They include minor hurling in 1987, four U-21 hurling 'A' finals '90-'93 incl, while in '94 he held the whistle for the Nenagh Eire Og v Ballinahinch junior final. He has refereed one other senior final when Toomevara defeated Roscrea after a replay of the 1993 senior hurling league final

What happened since '89

The last time Lorrha won the North final was in 1989. They had a successful year in the North that year, beating Borrisokane in the league final by 2-12 to 3-6 and overcoming

Toomevara by 1-14 to 1-12 in the championship. With a bit of luck that year they might have won their first ever

county championship.

Be defeating Toomevara in the North final, Lorrha qualified by play Carrick Swans in the county quarterfinal. They won by double scores on a scoreline of 4-14 to 2-7. Kieran Hough was in brilliant form on the day, scor-

ing 1-10 from frees and play.

In the semi-final Lorrha were pitted against Holycross-Ballycahill. In a dramatic game the North champions had a goal and a point disallowed by referee, George Ryan, in the space of only two minutes of the second half. Both were scores by Aidan McIntyre and, on both occasions, the referee gave a free out for what he deemed to be square infringements. Lorrha protested, especially when they lost by the minimum of margins, 0-12 to 0-11, their arguments and protests proved fruitless. Holycross had snatched the winning score with a 'Tonto' Lanigan point in the dying moments. What might have happened had



Lorrha got through is anybody's guess. Holycross lost the final to Clonoulty-Rossmore by two points.

In the following year they beat Shannon Rovers by 0-18 to 2-8 in the first round and qualified for the winners' group but were beaten by Newport 2-12 to 1-12 and lost their chance of improving on the previous year. There wasn't much joy in 1991 either. Getting a bye in the first round Lorrha beat Newport convincingly by 1-15 to 1-7 but lost the semi-final to Toomevara by the minimum of margins on a scoreline of 2-8 to 1-10.

In 1992 Lorrha qualified for the North final after playing five games in the championship. They beat Newport, 2-6 to 0-9 in the first round and went on to defeat Borrisokane by 2-9 to 1-9 and qualify for the semi-final. This turned out to be a marathon against Toomevara. The teams drew 2-9 to 0-15 the first day, were still locked together 3-13 to 1-19 after extra time the second day and Lorrha eventually came out on top by 2-7 to 1-5 after the third attempt. Alas, for the men in blue and white the exhaustion, mental and physical, of the three game saga took its toll and they lost badly to Nenagh in the final by 1-18 to 0-8. Any progress they might have made outside the division, was halted by defeat at the hands of Toomevara, in the play-off between the losers and the winners of the league.

There wasn't much to shout about in 1993, After a comprehensive defeat of St. Odhran's a combination of Silvermines and Templederry – by 4-16 to 1-15 in the first round, Lorrha were defeated, 4-9 to 1-9, by Nenagh in the winners' group. They won the first round in

1994, beating Borrisokane by 1-15 to 1-8 in the progress. They met Toomevara in the second round, drew the first day on a scoreline of 1-11 to 2-8 but were beaten in the replay by 1-16 to 1-12. Toomevara went on to win the county final and were beaten by Kilmallock in the Munster club final.

Lorrha played four matches in the 1995 championship. In the first round they drew 0-12 to 1-9 with Newport and were beaten in the replay by 0-11 to 0-10. Qualifying for the losers's group they drew with Moneygall, 0-8 to 1-5 but were beaten in the replay by 0-12 to 0-10.

And so the record since 1989 looks like this: Lorrha played 28 championship matches won 14, drew 5 and lost 9. It will be interesting to see what will be added to that record after today's game.

CONCEDED 10 GOALS

Lorrha lost to Toomevara on a scoreline of 10-6 to 5-7 in the second round of the 1963 senior hurling championship.

LORRHA SEMI-FINALS

Do you know that Lorrha has contested no less than 18 North Tipperary senior hurling semi-finals for the past 30 years. They have one less that Kilruane MacDonaghs, but have appeared there more often that Roscrea, Toomevara or Nenagh Éire Óg.

Martin Ryan, Newport looks back

In 1989 Newport successfully defended their North Intermediate Hurling title by defeating Portroe after having previously defeated Templederry in the 1988 Final. The 1989 victory marked a long awaited return to Senior ranks. The captain that year was defender Martin Ryan who is current senior selector for this year.

That was Newport's last success and with seven years having elapsed Martin Ryan looked back on a great year for his beloved Newport.

L.H.- What position did you play in?

M.R.- I played full back up to the Kildangan game before moving to left corner back for the last game prior to the semi final.

L.H.-How many games did Newport play?

M.R.-Six games. The Championship was run on a league basis similar to the one run this year.

L.H.-After winning the championship in 1988, what club did you think were your bogey team?

