
#### Man of the Match

#### TOM O'HARA

(An Appreciation)

C ONVENTIONS 1991 had come and gone. The annual thought provoking report at Mid level had been accepted and acknowledged as his best ever.

An accident to Tom some time previously was only considered a minor physical drawback, and a small operation was not even spoken of as of

any major significance.

As the days and weeks passed, those of us close to the situation were beginning to worry, but when the call came on April 13th, we were dumbfounded. A sincere friend, a true Gael was called to his maker.

In a crowded Gortnahoe graveyard we stood in silent tribute as Michael Lowry's oration revealed the life story of a man who had given a lifetime to our Association.

As club secretaries, we worked together from the early fifties, Tom cycling his 20 miles to and from the meetings. However he reaped a just reward when appointed Mid Board Chairman in 1969. From there he progressed to the prestigious office as Co. Chairman for three years.

In this very demanding job he worked for his county with great enthusiasm, carrying out his duties without fear or favour, at the same time gaining the respect of Gaeldom within and outside the county.

A few years later when the vacancy arose, he was appointed Mid Tipp. Runai and from that day to his untimely death he again displayed his talents as an administrator and his desire that our games, especially hurling would develop and progress within the county.

Tom O'Hara was a man apart, an exemplary christian, a devout Catholic, a



devoted husband and father. His service to our association cannot nor will ever be repaid in words, nor would he expect it either.

Few people show any appreciation of the voluntary input which very many people put into the G.A.A., their work is taken for granted. Tom was a shining example of those dedicated men. Tom O'Hara was of the very stuff on which our Association was founded and survived. A man of dignity and sincerity, of gentle nature and generous heart, born of the brown earth, of the Tipperary he loved.

As we watch these Mid Finals here in Semple Stadium, Tom is surely looking down from his heavenly seat, hoping that his efforts down through the years to raise the standards of our games will be seen in the performances of all the players, particularly here today.

Mid Tipperary owes a debt of gratitude to the man, but all he would ask for is Tipperary's continued success and most of all under the leadership of a Mid Tipperary captain.



Moycarkey-Borris captain

When Jimmy Bergin leads out Moycarkey-Borris today he will be trying to emulate brother Jack, who last led the club to divisional honours in 1982. Jack is still to the fore in the heart of the defence while another brother Liam lines out at midfield. Jimmy, a stylish wing back is a most experienced campaigner having won Mid medals at minor level in 1983 and intermediate



at both Mid and County levels in 1985 and an U-21 medal in 1984. Jimmy was also a sub on the 1984 county championship winning team. He captained the Tipperary junior team beaten by Cork in the 1986 Munster championship.

Aged 25 years Jimmy is a butcher at Super Valu, Cashel and expects a great game against Holycross-Ballycahill on this historic occasion, the first time that those neighbouring parishes and old rivals have met in a Mid senior hurling final. Referring to his side's chances Jimmy says that they will not lose for the want of trying, dedication and committment and is most pleased with the response to training by all members of the panel.

All followers of Moycarkey-Borris hope that this evening Jimmy will step forward to receive the Leahy Cup and bring the Mid senior crown to the parish for the twentieth time.

#### Moycarkey's last Mid title win

Moycarkey-Borris last won the Mid Title nine years ago in 1982 which saw the start of a great run which was to last for a few years. In the decider played at Holycross they defeated Loughmore-Castleiney by 4-10 to 2-9. The winning team on that occasion was:

#### **Phil Dwyer**

#### (Holycross|Ballycahill) Captain

Phil Dwyer comes from a well known Holycross hurling family – the Dwyers of Whitfort. His father, Philly and his uncle, Jack, were members of the squad that brought the first senior hurling championship to the parish in 1948.

Phil won his first Mid medal when he played on the under-12 hurling team that won the Mid title in 1976. In 1982 he played at right half back



when Midland County Minor hurling championships were won for the first time in the history of the club. When Tipperary, captained by P. J. Lanigan, won the Munster Minor hurling title in 1983 Phil and Michael Fleming were members of the panel.

He holds three Mid senior medals – 1985, 1989 and 1990. His brother, Tom, played in the 1989 and 1990 finals and both played in last years county final win over Cashel.

