
Co. Tipperary Senior Hurling Final Match Programme 2002



Bonfires will surely glitter to night, whether it is in the Cathedral Town or in Kickhams village in the shadow of Slievenamon. Thurles Sarsfields last won the Dan Breen Cup in 1974, while Mullinahone wait to claim the title for the first time. There is an air of excitement and expectation following two great semi-final games.

Sarsfields contest their third consecutive final. They were bitterly disappointed last year as they felt that they did not do themselves justice on the day. This year there is no hype; they have made progress quietly, improving with each game. In the quarter final, the moving outfield of Ger "Redser"O Grady was the turning point against Clonoulty. Last Sunday Loughmore led for most of the game, yet Sarsfields did not buckle under huge pressure. That was a significant factor as was the performance in the last ten minutes of Stephen Mason, Tony Ruth, Gary Mernagh and Lar Corbett. Short the injured Johnny Enright it was ironic that his replacement Eamonn Walsh scored three goals. A rewarding tally for any forward.

Mullinahone ousted champions Toomevara by a single point, a late "65" saw the immaculate Paul Kelly convert. It crowned a wonderful display for Paul. Moving to midfield late in 'the game he showed steel and style as he set up the attack. Toomevars' Benny Dunne was "cleaning up" at wing back until John Leahy moved out to curtail him. John caught and distributed some great ball. Pat Croke, who is having a great year, showed all the lovely skill we saw when he was a minor. Centre back Edward O Brien has played solidly during the

championship as has Paul Curran, Eddie Carey and Ky Vaughan.

What will be the outcome? Can Eamonn Walsh repeat his feats of last Sunday? Can the full back line close down the elusive Eoin Kelly and the experienced, if not fully fit, John Leahy? Sarsfields are very focused. They know that Mullinahone will probably start as favourites. That takes all the pressure from them. Mullinahone were overjoyed to beat Toomevara, but that is of no value unless they win today. It is a case of "keeping the heads" and concentrating. Brian O Meara has been relatively quiet of late as has Carrick man Conor Arrigan. Both are due a big game. Both teams play an attractive, skilful, open game. Lady luck will sway the outcome. Take your pick as to which side she will favour.

The minor game sees Carrick Davins and Moneygall in action. The Davins have a physically strong side, while Moneygall are younger and lighter. It will probably come down to whichever side uses the wide-open spaces of Semple Stadium best.

We acknowledge the Kilruane Mc Donaghs players who won the county final twenty five years ago and went on to retain the championship in 1978 and '79 . The Tipperary Star/Anner Hotel sponsor these jubilee awards, a lovely recognition of the players of the past. Welcome to all the U12 hurlers who play in the Ground Hurling exhibition game. Welcome to all the Tipperary Credit Unions personnel, both Mullinahone and Thurles Credit Unions are associated with the sponsorship of the county championships.

arsfields Captain Gary Mernagh has been a real leader on and off the field for the Blues this year. Having made his way into the senior side a few years ago Gary quickly established himself and has developed into a very reliable defender with plenty of skill to match his speed and anticipation.

In fact, it's a tribute to his team mates that a hurler of Gary's calibre should be confined to corner back when such a natural hurler could perhaps be deployed outfield.

Gary is a man who eats and sleeps hurling. A coach by profession, Gary has been extensively involved in coaching in Dublin where he works and lives and is not afraid to bring new ideas to the training fields in Thurles either. Many of his training methods have been used over the last number of weeks and months by Sarsfields and Gary is always ready and willing to try out the routines with the players.

It's a real sign of Gray's commitment and determination to succeed to say that he recovered from a very serious hand injury to play hurling again. Gary extensively damaged his left hand at work some years ago and is forced to wear protective strapping each and every time he goes out to hurl or play football. At the time, it looked as though Gary's career would be cut prematurely short, but true to form, he took the injury on the chin and rallied again to make a wonderful recovery.

On the field Gary Mernagh is a serious man who cuts a real dash. Off the field he is a real character and one of the lads who is always winding others up. Never short of a word or two, Gary is quick witted and ever willing to join in the craic.

For him to lift the Dan Breen today would be a huge personal achievement. It would be a massive lift to Thurles Sarsfields; a huge boost to hurling in Thurles; and a dream come

true for Gary Mernagh and his family. Gary is a nephew of John 'Hotpoint' Hayes, of Tipperary backroom team fame.

