

### MONEYGALL

Although not many hurling titles have found their way to the parish, the club has always been active and enthusiastic. Hurling was very popular in the parish in the "ditch to ditch" days long before the Association was established. The most famous organised team in the early days of the GAA was known as the "Honeymounts" who won a reputation for tough, uncompromising play. One member of this team, James Nolan of Summerhill, was chosen on the All-Ireland team that toured the U.S. in 1887 in the famous American Invasion.

The "Honeymounts" were organised by Thomas Corcoran of Honeymount who was elected Treasurer of Tipperary County Board in 1888, and later on was Chairman of North Tipperary Co. Council.

One of the best periods of the club was from 1912 to 1918 when amalgamated with Clonakenny they were in three North Tipperary senior finals, but were unsuccessful in each.

In 1915, after defeating Toomevara in the semi-final, they lost to Nenagh in the final, 3-3 to 3-2.

In the 1916 final, they went under to Toomevara in Borrisokane, 3-1 to 1-2.

In 1917, after overcoming De Wets in the semi-final, they were due to play Toomevara again in the final, but failing to turn up in Arderoney, the championship was awarded to the Greyhounds.

A significant change occurred in 1919 when Moneygall amalgamated with Toomevara for senior hurling, and this combination, which won many titles, lasted until the parish rule brought it to an end in 1935. During this period, Moneygall won the junior title on two occasions, defeating Kilruane in the 1919 final, and Borrisokane in 1929.

Regraded intermediate during the forties, Moneygall reached the final of that grade five times in the decade, winning out in 1943 and 1949, and took the county title in the latter year. The intermediate title was won again in 1962.

The senior team has had mixed fortunes and many disappointments over the past twenty-five years. Beaten by Roscrea in the divisional finals of 1967 and 1970 and by Borris-Ileigh in the county semi-final of 1972, their perseverence and dedication were eventually rewarded this year in winning the North Division title for the first time.

This is Moneygall's first appearance in the county senior hurling final.

Though the present club dates back to the thirties, it is only their third appearance in the county senior hurling final, and they have yet to win the Dan Breen Cup, having lost in '73 to Roscrea, and to Sarsfields in '59 and '44.

However, the dedication of club officials to juveniles over the years is now paying off handsomely, and successes at this level have paved the way for today's achievement. The club has held the county under 21 hurling crown for the past two years, and are still in contention for the championship this year.

Of course their biggest achievement to-date was their victory in the county senior football final some weeks ago, and fourteen of that selection are seeking hurling medals today.

Kilruane have set all other clubs in the county an example which, if followed, can only bring about a vast improvement in the standard of hurling in Tipperary, and who will say that this is not needed at the present time.

The club's predecessors in the Cloughjordan area, Lahorna De Wets won the county senior hurling title in 1902 by defeating Carrick 7-10 to 1-2, and it is interesting to note the recurrence of names of people who took part in that victory, in today's line out.