Today the brothers are hoping for a victory that would bring the Leahy Cup to the parish for the third year in a row.

# HOLYCROSS-BALLYCAHILL



# T HAS come as a surprise to us to learn that until today Holycross/Ballycahill have never met Moycarkey/Borris in a Senior Mid Final. Probably the best remembered game is the 1948 Mid semi-final played in Gaile

#### Holycross/ Ballycahill – a proud tradition

when Holycross were very lucky to defeat Moycarkey on the score 4-1 to 1-7. Moycarkey followers have very unhappy memories of this game as they claim that the referee played an unprecedented amount of injury time.

Holycross followers are naturally very reticient on the subject but it must be admitted that the Holycross winning scores came well after the end of normal time. However, Holycross survived, went on to win the County Championship and, with Pat Stakelum as captain, brought All-Ireland honours to the county in 1949.

The teams that played in that tough, uncompromising game lined out as follows:

Holycross/Ballycahill: M. Ferncombe; Francis Bannon, Jimmy Kennedy, Mick Stakelum; John Doyle, Danny O'Gorman, John Stakelum, Pat Stakelum, Francis Maher (capt); Bob Stakelum, Philip Maher, John Byrne; Jack Dwyer, Ned O'Gorman, Jim Ryan (A).

Moycarkey/Borris: John O'Grady; Timmy Ryan, Tom Hayes, Jim Power; John Mockler, Johnny Ryan, Matty Bannon; Willie Ryan, Jimmy O'Grady; Matt Ryan, M. Hayes, Larry Ryan; Paddy Ryan (Sweeper), Tom O'Keeffe, B. Power.

Patsy Ryan came on as a sub. for Holycross and J. Hassett replaced Jimmy O'Grady on the Moycarkey side.

During the 'Thirties Holycross and Moycarkey often clashed in Junior Championship games. Moycarkey and Sarsfields were the kingpins of hurling in that era and between them won every county senior championship from 1932 until 1941. At that time it appeared that man would walk on the moon before Holycross won any kind of a title. In 1934 Holycross/Ballycahill had their only win of the decade when they defeated Moycarkey Juniors in a replay at Moyne on the score 4-1 to 2-3.

The Holycross fifteen on that occasion was: John Tynan, Pakie Tynan, Denis Tynan, Jimmy Slattery, Paddy McGlynn, Denis O'Gorman, Denis Dunne, Jimmy O'Meara (now Turtulla), Pakie Ryan (Dispensary), Tom McGrath, Mick McGrath, Pakie Hennessy, Willie Dwan, Tom Flanagan and Mick Ferncombe.

For the 1935 game with Moycarkey, Michael Tuohy, John Ryan (Clareen), Danny O'Gorman, Neddy O'Dwyer, William Connolly and Jack Dunne came on to the Holycross team

but Moycarkey had an easy win on the score 5-7 to 3-1.

In 1936 Moycarkey again won by 3-4 to 2-1 despite the presence of newcomers Patrick O'Dwyer, Bill Dunne and Jimmy Bannon.

The teams for the 1937 clash of the sides are not available but Moycarkey again triumphed by 3-3 to 0-3. Among the cynics Holycross-Ballycahill was called "the Duffy's Circus" team – one day and one day only!

By winning the County Junior title in 1941 Holycross/Ballycahill qualified for Senior status but did not reach a Mid Senior final until an all-star Sarsfields team had an easy win on the score 7-7 to 2-2.

Holycross/Ballycahill players that day were: Jack Gleeson (goal), Dinny O'Gorman, Danny O'Gorman, Ned O'Gorman, Patrick O'Dwyer (capt.), John Stakelum (P), Dan O'Dwyer, Mick Stakelum, Bob Stakelum (P), Jack Cormack, Patsy Ryan, Jim Duggan, Francis Maher, Philip Maher, Jack Dwyer.

Sarsfields lined out as follows: Gerry Doyle, John Maguire, Ger Cornally, Jack Ryan, Tommy Doyle, John Maher, Tom Mason, Mick Murphy, Micheál Maher, Micky Byrne, Jack Dwyer, Eddie Gleeson, Tommy Ryan, John Delahunty, Mikie Doyle.

