deservedly on the list of nominees. In 2005 he was honoured with a Sean Ghael award which recognised his contribution to hurling in general and the Kilruane MacDonaghs in particular. Jimmy was a shrewd observer of the game and it came as no surprise that he slotted seamlessly into the role of selector. Along with Len Gaynor and Jim Meara he was a mentor on the minor hurling team which won the county final in 1971 and completed three in a row North titles two years later. He was also on the line when the U-21's captured the club's first two county titles in 1973 and 1974. Jimmy loved to socialise by taking a drink and he liked nothing better to replay the thrilling games of days gone by particularly the great contests between Tipp and Cork. As his funeral entered Cloughjordan village for the last time a huge gathering of MacDonaghs hurlers past and present walked in silent tribute to acknowledge his massive contribution to the club both as a player and selector. Johnny O'Meara 1951-2010 (Kilruane MacDonaghs)

The sudden and unexpected death of Johnny O'Meara shocked the entire community where he was one of the most recognisable characters in the village. Johnny played his first juvenile game with Kilruane MacDonaghs in 1965 but success eluded him until 1970 when he won a North U-21 football medal and he made his debut for the senior hurling team the same year. In 1972 he became the first MacDonaghs player



to lift the Hugh Burke Cup when he captained the U-21 hurling team which defeated Roscrea in the divisional final. In the same year he won the first of his six North senior football medals when Kilruane defeated Silvermines. Johnny's favourite position was on the edge of the square where he proved to be the ideal target man. He never relied on his strength to make or take scores but on his considerable skill, quick hands and alert brain. Johnny could strike scores confidently off his left or right and was adept at laying off a deft pass to a better placed colleague at precisely the right moment.

1975 was a memorable year for Johnny when he was a vital cog in the Kilruane MacDonaghs senior football team which created history by winning the county final for the first time. He had a magnificent campaign culminating in a fantastic display against Loughmore-Castleiney in the final. His displays with the club brought county recognition and he wore the blue and gold in U-21 and senior football. In 1977 Johnny was called on to the Tipperary senior hurling panel and he lined out in the championship against Clare. Later in the year MacDonaghs defeated Borris-Ileigh to win the North senior hurling final for the first time in twelve years and in October Kilruane won the county senior hurling championship for the first time in seventy five years, with the familiar presence of Big Johnny at full forward. He went on to win three successive North and county senior hurling medals. Johnny continued playing senior hurling with the club until 1982. In 1995 he served as a selector with the senior hurling team and the following year he was a mentor with the U-16 hurlers. Club members formed a guard of honour at his funeral and his colleagues from the three-in-row side of the seventies shouldered Johnny, the Gentle Giant to his final resting place. James McKeogh (Ballina) - 1983 - 2010

The parish of Ballina/Boher came to a sudden halt on Saturday 30th January, when word filtered through of an accident involving James McKeogh.

James had always been a very popular & active member of the Ballina GAA Club. He started out his hurling life like so many others in his own back lawn and yard, reliving and



replaying many great games with friends and family. He moved onto Boher National School and was goalkeeper for the school as they won the county schools hurling title for from 1994 to 1996.

He also won many juvenile honours with Ballina at underage level culminating with an North Tipp under-16 hurling and football "A" double in 1998 and a county football title the same year. In 1999 he won a Munster Schools under-16 1/2 hurling title with Saint Anne's, Killaloe.

James soon moved onto the Ballina minor and intermediate teams. In 2000 he was part of the Ballina minor team which won the North double and county football title & 3 years later he achieved the same feat at under-21 level. He continued to line out for Ballina at the various grades. In 2007/08, he travelled to Australia and played with Sydney Shamrocks.

In 2009 James transferred to the Na Fianna club and won a Dublin county junior hurling championship with his adapted club that year. After training with Na Fianna seniors on Friday 29th January, James was on his trip from Dublin to Gortlassobrien, Ballina to help out at home, when his tragic accident occured.

James was an avid sports fan and will be missed by all who knew him - especially Jimmy, Sheila, Mary, Josephine, Barbara, Seamie and David and his extended family and friends.

