In three of the last four county finals. teams from the North Division, anemely, Killadangan, Burgess and now Ballina, have been deserving contestants and could not have gone any closer without collecting the laurels. To the people in all of those clubs who are responsible for this very welcome change, we thank you sincerely. Your trojan efforts, which unquestionably will be culminated on a victorious platform, must be very near at hand

The recent death of Paddy Saunders and his noble affinity to both Cahir Slashers and Tipperary deserve to be remembered on this County Final day.

ne hundred years ago in 1900 the Gaelic Athletic Association was in its infancy. The organisation was greatly affected by conditions prevailing the time. Transport communications were far from what they are in Millennium year 2000. Travel was by rail and horse drawn vehicles only and communication was by letter - far removed from today's world telephone, television and internet.

The running of the championships was delayed, games were being played in the following year or the year after. Games sometimes did not take place due to one team not turning up.

Tipperary had its own particular problems in that year. The County Board was divided and resulted in a new County Board being elected early in 1901. This Board had as its Chairman. Dick Cummins (Fethard), whose son is still active in administration. It responsibility for running 2 year's championships. The records show that Clonmel Shamrocks won the County Football Championship of 1900 beating

Grangemockler,
Mullinahone and Clonmel
Commercials in the final. Two-mileborris won the hurling championship
beating Ballytarsna, Kilbarron and
Moycarkey.

In that era the County Champions represented the county in the Munster and All-Ireland series and both the hurling and the football were played on the same day at the same venue.

Tipperary beat Cork at Dungarvan in the first rounds:

Hurling – Tipperary 0-12, Cork 0-9 Football – Tipperary (Clonmel Shamrocks) 0-3, Cork (Fermoy) 0-1.

In the semi-finals Tipperary beat Clare in hurling 6-11 to 1-6 and Limerick (Commercials) in football 2-4 to 1-1.

In the finals Tipperary defeated Kerry

(Kilmoyley) in hurling 6-11 to 1-9 and Kerry (Luane Rangers) in football 1-14 to 1-5.

In the All-Ireland semi-finals Tipperary beat Kilkenny (Mooncoin) 14 points to 1-8 in hurling. In football Tipperary (Clonmel Shamrocks) lost to Kilkenny (Slate Quarries) but an objection was sustained and Tipperary awarded the game. These games were played at Deerpark, Carrick-on-Suir.

In the All-Ireland home finals played at Terenure Tipperary beat Galway 6-13 to 1-5 in hurling and 2-17 to 1 point in football.

In the All-Ireland finals Tipperary beat London Irish 2-5 to 6 points in hurling and 3-7 to 2 points in football.

Sweeney. by Hugh Kennedy The Clonmel Shamrocks team brought Tipperary its third senior football All-Ireland and Two-mile-borris won its sixth hurling All-Ireland with those successes. Tipperary won the double in 1895 and a second time in 1900, a feat achieved by Cork only in 1990. The record stood for ninety years and marks a milestone in Tipperary history. Only one other All-Ireland senior football title came in 1920 and now in Millennium Year 2000 we have a proud tradition to uphold but a mountain to climb to achieve it.

Moyle Rovers are the team to beat. In recent times they have been the standard bearers in Tipperary. They came within a hare's breath of winning the Munster club championship and play football with a flair which is unrivalled in the county. Their side is littered with intercounty stars and the South champions will be very hard to beat indeed.

Loughmore/Castleiney on other hand are a more industrious side who firmly believe in the work ethic. They have a fighting spirit which is second to none and they will certainly be working hard right to the very end of the game. A chance to display true form

There were so many unsatisfactory aspects to last Sunday's drawn senior hurling semi-final, that perhaps a draw was the best result for everybody.

Despite the intensity of the general effort and the excellence of some individuals, the game suffered primarily because of awful weather and to a lesser extent from the numerous stoppages, which led to over twelve minutes additional time being allowed by the referee. The amazing conclusion, which had Cappawhite looking for the equaliser, proved to all and sundry, that dominance around the pitch and territorial control are worthless, unless the scoreboard reflects such supremacy.

