



This evening Glanbia Gain Senior Hurling Championship decider brings into opposition famed Carrick Swans for long the kingpins in the grade and the proud holders of 20 titles and C.J. Kickhams, Mullinahone comparative newcomers to senior ranks whose three titles have all been gained in recent years.

Based on semi-final performances many judges have installed Mullinahone as warm favourites and whilst there can be no doubt but that a repeat of the form thrown against Ballingarry will make them extremely hard to beat, it must be remembered that recent meetings of the teams have seen the results go mainly in Swans favour.

In last year's league stages Swans were successful by 1-13 to 1-12 and they then went on to defeat today's rivals by 3-13 to 3-7 in the semi-final. This year in the league stages the sides finished level so all the indications are that a very exciting decider looks in prospect.

Mullinahone are laden with players who have worn the blue and gold of Tipp with pride and, indeed, only three members of the team have not enjoyed that honour. The likes of John Leahy, Brian O Meara, Pat Croke, Sean Brett, Paul and Eoin Kelly and Paul Curran are household names that would adorn any final.

By comparison the Swan players do not possess the same high profile but they lack nothing in skill or determination and names to watch out for include Kieran Maguire, Tomas Keane, Ray Dunne, Alan P. Ryan, Sean Barnett and Philip Loughnan.

We wish both teams well. The evening's curtain raiser, a relegation battle between St. Marys and Carrick Davins, should get events off to a cracking start. Both sides are proud of their senior status and will not surrender their standing without a major battle.

The mini game is a new innovation on Southern Final day and the cream of the Division's under 12 players are sure to provide lots of entertainment. The famed Sean Treacy Pipe Band will add further lustre to the occasion.

1990 - SWAN'S LAST SUCCESS

On the 19th of August 1990 at Clonmel Sportsfield, our senior hurlers won the South title for the 20th time and the first since 1986 when defeating champions Killenaule 3-7 to 2-7 in a memorable game. Training for the 1990 campaign began in March under the watchful eye of trainer Bernard O'Neill, Tournaments and challenge games were the order of the day for the first month or so.

EARLY ROUNDS

In the first round of the championship we were drawn against Killenaule who seemed to have the "Indian sign" over us the past couple of years. The game was played in Clonmel and after a good hour's hurling by both teams Killenaule again proved our masters with a seven points' victory, 2-15 to 1-11. We had our chances of victory but overall we could not complain about the result.

So it was into the losers' group but we were not too despondent as we are generally slow starters in the competition. Our play-off game was against Cahir and it was with apprehension that we travelled to Clonmel, but after a shaky opening period we finally took control and ran out winners by 3-15 to 2-10. Some concern for our selectors was conceding soft frees near goal.

Training was now being stepped up and the attendance increasing as we awaited the semi-final clash with our great rivals from Ballingarry. Ballingarry had already won the league final and were installed as favourites in the days coming up to the game. We were more hopeful than confident as we took the field on that windy day in Clonmel. We had first use of that big wind but after ten minutes we only had a few points to show on the scoreboard, then our forwards clicked into overdrive and Ballingarry were swept off their feet.

Our big full forward line of Tony Fitzpatrick, Dick Lonergan and Tom Waters were revelling in all the possession that was coming their way and the game was as good as over by half-time. Ballingarry tried to rally early in the second half but the Swan men were in confident mood now and giving nothing away. We ran out easy winners in the end: 4-12 to 0-6. The hunger that was missing in previous years was now evident in our play and some of our near veterans seemed to be after visiting Tir na nOg. Maurice Walsh was brilliant at left full-back, Eoin Cooney was hurling like a man inspired. Ray Walsh, also a newcomer, was showing great promise.

THE FINAL

South final day was nothing new to the "Swans" but everybody in the club seemed to sense the need for victory this time round. The men from Killenaule, the holders in '88 and '89, were again our opponents but after our display in the semi-final we were quietly confident of taking the cup back to Carrick.

South final day arrived and it turned out one of the wettest days of the year. We played into the breeze in the first half and looked in deep trouble at half-time with the score Killenaule 1-7 to 0-1 ahead. The Swan dressing room at half-time was no place for the faint-hearted as harsh words were spoken and each player to a man listened and obeyed.

