

As we congregate for today's games, it is fitting that we should remember Thomas MacDonagh, in whose memory this pitch is named. He was a native of Cloughjordan and a signatory to the 1916 Proclamation. The 90th anniversary of his death was commemorated earlier in the year by Kilruane Club in the opening and rededication of their facilities in his memory. The bust of Thomas MacDonagh appears on all medals presented by North Tipperary G.A.A. Seán Ó Scurlóg, Cathaoirleach.

A North final to whet the appetite

n 2004, both Toomevara and Kildangan were celebrating county and Munster title success.

While Toomevara were beating 'The Combo" and Mount Sion, Kildangan were attempting to become part of the elite of Tipperary and by winning the Intermediate championship against Moyne/Templetuohy, a return to the senior ranks for the first time in 1975 was guaranteed.

Are they happy to just be in with the "big boys" after years of trying to get out of the

Intermediate grade? Not a bit of it.

They reached the last twelve of last year's county championship before bowing out to neighbours, Nenagh Eire Og. A fantastic achievement after a long year that saw them become All-Ireland Intermediate champions. What a fine way to leave the intermediate scene.

This year under the eye of coach Vincent McKenna, they have been mightily impressive. Moneygall was the perfect start for them after the rude awakening that they received from their opponents to senior hurling twelve months ago. A late scoring spree secured the win and they were off and running.

Any talk of a one-sided final went out the window after looking at Kildangan's performance in the semi-final. Their nine point win over Roscrea was fully deserved and if

it was double that, the Rossie's would have had no argument.

Their hurling was crisp and fast. Their support play was terrific and in Paddy Lynch and Darragh Egan, they have players who can amass big totals.

No disrespect to Moneygall and Roscrea, but Toomevara provide a big step-up in class for Kildangan but they will thrive on taking on a team they could only have dreamed of

playing less than two years ago.

Toomevara are appearing in their first North Final since 2003 and will be keen to restore themselves to the top of the senior hurling scene in North Tipperary. Burgess provided an early test but their craft and experience brought them through to a semi-final meeting against the side that had knocked them out of the pervious two championships.

A big crowd turned out in Cloughjordan expecting another cracker between Toome and Borris-lleigh but it didn't live up to expectations but Toomevara didn't mind, coming from behind in the second half to record a six point win with Eoin Brislane and Terry

Dunne two of the key men in that success.

New coach Pat Herbert has reignited the fire in this Toomevara team and they look a lot hungrier than they have done for some time. While they may not be near the heights they reached four to five years ago, they are still the team to beat in Co. Tipperary.

The perennial contenders against the new pretenders! An intriguing final is in store.

'04 Toome are Munster champs

Toomevara 1-14 Mount Sion 1-13

ut of the game for most of the year due to a serious arm injury, John O'Brien scored the winning point for Toomevara as they won their second Munster club championship, following a great finish at Semple Stadium last Sunday.

Few could believe that Toome could make such a come back. They trailed by four points at half time and went seven behind after Mount Sion out hurled them in the third quarter to lead by 1-13 to 0-9.

Paddy O'Brien cut over an excellent line ball on the 40th minute. Six minutes later Ken McGrath hit the upright with a free. The ball rebounded to the path of Sean Ryan whose first timed effort looked to be heading for the corner of Justin Cottrell's net only to see the ball deflect off John Boland's leg resulting in a 65. That 65 went wide from Ken McGrath.

Mount Sion never scored after that as Toomevara contested the last quarter with vigour.

Terry Dunne and Benny Dunne plus Padraig Hackett were beginning to win most of Ian O'Reagan's puck outs. Both Ken and Tommy Dunne were busy picking up the bits and pieces. O'Reagan denied Willie Ryan with an excellent save and Brislane followed up on the rebound by fly kicking the ball wide. At the other end Justin Cottrell came off his line to deny Eoin Kelly.

Six minutes elapsed as neither side scored. Paddy O'Brien pointed a free after Brislane was fouled. Devaney moved to wing forward and the move worked with immediate effect as he reduced the margin to four points.

The margin was down to three, as Mount Sion's Brian Greene was penalised for throwing the ball at midway. Tomas Dunne pointed the resulting free. The Toomevara

inside backline were having a tighter grip on the Mount Sion attack.

With three minutes to go Paddy O'Brien hit a superb line ball from 35 metres with lan O'Reagan gaining possession. With all avenues blocked he decided to throw up the ball in the small square. Willie Ryan read the situation to perfection and he expertly tapped the ball to an empty net.

