

COUNTY FINAL day is always a very special day in County Tipperary and today is no exception. Patrons will also be keeping an eye out today for potential talent for the Tipp, senior side. The senior hurling management team of Nicky English, Ken Hogan and Jack Bergin will be watching with interest with the notebooks out. Perhaps they will be scribbling a few names down of potential Tipperary senior hurlers.

On the football front. Aherlow and Fethard do battle in what is a unique pairing. This should be a very interesting tussle indeed and it is great to see the cream of Tipperary football coming to Semple Stadium for the County

Final.

Both teams have had interesting paths for the decider and the number of games they have played to date ensure that they are ready and willing for action. Again, this is a chance to spot potential for the senior football side - players who can perform under pressure in high octane games such as county finals are needed for, and are vital to, county teams.

For the four clubs involved in today's finals these are special times. The culmination of a year's work, hard graft. toil, and honing of skills, have brought them to this point. It's a credit to the four clubs, the players. management teams, backroom teams and all involved to say that they have made it to the county final.

The four parishes have been boosted greatly by the clubs participation in the final and a wonderful community spirit has been formed. Long may that continue in Tipperary and in the G.A.A.

Best of luck to the four clubs involved.

town where football is always spoken of and, our aim to have the O'Dwyer Cup and our 21st senior title coming home to the friary town this 11th of November 2001. Our honours list in senior football stretches from 1887 to 1997 (20 titles), winning three in the nineties 1991, 1993, 1997.

Fethard club was formed in 1884 under the guidance of Munster Council (1901) who celebrated their centenary this year in mallow 30/6/2001. The club was honoured to be represented at this function by no other than our own Dick Cummins past chairman of our club and current life president of Tipp South Board. We have won county senior titles in every decade since the foundation of the association (except the 60s).

Our path to this final started on 29th June in Gorthnahoe: Fethard 3-13, Moyne, Templetuohy 1-5. Our next outing was in Killsheelan, 22th July: Fethard 1-15, Mullinahone 1-6. Our quarter final also in Killsheelan on 7th October: Fethard 3-4, Moyle Rovers 0-6 and the semi-final was in Clonmel, 27th October: Fethard 1-9, Ardfinnan 0-9.

Our last opponents in county final (1997) were none other than Aherlow, and today we have nine of that first fifteen on duty (Brian Burke, Tommy Sheehan, Willie Morrissey, Michael Quinlan, Damien Byrne, Stephen O'Donnell, Jimmy O'Meara, Michael Spillane and Paul Fitzgerald) who are joined by fifteen other players aiming for their first senior county title.



#### FINAL DAY MISCELLANY

#### SUCCESSFUL CAPTAINS

The last Tipperary man to captain his county to All-Ireland honours and his club to the county title in the same year was Tony Wall in 1958.

Declan Carr successfully captained his club in 1990 and his county in 1991 – a feat also achieved by Jimmy Doyle 1964 and 1965, Sean Kenny 1949/1950, John Maher 1944/1945 and Jim Lanigan 1936/1937.

Since the Dan Breen cup was first presented to the captain of the county title winning team, only one set of brothers has lifted the trophy in consecutive seasons. Thomas Dunne of Toomevara (1999) was succeeded as winning captain by Terry Dunne in 2000.

The men who received the Dan Breen Cup most frequently were: Jim Lanigan (Thurles Sarsfields) 5 times; Phil Purcell (Moycarkey-Borris) and John Maher (Thurles Sarsfields) 3 times each.

Among the list of those who have received it twice is current Tipperary senior selector Jack Bergin (Moycarkey-Borris). Jack captained Tipp. in the 1985 Munster Championship and also played in the unforgettable Centenary Year campaign. His brother Liam captained Tipperary in the 1983 Munster Championship.

#### SEMI-FINAL SCORCHER

Thurles Sarsfields 24 point semi-final victory over Cappawhite sent people to the record books to establish when there had been a penultimate victory of such magnitude.

Working in reverse order, Nenagh Eire Og beat Mullinahone by 17 points in 1999. Toomevara beat Kickhams by 18 points in 1998 and Thurles Sarsfields by 14 points in 1996. They had a similar 14 pts margin to spare over Clonoulty-Rossmore in 1994, while Cashel K.C. had 15 pts win over Kilruane McDonaghs the same year.

Clonoulty-Rossmore had a 14 pts win over Toomevara in 1989, Roscrea beat Carrick Swans by 15 points in 1985 and had 20 points to spare over Oliver Plunketts (Mid) in 1976, Kilraune had an 18 pts win over Silvermines in 1975, while Roscrea were 15 points better than Carrick Davins in 1970.

However, it was Carrick Davins in 1967, who beat the Sarsfields 2001 winning margin, defeating Eire Óg (West) by 5-15 to 0-2, a margin of twenty eight points! Not surprisingly

the Davins, led by Mick Roche, retained their County title.

#### WHEN WILL WE SEE THEM AGAIN?

Some of the prominent clubs which achieved County honours in the past 25 years have been absent from County final day for some time. Roscrea last appeared in 1985, Kilraune-McDonaghs in 1986, Borrisoleigh 1988, Moneygall 1976, Moycarkey-Borris 1984, Loughmore-Castleiney 1988, Holycross-Ballycahill 1991 and Cappawhite 1987.

#### DRAWS

The County S.H.C. has been drawn on nine occasions. The years were 1899, 1930, 1945, 1965, 1975, 1977, 1982, 1988 and 1992 respectively.

#### NEW COLOURS

Two of Lorrha's key players during their last quest for glory were John and Cathal McIntyre. John recently coached Clarinbridge to Galway honours for the first time, while Cathal is a "Thurles Blue" in recent years and they are poised to win a long overdue County title in Tipperary.