The first Senior clash between Holycross/Ballycahill and Moycarkey took place in Thurles Sportsfield on June 15th, 1947, when Holycross surprised even their most hopeful supporters by defeating Moycarkey 7-5 to 1-4 and qualified for the Mid Final against Sarsfields. Sarsfields had been County Champions for the previous three years and had at least twelve players with inter-county experience in their side while Holycross had not a single inter-county player.

The result was a sensation as Holycross grimly held on to a one-point lead to win on the score 4-2 to 2-7. "Winter Green", who was the *Star's* equivalent of "Cúlbáire" at that time, went to report on the South final.

Holycross fell to Carrick Swans in the County Semi-final but as the first ever Mid winning team from the parish their names should be recorded: Jack Gleeson; Francis Bannon, Jimmy Kennedy, John Stakelum; John Doyle, Danny O'Gorman, Patsy Ryan; Francis Maher, Pat Stakelum; Bob Stakelum, Philip Maher, John Byrne; Jack Dwyer, Ned O'Gorman, Jim Ryan (A)., Jack Pollard came on as a sub. when Francis Bannon was injured.

Holycross/Ballycahill retained the Mid title when they defeated Boherlahan in the 1948 final. Mikie Ferncombe and Mick Stakelum replaced Jack Gleeson and Patsy Ryan from the 1947 team.

Our next Mid final was against Sarsfields in 1950 when Sarsfields revenged the 1947 defeat on the score 3-8 to 0-8.

1951 saw Holycross and Sarsfields again in opposition. Holycross looked certain winners when they led by four points at the end of normal time but a goal and a point from frees by Flor Coffey levelled the scores. Sarsfields were on top for most of the replay and with a few minutes remaining led by 1-5 to 1-1. Pat Stakelum scored a goal and a point from play to send the game into extra time. Holycross dominated by adding 1-3 to their total while Sarsfields failed to score.

Holycross/Ballycahlll: Francis Bannon; John Stakelum, Jimmy Kennedy, Michael Maher; John Doyle, Danny O'Gorman, Francis Maher; Pat Stakelum, Jim Ryan; Bob Stakelum, John Byrne, Claus de Bhial; Jack Dwyer, E. O'Gorman, Philip Maher. It was to be the last time that Holycross defeated Sarsfields in a senior championship game until 1977.

Sarsfields won the 1952 Mid Final played on June 15 by defeating Holycross by 3-12 to 2-7. The 1954 Mid final was not played. Holycross proposed that the game be played in Templemore, Sarsfields objected as they claimed Holycross club had been offered money by the Templemore Sportsfield Committee if they agreed to that venue. After two stormy Mid Board meetings Sarsfields withdrew from the championship, giving Holycross a walk-over. It must be said that we never got the money from Templemore.

The 1955 Mid Final in Gaile remains a bitter memory. Sarsfields had three goals scored before Holycross had settled down but by half-time Holycross had reduced their lead to two points – 3-5 to 3-3. Ten minutes into the second half John Doyle was ordered off. It is admitted that he sinned but he received a lot of provocation. Sarsfields weathered a blitz by the fourteen Holycross men to run out winners on the score 3-10 to 3-5.

That defeat marked the end of a great era for Holycross/Ballycahill. Three county titles and four Mid Championships in an eight-year period was not bad for a club that had often been regarded as the Cinderella of Mid Tipperary hurling.

We lost Mid Finals to Sarsfields in 1957, 1959, 1960 and 1964 and were decisively defeated in the 1964 County Final on the score 5-14 to 1-4. Is it any wonder that we were sick of the blue and white colours.

When Moyne-Templetuohy defeated Sarsfields in the 1966 Mid semi-final the result was greeted with joy in Holycross and Ballycahill especially as we had qualified for the Mid Final.

The youth element is supplied by Andrew Bourke, Eamonn Donnelly, John Corcoran, Ken Ralph, John O'Keeffe, Billy Lanigan, Declan Hogan and Tom Ryan.