The Toome following could not believe it. The pressure continued and one would expect to see a team so dominant to really sew it up. Not to be, as they hit four wides and then the upright. There were three minutes of additional time gone. A replay looked on the cards until John O'Brien bisected the posts from around forty five metres.

From the puck out Mount Sion were awarded a free. Protest from Tomas Dunne and other Toome players saw the position of the free ten metres closer. Up stepped Ken McGrath and much to the delight of the Toome following the free went to the right and wide.

Kildangan's last North senior final a distant memory

August 22nd 1943 Kildangan 6-2, Roscrea 5-4

Three of the players that helped Kildangan win their last North Tipp senior hurling final are alive today. The three include Paddy Morrissey who played at full back. Seamus Flannery was in the left corner and Jimmy was a substitute.

The final was played in MacDonagh Park. The teams were close rivals having already met in five finals 1934, '36, '37, '38 and '42. Roscrea

had won the lion's share.

So 3,700 spectators attended the decider. Kildangan had the breeze in the first half which helped them into a 4-2 to 0-1 lead at half time. Jimmy Grace had Kildangan's opening goal. Roscrea had Seamus McBrien sent off and Martin Loughnane was back to help shore up the defence. John Joe Maher was very much involved also.

Kildangan used their numerical advantage and Matt Coen landed a sixty-five. Martin Kennedy had Kildangan's second goal. Rody Gleeson

replaced the injured Paddy Devanney.
Another switch saw Paddy Morrissey move to the attack and he had goal number three.
Jimmy Killeen blasted a twenty metre free for goal number four and after twenty minutes, the challengers were leading by 4-2 to 0-1.

The scores remained the same at the interval and after the break, Martin Loughnane reverted to his starting position of right corner forward.

Sean O'Neill pointed for Roscrea. Joe Fletcher found the net to bring Roscrea closer. However John Gleeson combined with Martin Kennedy to send Danny Gleeson through for Kildangan's fifth goal.

The champions lost Joe Fletcher who retired injured and was replaced by J. Cunningham. Martin Loughnane slammed a twenty-one yard free to the net for Ros but Kildangan made sure of keeping their noses ahead when Coen and Grace sent Danny Gleeson in for the full forwards second goal.

Roscrea responded with a Hannon point.

Brussels added another before Martin Loughnane had another goal from a close in free. Bears added a point. The Kildangan defence were under tremendous pressure and in the closing minutes, they saw John Joe Maher's effort from sixty five go narrowly wide.

Apart from the goal scorers, Kildangan were well served C Coen in goals who made two great saves just before half time. Paddy Morrissey, Matt Coen, Danny Moloney, Seamus Flannery, Nicholas Flannery, John Gleeson, John Hogan and Rody Gleeson played well.

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Michael Bevans -Toomevara's most consistent

Ever since Michael Bevans first appeared in a Toomevara jersey, he has been the club's most consistent player.

He normally plays at right corner forward, but this year he has taken up a new position on

the wing.

Toomevara's first game in this year's championship was against Burgess. Toome looked in trouble, but Michael Bevans pulled them out of the fire, scoring 1-3 in their 2-18 to 3-10 victory. In the semi-final win over Borrislleigh Michael darted to every available part of the field to create any danger possible. It was a close affair as Michael added a point before John Delaney's goal sealed it.

Michael's display was similar to all of his performances ever since he first arrived on

scene in the 1988 U-12 championship final when he dazzled the Moneygall defence with amazing skill and good positional sense for a player of his

age.

He won medals at U-12, U-14 and U-16 levels and played a vital roles in helping North Tipp win a Munster U'16 and Garda Cup Final plus Tony Forestall and Nenagh Co-Op medals with his county.

Michael played minors for Tipp in

'95. Meanwhile, he collected his first North medal as a sub in '94. He added six more medals in '95, '97 and '99, '00, '02 and '03.

He was captain in the '03 win over Nenagh Eire Og. Apart from his seven North medals, he has collected county honours. In addition, he has two Munster medals.

How much for Jimmy Kennedy?

The recent World Cup and the outrageously high monitery value placed upon soccer players has, again, raised the 'what if' topic in GAA circles. What if hurlers and footballers could play for a county of their choice, or more specifically, a county that was prepared to pay enough for their services? What if players, surplus to requirements, could set their cap on helping out another county that mightn't be as well adorned with intercounty talent?