Yet it was really Sarsfields' resurrection which impressed people. For long periods of the first half they were outhurled both in skill terms and in the physical stakes and their most prominent player was goalkeeper Ciarán Carroll! Indeed but for his vigilance the contest would have been over by half time. In truth, Cappawhite's half time lead was unflattering to their defensive and creative efforts.

Some shrewd Thurles switches for the second half, particularly the introduction of Connie Maher to challenge the previously rampant Thomas Costello and the recasting of the midfield, paid rich if slow dividends.

The instant replay gives teams little time to reflect negatively on their efforts. They will both start today believing that a final place can still be claimed. They will also welcome a second opportunity to display their true form and if the weather is more agreeable, we could well enjoy the game of the championship to date.

Despite the closeness of scoring in semi-finals over the past decade – many of which were decided by one score – Sunday's draw was the first in a semi-final since 1992, when co-incidentally Sarsfields drew with Nenagh Éire Óg (1-12 each), before winning the replay a week later in Cloughjordan, on a 2-15 to 2-6 scoreline.

"The Blues' amazingly drew the Co. Final with Toomevara, before losing out narrowly in the replay. That's as close as they have been to county honours in recent years. Their last victory was in

Cappawhite, who don't enjoy the record titles haul held by their rivals, have gone thirteen years since their only county success – 1-17 to 2-13 for Loughmore-Castleiney. Cappa qualified for that decider by virtue of a quarter-final victory over Roscrea 1-20 to 1-14 and the well recounted semi-final success against Sarsfields 2-15 to 1-14. Scores of that magnitude would certainly win this replay!

Those were far away glory days but the February 2000 victory, in the 1999 U-21 'A' county final has given the club a great lift and plenty of youthful ability has joined the wily and experienced veterans.

Sarsfields' form this season (guided by home grown management!) has been watched with considerable anticipation, by keen students of the game. Their downside is probably a lack of physique, but there are ways of working around that, most obviously by playing to their own strengths.

Eugene O'Neill's influence on the Cappa effort is all you would expect from a captain, but he can't be everywhere and more realistic expectations should exist for him.

Brendan Carroll was a more influential player in the second half and many people expect him to start at midfield today.

It's difficult to nominate winners, because last week's evidence will probably prove irrelevant and there are so many players with so much to prove. Maybe Cappawhite will take their chances this time.

MEDIA WATCH

The most comprehensive report of last Sunday's drawn game, in a National Newspaper, was provided by the *Irish Examiner*. Reporter Damien Irwin analysed the contest in these terms:

"If Cappawhite had been beaten they would have been kicking themselves playing a brand of exciting attacking hurling they dominated the opening half of this game and should have led by more than 10 points to four at the interval. The concession of a soft goal on 47 minutes when their goalkeeper Declan Costelloe allowed a weak shot from Matthew O'Dowd to creep over the line clearly threw them. And only O'Neill's late free saved them from what would have been an ill-deserved defeat. For Thurles Sars, a return to the glory days of decades ago looked unlikely up to that goal as they were knocked out of their stride by the intensity of the Cappawhite challenge and their much vaunted attack was finding scores extremely difficult to come by. In the end, however, it was the contribution of Eugene O'Neill first at centrefield and then at full-forward and finally at centre-back that Cappawhite will thank most for their survival'

* Damien captained the East Cork Under-16 team which lost to mid-Clare in the 1985 Munster Final. He played at full back on the Cork minor team which won the Munster title in 1986 (beating Tipp in a replay) and was a member of the Cork U-21 team which won the Munster and All-Ireland titles in 1988. Damien hails from Killeagh.