M.R.-Silvermines, definitely, they had beaten us in the 1987 final and we never seemed to be able to get one over on them.

L.H.-You did beat them in the semi final?

M.R.-That's right, I remember Connie McGrath giving a great performance at centre back. Silvermines pushed up Noel Sheedy during the second half, but this came to nothing, as we held it.

L.H.- The final against Portroe, what were your thoughts as captain?

M.R.-We knew we were defending champions and after beating Silvermines in the semi final we knew that the pressure had somewhat eased. Still, anything can happen over sixty minutes of hurling.

L.H.-Describe how the game progressed?

M.R.-I remember we got a good start scoring two early goals. The winning of this game seemed a lot easier. However, with Portroe no game is ever won easily. They came back at us before half time, when they came within two points of us. Half time came as a relief and the constant thought of making history was the main spur to us to keep going. Holding our composure was vital.

L.H.-Who were you marking?

M.R.– Jimmy Sheedy, who was captain of Portroe. I remember that he had a great chance of scoring a goal but the ball hit the upright. that goal might have made the difference. It was going to be our day as we won by five points. The final score was 2-14 to 1-12.

L.H.-Soon you were now facing a County Semi Final?

M.R.-Yes, we now knew that senior ranks was for us in the following year. However, having failed in the County Semi Final the previous year we were more anxious to finish our year on a high note.

L.H.-Who did you play in the semi of 1988?

M.R.-Gortnahoe/Glengoole were our opponents that year in Holycross. They went on to win the County Final later.

L.H.-Your opponents in 1989?

M.R-We played Fethard at Semple Stadium. I remember that we always wanted to play in Semple Stadium, particularly as this might be the last chance for some of our players to play in Thurles. I remember that the game was played on a wet and windy day.

L.H.-You won that game easy?

M.R.-That's right, we won by 3-15 to 0-3.

L.H.-Immediately your thoughts were on the County Final?

M.R-Yes, but strangely we went celebrating on our way home in McCormacks of Kilcommon!

L.H.-Who was your trainer at that time?

M.R.-Nenagh's Tony Hassett, who was a powerful motivator, but unfortunately he had an accident at which point Len Gaynor took over the helm.

L.H.-I am sure there were no celebrations then?

M.R.-That's right, it was a hard slog from there on as it was all through the year.

L.H.-Who were your opponents?

M.R.-Thurles Sarsfields were our opponents and Cashel was the venue. I can remember that some of the players were hoping for a return visit to Semple Stadium.

L.H.-Can you tell us much about the game?

M.R.-Not much, but we had a good opening quarter. Connie McGrath had a great game again and I think he finished up as Guardian Player of the Week.

L.H.-Another Cup and another speech?

M.R.-Yes, the usual thanking of players, mentors and supporters.

L.H.-Your thoughts after receiving the Cup?

M.R.—I remember the many fine games that we had played, not alone in 1989, but back as far as 1985, when that year we reached the quarter final, only to lose to the future champions, Shannon Rovers. We lost the North Finals in 1986/87, but success at County Level was all the more worth while.

L.H.-Did you look forward to Senior ranks?

M.R.-Yes, but certainly I knew that the club would hold its won with any of the teams as the results have shown. For some of us however, we knew that time would be against us. Thankfully a fine bunch of young players have come along, thanks to some fine tuition by our juvenile committee.

L.H.-Prediction for this years final?

M.R.-No comment!

L.H.-You are a selector with the team?

M.R.-Yes, Tim Floyd asked both myself and Eddie Quigley to form a selection committee which helps when you are not playing, although I still play on the junior teams.

L.H.-Martin, thanks very much for your held and time.

M.R.- No problem.

Jimmy Coffey, Newport

A career that spanned four decades from 1929 when he first lined out with Newport senior hurlers to 1951 when he played his last game with Cappamore, is the proud record of Jimmy 'Butler' Coffey, one of the greatest stylists the game has produced. Winning an All-Ireland minor medal in 1930, he was the first of that squad to be selected on the county senior team. He played at wing forward on the side beaten by Waterford in 1933 but his work prevented him from lining out against Cork the following year and he went out of favour with the selectors. He was back on




the county side two years later and was at half forward on the All-Ireland winning side of 1937.


He won a Railway Cup medal with Munster the following year and was a regular with Tipperary until 1940 when a leg injury put an end to his inter-county career.

His championship successes include 2 North Tipp senior hurling in 1932 and 1935, North minor hurling in 1926, North intermediate hurling in 1934 and 2 Limerick county senior medals with Ahane in 1947 and 1948.

He trained the Cappamore hurlers to win county titles in junior and senior and Fr. Liam Ryan, author of Cappamore's GAA history, describes him as the most successful trainer the club ever had.