Whatever about the second 'what if' becoming a reality in time (and it might not be too far off at all), the likelihood of the first one bursting on to the scene is about as fanciful as lan Paisley stepping on to the Croke Park sod to greet the teams on All-Ireland final day. The reasons don't require any elaboration. Even if the 'play for pay' element that has reared itself in recent times were to eventually find favour, it is extremely unlikely that the bond that keeps the GAA so tightly gripped, that gradh for playing for one's native club/county, would be interfered with to such an outlandish extent.

We can think of Tipp's Declan Browne, whose loyalty to his county and Moyle Rovers has never wavered, despite the fact that there are other counties that would have 'fixed him up' if he was prepared to enlist with them and, perhaps, help them to All-Ireland honours.

All of fifty six years ago another Tipperary player was setting the hurling scene alight with another county and it led to an all-out campaign to have him declare for his native county at a time when things were relatively low here and a win was badly needed. In 1948 Dublin reached the All-Ireland final only to lose to Waterford and a valued and hugely influential member of that Dublin side was a young man from Puckane named JIMMY KENNEDY. Jimmy was a student at UCD and four years earlier he had helped St Flannan's College, Ennis to Harty Cup and All-Ireland colleges honours. In UCD his prowess saw him to the fore in colleges competition (Fitzgibbon Cup) and in the Dublin SHC too. Then, television had not arrived and unlike today, press reports on GAA activities were very scarce so that back home in Tipperary, all that Jimmy Kennedy was accomplishing and his outstanding scoring feats, especially from placed balls, would have gone unnoticed by the vast majority of Tipperary people.

That All Ireland final performance against Waterford, albeit on a losing team, to be followed by Jimmy's selection as captain of the Leinster team in the Railway Cup made Tipp's hurling fraternity take notice. Since winning the final of '45 Tipp had been out of the frame with very little sign of recovery. They were defeated by Limerick in each of the following years, the difficulty in swallowing that pill exacerbated by virtue of the fact that Limerick failed on each occasion to come out of the province. Maybe this young Kennedy chap might help change things, if he could be persuaded to transfer his hurling allegiance to his native county.

Co-incidentally, while plans were afoot to reclaim the

Puckane man whose only hurling reward back home had been a North junior championship medal with Kiladangan as a lad of 18 summers in 1944, things were happening down near the Galway border where a goalkeeper named Martin Charles Reddington, was giving a new lease of life to Lorrha. That name would change to Tony Reddin and with it so too would his influence on his adopted club. His performances in the blue of Lorrha would soon see him in the Tipp colours as the road back to All-Ireland glory began to be traversed.

But young Kennedy had to be brought home too. The plans were hatched and two highly articulate and deeply committed men in former GAA President Seamus Gardiner and Fr Johnnie Minehan were selected to accompany County Secretary Phil Purcell on a mission of recovery. They travelled to Dublin and met Jimmy, with all their powers of persuasion used to the limit. It wasn't easy, Jimmy liked the Dublin hurling scene. He was happy there. He liked playing for UCD and for Dublin. Still, the persuasive influence of the travellers worked. Jimmy declared for his native county and made his debut in a Thomond Shield match against Clare on May 8th 1949. Four months later he would be the proud possessor of an All Ireland medal following Tipp's 3-11 to 0-3 win over Laois, That campaign would have seen him notch a grand total of 6-37 in six games. When the McCarthy Cup was retained in 1950, Jimmy's scoring contribution was 4-23 in five games.

As Tipp set off for their three-in-a-row Jimmy Kennedy hardly anticipated that in quelling Wexford's fire, he would have no part to play in that achievement. He scored 1-3 in the first round defeat of Waterford but was dropped for the semi-final against Limerick and came on as a sub, being then named for the provincial final against Cork, a match he played with cracked ribs. There was no All-Ireland final place for him and his disappointment at not being chosen was compounded by virtue of the fact that although he had played in two of the championship matches he was omitted from the list of substitutes that also received medals. Later selected to play in the Oireachtas, he declined.

Jimmy Kennedy had played his last match for Tipperary and he was aged only 25 years. Just imagine, had the transfer system existed and had Jimmy Kennedy been 'transferred' from Dublin in '49, it would surely have been for a record figure. Then, in the autumn of 1951 the cheque books would have been out, his signature sought eagerly by several counties. His intercounty career that had been cut short so unexpectedly and abruptly after all the persuasion there had been to have him declare for Tipp, might have extended much farther in another county.

Jimmy Kennedy still remains a legend in Tipperary hurling and is surely deserving of that 1951 All-Ireland medal.