THURLES - the t

rowing up in Thurles in the 1960's, we were often reminded of the great hurling tradition our town possessed. We learned in the C.B.S. that the G.A.A. was founded just down the street, but the boast that fascinated me was when I heard that, over the years, hurlers from the parish of Thurles had won over one hundred All-Ireland Senior hurling medals.

So I decided to take a closer look at this claim to one hundred medals. I didn't include hurlers from other clubs, who were part of the Thurles inter-county selection in the early years. However, I did include Thurles players who were substitutes on the various teams. I also included hurlers from the first All-Ireland Championship (1887) who played in the games up to the final but who, due to a disagreement, didn't play in the final.

IN 1988 when Mullinahone folk travelled to Clonmel for the South Tipperary junior hurling final nobody could have realised what lay ahead in the coming years.

The junior final was won the same way, and the CJ Kickhams bandwagon had begun to roll. Later that winter U-21 'B' South and County hurling and football double was won.

1989 was a great year for the premier county, but a better one for the boys from Kickhams town.

After winning South U-21 'A' and Junior hurling titles, we went on to win County honours in both, beatinbg Declan Ryan's Clonoulty in the U-21 and Nicky English's Lattin Cullen in the iunior decider.

A South intermediate football title was also brought back to the 'little village'.

A certain John Leahy had nine championship medals the same year. Back to back South intermediate hurling titles were won in 1990 and (Mullinahone Capt) tale is only beginning!! 1991, so we progressed to senior hurling in 1992.

In our eleven years, hurling senior we have annexed five South titles (93, 95, 97, 99, 2002).

In 1997 we reached the county senior



hurling final, only to narrowly fall to Clonoulty. We have also been defeated in county finals in minor hurling and U-21 hurling in recent years.

Is our luck about to change? Today we are back in a senior hurling final hoping to bridge a 35 year gap since Dan Breen came to the South. The Mullinahone bandwagon continues to roll. Perhaps the fairy-

Paul Curran (Mullinahone)

oday the curtain comes down on yet another intriguing county senior hurling championship campaign, in a year in which all four divisional finals have produced new winners. Ironically its only Mullinasecond hone's ever appearance in a final. Losing in 1997 to Clonoulty-Rossmore was a bitter pill to swallow but now they've returned in anticipation of recording a unique achievement. From a first junior title in 1989, today the CJ Kickham club find themselves one hour away from a senior equivalent after 13 years of effort and heartache. Mullinahone have amassed five senior divisional titles, their first in 1993. Traditionally a

footballing stronghold, in 1987 John Leahy at minor level broke the mould in becoming the first ever Mullinahone representative to grace the inter-county stage. Since then, Paul Curran has become one of eight others to follow in his footsteps. In the 1997 county final loss, Paul was the second youngest on the panel, still active in Bord na Nog games while ensuring an invaluable learning experience in the senior squad sessions. In the same year the south division won its first ever Munster U-16 title defeating south Limerick in the decider with Paul having performed heroics at left half back. Later in the year Tipperary claimed the Nenagh Co-op tournament. Another triumph for the young Mullinahone defender At Scoil Ruain, Killenaule hurling came easy to the Kilvemnon lad. A Canon Fitzgerald winners medal against Nenagh in 1997 was first to come.

In 1998 representing Scoil Ruain, Paul made the county vocational schools hurling and football teams winning the All Ireland Senior 'B' football title for good measure. He also captained the U-17 inter-divisional football champs against North Tipp that same season. In Paul's final year, the school collected the Munster Vocational school's title defeat-

ing Coachford College Cork
only to have their All-Ireland
ambitions cut short against
Athenry VS at the semifinal stage. The Tipperary
minors regained provincial honours in 1999 at
Semple Stadium after a
two year lapse. Paul
operating at full-back

gave commendable per-

formances throughout.

A strongly built, well focused and equally committed individual, Paul who won't turn twenty one for another two weeks is second in a family of five. Eldest brother Niall, a

former county minor is Eddie Carey's midfield partner while seventeen year old Alan is the latest panel member.

Presently in his final year studying manufacturing engineering at Waterford IT, he has added a Fitzgibbon Cup medal to his handsome collection defeating UCD in 2000. Paul exceeded all expectations playing full-back in his fresher season. He is also the holder of two U-21 and three Senior divisional medals but victory today would overshadow all that. In early 2001, he was one of five Mullinahone club men included in the senior squad. Despite not securing a championship place he did feature against Laois, Cork and Galway in the 2001 league campaign. After endless nights training and diligent hurling practice an All-Ireland medal was equally rewarding for his all-round contribution. Losing consecutive U-21 Munster finals to Limerick inflicted wounds that were slow to heal. Paul at centre-back and full-back respectively viewed these results as potential low points. Thankfully for him under John Leahy and the coaching skills of Sean O'Regan this year could end triumphantly for the green and red. Its now or never Mullinahone!