Rev Francis George Gallagher (Ballinahinch GAA)

4th Aug 1943 - 20th April 2010

Fr. Gallagher's untimely passing in his midsixties cast a cloud over the entire parish which he had served for more than 16 years as one of the most devoted and loved pastors in the history of the parish. He was president of the GAA club and had an active role in the community, he was involved in the improvements in both churches in the parish



along with numerous other projects throughout his years as parish priest. A native of Ballycroehane, Aherlow, where he was born in 1943, he was the youngest of a large farming family, and educated at Rockwell College, Cashel, before going on to study for the priesthood at the Pontifical Irish College in Rome where he was ordained on February 18, 1967. He served on temporary mission in Dublin for three years and was Chaplain at the Convent of Mercy, Doon for a year, before his first parish appointment in the Archdiocese as Catholic Curate (CC) at Bothar na Naomh, Thurles and teacher of Catechetics at the Vocational School, Thurles. In 1980 he was appointed CC at Castleiney and two years later became CC at Herbertstown, Co Limerick, before being appointed Parish Priest of Ballinahinch and Killoscully in August 1992. He retired in April 2009, because of failing health, but decided that he wished to continue to live in the parish, where he continued to assist with the celebration of daily Mass, and other church ceremonies until last December. May he rest in peace.

Margaret O'Keeffe (*Ballinahinch GAA*) 24th November 1968 - 15th July 2010

Margaret O'Keeffe (nee Clifford) passed away peacefully after a long illness in July 2010. She was a big supporter of Ballinahinch GAA club following the teams around the county. She continued to attend the games throughout her illness keeping an watchful eye on all the teams. She was a great character and well liked by all who were privileged to know her. Nora (Nonie) Jones (*Ballinahinch GAA*) 11th Dec 1945 – 27th August 2010

The sudden passing of Nonie Jones (nee Cosgrove) saddened the parish in August this year. Nonie had an active role in the community and she had a big interest in all GAA matters. She was a very active member of the Ballinahinch club, involved in numerous of our fundraising efforts and always present at club games. She had attended Tipperary's All-Ireland semi-final victory over Waterford in Croke Park on the previous Sunday with her



family and friends. She will be sadly missed by her loving son Pat, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nieces, nephew, relatives and a large circle of friends. May she rest in peace.

Tadgh Foley (*Ballinahinch GAA*) 2nd June 1928 – 5th October 2010

It was with great sadness we learned of the passing of Tadgh Foley in October. He had a big involvement with Ballinahinch GAA throughout his life, as a player in the '50s and 60's, starring mainly at full-forward throughout this period. He served as chairman of the club in the early '60s and worked on various club committees throughout the years. In 2005 he was awarded a Sean Ghael award in



recognition of his contribution to the GAA. He served as joint president of the club for the past few years. The esteem with which he was held throughout the area was evident by the huge crowds that attended the removal to Ballinahinch church and the burial in the local cemetery. A guard of honour of past and present players lined the route from the family home to the church on his removal. Deeply regretted by his loving wife Maura, children Cathriona, Noreen and John, brothers Rev. Denis Foley (Dublin), Rev. Mons. Philip Kelly (Cappawhite) 1978-2010

The village of Cappawhite and surrounding area was shocked at the news of the death of Philip Kelly on Wednesday 7th April,2010. Philip Kelly tragically drowned in the river Clodagh in Portlaw, Co. Philip won All Ireland Division 3 colleges hurling in 1997 with Dundalk R.T.C. Philip had a great sense of adventure and travelled extensively to Australia, Middle East, Nepal, Morocco and Spain in pursuit of his passion for outdoor activities. To his parents John and Patricia, brothers John, Pat, George and Frank, and sisters Georgina, Rachel, Mary and Lorraine the Club sends its deepest sympathy.

Betty Walshe (Cappawhite) 1925-2009

Peter Hogan (Lorrha)

He played mostly in the half forward line, winning a county juvenile title in 1957 before helping Lorrha win the 1966 North senior title. David Boland (Moyle Rovers) (2005 - 2010)

It was with great sadness and extreme devastation that the news spread of the sudden passing of young David Boland on Wednesday 7th July. Paddy Boland (Carrick Swan) 1931-2010

When Paddy Boland passed to his eternal reward on Saturday 18th September Carrick Swan club lost the greatest club man who has ever lived. Paddy had given his life to his beloved club in numerous roles for over 60 years. Paddy did not have a most distinguished playing career but it was off the field of play that he showed the true meaning of a clubman. It seems that the gods granted Paddy the unique gift of a 48 hour day whereas other



mere mortals had to be satisfied with 24. He had time for everything, and everybody, and that allied to his deep love of sport, particularly Carrick Swan and Tipperary, is why he always had something to be happy about.