Maybe the Kildangan club might set about having the wrong righted!

Meet Michael 'Spike' Holan

ery few have done so much for gaelic games in this county as Micheal Nolan from Kildangan. Hurling and football, refereeing or administration, Spike, as he is better known, has done it all.

A carpenter by trade, Spike worked for thirty years with the ESB in Ardnacrusha.

He is married to Margaret and they have six children.

He is the current Treasurer of the Tipperary County Board a position he is serving for his second spell but his activity with the GAA began much earlier as a player with Moneygall.

In his hurling career he played with

Tipperary's successful county under-21 team that won the Munster and All-Ireland finals in 1967. He played on the very successful Moneygall side, which captured two county finals in 1975 and 1976. Those victories more than compensated for a number of near misses at club and county level.

Whereas his footballing success is not as impressive he still has a respectable tally of achievements. Starting in 1963 he won a divisional junior medal. He followed up in 1964 with divisional and county honours in the same grade. There was mixed luck in 1965. Moneygall were beaten in the county senior football final by Commercials but had the consolation of beating Ardfinnan for the county under-21 title.

In 1966, there was defeat in the county senior final but success at divisional under-21 level. This great under-21 squad had a last fling in 1967 with victory in the division but defeat by Fethard in the county final. Spike won a divisional intermediate title in 1980.

Spike's ability with the big ball is reflected in his county achievements. In 1966 he was on the under-21, junior and senior football panels. In 1967 he was on the under-21 panel.

Spike also made his name as a referee, the high points of which were the refereeing of the senior hurling final in 1984 and the senior football finals in 1985 and 1986. His older brother, Tom, was a well-known referee and county football selector.

As his involvement on the hurling and football fields was coming to a close, Spike became involved with his club affairs. As an enthusiastic member of the Moneygall Development Committee, he was involved in the construction of the clubs sports complex in 1976/1977.

He was a club representative at divisional board level before he was elected registrar of the board in 1982 for three years.

At the end of that period he was elected treasurer, a post he held for a further six years before he was elected county treasurer in 1988 for a three year term. He returned as divisional treasurer in 1991 and remained in that position until the end of 2000, when he was elected county treasurer once again.

In that twenty years Michael has turned the role of treasurer into an art. His annual reports gives a detailed account of every last penny that is spent or saved. Apart from being a Treasurer, Michael is also known for his astuteness and is never afraid to speak his mind.

When he transferred to the Kildangan club in the early eighties he threw himself energetically into the club's activities, helping out at all levels of activity and contributing in no small way to the success of the club. He was chairman from 1997-1999.

During his term as chairman, Kildangan won the County Minor hurling final in 1998 with a team that sports seven or eight players in action today. That was the beginning of the clubs current period of success that has scene three North Intermediate hurling titles, one county title, a Munster and All-Ireland intermediate honour as well.

His sons Michael, Enda and Martin all played hurling with Kildangan. Enda is a member of today's panel. His daughters, Bride, Yvonne and Lorraine had played their part too.

Today, Michael's family will be cheering on Kildangan to win their first North Senior title in 63 years. What odds on a county title to follow.

Pat continued on the success trail and the following year he won his first North U'21 'B' medal and added a second in 2004. That year was crowned with a county medal after a great win over Arravale Rovers, a success which meant a lot to the Dromineer lad as he played a great game in the final forming a great partnership with Darragh Egan.

Pat wasn't on the successful Intermediate team in 2001 but instead he won a North Junior 'B' title after defeating Nenagh Éire Óg. He made the intermediate team in 2002 normally on the wing, and won his first medal against Newport. He won his second in 2004 before playing key roles in the county, Munster and All Ireland Intermediate



successes.

He was top scorer in the All-Ireland semifinal win over St Thomas of Galway on 0-5, with 0-3 from frees, and provided 0-3 from play in the All-Ireland final win against Carrickshock.

In today's final, Pat will be lining out against Tipperary's U-21 Captain, David Young and it promises to be a great battle.

Pat is employed as a plasterer and works with his father, Pat senior. The Lynch household have a keen interest in the affairs of Kildangan and his parents, Pat and Mary, along with his sisters, Jennifer and Ciara attend most of the games.

Toomevara lived up to their favourites tag to win their eight North Senior title in twelve years in Tomas MacDonagh Park, Cloughjordan.

Three first half goals – two by Willie Ryan and one by John O Brien proved to be enough to deny Nenagh the chance of an upset.