This misture has bonded together a team of great potential and formidable opponents for any side. This vast wealth of talent and experience should be just the right ingredients to regain glories from the recent past.

#### **BILL RYAN**

## (Laha) An Appreciation

THE Mid division lost one of its greatest supporters last August with the death of Bill Ryan, Laha, Castleiney, the last survivor of the Tipperary Bloody Sunday team.

Though Bill was in his 97th year, he retained his enthusiasm for Gaelic games right to the end and was, at the time of his death, President of the Loughmore-Castleiney Club,

and up to recently, when ill-health slowed him down, a staunch supporter of the club at their many games.



Bill's love of Gaelic games stemmed from a lifetime association with the games. He was an accomplished footballer and played with the county from 1914 to 1926. He won a senior All-Ireland medal playing at right half-back on the team which beat Dublin in the 1920 final, a game not decided until 1922.

He was on the losing Tipperary team to Wexford in the 1918 All-Ireland final and he won a third Munster senior medal in 1922 when Tipp beat Limerick.

At club level Bill played football with his native Castleiney, and also with Templetuohy and Templemore, winning championships with all of them, and county honours with Castleiney in 1914 and Templemore in 1925. He was no mean hurler either, and won championships with Castleiney in 1923, '25 and '28.

On his retirement, Bill continued to follow the games with an avid interest and was particularly delighted at the success of Loughmore-Castleiney hurlers in the 'Eighties. He is well remembered as a member of the Tipperary team that was playing Dublin in Croke Park on November 20th, 1920, when Black and Tans opened fire on the attendance as a reprisal, killing among 14 people, Bill's team-mate, Mick Hogan of Grangemockler.

In a tribute at his funeral, Tommy Barrett, county secretary, said that Bill epitomised the real spirit that is synonymous with Tipperary. He was proud of his parish, his club and his county. Bill's pride in them reflected itself in his delight in recalling games, people and events, and his facility in this regard made him a delightful companion.

A gentle, kindly man, Bill richly deserved the many tributes paid by followers of the games not only in Tippeary, but much further afield. His passing leaves a void in the Mid division that will not easily be filled.

30 years ago recalled

#### Mid Senior Hurling Final

Thurles Sarsfields 4-4 Moycarkey-Borris 1-7

A LTHOUGH they led by two points at half-time, Moycark-ey-Borris failed to dethrone Thurles Sarsfields in the Mid Tipperary senior hurling final at Templemore on Sunday and lost to a depleted Thurles team by a two goal margin. In winning the championship for the seventh successive year, Sarsfields maintained a great winning sequence that is unlikely to be equalled by any other club for many years to come.

The final, which attracted a fair attendance, was poor. Interest was maintained until near the end due to the closeness of the scoring and the possibility of an upset. Otherwise, however, the game had little to offer. Forwards on both sides were unimpressive, and in the first half there was only one point from play, Moycarkey's Billy Ryan being the scorer.

#### SARSFIELDS MINUS FIVE

On Sunday, Sarsfields looked far from being world-beaters. In fact they seemed a very ordinary team for the greater part of the hour, but there was considerably more merit attached to their victory than the scoreline indicates for the champions had to line out without five regulars.

Two of these, Tony Wall and Jimmy Doyle, both on the injured list, were an immense loss, but the absence of Larry Keane (ill), Bobby Mockler (injured) and Michael McElgunn (unfit) was felt too. There can be no doubt but that Doyle and Keane were sorely missed from the attack and had they been available Sarsfields would probably have won by a bigger margin. As it was the forwards never seemed to settle down without them.

#### **MOYCARKEY WEAK IN FORWARDS**

It is difficult to assess the merits of Moycarkey's performance. Some people considered that they would not be a match even for a weakened Sarsfield's team, and were surprised that they ran the champions so close. Moycarkey supporters, however, were disappointed. This was a game which Moycarkey went out to win, and they might have succeeded too had they but one forward to offer county minor Billy Ryan some worthwhile assistance.

Ryan gave Meycarkey an early lead when he pointed a free, but Sarsfields replied when Paddy Doyle, also from a free, smacked the ball past a crowded goal-line for a shock goal. The champions went on to lead 1-2 to 0-3 after 22 minutes, but shortly afterwards Ryan goaled from a free to regain the lead for Moycarkey, before half-time the same player added a point.