Paddy Boland gave unbroken service as secretary of Carrick Swan club for 42 years. He was the most accomplished club secretary that any organisation could wish for. He also co-ordinated the Tipperary draw, ran the annual Grand National Sweep, served on Davin Park field committee for many years, as secretary for over 20 years, represented the Swan Club at south and county board level, washed jerseys, lined fields, hung nets. You name it – Paddy did it. Since Paddy's tenure as secretary ended he filled the role of treasurer and his work ensured the club remained on a financially sound footing at all times. His services to the GAA were acknowledged in 2004 when he was awarded the Sean Ghael Award while two years earlier he and his family were honoured by the town of Carrick-on-Suir when accorded a most deserving civic reception.

Paddy Boland's remains reposed in his beloved club's juvenile training centre after his death. This was Paddy's second home and it was most fitting that the hundreds of people who came to pay their respects met their fellow gaels and friends in a place that meant so much to Paddy Boland who went to meet his maker only a short time after he had witnessed Carrick Swan win their 22nd South senior hurling title and Tipperary regain their rightful place as All-Ireland senior hurling champions. It was very moving to see both trophies adorn his coffin.

Carrick Swan club salutes Paddy Boland and we thank him. We will never forget him.

George Pyke (Clonmel Commercials)

The members of Clonmel Commercials were greatly saddened by the death of club president George Pyke on Monday Febuary 1st. George gave a lifetime service to the club and without his efforts down the years the club would quiet simply not exist. George was a gentleman in every way. His quiet ways endeared him to many throughout the GAA in South Tipperary and beyond. George was a member of Commercials from almost the beginning of the



club. His first involvement in football came in the late 1930s playing with St.Mary's CBS in a league organized by Clonmel Commercials, a relatively new club busy promoting the game among the youngsters of the town. In 1942 George Pyke first donned the club jersey and so began a lifelong involvement with the club that would last almost 70 years. On

the minor team of 1942 also was his brother Jack who also played with the club at many levels. George would go on to play with the club at minor, junior and senior level and was a distinguished footballer. He was a member of the 1948 senior panel winning south, county and Tipperaryman's Cup medals in that year. George captained the senior team in 1954. George suffered a serious injury and although recovered to take his place on the county winning panel of 1956 he retired from playing shortly afterwards. His talents were recognized beyond the club and in 1952 George played on the Tippearary junior team which won the Munster title. Unfortunately an All Ireland eluded him as Leitrim proved too good in the semi final. George was selector on teams at various levels at both club and county.

He became chairman of the club in 1957 and held the position until 1966. He again served as chairman for a shorter term beginning in 1968. As an administrator he also excelled. His knowledge of the rules and application of them earned him the respect of all who had dealings with him and he guided the club in a positive way. He was accorded the highest honour of the club when in 1984 he succeeded the late Dr. Pat Ó Callaghan as Honorary President. While George was an outstanding player it was perhaps his work with the juveniles of the club over many years that his legacy can be best seen. He looked after dozens of juvenile teams within the club over the years. He was selector of the under 14s that won a Féile Peil Na nÓg title in Cavan in 1982. George believed passionately in the promotion of gaelic football to the young people of Clonmel and he worked tirelessly for the promotion of the game.

Johnny Lonergan (Newcastle) 1932 – 2010

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of Johnny Lonergan on the 14th May, 2010. He passed away peacefully at St Theresa's Hospital Clogheen.

Johnny had a long, varied and interesting life. He was a passionate sportsman, deeply interested in G.A.A., soccer, greyhounds and tennis. He participated in all of the above, except soccer with great success. However, it was in the gaelic fields of South Tipperary,



Tipperary, Munster and Ireland where he made his greatest mark.

Johnny's adult club career spanned from 1950 to 1968 inclusive. He won many honours with his club, most notably south junior hurling, and junior football double in 1960. He played senior hurling with Pierce McCann's (Newcastle/St Mary's) and was a member of the team beaten in the 1959 South final. He played senior football with Old Bridge and Ardfinnan and won a post-office All Ireland with Clonmel post office. He played junior hurling with Tipperary for three successive years, 1954 to 1956 inclusive. He, also, played senior hurling with Tipperary in a number of tournament games in Waterford and Limerick. He was club secretary from 1954 to 1958, and he proved to be a most efficient and forward looking administrator.

The G.A.A at county level acknowledged his contribution to gaelic games by presenting him with Sean Gael award in 2008. He was very supportive of the recent publication of the club's history. He will be missed by all who knew him.

Tom also served in the role of selector with the club at junior grade in 1984 and intermediate grade in 1996 and 1997.