It was a final that never raised the passions of the followers despite the teams going level four times in the opening twenty minutes. Eire Og fell six points behind at one stage in the second half but recovered to come within two and six minutes of normal time remaining.

It was Toome's 30th title all right and inside four minutes, John O Brien had the ball in the Nenagh net. Consistent rain fell throughout. Tomas Dunne came on for the injured Padraic Hackett after 16 minutes and pointed a free from a difficult angle

Willie Ryan grabbed his team's second goal to help take a 2-4 to 0-7 lead after 23 minutes. Nenagh kept in touch spurred on by accurate free taking of Michael Cleary but two minutes into added time, Toome had their third goal thanks to clever stick work by Willie Ryan.

Toome led 3-6 to 0-10 at half time. The skies brightened for the second half and Toome went six ahead thanks to Francis Devaney. Nenagh tightened up their defence and entered a bright spell with points from Cleary bringing the light blues to within two of the leaders.

That was as far as it goes for Nenagh. The holders replied with three late points thanks to Ken Dunne, two, and one from Willie Ryan.

The late Tom Ryan, Toomevara was the leading scorer in the 1966 North Senior Final between Lorrha and Toomevara. The former Tipp star scored 1-7 with 1-4 coming from frees. Despite his great deeds, Toome were on the losing side as Lorrha won by 3-11 to 2-13.

Not a nice thing to happen on the morning of a North senior final but when Toomevara were looking ahead to their 1966 North final clash with Lorrha, they were dealt a severe blow when they discovered that Michael Bevans and Matt Hassett would have to cry off the team due to injury.

Goalkeeping in the blood. Present Toomevara keeper, James McGrath, is a nephew of Pat McGrath and Jody Grace both of whom were outstanding goalkeepers with Toome in the eighties and nineties.

Finals by twenty

August 25 1946: TOOMEVARA 6-7, ROSCREA 2-4

Over 6,000 people saw Toomevara become North senior hurling champions when they defeated Roscrea in the final at MacDonagh Park, Nenagh.

The young Greyhounds ended a thirteen year absence in what was the best final in years.

Roscrea moved into a 1-1 to 0-2 lead after Jack Maher beat Rody Nolan with an early goal. But two goals by Martin Burke and further goals through John Gleeson and Willie Harty helped Toome to a 4-2 to 2-3 lead at the interval.

Roscrea applied the pressure early in the second half but Rody Nolan made a number of great saves. Having survived the onslaught, Toome settled the issue in the final ten minutes with Dan Kennedy and Willie Harty finding the net twice.

Toomevara led 2-7 to 1-5 at half time thanks to goals by Tom and Roger Ryan. Lorrha captain, Noel Lane had the Lorrha goal.

Early in the second half and Lorrha full forward, Mick Doyle had his team's second goal. Toome went three up on the three quarter hour mark before Peter Hogan had the teams level when he bellowed the Toome net with a twenty one yard free. Toome took the lead on three occasions but Lorrha levelled every time. Then Peter Hogan grabbed a 57th minute winner from a free to make Lorrha the champions after a ten year lapse.

Kildangan win All-Ireland Inter. final

Kildangan 2-13, Carrickshock 1-13

t was one of the most extraordinary ten minutes in the club's history. Ten minutes, when Kildangan came from three points behind, lost a key player threw injury, and defeated the best Kilkenny could throw at them, to win the first ever All-Ireland Intermediate Club final at Semple Stadium.

With three minutes of normal time remaining, Kildangan were trailing by 1-12 to 0-12. Defeat was staring them in the face. Dan Hackett, who played heroically at centre back, throughout the game, was switched to the attack. It was a repeat of the move he made in the semi-final against St. Thomas, when he scored the match winning goal.

His first attempt for a score went wide. His next attempt ended in injury as he lay agonisingly on the ground with a badly broken ankle. Play was held up for three to four minutes before he was stretchered off. Conor Hayes, who had earlier being substituted, replaced him. The corner forward would play a key part in those final

When play resumed the game Sean Gleeson, also a substitute won possession and his delivery landed at the feet of Conor Hayes. Hayes first timed but his shot was parried by Carrickshock goalkeeper Brendan Hoyne. Backs and forwards foraged for the ball but somehow the sliotar ended up in the net. Later on, Darragh Egan said it was an own goal.

Sean Gleeson followed on by sending Tommie Connors through for a point. Then Kildangan made one more attack and Conor Hayes first timed to the net for the match winning goal.