On resuming Sarsfields had the wind in their favour, but it was Moycarkey who scored first with a point from midfielder Donal Ryan. Changes were made on both teams. Billy Nolan replaced M. Shanahan on the Moycarkey line-out, and Sarsfields brought on Kevin Houlihan for Michael Dorney, moving Tim Walsh from centreforward to midfield.

#### SARSFIELDS SCORING SPREE

At this stage Moycarkey, playing into the breeze, were three points ahead, and when they had a further point by Billy Ryan after eight minutes to go still further ahead, one wondered were Sarsfields going to give up their title quietly. However, a scoring spree, which yielded 2-2 inside three minutes, rocketed the champs into the lead and they stayed in front to the end.

The first goal was from a long-range free taken by half-back Michael Murphy. The score came as a surprise, but goalkeeper John O'Grady, who made many fine saves, appeared to be blinded by the sun. Almost immediately Kevin Houlihan had another from play, and Moycarkey's lead had been wiped out. Two points from "Blackie" Keane and "Musha" Maher put Sarsfields four points ahead.

This spate of scoring was a big blow to Moycarkey's aspiring hopes, and the odds were now very2 much in favour of the champions, However, a point from a free by Billy Ryan left only a goal between the teams, and there were some hopes that Moycarkey might yet make it a close finish.

#### THE "CLINCHING" GOAL

A seven minute scoreless period followed before "Blackie" and Sean McLoughlin shared the honours in notching the goal that clinched the issue. This score came after 25 minutes, and with the result no longer in doubt some of the attendance started to move away before referee W. Sweeney sounded the final whistle.

#### SARSFIELDS' BEST

For Sarsfields, county intermediate player Ned Maher kept a good goal, and was not beaten once from play. In the half-back line, Michael Murphy hurled a grand hour on the right wing, and was very sound. Ray Reidy also played well, and was a most competent centre-half, but Noel Murphy, who completed the line, found Billy Ryan quite a handful.

At midfield it was more or less left to county minor Conor O'Dwyer to keep Sarsfields in the picture, until Tim Walsh was moved back from the attack to partner him during the second half, From then on Sarsfields fared well in the centre of the field, and it was surprising that Walsh, a Cork senior, was not moved back to partner the hard-working O'Dwyer at an earlier stage of the game.

In attack, the champions had no forward of note, and by this display it would seem that the presence of Jimmy Doyle and Larry Keane is essential to add punch up front.

Paddy Doyle, who had a sparkling game against Holycross, scored 1-2 from frees, but was held scoreless from play by John Carroll. Former goalkeeper "Blackie" Keane operated at full-forward in the first half where he met with little success. He fared much better when switched to the right corner, and had a hand in some vital scores, sharing a goal with Sean McLoughlin, who deserves credit for this effort. Substitute Kevin Houlihan was responsible for a goal.

#### PROMINENT FOR MOYCARKEY

Goalkeeper John O'Grady brought off some spectacular saves in the Moycarkey goal, while centre-half Pat Ryan, right-winger John Carroll and full-back John Ryan were about the pick of a defence that almost man for man had the better of matters with the opposing forwards.

W. Shanahan and Donal Ryan performed some useful work at midfield, but Billy Ryan was the only Moycarkey forward to score, and had all but one point of his team's total. Most of his scores came from frees, two points being from play. The full-forward line of Tom Bourke, Jim Scott and M. Shanahan made little headway against Benny Maher, Dick Callinan and Mickey Byrne. Apart from Billy Ryan, Moycarkey's only marksman was midfielded Donal Ryan. Substitutes Billy Nolan and G. Ryan did not get much chance to prove their worth.

By virtue of last Sunday's victory, Sarsfields have qualified to compete in the county championship. The rather complicated draw, gives Sarsfields a bye in the first round. In the county semi-final they are drawn against the winners of the game between South champions and North runners-up.

Moycarkey are out of the Mid Tipperary championship, but may yet qualify for the county championship, as Mid Tipperary's second representative. However, Holycross-Ballycahill have a say in this, and the two teams must play off to decide who will be Sarsfields running-mates in the county championship. The winners of the Moycarkey v Holycross game will play the West champions, St. Vincent's.

