An Fainne Nua - A Badge of Loyalty

"An Fáinne Núa is not a testimony of competency in Irish but rather a badge of loyalty to the language. The wearer is not merely indicating that he knows some Irish; he is showing that he wants to speak whatever amount of Irish he knows on every possible occasion," said Mr. Donal O Moráin, ceannasaí, Gael-Linn, at a meeting of South Tipperary language workers in the Town Hall, Cashel.

"There would be no necessity to wear an emblem if they could presume that most people they met knew enough Irish to carry on an ordinary conversation. They could not assume that this was the position at present, in spite of the fact that the majority of those who now had virtually no Irish were, at one time or another, reasonably fluent,

They had lost their fluency because of a lack of Equent opportunities to use a modicum of Irish. The purpose of An Fainne Núa was to provide such occasions for everyone every day from now until the time when the country was truly bilingual.

"All the language organisations had come together in close co-operation to launch this project which, over the next few months, aimed to introduce An Fáinne Núa to every house in Ireland."

Mr. O Moráin predicted that this undertaking would be even more successful than last year's nation-wide "Let the Language Live" campaign,