Still hale and hearty, Jimmy loves nothing better than to reminisce on games and hurlers of the past and he keeps up to date with happenings on the club and inter-county scene.

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Paddy O'Meara, Lorrha – Star of the past

Just three months ago I travelled to Lorrha's GAA Park to referee an U/14 hurling "B" game between Lorrha and Kilruane MacDonaghs. On arriving at the dressing room the first person I saw was Paddy O'Meara surrounded by members of the Lorrha Camogie team who were listening to his words of advice. My first thoughts were "what an all-rounder he really is."

In a career that began as a juvenile in the 1940's, he has hurled and officiated with Lorrha, trained various clubs and became a member of the Tipperary U/21 and senior hurling teams. Added to that, he has run cross country with Moneygall and off course he has been seen at numerous greyhound race meetings, which many have considered as his real love.

Paddy O'Meara is married to Gerthue Feehan. They have two sons Padraig and James and one daughter Catherine. A blacksmith by profession, he won two North Tipperary senior hurling championship medals with Lorrha in 1956 and 1966 against Borris-Ileigh and Kilruane MacDonaghs.

I was surprised to know that Paddy also won a North Tipperary Intermediate medal with Knockshegowna in 1960. One year later he won a Munster Intermediate medal with Tipperary who defeated Cork (3-10 to 2-12) in the final. While Lorrha have being noted as a fine hurling club, they have also engaged in Gaelic Football finals throughout the clubs history. Paddy O'Meara has a collection of North Medals here also beginning with success in North titles in 1966/68/71. He also won a county medal in that grade in 1971.

CLUB CHAIRMAN

After a fine career in the playing fields, Paddy turned his hand to officiating and Paddy became Club Chairman in 1983 for a three year reign. In that period Lorrha reached the North Tipperary Senior Hurling Semi Finals in 1983 and 1985, while they became North Champions in 1984 (Centenary Year). They later lost narrowly to Moycarkey in the County Final. Paddy was a team selector in that year.

Moving on a number of years Paddy became a member of the County U/21 Selection Committee in a period spanning from 1980 to 1984, and later from 1989 to 1994. There were All-Ireland successes in 1980/81 and 1989, while they won the Munster in 1983/84 and 1990. In fact in 1990 they were runners-up to Kilkenny in the All-Ireland.

Paddy O'Meara's name in synonymous in coaching many clubs in the hurling land of Lorrha. Portunna required his coaching skills in 1982, when the town won the first junior title in 70 years. It was then the turn of Abbey Duriry, who with his help and guidance won the County Galway Intermediate title in 1989 after a replay.

In the 90's he turned his attentions to St. Rynagh's of Offaly, who won three county titles in a row in 1992/93/94. St. Rynagh's won two county tiles, senior and Intermediate back to back in 92 and 93, which is regarded by many a great fete. St. Rynagh's won the Leinster Club Title in 1993, but later lost to All-Ireland Champions Sarsfields while at Thurles in the penultimate stage.

N.A.C.A.

While speaking with Paddy, he mentioned his running achievements, particularly his success with the Moneygall club who won the junior cross country in 1952, and the senior in 1953. His running mates were many with such names as Patsy Carroll R.I.P.; Mick Donoghue R.I.P., and Ned Fogarty.

GREYHOUND RACING

Finally, it would be recessive not to mention his great love of Greyhound racing which Paddy has being involved with for many years. He has met many famous names from the GAA world during these race meetings. As recently as last week-end he met the legendary James McCarton of Down in the Thurles race track.

Mentioning famous names brings me to his brother Sean, who was a leading referee in the seventies and eighties. One way or another Paddy O'Meara has made a wonderful contribution to the GAA world of Lorrha, Knockshegowna and Tipperary, not to mention Offaly and Galway. Presently he is team coach/trainer with Portumna senior team, who were in the running for County honours having failed at the last hurdle in 1995. I am sure while his thoughts are on the concluding stages of the Galway Championship, Paddy O'Meara will be dedicating his thoughts and advice to his beloved Lorrha for sixty minutes in to-day's final.

N.B.: Paddy's father Jim was a selector in the 1956 North Final success and ten years later he would see Lorrha win the final again with a team that featured three brothers Paddy, Sean and Seamus for the finals. It is on record that this was the first occasion that a winning Lorrha team included three brothers from any family.

It is a feature of most generations that their heroes are remembered with affection.

The passage of time can often mix man and myth. Feats, already great, become embellished, reputations, already untarnished, becomes even glossier.

In the history of gaelic football few have matched the achievements of Kerry's Mick O'Connell. At his best, and that was nearly every time he laced his boots, this man from Valentia Island was majestic.

His kicking, with either foot, was wonderfully accurate. He could place a ball in a forward's hand from 40-50 yards. Off the ground, his kicking was technically perfect. And of course, high

catching was his hallmark.

