In the 1969 Co. Final, Commercials beat Ardfinnan on the score 2-13 to 0-13, in the South Final of the same year the result and the score was exactly the same.

Ardfinnan appeared in 5 South S.F. Finals in a row from 1960 to 1964. They won 4 in a row in '61, '62, '63, '64 defeating in turn Commercials. Burncourt, Fethard and Commercials.

Clonmel Commercials was founded in 1932 as a Minor Football Club. It won its first championship, the South Minor title, in 1935 and its first Senior title in 1944.

Ardfinnan and Commercials first met in a South S.F. Final at Kilsheelan on the 11th November 1939. The game was refeered by Paddy Joe Sullivan of Kilsheelan. The game ended in a draw as did the replay. The second replay took place on the 31st March 1940 and Ardfinnan won on the score 1-3 to 0-1. Ardfinnan won on the score 1-3 to 0-1. Ardfinnan went on to win the Co. Final beating a West selection in Treacy Park, Tipperary by 1-3 to 1-1.



WHEN LAST THEY MET IN A SOUTH S.F. FINAL

It is hard to believe that twenty years have elapsed since these two great rivals have met in a South S.F. Final.

On the 25th August 1974 Commercials and Ardfinnan battled it out for Football supremacy in the Division. The venue was Clonmel Sportsfield and the first half of the game was a low scoring affair. Ardfinnan led at half time 0-4 to 0-2 despite being without the services of Michael Babs Keating. The game ended in a welter of excitement as Ardfinnan led by 2-6 to 0-9. Commercials were awarded a penalty by Referee George Ryan. But Ritchie Boyle denied Commercials the goal they needed to level the game with a great save from Gene McGrath. There was no further scoring and Ardfinnan went on to retain their title.





ARDFINNAN

The village is back. Those words are reference to Ardfinnan, who for the first time in twenty years are back in the South Tipp Football Final. Ardfinnan has always been known as the Village and is made up of players from Ardfinnan, Grange and Ballybacon. For a village so steeped in football folklore twenty years is a long time to wait. In Ardfinnan football is a way of life and even though we were going through a drought at senior level, the club worked very hard at underage level in order to build up a good team at Senior level again. For us it is great to be back in the South Final. For some strange reason Ardfinnan seem to stir up more emotion when going well than most other teams. I suppose the closeness of supporters with the team creates this. We also seem to create a broader interest; during the glory days of the 1960s people would come in from outside counties to see South and County Finals. We also gave good value for money. So in a way Tipp football need Ardfinnan.

For me being part of the football scene came very easy as my father the late Jackie O'Mahoney was chairman all through the 1930 period when Ardfinnan won its first County title at Junior level in 1934 as well as Senior in 1935 - 1939. Ardfinnan won the Tipp Cup in 1944/45/58. Our only championship from 1939 to 1961 was Junior in 1954. Then along came the dream team of 1961/1974 period.

I think almost every member of 1961 team played inter-county at some level. Babs Keating won Minor - U21 - Senior in the one year with Ardfinnan. Those teams of that period won 5 County Championships and lost 6 Finals. We also won at U21 and Minor during 1961/74 period. If one incident stands out in my mind during those glorious years it has to be a jump for a high ball by John Keating, against Bansha Galtee Rovers. In the County Semi-final in 1962 at Clonmel, John jumped with Sean McGovern for a high ball and was a clear six foot above Sean. He held the ball and he got a great point. Never before or never after did I see a jump like that. Our present team is made up of young and seasoned players. Most of them have won County medals at underage but are now hoping for the breakthrough at senior level. I think this team is good enough to win. At least ten of the panel's fathers have County Senior medals. So tradition dies hard. The team is in the hands of very experienced people such as Pete Savage, Mike Leary, Freddie Quinn, Patsy Myles, John Cummings. Breda Lonergan is in charge of First Aid. Officers of the club at present are: Tom O'Mahoney (Chairman), Deirdre Myles, Fran Leary (Joint Treasurer), Paddy Noonan (Hon.Sec.).

We all wish the team the best of luck today.

THE LATE TOMMY O'KEEFFE A TRIBUTE

It is appropriate as we gather here in Kilsheelan today for the Final of our premier football competition in the Division that we remember one of the supreme stylists of the game - the late Tommy O'Keeffe, R.I.P. - who passed to his eternal reward just recently.