After seven minutes of added time, the full time whistle went and Kildangan were crowned All-Ireland champions.

What a finish. From Dermot Hogan up to Darragh Egan at corner forward, Kildangan provided fifteen heroes and nineteen if you include the substitutes. Dan Hackett and Ger Slattery starred at half back. Liam Kelly never played as well at full back curbing the threat of a quality player like Michael Rice. At corner back, Michael Rvan was a star of stars.

Liam Karl Flannery, whose hurling year looked in doubt two months earlier because of a serious knee injury, played brilliantly when he came on. Brian Kelly battled all through the game and his partner Tommie Connors made a vital contribution.

oday's final will be a very unique occasion as if their team selection remains unchanged from the semi-final win over Borris-Ileigh, one-third of the Toomevara team will come from one family.

For the first time in a North Tipperary Senior Hurling Final, five brothers will line up behind the band with the famous Dunne family doing the honours.

While all five have featured in North Finals previously in 2002 and 2003, never have five members of one family started a North Final.

Tommy (Captain), Terry, Ken and Benny are all household names to hurling followers in the premier county but Barry Dunne is also part of the Dunne dynasty and he will make his first start in a North Final today.

hen the late Canon John Mulqueen brought a group of people together in the winter of 1973 to re-organise underage hurling in the parish of Toomevara, no one envisaged then that the foresight and vision shown would have such an impact on the club's hurling history.

Johnny Ryan, Moycarkey Borris recalls his memories of Martin Kennedy

Former Tipperary star, Martin Kennedy, was a great Tipperary hurler. He played hurling with Toomevara and won ten North senior medals between 1919 and 31 and four county medals in 1919, 23, 30 and 31. He switched to Kildangan club in 1932 and won three more North medals. He won numerous other awards including Railway Cup medals, Thomond Shields and was selected at full forward by the readers of the Tipperary Star newspaper for the Millennium team off

Who could ask finer? A bright fire, a comfortable chair, Johnny Ryan sitting opposite, talking hurling with humour and relish and, at the appropriate time, his good wife appearing with something appetising to keep us going.

The welcome blaze in the grate was fuelled aptly enough with material from not far away in Littleton. If anyone should have lots of sound turf it is Johnny, he gave from 1941 to 79 working with Bord na Mona.

The great backman, of club, county, and provincial fame; winner of Tipp

championships, All-Irelands and Provincial Cups admired as a

defensive craftsman – who better qualified to remember and to assess his fellow hurlers. If he has a hobby in retirement it might be just that – discussing hurling, recalling men and matches.

The year then ending had removed from among the living, some very famous players - Tipp hurlers like Martin Kennedy, Dan

Mackey, Mick Maher; Cork star Johnny Quirke and

Waterford goalie, Jim Ware.

Johnny went on to tell about his team (Moycarkey/Borris) playing Kildangan-Kilbarron in the Jubilee County Senior Final of 1934. It was his first senior final.

"I had the privilege of playing on Kennedy. I was left corner back. Kennedy switched out from full forward in the second half. He had been on John Maher of Killough in the first. It was a thrill for me.

Martin was a veteran of ten years with Tipp, the most famous full forward off all time. I decided to get out before him as I thought I would have more speed than him. Twould be foolish to stay behind him and let him get the first move. We beat Kildangan-Kilbarron that day and I was happy to come through the test,"

What struck Johnnie about Kennedy's methods? "He had a brilliant brain, great ball control, fast stickwork and you could expect all sorts of cleverness from him. He varied his tactics from one ball to the next. He might be out to a ball crouch as if to stop it, then suddenly step aside and let fly. He would create a free for himself if he could. The least touch and he would be down on his hands and knees. In the finish. the referees would often blow against him because they suspected he was play acting.


Martin won his first All-Ireland medal (Junior) in 1924. He won two senior in1925 and 30 and toured America with Tipp to become world champions.

"Kennedy was on the Toomevara team that defeated Moycarkey in 1931," recalls Johnny. "He won three north medals with Kildangan–Kilbarron in 34, 38 and 43. He missed two years, in the late thirties, because of ill- health.

"Martin was quite," said Johnny. He would not push himself to talk about his own achievements. He could be got to sing when he had a few jars. His favourite song was The Toomevara Greyhounds.

"Tom Duffy, Lorrha, was one of his best friends. They used travel together to meet their former team-mates at funerals and other events. Martin was a friend to all that played with and against. Sweeper and myself went to see him just before he died.

God rest him, he was a wonderful man, said Johnny.