Quite simply, his fielding of the high ball approached art form. He timed his

take-off like an Olympic high jumper thus reaching the apex at the precisely correct moment. Man and ball uniting high above the ground and all opposition. He attained a perfection in his play that is etched forever in the hearts of all who saw him.

Consistency has been the hallmark of Ger's game. A safe goalie, whose poise and coolness never deserts him under pressure, he has, like good wine, matured over the years and is

one of the most reliable keepers in the game today.

Most goalies can do the mundane things like stopping shots they are expected to stop, but the man who leaves a lasting imprint on the game will pull off a really great save, particularly in the heat of a championship game. Ger has done this on many occasions and it has often roused his team mates to achieve some notable victories.



He is one of a family of six brothers, all of whom have worn the Newport jersey and have given great service to their club both on and off the field.

Ger is equally proficient with the big ball and has guarded the net for the footballers over the same period of time.

He has won two North intermediate hurling medals, a county medal in the same grade, 5 North intermediate football medals, a county intermediate football medal and five North senior football medals.

It would be a fitting reward for his loyalty and dedication if he was to add a senior hurling medal to his collection in the twilight of a great career.

Dinny Ryan

When one hears reference to "Little Dinny" or "The Cooper" in hurling circles in Newport or North Tipp, there is no need for further appendices to determine who is the subject of conversation. The affable Birdhill publican has carved a distinctive niche for himself in the hurling and business world. The buzz of expectation which can be heard when he gets on the ball is reserved for only the chosen few in hurling but Dinny Ryan is

among that select band who seem to capture the imag-

ination of hurling followers.

Even as a juvenile, Dinny Ryan showed distinct promise. That sudden burst of speed, the sure touch, the capacity to shake off a tackle and take a score—they were all as obvious then as now. Dinny first 'arrived' in Lacken Park in 1976, when he participated as an 8 year old in a parish under 12 league.

Two years later he picked up a North Tipp under-12 'B' hurling medal when Newport defeated Burgess in the final. Dinny was at corner forward and beside him was Connie McGrath who accounted for five goals

that evening.

In 1980, Dinny figured between the posts in the under-14 championship. Newport recorded victories over Borrisokane, Nenagh and Toomevara to reach the North final which they lost to Kilruane.

Dinny finished second in the North Tipp u-14 skills competition in 1982. In the same year, Newport reached two North finals in the u-14 grade but they had the misfortune to lose in both codes. He had bet-



ter luck with the u-16 footballers who recorded a historic first by winning the county title. He graduated to the Newport minor team in 1983 and two years later he was on the under-21 teams. The u-21 hurlers lost the 'B' final to Moneygall but compensated by defeating Inane Rovers in the football final, only to lose the county final to Lattin-Emly.

1986 brought an All-Ireland Colleges' medal when he helped Nenagh CBS win the 'B' championship. He made a notable contribution in the semi-final against Maghera when scoring 2-9. In that same year he earned a place on the Tipp minor hurling team which reached the Munster final. He played in the drawn final at Killarney, but had the misfortune to be ruled out of the replay, having been dismissed in a club game in the interim.

The following year, Dinny graduated to the Newport I.H. team and was on the losing side in the North final against Silvermines. The same date befell the u-21 H. team against

Moneygall.

1988 was probably the best year (to date) in the history of Newport GAA Club – they annexed a number of North titles including I.H. and S.F., both of which Dinny Ryan figured in. These triumphs helped earn Newport the 'North Tipp Club of the Year' award and Dinny was 'North Tipp Hurler of the Year'. Among his notable scoring achievements during the year was 3-8 against Éire Óg in u-21 H.

Newport repeated the North I.H. victory in '89 and went on to add the county crown.

But Dinny earned greater honours with the county team, picking up All-Ireland medals in u-21 H. and J.H. He went on to figure occasionally with the county senior hurling team in

league and championship, culminating in an Oireachtas medal in 1994.

The nineties have seen Dinny figure prominently with various Newport teams in hurling and football. He collected North Tipp I.F. medals in 1993 and 1995 adding to the senior football mementoes of '88 and '90. His greatest year on the local scene on the hurling front must surely be 1993 when he tormented opposing defences in league and championship, scoring 0-9 v Nenagh; 3-5 v Borrisokane; 1-4 v Kilruane; 1-8 v Moneygall in the league followed by 1-7 after coming on against Kilruane for half a hour in the championship.

In recent years Dinny has assisted with the preparation of a number of teams. He is currently selector of Newport's under-21 and junior teams. Last year he coached Ballina J.H.

team.

Many honours, then, have come Dinny's way in his career to date. Much expectancy lies on his shoulders when Newport teams line out. But in success or failure, "The Cooper" will always remain the unassuming, modest character he was when commencing his hurling career just 20 years ago this year.