Four final defeats in the decade between them

They say that "you have to lose one to win one"!
Well if they do, please don't repeat it to the men of
Thurles Sarsfields or Mullinahone. Between them
they have been on the end of four County final
defeats in the last decade.

Neither panel will want to add to that tally today.

1992 Toomevara 0-12, Thurles Sarsfields 1-6 (after a replay)

Toomevara went into the replay with an increased confidence in their ability and they expressed that confidence in a much improved display. Yet Sarsfields had a point to spare at the interval in a scoreline of 1-4 to 0-6, their goal a fortuitous one by Connie Maher from a meiee in the front of the goal. In the second half Toomevara's superiority became more pronounced but they were never able to pull out of the danger zone chiefly due to a tenacious defence by the Thurles backline, especially Michael Maher, Seamus O'Shea and Seamus Maher (RIP), until he retired with an injury. In fact many believed that performance of the veteran. Michael Maher, deserved the Man of the Match award.

But there were sterling performances at the other end of the field also and as the game wore on we saw some superb defending by Declan O'Meara, George Friend and Man of the Match, Philip Shanahan, who was just half the age of the leading contender from the opposite side. The quality of the Toomevara defence can be seen in the paucity of Sarsfields' scores in the second half, a mere two points. The last ten minutes saw trojan efforts on both sides to gain the verdict and the excitement was intense up to final whistle, with only a puck of a ball between the sides, Toomevara 0-12, Thurles Sarsfields 1-6.

1997 Clonoulty-Rossmore 0-17, Mullinahone 1-12

The county final on November 2 was unique in a number of ways. Never before had there been a south-west contest at this level. It was Mullinahone's first time to appear and it brought to twelve the number of appearances by south teams in county senior finals. It was thirty years since a south team won the final. Mullinahone were slight favourites on the basis of their displays in the quarter – and semi-finals and Clonoulty-Rossmore's fortuitous win. Over 17,000 attended, the biggest number at a county final since the fifties.

On a murky day in greasy conditions, there was no appreciable wind to interfere with the game. The sides were level on six occasions in the first half but by half-time Clonoulty-Rossmore were in front by ten points to seven, the difference between the sides reflected in the number of wides, three to the West, nine to the South. The West men remained in front until Brian O'Meara's goal brought the sides level and there was all to play for in the final ten minutes. Bonny Kennedy gave Clonoulty-Rossmore a two point cushion during this period and with about three minutes to go, Mullinahone got a thirty yard free. Leahy blasted for goal but it was saved. He got a second chance and it came off the post, leaving the advantage to Clonoulty-Rossmore and victory by 0-17 to 1-12.

2000 Toomevara 2-10, Thurles Sarsfields 0-11

An attendance of 8,500 at Semple Stadium on October 15 were treated to a game which fell far short of expectations. Toomevara opened the scoring with a point but Thurles had a great chance of a goal in the seventh minute. Three minutes later John O'Brien scored a goal for Toomevara from a pass from his brother, Paddy. At the end of the first quarter Toomevara were ahead by 1-3 to 0-2. They continued to dominate the second quarter and were in front by 1-6 to 0-2 after twenty-two minutes. Sarsfields were doing a lot of attacking but getting nowhere against a superb Toomevara defence, especially the inner line of George Frend, Rory Brislane and Brendan Dunne. However, in the remaining minutes they came more into the game, scoring three points to one from Toomevara, to leave the half-time score 1-7 to 0-5.

The score did not adequately reflect Toomevara's superiority. They were playing the better hurling, making the more effective moves. They were very good at touching the ball away from their opponents, advancing it twenty or third yards with deft touches, when they couldn't get in a full stroke. Overall, they were the more skillful combination.

Whereas the first half was incident free, the second half saw no less than three players get red cards.

Whereas the game was niggling in spots, the sendingoff offences were isolated incidents.