His pride in his club was very evident in the year 2000 when Templederry won their first ever Ccounty intermediate title.

Tom never missed a Templederry Game whether intermediate, junior, juvenile and football, He would have been delighted this year to see his daughter Ciara win her North and county under 12 title with Templederry club.

Tom was also a great Tipperary supporter and never missed a Tipperary match. How proud he would have been in Croke Park in September when Tipperary won the All Ireland.

Tom will be greatly missed by his wife Bridget, his daughter Ciara, his sisters Anne and Carmel and brother Pat.

Bill Quigley, Milestone, died on 11th June 2009. His death was greeted with great sadness by his family and large circle of friends. In recognition of his contributions Bill was honoured with a Sean Ghael Award in November 2008. Bill was a genuine G.A.A. supported and a loyal follower of Sean Treacy and Tipperary hurling. His coffin was draped in the blue and gold of the Sean Treacy club and club members formed a guard of honour in a moving tribute to one of its great sons.

Pat Walsh (Cahir)

Tom Walsh (Cahir)

The death occurred in April of former Cahir, Tipperary and Munster footballer, Tom Walsh.



A county minor in 1954 and 1955, he played at centre back in the 1955 Minor All-Ireland final against Dublin. After a couple of years on the Tipperary junior team, he made his Munster senior championship debut in 1958 and played for Tipperary until 1965. In 1959 at the age of 21 he played at centre back for Munster in the Railway Cup. For Cahir he won a County minor championship in 1953, county junior championships in 1955 and 1958 and in 1959 he was centre back on the Cahir team that won the South senior football championship for the first time. Thomas Casey (Drom & Inch)

It was with great sadness that the many friends of Thomas Casey learned that he had died in Nenagh Hospital in the early morning of Wednesday, August 18th. Thomas, better known as Tommy, was the caretaker of the Vocational School, Templemore (now St. Sheelan's College) from 1955 to 1992. Until he retired to The Mall, Templemore, he had lived most of his life under the shadow of the Devil's Bit Mountain. He was a man of many and great



enthusiasms, and he expressed them vigorously and without any doubt. Tommy was a great GAA supporter and never missed a match. In the late 1950s, he played hurling and football for Drom & Inch and was the recipient of many medals for his prowess on the field. Held in high esteem, he was asked with Hugh Cleary to train the Drom & Inch team in 1973-'74. As his good friend Dan Condron recalls, discussions on the latest hurling matches often continued late into the night. Tommy's contribution to Gaelic games was recognised by the Mid Tipperary Board in recent years when he was presented with a Sean Ghael award. As a mark of respect, a GAA guard of honour was graciously formed outside Drom Church to receive his remains.





Tim Marnell (J.K. Brackens)

The name of Tim Marnell will always be remembered and spoken of with great respect in the parish of Templemore whenever G.A.A. matters are discussed. All who knew Tim were saddened when news of his death filtered through on October 13th following an illness which he bore with great courage.



With Tim's passing, J.K. Brackens and Tipperary have lost a loyal and dedicated member and supporter. His passing removed

another link with the College Hill team that brought much success to the parish in the 1950s. Tim was a tough, tenacious, accomplished hurler who captained College Hill from the centre back position to win a Mid No.2 junior hurling title in 1954. He won another Mid No.2 junior hurling title with Templemore Kickhams in 1961. Tim also featured on Templemore Éire Óg football teams throughout his playing career.

Tim was an active committee member with the College Hill club and was later a founder member of J.K. Brackens G.A.A. club where he was a hard-working committee member, shrewd selector and busy County Board Draw promoter. He took immense satisfaction in watching all players performing in the club colours, in particular his three nephews Paddy, Michael and Anthony. Tim had many friends inside and outside the club – this was due to his jolly character and great sense of humour which appealed to people of all ages.

The esteem in which he was held was reflected in the huge crowds that attended his funeral where many members of his beloved J.K. Brackens provided a guard of honour and carried his coffin to his final resting place.



Michael Ryan(C) (Éire Óg Anacarty/Donohill) 1920-2010

Michael Ryan (C), better known as Mikey the Castle died suddenly on October 21st 2010, just one week after burying his son Philly (owner of Hogan Stand Pub in Dublin). He was the last surviving player of the Éire Óg team that won the county senior hurling final in 1943. His hurling career began in Anacarty N.S under the tutelage of headmaster, Bill O'Donnell, where he won a schools medal in 1934. He went on to win two West minor hurling medals in 1937



and 1938, and also a West Junior medal in 1937. From 1941 to 1944 he won four West senior hurling medals and two Crosco Cup medals in 1944 and 1946. In the county final of 1943 when Éire Óg defeated Moycarkey/Borris, Mikey played at left-half forward. On the team were



his two brothers, Tom who captained the side and Philly who later won medals with both Tipperary and Dublin. In 1949 Mickey hung up his boots to concentrate on farming and family life. He was married to Mary Jo O'Dwyer and they reared a family of four boys and two girls. Mikey was honorary president of the Éire Óg club.