Donal O'Donoghue

Playing in his sixth divisional final today, Donal O'Donoghue has given long and dedicated service to Lorrha. Since he made his first senior debut in 1979, the thirty-six year old Rathcabbin farmer has played in every championship. This year is his eighteenth and this makes him the longest serving member of the team and a player who had played longer than most in the history of his club.

His hurling ancestry is impeccable. His father, Danny, and his uncle, Mick, gave long and distinguished service to Lorrha. When Donal came to the senior team in 1979 he slotted into the full back position in place of Felix Cronin. In the following year he was at corner back and, during his long career, he has played

in every position on the field with the exception of goals. He has been one of the most satile of players, always willing to play where requested. In latter years he has reverte the fullback position and has made a good job of the position despite his low stature.

Although he has given away height and weight to many opponents, he has more the compensated with guts and determination. A lion-hearted player, he is noted for swashbuckling style of dashing runs and daredevil abandon. His do or die spirit has of inspired his fellow players to lift their game. His skill level has always been quite good is a good reader of the game and a hard, fast tackler especially on the ground ball. His comitment to training has always been first class and his attendance at training sessions been an example to all.

Perhaps it can be said that Donal's return from the game after so many years and much commitment has been meagre, but it reflects the fortunes of Lorrha over the period the five North finals in which he has played he was successful in 1984 and 1989 tunsuccessful in 1983, 1987 and 1992.

The highlight of his career was winning the divisional final in centenary year and one his greatest regrets is defeat in the county final of the same year. In fact, he is of the belthat there were more low than high points in his playing career. Another great regret is hing the North semi-final to Roscrea in 1985. He hoped to go all the way that year and maup for failing at the final hurdle in 1984. Still another disappointment was the loss Holycross in the county semi-final of 1989. He reckons Lorrha could have got to the couty final that year but for some refereeing decisions and some injuries which saw him relater only five minutes of the game and Ciaran Hough also injured.

Hurling has been his life and now in the twilight of his career nothing would please better than to win a county final. Before that can be achieved victory has to be won too After hurling, football has been a lesser interest in which he has won divisional honour intermediate and senior level. His favourite player at the inter county level has alwabeen Nicky English. He has had his share of injuries in the course of his career, including broken leg on two occasions and a broken ankle also. To an extent the nature of the injuries reflect the courage and determination of the player, a spirit and a heart that he always put his team and his club above any other interest.

The Madden brothers - Lorrha

(JOSEPHINE NEEDHAM).

The Madden brothers, John, Thomas and Padraic, all stalwarts of Lorrha teams, since their juvenile days, couldn't avoid being hurlers, coming from a family with long and active association with the GAA.

Their grandfather John Joe, wore the Lorrha colours, in the North Senior finals, of 1914 and 1924 and was selected on North Tipperary sides against Galway, in the early decades of this century.

Their father Paddy, is the holder of two North Senior Hurling medals won with Lorrha in 1956 and 1966 and once his playing days ended he took on the role of juvenile selector and coach giving over 20 years service to the club and 8 years to the Division, as an U/16 hurling selector during which time, two Munster championships and two Garda Cup Tournament successes were achieved. Paddy and Bridget maintain a keen and active interest in hurling and all aspects of Gaelic culture and passed these interests and skills on to their families.

The eldest of the trio, John is an accomplished player with style speed and skill to burn. John has many honours to his credit, winning U/16 Munster and Garda Cup medals in 1983 and 1984, a North Tipperary U/21 B title with Lorrha in 1983 and a seniors in 1989. In 1985 and 1986 John was a Tipperary minor and played with the Tipperary Seniors in the successful years of 1989 and 1991. In 1989, he had an outstanding year on the Tipperary U/21 side, which took All-Ireland honours. John is also the holder of an Oireachtas medal and had the honour of captaining the Galway All-Ireland winning Vocational Schools' team in 1985.

Thomas, while not as prominent as John, has been and is a valuable and dependable member of all Lorrha teams, since his juvenile days and turns in most solid displays, at senior level, in all his outings. Thomas holds North Tipperary Junior League and Championship medals won in 1987 and a senior medal won in 1989. thomas also had the distinction of captaining Portumna College in a Connacht College's final and D.C.U. in 1990. He also holds two Garda Cup medals.

Youngest of the clan, Pádraig - outgoing and effervescent has all the skills of the game since an early age and captained Lorrha juveniles to a North Tipp U/12 'B' title in 1987. He holds an U/21 B minor title won in 1993 and Garda Cup and Munster U/16 championships won in1989 and 1990 respectively. Keeping up the family tradition, he won a Connacht College's Championship, with Portumna College. Pádraig was North Tipperary Feile na nGael skills winner in 1985 and 1986, Co. Champion in 1986 representing Tipperary in the All-Ireland Feile na NGael Final. Pádraig was a member of the Tipperary U/21 hurling panel this year.

