

Ballingarry or Killenaule? The Expert View

Killenaule won't want to lose the final after putting so much effort into their two games against Mullinahone in the semi-final. Those two games, plus the earlier first round game against last year's Intermediate Champions, could be crucial in Killenaule's bid to retain their title.

The champions stormed through the loser's group after the first round shock at the hands of Mullinahone in Cloneen and then after coming close to defeat again in the semi-final, they responded in the best possible fashion in the replay to win comfortably.

That match practice could be the difference between the sides. Killenaule have had five games to date to Ballingarry's two and in neither game were Ballingarry overly impressive. Ballingarry will be looking to Blondie Ivors and Don Lyons in their bid for their fourth title but the experience of players such as Davy Hearne, Donie O'Connell, Michael Brennan and Joe O'Dwyer may just swing it for Killenaule and see them to their sixteenth title.

When asked to pen a few lines for this programme on the atmosphere surrounding Killenaule-Ballingarry rivalry my mind wandered back to a personal experience of the vigour and unmitigated passion of contests between these two great clubs.

I hasten to add that I never had the pleasure of being what you would call a good hurler, never mind playing in a South Senior hurling final, so my little piece of reminiscence conerns that of a humble under-age participant in the Killenaule colours. The precise year escapes me, but it was either '76 or '77 and we were facing Ballingarry in a round of the South minor championship, in Fethard. It sticks in my mind for a variety of reasons, not least the fact that it poured cats and dogs for most of the hour, and I was marking Michael Sparrow and got the proverbial hurling lesson from the then left-half-back, with whom I later became

quite friendly as we worked within yards of each other. Indeed, I wish him well today in his quest for a Mid-Senior medal with Thursles Sarsfields.

My most vivid memory of that game, however, was not that we lost by a few points but the sheer tenacity and legitimate physical force of the contest. You were either in it or you were not! I was not! It had everything you could think of, savoury and unsavoury, and I can tell you if we had physios at that time they would have been working overtime! Some of the modern sportswriters would probably have described it as sheer tribalism. And, sure, they would be close to the mark!

Yet, when it was all over, it was all over, like many a contest before it, and after it, and if the rivalry became over-intense it was always put down by either side as an integral part of the special atmosphere that prevails between two neighbouring clubs who know each other so well. As we face into today's final the enthusiasm is every bit as infectious in both parishes as in the past, and still whatever happens on the field of play there is an almost tangible healthy respect between the clubs. You will find players and officials mingling freely, in a social capacity wherever they meet, whether it be in Killenaule or Ballingarry, a situation that is unlikely to ever change regardless of the heavy banter that may go on.

It must not be forgotten that they bring a huge appeal to hurling in the division too, and ample proof of that was seen in the record gate receipts of the South Board when the teams last met in the '87 final. Today could see the record broken.

The clash of Killenaule and Ballingarry in this year's South Senior Hurling final is eagerly awaited, not only in these two neighbouring parishes, but also by hurling followers throughout the South Division. Because they are neighbouring parishes, the stakes will be high with rivalry pride and honour to the fore.

It is hard to predict an outcome to this final. Killenaule, the defending South Champions, were slow to get off the mark in this year's championship having been beaten by Mullinahone in the opening round, and then having to come through the Losers group. They were not their usual impressive selves in the drawn semi-final against Mullinahone, hitting a total of 17 wides. However, Killenaule showed a vast improvement for the replay and the result was never really in doubt from half time onwards. They will be looking to players like Donie O'Connell, Michael Brennan, the Shelleys, Paul and Tony and the O'Dwyers, Joe and John to once again play like men inspired.

For Ballingarry, this South final will be a big test. Under the guidance of former county great, Theo English, they certainly have served a fine brand of hurling in this year's championship. Some will argue that the men from Ballingarry were lucky to beat Carrick Swan in the semi-final, literally snatching victory form the jaws of defeat. That win proves two things, this Ballingarry team do no give up until the final whistle, and that they do not lack the fitness to hurl for the full hour. They will be hoping that on the day players like Don Lyons, Seamus Doheny, the Ivors "Blondie" and Shane, and the Shelleys, Dan and Kevin, can play to expectations.

Maybe because of their display in that marvellous semi-tinal against Swan, Ballingarry will start today's final as slight favourites, but then again Killenaule may have the edge in terms of experience. One word of caution to both teams, 1992 has proven to be the year of the beaten favourites and the year of the beaten defending champions. It all makes for a very interesting game of championship hurling.



The appearance in Clonmel today of Ballyneale Under 21 hurlers in the B final is a historic day for the Club as this is the first time in the club's history that a team from the Parish of Ballyneale and Grangemockler has made it to this stage of the championship.

Indeed Ballyneale have never won a championship in Minor or Under 21 grades as a club on its own. Until recent years, the club was often unable to field a team on its own in the grades. However, in 1985 Ballyneale combined with Moyle Rovers as Slievenamon to win a great victory over Fethard in the Minor B final.

Since then success has been scarce for Ballyneale hurling at any level but 1987 was a famous year for the club when South Junior title came to the Parish, after a long wait, being the club's first since 1948. In 1990 the junior hurlers again reached the South final, only to be narrowly beaten in the decider.

So win, lose or draw today, the club is proud of the players who have played so whole-heartedly throughout the championship to reach this decider. In the first round they ousted one of the favourites, Carrick Davins by a couple of points. In the quarter-final Ballylooby/Castlegrace were eventually overcome in a dour game. The team upped their performance a great deal for the semi-final in which they defeated a highly fancied Kilsheelan.

Preparations since have gone quite well for today's game. Hopefully, the team will deliver another whole hearted display today.

Finally, the whole team will no doubt miss the services of Tony Lanigan, who played a significant part in the team to date. Tony, will no doubt be wishing he could be here today from far away New Zealand.

Killenaule's New Pitch

Killenaule GAA Club is now providing the facilities that a club of its standing in the association deserves, a proper playing field of its own.

Killenaule hurling may have been flying high in recent years, with three South Championships in the last four years, but the pitch remained something of an embarrassment.

It was both too short and too narrow for competitive games and could only be used by the club for training.

But now the club has purchased an additional twelve acres for £25,000 and plans to provide facilities second to none.

In addition to extending the main pitch, the club will also provide a juvenile pitch and a running track as well as making facilities available for local schools and even other sports.

Even though the sale has been agreed, the actual money hasn't been raised yet, according to club and local curate, Fr. Liam Ryan.

But he is confident that the £25,000

will be raised to purchase the land known locally as the Pike Meadow.

A significant amount will come from the club's involvement in the County Board Draw and the club has already managed to increase the number of members in the draw locally from one hundred to over seven hundred.

Fr. Ryan says the club will also be appealing to Killenaule people living outside the town to contribute towards the venture.

And he expects good support. "We have a great hurling tradition here and we need our own facilities," he remarks.

The club hopes to have the land fully paid for by the end of this year and to have the pitch playable by the end of 1993. Fortunately new dressing rooms and a club house ar not needed as the land is adjacent to the Killenaule Sports Complex which the club already uses.

When complete the facility will be worthy of a club with Killenaule's traditions, believes Fr. Ryan.