Tommy was one of the greatest exponents of the art of Gaelic football that this Division has produced. He began his career in Kilsheelan in 1924 winning South and Co. Junior medals. His great skills earned him recognition by the Co. Selectors and in 1927 he began an Inter Co. career that was to last the best part of twenty years. He was a member of the Co. Football team which sensationally defeated Kerry in the Munster Championship Semi Final of 1928; the last time the Co. has done so and a member of the 1944 Co. team which defeated Cork at the same stage. In between he won two Co. S.F. medals with Kilsheelan, one with Clonmel Shamrocks and one in 1944 with Clonmel Commercials. He was also a regular on Munster teams of the 30s and, of course, won a Munster medal with Tipp in 1935. His great contribution to Tipperary Football was honoured by the United Sports Panel when he was awarded the Knocknagow Award for Sportsman of the Past and in 1979 the South Board honoured him yet again with the Footballer of the Past award for South Tipperary. Honours well deserved by a supreme stylist whose football talents were admired by friend and foe alike.

His dedication to physical fitness was an example to all in the latter years of his life and he was a familiar figure on his bike or walking on the roads of South Tipperary. His friendship and reminiscences of days gone by will be missed by many but his great contribution to Gaelic Games and to life in general will always be remembered.



SOME OF THE HISTORY OF FOOTBALL

So much for the history of athletics and hurling prior to the founding of the G.A.A. What light do chroniclers of the past shed on football in Ireland? Some hold that all present-day codes of football derived from the harpastrum of the ancient Greeks and Romans. Morris Marples inclines to the view that football had its origins among the Celtic peoples; certainly the rough-and-ready game first known here and in England at the end of the Middle Ages seems to have been a development of *La Soule*, a game in which a large ball of leather stuffed with straw or hay was kicked and chased by opposing teams in Normandy and Brittany a thousand years ago. Others hold that football was as well known as hurling in Ireland and that the term *iomain* was applied to either game.

Native speakers in the Omeath Gaeltacht of Leinster, always a football stronghold, used *iomain* to designate football and *iomain le camain* for hurling; but some knowledgeable Gaelgeoiri stoutly maintain that *iomain* meant hurling and *iomain le crois* football. The fact remains that the first direct reference to football in Ireland does not occur until the 16th century when it was exempted from a ban on other non-military sports. In 1527 the Statutes of Galway ordered the citizens not to play with the shot or stone, but only to shoot with bows and to throw the dart or spear, "also at no tyme to use or occupy the hurlings of the litill ball with hockie sticks or staves, nor use no hands ball to play without the walls, but only the great footeball....". The game, like hurling and other athletic pastimes, had been prohibited, constantly and unavailingly, during the two previous centuries, as a hindrance to archery, lance-throwing, 'and other gentle games that appertain to arms'.

Though football of an elementary rough and tumble type seems to have continued through Tudor, Stuart and Cromwellian times, the next reference to the game is found in a poem by the North Leinster poet, Seumas Dall MacCuarta. In *Ioman na Boinne*, a twelve-verse Gaelic poem, he describes a football match played about 1670 at Fennor, on the south bank of the Boyne, not far from Slane. MacCuarta used the word *leanadh* for the playing pitch.

From the brief description given of the game it appears that snatching and carrying the ball were features of the play, with wrestling permitted. Victory went to the Boyne Valley team, their opponents being men from an adjoining district on the banks of the Nanny River. John Dunton, the English writer already quoted, travelled Ireland seven years later and in his letters had this to say: 'They (the Irish) do not often play at football, only in a small territory called Fingal near Dublin where the people use it much and trip and shoulder verie handsomely.

Redmond Murphy, an Omeath poet writing in Gaelic, described a football match in which his two sons played; twelve men from each of two rival parishes took part: the footballers trained beforehand, while wrestling, tripping, running with the ball and snatching it were features of the game. In Dublin itself about the same time, there were matches at Merrion Fields and on Oxmantown Green. During the seventeenforties a long-remembered football match was played on the ice-bound Liffey, frozen after a spell of heavy frost. Forty years later, according to the poems of Edward ('pleasant Ned') Lysaght, football was played every evening in College Park by the 'pensioners' and 'commoners' of Trinity.