All the Madden's passed through St. Ruadhan's "academy", Redwood, so I have more than a passing interest in the boys. I can't claim that they learned their hurling there - though they did continue to practice and perfect their skills there - because, even at the tender age of 4, all were proficient and skilfull wielders of the caman, due to dad Paddy's excellent tutelage and inspiring influence. Pádraig's first day in school is clearly etched in my memory - a small fair haired by, standing tentatively at the door clutching a tiny well used camán - that served as "comforter" for his first few days. So keen was their interest

that lunches would go uneaten, except for my eagle eye and there was a rush for the door once the last crumb was accounted for.

It was rare to see a Madden without a "hurl and shoeleather" and one took a definite risk, going in by the back door, to Maddens, as sliotars flew in all directions, when all were at home. Mam, Bridget, got used to the missiles and the odd shower of glass and no eyebrows were raised in Redwood either, when I closed my eyes and chucked the flying glass, occasionally.

The Madden's were exemplary pupils - mannerly, manly, focussed, high achievers and from and bring the same attributes to the game of hurling.

Win, lose or draw on Sunday, the Madden brothers will accept the result in true sporting manner.

LORRHA'S FOUR WINS

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Lorrha claim sixth North title in thriller

Of Lorrha's eight North senior final victories one which is remembered with special fondness is the thrilling victory of 1966 secured against a highly rated Toomevara outfit in McDonagh Park, Nenagh on August 28th. This was Lorrha's first final win in ten years and the manner in which the team came back from a five point half-time deficit to score a thrilling one point victory victory will live long in the memory of Lorrha folk who witnessed it. Match Report

From goalkeeper Gerry Moylan down to Mick O'Meara at left fullforward Lorrha had no weak links. Their forwards, in the first half, kept the Toom backs at full stretch and gave them few chances to make lengthy clearances. Liam Hackett, at right corner-back, made the only worthwhile clearance from the fullback line for Toomevara in this half. The mid-

field battle was even for three-quarters of the game.

Tom Ryan had the upper hand of Jim Lane but got little assistance from Mick Delaney. Mick Gleeson played well in this sector for Lorrha and scored a beautiful point from midfield in the first half. Gerry Moylan, in goal for the winners, was cool under pressure and made some good saves. He got great cover from his full line of the O'Meara brothers, Paddy and Seamus, and Mick Liffey. Wilsie Morris and Liam King, without reaching their usual high standards, easily contained the best efforts of their opposite numbers, Tom Hassett and Pat McGrath respectively.

O'MEARA AND HOGAN STAR

The two big men on this Lorrha 15 were Sean O'Meara and Peter Hogan. Sean, at centre half-back, after a somewhat slow beginning, was in top form. He held Roger Ryan well after the first quarter and made a big contribution to the victory when wisely switched to midfield in the closing quarter. His two points from 70's were worth goals when they came. Peter Hogan was the star of the attack. He was his side's top scorer, accounting for 1-5 of the total.

He gave his opposite number, Tom Shanahan, a hard hour. Noel Lane spear-headed many an attack and scored a sizzler of a goal in the opening half. Fennor Ryan, Paddy Madden and Mick Doyle all did their parts in bringing victory to Lorrha.

TOM RYAN OUTSTANDING

In contrast to Lorrha, the Toom team showed many weak links. Roger Mounsey, Liam Hackett, Niall Williams, Tom Ryan, Roger Ryan, Frank Ryan and Phil Shanahan can wash their hands out of this defeat. Tom Ryan, at midfield, was outstanding. He played himself to a standstill and scored one powerful point from 80 yards. Liam Hackett was little behind his team-mate Tom, and gave the best corner-back display for Toomevara for many a day.

Frank Ryan, the captain, gave a great display, his best this year, and along with Roger Ryan and Phil Shanahan did everything possible to bring victory to Toom. John Hough, who played minutes, tried in vain to rally his men. Roger Mounsey proved once again that he is a top class net-minder, making several good saves, and Niall Williams played soundly all through at centre-back.

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Lorrha's Mr. Hurling "Blakefield-Mick O'Meara"

(Josephine Needham)

Known far and wide as "Blakefield", Mick O'Meara, comes from a strong GAA family. HIs uncle, Pat O'Meara played for Lorrha, in the early days of the association, while Blakefield himself figured, at all levels, on Lorrha teams, in his playing days, winning North Tipperary Senior Awards in 1948 and 1956. In 1946, he collected North and Co. Junior Championships and was on the Junior side, of 1947, which failed to Boherlahan.