Sarsfields did not continue their revival in the second half. John O'Brien almost had a Toomevara goal in the third minute but was foiled by an alert Ciaran Carroll. Three minutes later O'Brien scored on his second chance to put Toomevara 2-7 to 0-6 in front. The next ten minutes were scrappy as three players got their marching orders. Sarsfields came more into the game and began to run at the Toomevara backs. With five minutes to go they had reduced the deficit to four points. Try as they might they couldn't get the goal they required. During these final minutes Paddy O'Brien scored a point to give Toomevara their 2-10 to 0-11 victory.

2001 Toomevara 1-22, Thurles Sarsfields 1-13

It was a repeat of the previous year's, when Thurles Sarsfields had frozen on the day. It was hoped the experience would stand to them and their performance up to the final appeared to suggest they were playing with a confidence that would stand to them against Toomevara. Up to the interval they seemed on target for their first victory since 1974. The majority of the fine crowd of over 12,000 spectators seemed to be on their side. The score stood at 0-8 to 0-7 in favour of Toomevara, who had enjoyed the advantage of the breeze in the first half.

However, any conjecture of Sarsfields' chances wasn't long becoming irrelevant. Within ten minutes the postmortems were being prepared. Whereas all the Toomevara side contributed to Sarsfields' demise, the contribution of John O'Brien has to be singled out. Unable to get going in the first half, having two wides to his credit, he suddenly unleashed a performance and was a lethal weapon against which the challengers had no answer. He bagged 1-5 from play and was a terror to the opposing backs anytime he got the ball. Six other Toomevara players scored and this was probably the main difference between the sides. No less than 1-8 of Sarsfields' scores came from placed balls. Only six points of Toomevara's much bigger score came from the same source. Long before the final whistle sounded, the game was over and the crowd were leaving.

The frustration that Sarsfields felt was reflected in the play. Long before the end the team had lost all their structure. The skill levels, the speed and the passing movements they had revealed with such brilliance against Cappawhite were nowhere to be seen. In contrast Toomevara were everywhere. Wherever a ball broke there was a Toom man to collect and clear. Any Sarsfields forward who got possession was harried and hassled by two or even three opponents and was never given an opportunity to express himself. For Sarsfields it was a bitter end to a championship, which promised so much. For Toomevara, it was an incredible performance and one is left amazed at how hungry, committed, determined and focused a team with so many victories under its belt can be. One has to wish them well in the club championship. Look at the videos of the '91 Munster Final replay; the '91 All-Ireland; the '93 Munster Final; the '94 League Final; the 2000 Munster Championship games against Waterford and Clare... just for starters! Consider John's role in guiding Mullinahone into their first County Final in 1997, only to lose by 2 points.

See the eulogies that have Been written about Leahy after numerous big games. Recall Diarmuid Flynn's piece in *The Examiner* when he stated that if he were selecting a team of the best contemporary hurlers, John Leahy would be the first player he would pick.

15 years great service surely deserves recognition. In the words of his former manager Babs Keating, John is a "tremendous player with great courage and

strength, who did everything for the team". Has there ever been a louder ovation to greet a player, than when Leahy was introduced against Clare in 2001?

In Mullinahone, where football was king, Leaky has inspired and tutored a fine crop of players in Brian O'Meara, the Currans, the Kellys, Eddie Carey, Pat Croke, etc. When John eventually retires he will be happy in the knowledge that Mullinahone is a powerhouse in Tipp hurling.

During the 80's, 90's, and now into the new century, he has enthralled and delighted spectators with his charismatic displays. Picture for a moment the hand going skywards to catch the dropping ball, the frisson of excitement as he bursts through the opposition, and the skilful long-striking which produced so many wonderful scores.

John has produced a legacy and litany of performances which will always endure in the memory of those privileged to have witnessed such prodigious skill and talent.

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DR CROSS

Dr T W Croke, (1823-1902) by Seamus J. King

r Croke, the Cork-born, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly, might never have been the first Patron of the GAA.

When Michael Cusack began to lay plans for the foundation of the Gaelic Athletic Association, he saw the need for support from leaders of Church and State. His original choice was Dr Patrick Duggan, the Bishop of Clonfert.

When he was approached, he was seventy-one years of age, in rather poor health and had already offered his resignation to the Pope. He declined the request and advised that Dr Croke, "a fine Gael, young vigorous and energetic", would be a good choice as patron of the new body. And so, Cusack came to Thurles and the rest is history.

Dr Croke was a fine choice and he took his new post seriously. Soon after receiving the request he wrote a long letter explaining why he supported the GAA, a document that so comprehensively made the case for the GAA that it has ever since been regarded as the Charter or Manifesto of the Association.