Within two minutes of the restart the tonic we needed arrived - a passing movement involving Sean Cronin, M. J. Russell ended with Tony Fitzpatrick bulging the Killenaule net and the Swans were now flying. Points followed in quick succession and then Dick Lonergan and Tom Waters fired in more goals and the game was within our grasp. But Killenaule, stout men that they are, rallied with a good goal and we had to sweat out the last few minutes' final score Swans 3-7, Killenaule 2-7. Gerry Kehoe lifted the cup to delighted Swan supporters and the young juveniles, wet as they were on the far side of the ground, now had their own local heroes. We pay tribute to our backroom team of Pat Ryan, Michael Walsh and Tony Fitzpatrick (who coached the team), also our great trainer Bernard O'Neill.

Wise Words From The Walls



WILLIE WALL

The Wall Brothers from Newtown, Willie and Tom, Swan's most celebrated players enjoyed a lifetime of hurling and we wish them well on this big day for the Carrick Club.

The Walls had very definite views on the modern game as these snippets from an interview with Michael O'Meara in the 1991 Tipperary G.A.A. Yearbook illustrated:-

"Today's game has changed completely from that played in our day. It is not faster as many people feel. In our day it was all ground hurling, now it's catch and run. You cannot beat ground hurling, Tipp won all their matches on the ground. Running with the ball leads to trouble and slows up the game. The hand pass should be banned. The back has no chance with the hand pass."

"The Under-21 grade is the most important of all. It is the ideal stepping stone to Senior. It's a wonderful competition. The Under-12, Under-14 and Under-16 we have no time for at all. It's win the whole time. Players should be playing for the love of the game. Young players are burned out too early".

"There was a better spirit and give and take in our day. You'd be ashamed to lie down and now they are throwing themselves down".

"To be able to defend yourself is one of the arts of the game. Stand in close and you'll never get hurt. We could not wear a helmet to save our lives".

"There is no midfield play or overhead hurling now".

At the end of their playing careers the Walls had one regret:-

"We never had the satisfaction of beating Thurles Sarsfields in a championship. They were a marvellous club and were great to train a team. You could beat Sarsfields all over the field but they would still end up getting the scores. We would dearly love to have beaten them". Best wishes to All Teams

1993 - MULLINAHONE'S FIRST TITLE

In 1945 Mullinahone last won a divisional senior football title. Prior to 1993 the club had never appeared in a divisional senior hurling final let alone won one.

On 22nd August, 1993, all that was changed forever as Mullinahone's senior hurlers, in only their second year in the ranks, and appearing in their very first final, defeated Carrick Swans who were seeking their 21st South Tipperary senior hurling title. Perhaps it was an omen of things to come that as patrons flocked to Clonmel that day they were met with a programme whose covers were in green and red, the colours of the brash and youthful challengers.

The final itself was a tense battle. In spite of all their experience gathered over the playing fields of Tipperary and indeed Ireland since 1988, Mullinahone were affected by nerves. This was the biggest day so far in the parish's relatively short hurling life. Even their most experienced hurlers were affected and it was well into the second half before the team ignited. Even then it was hard on their followers as wide followed wide and the gap wasn't wide enough to be safe. The end came suddenly and the sound of Tommy Lonergan's whistle was the sweetest music of the year. Mullinahone were the 1993 South Tipperary senior hurling champions. "The old order changeth yielding place to the new." Now things will never be the same again. Mullinahone were an overnight success having been trying for years.

At our AGM it was decided to get an outside coach. The choice was Michael Doyle of Holycross. Early sessions with Michael proved relatively successful but many of our players were away from home. This didn't help nor did the fact that Michael was captain of his own club. However, in spite of all these difficulties I believe that Michael re-ignited the spark and can take a share of the credit for Mullinahone's success later in the season.

The South draw ordained a first round meeting with Carrick Swan. An experimental team took the field as we were hit by injury, illness and examinations. While victory wasn't vital, every win over senior opposition would inspire confidence. After a bit of a struggle we edged out on top 0-12 to 1-7.

We were now in the semi-final but would miss the match practice of the losers group. We were drawn against the reigning champions and our great rivals Ballingarry. They had come through the losers group. Many of our followers would have preferred to meet Ballingarry in the final. Some said the semi-final was the place to catch them. Locally the game was being built up as a clash of the Titans. It was to be our greatest test so far.

Ballingarry had the advantage of the elements and we were holding them okay for awhile. Then the roof fell in as our full-back line buckled perhaps from pressure out further and four goals were conceded. At half-time we were twelve points down 4-6 to 0-6. The hope of our followers were sorely tested. It was the darkest hour but it was also the hour before the dawn.

The Mullinahone dressing-room was a quiet place as the players took in the awful situation they were in and the jibes of the opposition. Perhaps they were after all "only a poor junior team." There was little said as the players looked into their hearts and vowed that in the second half things would be different. They were.