Jack Cooney (Éire Óg Anacarty/Donohill)

Jack Cooney passed to his eternal reward at his home in Limerick in September 2010. He played Senior Hurling with Éire Óg Anacarty/Donohill in 1943 and 1944, winning two West titles and the county senior hurling final of 1943. Jack hailed from Goldengarden in the parish of Anacarty and was studying veterinary in UCD, when he transferred to Éire Óg in 1943. Jack operated in the full forward line and he was full forward in the county final of 1943. After 1944 Jack left the area, seldom to return but will always be remembered as one of the greats of 1943.

D.J. Treacy (Glengar)

D.J. Treacy, Davis Street, Tipperary and formerly of Commonaline died on 5th March 2010. D.J. served as a player and secretary of Glengar club over a number of years. He won a West Tipperary minor hurling medal in 1942. This minor team was made up of players from Glengar, Hollyford and Kilcommon. D.J. also won a West Tipperary senior hurling medal with St. Nicholas in 1957. St. Nicholas was a combination from Glengar, Solohead and Cappawhite. He also wrote a history of



Glengar G.A.A. club in centenary year. D.J. loved hurling and was an avid follower of Tipperary hurling until his death.

Connie Walshe (Éire Óg Anacarty/Donohill) 1941-2009

Connie Walshe was born on July 21st 1941 at Shanballymore, Donohill. He began playing with Éire Óg at juvenile level, graduating to Minor and U/21 level, but without any success. His favoured position was either left-corner back or full-back. He first lined out in senior hurling on the Éire Óg/Hollyford combination in 1962. While not having any success in senior hurling, Éire Óg won the West junior hurling title of 1962 with Connie at full-back. They lost



the county final to Thurles Sarsfields by a mere point. Connie won a West senior hurling medal in 1964 when Éire Óg beat Cappawhite in the final. They then lost the 1965 final to Cashel. Connie played both games at full-back, but faded off the hurling scene after that, though he remained a life long Éire Óg supporter even while living in Tipperary Town. He was a selector when Éire Óg last won a West senior hurling title in 1986.

In failing health for some time he departed this life on December 14th 2009 at a relatively young age. Sincere sympathy to his wife Catherine, brother P.J., sisters Kathleen and Maureen.

Tom O' Dwyer (Éire Óg Anacarty/Donohill) 1948-2009

Tom O'Dwyer was born in May 1948 to Michael O'Dwyer and Josie Mai Heffernan of Knockgorman, Donohill. He was the second eldest of a family of six, the others being John, Michael, Seamie, P.P. and Mary.

His hurling and football career began in juvenile circles in the late fifties continuing into Minor and U/21 grades but without any success. In 1967 he won a West senior hurling



medal, playing at centre-forward when Éire Óg toppled Arravale Rovers in the final. In 1971 he distinguished himself by outhurling Theo English at midfield when Éire Óg beat Marlfield in the county senior hurling open draw series. His big break-through came in 1974 when he

captained the footballers known as Multeen Rovers to a West and county junior football title, playing at wing-back. A West and county junior hurling medal came his way in 1977, when he marshalled Seamus Barry of Upperchurch in the final. He won three Crosco Cup medals with Éire Óg in 1971, 1972 and 1980 when the Crosco Cup meant something in the division. Tom's final achievement with Éire Óg was in 1981 when they beat Cappawhite in the West Final and he was on the losing side in 1982 when Seán Treacys beat them in the final. He was a substitute in both of these games. Unfortunately in April 1980 he suffered a broken leg which contributed to his retirement from the game, though he continued as selector for the football team for the following years. He also served as club secretary in 1984 and 1985.

An utter sense of shock and disbelief rippled through the GAA community of Anacarty and Donohill on December 19th 2009 when news filtered through of the sudden and untimely death of Tom O'Dwyer. Tom's funeral was a sight to behold as it was one of the largest funerals ever witnessed in Tipperary Town with farming and GAA people from far and wide paying tribute to one of their own who was called to God's Heavenly Kingdom at a relatively young age.