Mick umpired in ten North Senior Finals-6 with the late Hubie Hogan, as referee, in 1951/52/53/54/57/58 and four when Sean O'Meara had the whistle, in 1968/74/79/82. He acted as an umpire for a Co. Senior Hurling Final in 1952 and also officiated in a Co. Senior Football Final. He notes the North Final of 1957, between Toomevara and Nenagh, as the last of the ten, he umpired in again, with the late Hubie Hogan as referee. Blakefield umpired, with the late Tom Duffy, Gerry Dillon and Jimmy Kennedy in an All-Ireland Senior Semi Final between Galway and Cork, played in Birr, with victory going to the Rebels. He also had the honour of umpiring in an U/21 All-Ireland Hurling Final.

Blakefield also saw service as a selector, for Lorrha and with the Co. Intermediate side of 1952. He was with the Lorrha junior side of 1961 which won the North title and lost to Moyne/Templetuohy in the County decider. He was also a selector in 1966, when Lorrha teams took four North titles in senior, Junior and U/21 hurling and junior football.

Blakefields commitment to and love of Gaelic games wasn't confined to playing, administration and officiating and from 1935/1945 and again from 1958/1966, one of his fields in Abbeyville was used, free of charge, as the Lorrha hurling field.

Blackfield's interest in and knowledge of the game is boundless and if you have a difficult GAA question, you could do worse than making your way to his house, where you would be sure of a great welcome—but don't be in a hurry. Blakefield has been to Co. Finals in almost every county and can recall all of them in great detail and no doubt he will be more than an interested spectator to-day at McDonagh Park.

JUST ONE GAME

In 1969 Newport played only one game in that year's championship. They lost by 1-12 to 2-4 against Borris-Ileigh. There was no first round losers in that year, so Newport's lot rested on that first round game.

FIRST SEMI-FINAL

For the first time in thirty-five years Newport reached the North Tipperary semi-final against Roscrea. They were defeated by 4-16 to 2-3. Newport earlier accounted for Na Piarsaigh (Burgess/Kildangan clubs) and Kilruane MacDonaghs.

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Newport's last North Championship

Newport won two North titles in the space of three years. In 1932 they received a walkover from Toomevara after defeating Kilbarron/Kildangan in the Semi-Final. To-day we print the full match report of Newport's 1935 win as it appeared in *The Guardian*.

Championship for Newport

Victory in stern struggle at Nenagh

Kilruane's strong finish

Newport 6-4; Kilruane 5-4

Newport won the North Tipperary Senior Hurling Championship at the Show grounds Nenagh, on Sunday, before a fine attendance, defeating Kilruane McDonaghs by 6-4 to 5-4, after a strenuous game, fought with great determination.

It was one of the hardest fought contests seen in the championship for a good many years, and so strongly did McDonaghs finish that they pulled down a four-goal lead to a goal margin.

McDonaghs lost the game in the first half when the forwards had open chances which they failed to finish, and the sharp-shooting Newport forwards missed nothing that came their way.

Mick Coffey (Newport) made many wonderful saves, while the defence generally withstood some strong challenges. The Newport team as a whole shone well. Newport wore down a lead and went to the front at half-time by 3-3 to 2-3. This they doubled and at one time they had a comfortable lead of 6-3 to 2-3, and it was then that McDonaghs made their great rally which ended with three goals and a point. At the final whistle they were fighting on.

The teams were played to the centre of the field by the Silvermines Band, which also played the National Anthem, before Mr. D. Costelloe, Kilbarron, referee, sent the teams into action. Kilruane lost a good forward in M. Kelly in the early part of the game, and injuries to Heffernan also hampered that speedy player in his work. The Kilruane team played consistent all through, P. Peters, J. Kennedy, Hyland, Meara, Whelan, and P. Spain being always on the ball. For Newport, Coffey's (3), Humphries, Connors, Maloney, Delaney, and Rainsford were always good.

THE PLAY

Newport got a free as the game just started and Coffey "Butler" took the puck, for Kilruane to fling back. Heffernan, Whelan, and Kelly were in the attack when Newport got another free. This time Lee fielded and Jack Coffey, in possession, pointed for Newport. Newport rushed through a goal in a sharp attack, but the score was disallowed. Kilruane,

per P. Spain, drove wide. Kilruane launched another attack in which Kennedy, P. Spain, and Heffernan were concerned, but Connors, Humphries, and Rainsford defended stoutly. Newport then rushed with Jim Coffey in possession but they sent wide. Peters sent up for P. Spain to cross a ball to the Newport goal and Coffey saved his net in a vigorous charge in which Newport defence fought back tenaciously. A free to Kilruane eased matters. Heffernan placed the puck prettily and Coffey saved a hot shot but Kilruane dashed in for a goal. Play was still being maintained at a speedy pace and Jim Coffey sent wide a free for Newport. Dwane got possession from P. Peters and he passed to Kenny, then back to Dwane, and Kilruane moved in but Kelly eased with a wide. Again Kilruane wided when Whelan had possession on a fast run. Newport were being pressed hard. Heffernan took a free and in a long drive Mick Coffey saved and Humphries had the ball clear. Then Jack Meara stopped a Newport race and a good effort by Hyland for a score just failed.