Best wieshes to Holycross teams on Sunday DURING our early years we heard about the hurling skills of Phil Cahill. There are many alive today who saw him hurl and all maintain that he was a better hurler than Christy Ring or Mick Mackey. He may not have had their strength, but for pure hurling skill, he was supreme.

# Player Of The Past... PHIL CAHILL

(Holycross | Ballycahill)

Those who saw him play tell of his bursts of speed down the wing, his ability to lift the ball when travelling at full speed and strike it over the bar without handling. It is related that on one occasion the angle was so narrow that the ball clipped both uprights on its way over the bar.

Unfortunately in that era, good hurlers were tightly marked and often received severe punishment. Phil Cahill suffered many serious injuries and unfortunately it must be said that many of them were received in club games. Greatness was not appreciated by lesser lights. Still he never flinched and came back after every injury to play magnificently for club and county.

He made his first appearance for the county when Clare was defeated in the first round of the 1923 Senior Championship, but surprisingly was not selected for the Munster Final when Tipperary lost to Limerick. He regained




his place for the 1924 championship and played in all championship games until the end of 1931. His final appearance was in 1933 when Waterford defeated Tipperary in a first round tie in Carrick-On-Suir.

During his career, he won two All-Ireland and three Munster Senior Championship medals, one National League award and four Railway Cup medals. In 1928 he was selected on the Ireland team that played in the Tailteann Games. County championships were won with a Mid (Boherlahan) selection in 1922, with a South Selection (Boherlahan) in 1924 and with Moycarkey-Borris in 1932, and 1933.

Many compliments were paid to him by sportswriters. Carbery said of him "that for a decade or more he charmed us with his speed and artistry". Green Flag of the Irish Press described him as one of the greatest stylists hurling has ever produced.

"The Tipperary Star" has this to say: "his artistry with the caman was superb, and he can certainly be classed as one of the truest and sweetest hitting hurlers Tipperary ever produced. When he struck the ball, a score was almost a certainty and he had an uncanny gift of knowing where the posts were without ever having to look".

Dinny O'Gorman claims that Phil Cahill and Paddy Phelan were the greatest hurlers he saw and he has seen a lot.

# Phil Purcell, A Pillar Of Tipperary Hurling

THE above title was given by national journalist, John D. Hickey to describe one of the greatest backmen Tipperary hurling has produced.

John Purcell was born in Littleton in the early years of the present century into a family steeped in hurling tradition. His father's uncle, Tom Stapleton was on the county team which won the first All-Ireland and his uncle Mick Purcell and cousin Matt Ryan were on the Two Mile Borris side which won the 1900 All-Ireland.

His own career started as a hurler during the *Troubles* and when senior championship games were restored in 1922, Phil was one of six Moycarkey-Borris players who won county championship medals with Boherlahan. This was probably a group team of junior players as only four Boherlahan players were on the team! The following year, he was a member of the Mid team which won county junior honours.

In 1924 he was captain of the Tipperary County Junior team which beat Galway in the All-Ireland final.



When Tipperary won the All-Ireland senior final of 1925, Phil was among the subs, and he travelled to America in 1926 with the county team.

When Moycarkey-Borris won the county final of 1926, Phil won his second county medal and he captained the parish team in the club's great run of county titles in 1932/3/4 as well as the Mid Final of 1931. He was an ever present member of the county team from 1926 until a serious leg injury ended his career in 1936.

He was a member of the 1930 team which won Tipperary's first National League title in 1928. He won five Railway Cup medals with Munster, played for Ireland against the U.S.A. in the 1928 Tailtean Games.

Phil Purcell visited America four times. In 1926 and 1931 as a player and in 1950 and 1957 as team manager. He was a very popular and capable referee, officiating at all levels from rural schools to the 1946 All-Ireland final between Cork and Kilkenny.

He was club secretary in the 1920's, and was appointed Mid Tipp. Secretary in 1937. In 1948 he was elected County Secretary, a position he held until his sudden death in February, 1961.