From his earliest youth Thomas William Croke showed himself a lover of all things Irish. He excelled in sport, especially handball, which he played into adult life. When he was first president of St. Colman's College, Fermoy, he was instrumental in the erection of two handball alleys at the college.

Born in 1823 at Castlecor he was educated locally until he was sixteen, when he went to the Irish College in Paris as a student for the priesthood for six years. Afterwards he went to the Irish College in Rome, where he was ordained in 1847. Later the same year he was awarded a Doctor of Divinity degree and returned to Ireland to a teaching post in St Patrick's College, Carlow and, a year later, Professor of Dogmatic Theology in the Irish College Paris.

His pastoral ministry in the Cloyne Diocese began in 1849 and continued until 1870, with the exception of the years 1858-1870, when he was first president of St. Colman,s College. He was ordained Bishop of Auckland in 1870 and appointed Archbishop of Cashel and Emly in 1875, where he remained until his death in 1902.

Dr Croke was a commanding figure, physically and intellectually, a national figure as well as a leader of the Irish hierarchy. He was to the fore in helping the great
national struggle for land reform. In one speech in 1850 he used the language of the future Sinn Fein: "We must not flatter ourselves that we can succeed in this or any other national struggle, unless we place the

hopes of our deliverance in ourselves alone".

When he gave his support to Michael Davitt and the leaders of the Land League, he reserved his special praise for CS Parnell, and publicly declared: "I believe Mr Pamell to be one of the greatest benefactors of the Irish people. He has brought a nation of

slaves to assume the part and bearing and language

of freemen".

Another aspect of the individual was his generosity. Endowed with considerable family means, Archbishop Croke was a ready and exceptionally generous benefactor to a multiplicity of deserving diocesan, national and charitable causes. The poor, the evicted, church buildings and deserving national causes were all frequent beneficiaries of his extraordinary generosity.

Dr Croke was also a tremendous worker. A prolific letter writer, he peppered the papers of the day with comment and opinion on a wide range of topics. He helped the infant GAA either with generous grants or by his own presence at GAA sports meetings or matches. He was in demand as a public speaker. He performed the opening ceremonies of a huge number of newchurches. He had a deserved reputation for pastoral and administrative ability.

He was a truly outstanding figure in the Ireland of his day and he remained so right up to the end of his life, maintaining that he would "labour as the earnest advocate of national liberty all the world over; a friend of every righteous cause and the sworn enemy of oppression and tyranny". He was, indeed, a great Irishman, a great archbishop and the perfect choice as first patron of the Gaelic Athletic Association.

Then Derry Gowan back in 1969 put forward the innovative idea of having some social activities run by GAA during winter months, the motion was passed at Congress. Scór was born and competitions started in 1970/71.

We had many wonderful nights of music song and dance in the intervening years. But with so many field activities now ongoing in all categories, club committees find it hard to cope with all the pressures, so at present Scór is losing out in some parishes.

At our recent AGM Donie Shanahan Leas Cathaoirleach, representing Con Hogan, assured us that Con and Donie will support our endeavours for Scór in every way possible. Likewise Billy Barrett South Chairman, who informed us that Scór in the South lost a very committed secretary Eileen Boland, due to personal commitments. She will be hard to replace.

Gerry Ring from West, a stalwart in Scór in the early years, will do his utmost to revive interest again in his division. So now gentlemen actions speak louder than words, hopefully we may now look forward to more clubs participating in the years ahead.

We have had clubs over the years competing in County Finals regularly, but never winning, eg. Newcastle Set, eventually their luck turned, and they went on to win an All-Ireland. Last year (2001/2002 season) Shannon Rovers, dormant for years, came to Ardcroney for the North Final. Their representative Siobhán Weafer in the Solo Song competition went on to win the All-Ireland in Killarney in April.

We had a very enjoyable celebratory party in Elsie Hogan's hostelry, Ballinderry, in September – delayed because Siobhán went on tour with Lord of the Dance in Germany.

She was returning for a second term in early October, a lovely personality, a good ambassadress for our Irish culture in Europe. We wish Siobhán much luck in her career.

You don't have to be an athlete to represent your parish – perhaps you play music, sing, dance or recite. While winning a competition is a bonus, it is the participation that is important. Perhaps we have a Louise Morrissey, Domnic Kirwan or Eamon McCann, who started their careers in Scór, hiding out in the parish and only need encouragement from some Scór official to come forward.