#### NO DOUBLE PROGRAMME

There was some surprise that the Minor 'A' County Final was not 'held' and played with this senior decider as is the usual practice. However, in noting the various reactions to the decision, we should point out that the Minor 'A' Final was played on a separate occasion as recently as 1998, when the Minor 'B' decider was the curtain raiser to the big game. Two years earlier, we had a Minor 'A' semi-final to open the programme, Toomevara v. Clonoulty-Rossmore.

#### LATE DATES

It is interesting to note that the County final date has varied significantly over the past thirty years. In 1971 it was played on October 31st, 1981 it was October 25th, in 1991 it was November 10th and this year it is November 11th. Today's date is *not* the latest in this thirty years – the 1972 County S.H.C. final, Roscrea v. Borrisoleigh, was played on November 12th (without a curtain raiser!) and Tipp, had been

eliminated from the championship on July 9th.

#### EARLY FINISH

The September 12th date of 1976 is unlikely to be emulated in the immediate future, but you have to go back to the 1986 decider between Borrisoleigh and Kilraune-McDonaghs for the last decider played in September.

#### ELUSIVE DOUBLE

The County Senior/Minor 'A' hurling double has not been achieved since Thurles Sarsfields beat Borrisokane (minor) and Na Piarsaigh (South) in the 1957 finals.

#### ALL COMERS

It is interesting to note that Toomevara's trebles of 1992/93/94 and 1998/99/00 comprised of victories over Mid, North and West opposition in both sequences.

#### REMEMBER THE DISPLAY?

The 'Man of the Match' award has been won by many deserving players over the years. In the past decade the hurlers honoured in this way on County Final day were – 1991: Raymie Ryan (Cashel K.C.); 1992: Philip Shanahan (Toomevara); 1993: Mic hael Cleary (Nenagh Éire Óg); 1994: Pat King (Toomevara); 1995: Eddie Tucker (Nenagh Éire Óg); 1996: David Ryan (Boherlahan-Dualla); 1997: Michael Heffernan (S) (Clonoulty-Rossmore); 1998: Tony Delaney (Toomevara); 1999: Paddy O'Brien (Toomevara); 2000: John O'Brien (Toomevara).

#### A MAN OF MANY PARTS

Who was the last man to play in a County S.H.C. final and then referee the decider before going on to coach an All-Ireland U-21 winning team and act as a Tipperary senior hurling selector? Michael Doyle (Holycross-Ballycahill) played in the County finals of 1989/1990 and 1991, he refereed the 1994 decider and coached Tipp. U-21s to victory in 1995, before acting as senior selector 1996-1998. You can fill in his other career highlights yourself!

#### WINNING WITHOUT A GOAL

Despite the widely held belief that goals win matches, it is possible to win the County Senior Hurling Final without raising the green flag. In the past twenty years, the title has been won on a points only basis six times. The clubs which achieved this feat were: Borrisoleigh (1983 and 1986), Holycross-Ballycahill (1990), Toomevara (1992 and 1998) and Clonoulty-Rossmore (1997). The losing team has failed to score a goal in eight of the last twenty finals.

#### NO GOALS AT ALL

The last goal-less decider was the Holycross-Ballycahill 0-13 to 0-10 victory over Cashel King Cormacs in 1990.

#### HIGH SCORING LOSERS

The scores registered by some losing finalists over the past two decades or so would have won many deciders on other occasions. The scores worthy of note are: 2-13 Roscrea (1978), 2-13 Kilruane-McDonaghs (1980), 2-13 Loughmore-Castleiney (1987) and 2-12 Toomevara (1996).

#### LOW POINTS

The lowest winning score in deciders since 1980 was Toomevara's 0-12 v. Thurles Sarsfields in the 1992 replay. The lowest score recorded by the runners-up in that period was the 0-7 registered by Kilruane McDonaghs (then All-Ireland Club Champions) against Borrisoleigh (their successors) in 1986.

#### RECORD IN SIGHT

Toomevara have won 16 County S.H.C. titles between 1890 and 2000 and while there have been three sequences of a treble – 1912/1913/1914, 1992/1993/1994 and 1998/1999/2000 – the four-in-a-row has remained elusive. The present team stands on the brink of history with a club record in sight.

#### RECORD HOLDERS

Thurles Sarsfields hold the record number of County title victories in Tipperary with 28 titles won between 1887 and 1974. They have won a three-in-a-row 1944/1945/1946, a four-in-a-row 1906/1907/1908/1909 and two five timers 1955/56/57/58/59 and 1961/62/63/ 64/65. Club members will tell you their sweetest will be the next one!

#### LONG TIME AGO

Thurles Sarsfields' last championship victory over Toomevara was recorded on September 15th, 1974, when they won a County S.H.C. semi-final on a 3-15 to 2-9 scoreline at Nenagh. "The Blues" went on to win their 28th and last County title.



One cannot omit Brian O'Meara who missed out on playing in the All-Ireland final. The support from Wexford during that time was much appreciated. Decent people



Every club should have a School of Excellence. Attention to detail, proper coaching, expert physical fitness programme and advice on diet and nutrition. The day of 'it will do is long over'. It is as easy to have a professional approach as a slapdash one.

Who will win today? The game between Fethard and Aherlow is wide open. This year Thurles Sarsfields appear to have come of age, more leaders on the field and more cohesive teamwork. They have impressed me all year. They almost have to make the break through this year. What of Toomevara? Well Toome never panic even when things are going against them. They can destroy a team in five minutes or less. They are not champions for nothing. I'll sit on the fence.