Béal an Átha ... a brief juvenile history

Since Ballina Juvenile club was formed in 1982, the club has been putting in tremendous efforts at Juvenile level. In the early days Ballina were joined with Ballinahinch from under-12 to under-21. This combination produced many victories in various grades. This combination split at Minor level in 1992 and Ballina won a North Tipperary Minor 'B' hurling final that year. Indeed county honours were achieved with victory over Loughmore-Castleiney in the football final but Newcastle denied the club of a county minor double when they beat us in the hurling decider.

Ballina have played six games to reach today's final. In the North championship they defeated Newport & Nenagh Éire Óg, but suffered defeat at the hands of Burgess in the League section. These results put Ballina into the semi-final where they beat Burgess in a low scoring game. In the North final Ballina recorded a comfortable victory over Inane Rovers. This was followed by county semi-final success over J.K. Brackens.

Ballina also won this year's North Tipperary Minor hurling championship, beating Toomevara in the final, but were recently beaten by Thurles Sarsfields in the county semi-final.

A large number of today's panel have already played in a county football final this year. Ballina were beaten in the county under-21 'B' football final by Killenaule. The side beat Upperchurch-Drombane in the semi-final and Newport in the North final.

Ballina have also won the North under-21 'B' hurling title this year, when they defeated Templederry Kenyons in the final. However, Gortnahoe-Glengoole beat Ballina in the county semi-final.

Ballina will have had a chance to revenge that defeat yesterday, when they played Gortnahoe in the county under-14 'B' hurling final.

In what has been a very successful year for the club, Ballina have reached North finals in Intermediate Hurling League, Junior 'B' Hurling Championship and under-14 'a' Football Championship Final. They are also involved at the quarter-final stage of the North Junior 'A' Football championship.

PLAYER OF THE PAST

Profile - Pat Joe Stapleton

hen Castleiney-Loughmore defeated hot favourites Clonmel Shamrocks by 1-8 to 0-2 to win the 1940 county final Pat Joe Stapleton played at centre-back. That such a pivotal rôle was entrusted to him at eighteen years of age is an indication of the determination and resolve, which characterised his play with both club and county.

The team which won the 1940 final and of which Micheál Ryan is the only other surviving member was: Liam Lynch; Jimmy Ryan; Tom Grimes; Donal McGrath; Sean Lynch; Pat Joe Stapleton; Dan Bergin; Mick Grimes; Luke Nolan; Pat Ryan; Ned Quinn; Pat Kavanagh; Micheál Ryan; Jim Ryan; Jack Bohan.

Nothing would please Pat Joe more than to see his club team, who are equally as unfancied as they were sixty years ago, upset the odds and bring an eleventh county title to the parish.

When Castleiney-Loughmore recorded their second county championship success of the decade, defeating Clonmel Commercials by 3-8 to 2-6 in 1946, Pat Joe lined out in what by then had become his customary full back position. The team on that occasion was: Liam Lynch; Richard Morris; Pat Joe Stapleton; Donal McGrath; Jimmy Ryan; Sean Lynch; Mick Grimes; Sean Ryan; Denis Ryan; Micheál Ryan; Billy Treacy; Pat Ryan; Billy Joe Ryan; Pat Kavanagh; Mick McGrath.

During his inter-county career Pat Joe lined out at full back in three consecutive Munster senior football semifinals against Cork – 1947, '48 and '49 – each of which Tipperary lost by four points.

During the seventies and eighties Pat Joe's sons Paddy, Jerry and Eddie carried on the family tradition, initiated by Pat Joe. All three played on the teams that brought six county senior football titles to the parish between 1973 and 1992. They have also represented Tipperary in all grades of football. A third generation of Stapletons are presently continuing the proud tradition; his grandson David having won an All-Ireland U-21 medal with Limerick a few weeks ago.

Still hale and hearty, sixty years on from his first memorable county final Pat Joe, who must surely be rated as one of the club's best ever defenders, looks set to match the longevity enjoyed by his life-long friend and neighbour in Laha, the late Bill Ryan.