Within minutes Mullinahone had shot 1-1 to drag themselves back into the game. After thirteen minutes the sides were almost level. For ten minutes or so they fought for supremacy but now nothing could halt the Mullinahone machine and incredulous Ballingarry could only stand and stare as Mullinahone roared on to victory. It was the greatest comeback of our time. The second half scoring was Mullinahone 2-12; Ballingarry 0-1 in the end, a five point win 2-18 to 4-7. It was the day when Mullinahone's hurlers became men and learned to believe in themselves.

The final brought ballyhoo and pressure. Once more this group of players were stepping into the unknown for Mullinahone. As I said the pressure got to Mullinahone and only when the anxiety lifted did Mullinahone show something approaching their true form. Again they will learn and hopefully the team will grow to fill the mantle of champions. On final day the club had many heroes as winners always do. Even 'Man of the Match' and captain, John Leahy, had local rivals on the day. His county colleague, Brian O'Meara had a profound effect on the turning around of the final whilst wing back Tony Dalton was outstanding. Sean Brett and Kyran Vaughan at seventeen the baby of the side turned in some sterling performances. In earlier rounds Jackie Bolger showed hurling class.

As I have previously said, on final day all proved heroes and it is well to name the South final panel for posterity - Liam O'Connor, Kyran Vaughan, Ollie Maher, Michael Skehan, Tony Dalton, Sean Brett, John McCormack, Ray Cody, Brian O'Meara, Jackie Bolger, 'Mossie' Tobin, Noel Leahy, John Leahy (captain), Sean Walzer, Pat Croke, Stephen O'Brien, Jim White, Alan Foxe, Jim O'Neill, Ger Dalton, Albert Curran, Thomas Cahill, Terry O'Brien, 'Toss' Lonergan, Gerry Brett and John O'Shea who was later enlisted.

Jackie Bolger: The Hurler Time Forgot

When the Mullinahone Senior Hurling team ran onto the field for the recent South Tipp Senior Hurling semi-final, by far the oldest member of the starting 15, now in his 38th year was full back Jackie Bolger. In fact six of Jackie's team mates Niall Curran, Edward O'Brien, Paul Curran, Eoin Kelly, Eddie Carey and Paul Kelly were not even born or were babes in arms when Jackie first played adult hurling for Mullinahone twenty one seasons ago, way back in 1979.

By coincidence all of that sextet have played championship football or hurling or both for Tipperary. That year 1979 Mullinahone won their second ever South Tipp Junior Hurling title and first in 39 years. They, having beaten Lattin-Cullen in the semi-final, were beaten by Silvermines in the County

Final.In the semi-final Nicky English made his adult debut for Latin-Cullen and was marked by Jimsy Kelly.

Mullinahone rose again and Jackie was captain when the "lads" captured their third junior title defeating Killenaule in 1985. Partners with Killenaule in minor, under 21 and senior ranks as Eire Óg in the early 1980's Jackie was to win South Tipp under 21 and eventually senior championships with Eire Óg.

In one of those senior finals against Swan, Jackie was to win the "Man of the Match" award at wing back. When Mullinahone entered the Leahy era and bagan the roll towards hurling acceptance, Jackie was to become a club mentor at under 21 level in the glory days of 1988 and 1989. The Junior Final County win of 1989 was one of the highlights of Jackie's career. An All-Ireland Club Junior 7-a-side followed in 1990. It was Jackie's second All-Ireland hurling award. In the mid eightees he was a member of the PN Construction team to win the Firms Junior All-Ireland. Some regard this as Mullinahone's first All-Ireland Hurling award. Jackie was as ever present as Mullinahone rose through Intermediate and into Senior ranks. Now the chairman of the Mullinahone Club he still retains two ambitions (1) to win a County Senior Hurling Medal and (2) to play championship for Tipperary, (watch out the over 40's - mid summer's day 2002 is D-Day - Could today be a step on the road?)

Today Jackie's son Kevin is 13. In 1975 another 13 year old lined out with Mullinahone in an effort to win first South Tipp rural and urban rural hurling titles. Jimmy O'Connor trained that bunch of young hurlers and laid foundations for hurling to flourish. Remember some of the names: Jimmy Bolger (Killaghy), Michael McGrath, Michael Hearne, Pat Fitzgerald, Paul Hogan, John McCormack and of course Jackie Bolger. A non-drinker and non-smoker Jackie has retained youthful enthusiasm for hurling. Today he has a lifetime of adult hurling service behind him. Give him a special cheer for Jackie Bolger is indeed the hurler that time forgot.