Jim Nolan (Sean Treacys)

Jim Nolan of Barnadomeeny, Rearcross, Newport, County Tipperary, and also late of Manor Street, Dublin, died suddenly on Friday the 13th of August 2010.

Jim loved sport from an early age. He first came to prominence, hurling with Rearcross School, in the O'Brien Cup competition. His talent was evident throughout his youth, and his defensive prowess was never more apparent than in the West minor hurling final in 1965,



where he gave a brilliant display for Sean Treacy's, losing to Cappawhite by 1 point.

After some time spent working in Thurles, Jim got the call to the capital. He initially worked in the bar and building trades, before later spending over 30 years with M & J Gleeson & Co., until he retired through illness.

Jim played hurling in Dublin for a few years, but his heart was always with his local Sean Treacy team. When they were promoted to senior grade in 1967, he was approached to rejoin the club. He answered the call without hesitation and played his part with the very successful Sean Treacy's team in the 1970s. Jim made his name at right cornerback on that team and gave some memorable displays. He won 5 West Tipperary senior hurling championships, 2 Crosco Cup hurling leagues, the prestigious Doon, Borrisoleigh and Bansha tournaments and many other trophies. He was captain of the Sean Treacy team that won the 1978 West senior hurling championship. A fearless and skilful hurler, who did not "take any prisoners", Jim always played the game hard but fair and was undaunted by any of the big name players he faced, especially the county stars of Benettsbridge and Mount Sion, arguably the best clubs in Ireland at the time.

When his playing career ended he helped the club in any way he could and was very generous in supporting the clubs fund-raising ventures. He was a prominent and founder member of the Sean Treacy's Golfing Society and was honoured both as captain and president. He was deeply honoured to carry the GAA "Millennium Torch" through his native village of Rearcross in June, 2009. He was a gentle giant with a heart of gold, He went to Lourdes for each of the past 20 years as a helper with the cystic fibrosis patients and gave generously of his time. He had a great outlook on life, worked hard but always believed in enjoyment. People loved to be in his company. Many of us can recall his vibrant personality on all social occasions and in such places as Majorca, Spain, Cheltenham, York, Galway and Listowel. He will be sadly missed by all his friends, the Sean Treacy GAA club, work colleagues and acquaintances, both in Tipperary and Dublin. He will be especially missed by his brothers John Joe, Michael and Donie and by his sisters Mary and Winnie, his sister Peggy having predeceased him by a short time."We may have had great men, but we never had better".

Patrick O'Dwyer (Gaile)

On August 19th 2010, the death took place at Milford Hospice, Limerick of Patrick O'Dwyer, Gaile, Cashel. Formerly of Nodstown, Boherlahan, he was son of the late William and Josie O'Dwyer. His late father Willie was well known for many years in GAA and political circles and held many positions of note, not only in the GAA, but also as a member of South Tipperary County Council. As a young man, Patrick, like so many young men of the fifties



had to emigrate to England. While there, he won senior titles with the Brian Boru club, London in 1962, 1963 and 1964 and he also won All Ireland intermediate medals with the London team in 1959 and 1960. He was a member of the London team which were defeated by Tipperary Intermediate hurlers in 1963 in the All Ireland intermediate hurling final which was played in Thurles. Around 1965, Patrick returned to Boherlahan and in the late sixties he played regularly for the local team. In the early seventies, Patrick married Rita Hanrahan, Kilkee, Co. Clare and they spent their married life in Gaile where Patrick was a valued member of the local farming community. Tommy was a selector on the Moycarkey-Borris team which captured the county No. 1 junior hurling title in 1954 before emigrating to New York where he played for the Tipperary team there for a number of years. Tommy was a staunch GAA supporter and followed



Moycarkey-Borris and Tipperary teams up to the time of his untimely passing. Tommy's son Ed is a former County Board PRO. The Moycarkey-Borris GAA club formed a guard of honour at Moycarkey Church and the coffin was draped in the red and yellow colours of the club. May he rest in peace.

Dan Shaw (Moycarkey/Borris) 1933-2010

On 6th August, the parish of Moycarkey Borris was deeply saddened by the death of one of its biggest supporters, Dan Shaw, Grallagh, Horse and Jockey, aged 77 years. Dan was a lifelong supporter of his beloved parish and of Tipperary hurling. Dan played hurling with Moycarkey up to and including junior level. It will be for Dan's tremendous off-field work that he will be fondly remembered. Whether at iuvenile matches with his club or Tipperary



matches nationwide, you were guaranteed to see Dan there with his friend Frank Gooney. Dan was a very successful promoter for the Tipperary GAA draw, and was honoured with distinction on presentation of a Cumann na Sean Ghael Award in 2006 for his services to Tipperary hurling. At the time of his death Dan was Vice-President of the Moycarkey-Borris GAA club. He is sadly missed by his sister Anna, brother Maurice, nephews, nieces, and all his friends.