Martin Kennedy (goal) saved from Jim Coffey and Minogue eased pressure. Jim Coffey placed a free and Jack Coffey flashed in a shot which Kennedy came to the ground to save at the cost of a 70. The ball was carried wide by the wind and later Maloney scored a point for Newport. E. Gleeson cut down a ball from Whelan but Heffernan nipping in put a long drive over the bar for a point. Some vigorous clashes in the Newport end followed and Whelan began an attack and though Newport defended well Roger Dwane got the leather across to Kelly to goal.

Newport, on the re-start, dashed down and in a fierce attack Newport registered a goal, Kennedy, on the ground, failing to save. Kelly was injured and was replaced by M. Dunne, and on the resumption there were some hectic passages. Maloney added a point for Newport and when Jack Coffey manoeuvred an attack Maloney was in position to add a goal for Newport.

This left Newport leading for the first time by two points and the ball was flying from end to end in rapid and determined attacks. Jack Coffey again had possession for Maloney to control the pass and beat Kennedy for Newport's third goal. Kilruane scored a point from a 70 by Heffernan just before the interval whistle. Score:—

Newport-3 goals 3 points; Kilruane-2 goals 2 points

When the game re-started there was nice combination amongst the Kilruane boys, but Spain failed with a pass from Dwane. Newport attacked strongly and P. Peters, Meara, and Hyland fought back. Maloney and Delaney were fast forwards, and when Kilruane took a free Humphries defended alone and Dwane had a good try. Kennedy hurled well for McDonaghs and was in the thick of the attack, and Kilruane gave the Newport backs a troublesome time. Newport beat off an attack from a free and when Jack Coffey placed in Kilruane goal Kennedy beat Madden for possession. Newport goaled after a very fast piece of play. Kennedy saved a high shot but Newport were fast and took the net for a goal. Whelan followed with a point for Kilruane, and when Newport got a free thirty yards out Jim Coffey scored a rasping shot which Kennedy apparently misjudged.

Newport had a comfortable lead and Coffey saved a good shot from Whelan. Heffernan started another attack. P. Spain sent on to Dwane, who doubled on a ball which Coffey blocked to save. Kilruane were attacking strongly and Coffey, ever alert, again saved. Kilruane were fighting well and Whelan added a point. Heffernan took a free and Coffey

saved his net, but McDonaghs fought on until they pushed the ball through for a goal. Attacks at each end were defeated. Then Kennedy got possession of a ball from a free by Peters and, eluding his man, he passed to Dunne, who goaled for Kilruane. Playing with renewed energy in fast ground hurling, Kilruane fought on. In a swift attack on Kilruane goal Maloney was injured and was replaced by Reilly.

Gruelling passages marked the closing stages of the game as McDonaghs battled for supremacy. Kennedy crossed a ball to Heffernan and the effort was broken by Connors and went wide. After Coffey saved his sticks Delaney pointed for Newport. Keogh and M. Peters beat off a Newport attack and Hyland and Heffernan sent on to Spain, who passed to Dwane. Kennedy coming up took Dwane's pass with a sweep and beat Coffey for a goal, leaving only a difference of three points in favour of Newport.

Excitement was high as McDonaghs strove for the equaliser. It nearly came from Kennedy, who was just stopped by Humphries, and the same player was fighting strongly against Kilruane attacks as the final whistle went. Score—

Newport were held scoreless by Moneygall in the second round of the 1971 senior hurling championship on a scoreline of 3-12 to 0-0. Newport won none of their four championship game of that year. Remember the championship was run on a league basis for the first time in many decades.

RED JERSEYS IN 1949

Did you know that Lorrha once wore the red of Roscrea in a hurling championship game. That's right as far back as 1949 on July 29th, against Nenagh in Borrisokane. Whether it was the jerseys or what, Lorrha failed to come to terms with a Nenagh side that included Charlie Downes and Seamus Bannon in their line out. The final score read Nenagh 3-8 Lorrha 0-5 and remember Lorrha were current champions.

BACK IN SENIOR RANKS

After winning the 1965 North Tipperary Intermediate Championship Newport reentered senior ranks in 1966. Their first game resulted in a 3-8 to 1-3 defeat at the hands of Roscrea. One month later they ran Borris-Ileigh to two points at Nenagh. The final score read 4-8 to 3-9 in favour of Borris. Good luck to Newport in today's final from

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