Billy Bourke (Moyne/Templetuohy) 1936-2010.

The sudden death of Billy Bourke on the morning of Thursday 16th September caused great sadness around the parish. He epitomized all that was good and healthy in the person, having never drank or smoked, attended horseracing in far away places and like his neighbours, enjoyed his greyhounds. However it was on the training grounds that Billy really made his mark and in the early eighties he became part of our club history.



In 1980 Billy was appointed trainer of the clubs junior football team and immediately put his stamp on affairs when the club won both the Mid and County titles. As a result of these successes the club was promoted to the intermediate grade the following year and against all the odds, Billy's well prepared team won both Mid and County titles that year. This enabled the club to join the senior football ranks the following year. Billy's love of Gaelic games could be measured by his attendance at both adult and juvenile matches, regardless as to where they were played. He will be sadly missed by those who were so lucky to know him. To his family and friends we extend our deepest sympathy.

Michael [Mixie] Dunne (Moyne/Templetuohy) 1926-2010.

Ned Doherty (Moyne/Templetuohy) 1918 - 2010.

Pat Maher (Borris-Ileigh)

Michael Walsh (Skeheenarinky) 1936 - 2010

Mick Walsh passed to his eternal reward on April 10th. He was one of Skeheenarinky's most dedicated players during the '50s and '60s. He held the position as treasurer during that period. At that time it was men like Mick who helped to keep our club on the road. He moved to Mitchelstown in 1968. It was fitting that the club provided a guard of honour at his funeral and his coffin was draped in the club colours.

Mick Cowan (Borris-Ileigh)

On 17th May 2010 a great stalwart of our club Mick Cowan passed from among us. His long and brave battle with illness had finally ended. Although it was widely known that Mick was seriously ill for a long time, the impact of his passing had a profound effect on all who knew him. He will always be remembered in Borris for his great performances with the club during the '70s and '80s, winning county titles in '81, '83 and '86. The mighty battles with Middleton



in Kilmallock in '83 are still spoken of as being among the greatest games in club hurling. Undoubtedly winning the All Ireland club final on St. Patrick's Day 1987 was memorable by any standards. Mick was central to all these great memories and his ongoing legacy is well preserved by his sons, Aidan and Kieran.

His smiling welcome to all who called to Stapletons in Borris was a hallmark of his personality. Mick had been accurately described as "the most likeable and easy company", with genuine friendship, wit and kindly humour.

His loss to his family is very deep and the club extends its sympathy once again especially at this time of year.

Hughie Tooher (Kilruane MacDonaghs) 1929-2010

The late Hughie Tooher was one of the great characters in the Kilruane MacDonaghs club. He won divisional junior hurling medals in 1954 and 1956. He was called on to the senior side and lined out at full forward when MacDonaghs defeated Toomevara in the 1959 North final. Hughie was a wily and wiry competitor who held his own in the uncompromising tussles in that era. He was



recognised as a shrewd observer of the game and acted as a selector on many MacDonaghs sides. Hughie was a mentor on the 1965 senior team which defeated Lorrha in the North final. He lived life to the full. He enjoyed his game of cards, liked to take a drink, smoked like a steam engine and liked nothing better than a wager on a horse or a hound. Although in failing health in recent years he kept firmly in touch with events both local and global by reading the Irish Independent and The Guardian from cover to cover. Last year the MacDonaghs club made a special presentation to Hughie in recognition of his loyal service and to mark the golden jubilee of the famous win against The Greyhounds in 1959. The graveside oration was given by his friend and former colleague Len Gaynor. Suaimhneas siorai da anam.

Jim O'Meara (Kilruane MacDonaghs) 1926-2010

Jim played junior hurling with the local Kyle team before he progressed on to the Kilruane MacDonaghs senior side. He lined out at corner back in the 1952 and 1953 north finals but MacDonaghs lost out to the powerful Borris-Ileigh team of that period. He was a crafty player with uncanny anticipation which made




him a formidable opponent for any forward. Jim was a shrewd mentor and along with Len Gaynor and Jimmy Gibson he was on the line when Kilruane MacDonaghs won the minor county final in 1971 and four U-21 divisional county titles between 1973 and 1976. Jim was a keen follower of the fortunes of both club and county. He derived great satisfaction from Tipperary's All-Ireland win against Kilkenny. He was great company and liked a quiet drink in one of the village taverns. Jim was equally at ease in the company of both young and old and was in his element when hurling was the topic of conversation. His coffin was draped in the MacDonaghs colours and club members formed a guard of honour as his funeral entered the village. Seamus Nolan (Clonmore)

With the passing of Bob Stakelum we lost a true stalwart whose efforts on an off the field of play for decade after decade inspired several generations to join in and play their part for our club.


As a hurler his record speaks for itself. A crucial player on our county senior hurling final winning teams of 1948, '51 and '54, Bob's sterling performances during that golden era for our club earned him the recognition of the county selectors and says him win an All Jesland

county selectors and saw him win an All Ireland senior hurling medal in 1949, the first leg of Tipperary's three in a row.

Bob was also a very accomplished footballer, who represented Tipperary at both junior and senior level in the 1950s. All the while, his acknowledged sense of fair play and his vast knowledge of the rules of hurling and football saw him gain wide respect as a referee of high standard, and he had the honour of refereeing the All Ireland senior hurling final of 1955, the Munster senior hurling final of 1956 and the Munster senior football finals of 1954 and 1955.

Off the field of play there was scarcely a role in the club that Bob didn't take on. Spells as club chairman, secretary and board representative were inevitable given his standing as a leader of club and parish, and every role he assumed was marked by the same strong, solid leadership qualities he carried throughout his life.


As the decades passed, Bob's interests in the club and his willingness to help in any way possible never waned. A wise and welcome



Paddy Morrissey (Kildangan)



Davy Ryan (C) (Solohead) 1955 - 2010

It was with profound regret that the news of the death of Davy Ryan was received in Solohead and Monaghan on April 21st last.

On the playing fields, he was part of a very successful Solohead squad that won juvenile west football titles in 1967 and 1968, west and county U17 football in 1969, minor football west titles in 1970 and 1971 and played minor football for Tipperary in 1971 and 1972. He also captained Abbey CBS in a Munster final appearance.



He joined the guards in 1973 and after a short spell in Listowel he was sent on border duty to Clones and later Carrickmacross.

A member of the Carrickmacross hurling club since moving to the town Davy was involved in the hurling scene for over thirty years at club and county level. He played for the county hurlers from 1978 to 1992 in practically every position with the exception of goalkeeper and was the proud holder of four Ulster junior hurling championship medals and three National hurling league division four medals. He won a senior hurling league medal with Carrickmacross in 1986 and was assistant hurling manager in 1993 and manager in 1994. At club level he served as treasurer of both the Carrickmacross hurling and football clubs. When he hung up the playing boots and the camán Davy took up refereeing and was operating on the provincial panel as well as in Monaghan for the best part of two decades. He took charge of Ulster minor hurling leagues and U21 championship matches as well as the final of the Monaghan senior hurling championship in 2002.

There was a large and representative attendance at both the removal of his remains and Requiem Mass in Carrickmacross with the Garda

Siochana, members of the Carrickmacross and Solohead GAA clubs along with former playing colleagues and officers and members of Monaghan County Board including GAA director general, Padraig Duffy forming a guard of honour. Davy Ryan was interred in Saint Oliver Plunkett cemetery Clones.

During the 1950s and 1960s Paddy Ryan played his hurling with Toomevara winning a North junior hurling medal in 1958 and he was also a member of the senior panel that won the North Tipperary senior championship in the same year. Paddy also had a great passion for Greyhounds and was a very familiar and popular figure at Greyhound Stadiums in places like Limerick and Thurles. To his wife Joan and family we extend our sympathy.



Seamus Maxwell (Toomevara)

Seamus Maxwell passed to his eternal reward after a short illness. As a

hurler Seamus first came to promise as a very skilful player when Toomevara won the North Tipperary juvenile championship of 1955 and it was no coincidence then that Seamus would progress to play junior and senior with the club and he was a member of the panel when Toome defeated Thurles Sarsfield in the never to be forgotten county final of 1960. He achieved further honours when Toome won North finals in 1961 and 1962. Seamus always maintained a great love for Toomevara hurling and he remained a most loyal supporter up to the time



of his death. Such was his love of hurling that when Seamus took up residence in Templemore that he lined out with the Red and White of Killea for a couple of years.
