Jason Forde profile

ason Forde is a young man comfortable in his own skin.

When many good players are weighed down by the expectancy of being the major contributor of scores, the Silvermines forward thrives on it.

2011 was the year he came to public prominence for many hurling followers, when awarded the captaincy of the county minor team. Oh how that management team will regret their decision to play him at centre back, not that he wasn't good there, but as we saw in glimpses during that campaign when moved further forward, he offered so much more.

North Intermediate final glory with Silvermines was followed by bitter disappointment in the autumn of 2011 when they came up just short in their quest to get back to the senior ranks, and compete in big games like this evening.

Little did he know that, that autumn was the start of an outstanding run of form, coupled with leadership which has seen him become one of the brightest hurling prospects in the country.

From his schools coach at Nenagh CBS Donach O'Donnell to his current captain with Silvermines Orrie Quirke, there is nothing but praise for the way he carries himself and you get that sense anyway by the way he plays.

Despite being a leading player for Nenagh CBS, Tipperary under 21's and Silvermines, you never get the sense he is the focal point. He doesn't take on too much of the burden himself. You see similar players in his situation who think they have to do more to get his team to win.

Go back to Nenagh CBS' run to the 2012 All Ireland Colleges title, when the score was on, he took it, if it wasn't he rarely took a hopeful shot. Arguably his greatest individual performance was in the semifinal against St Kieran's College on St Patrick's Day, scoring 14 of his sides 17 points as little Nenagh took down the aristocrats of the Kilkenny City school. Few believed it could be done, but Forde did.

In an interview with the *Irish Independent* last month following the Munster under 21 quarter final win over Limerick, he commented that "the club is where is all starts really". Schools and inter-county success only comes about after the club puts in the initial groundwork.

Whatever Forde goes onto achieve in his hurling career, there's the likelihood that this evening could be the biggest thrill of his career because the club means more than anything and it is why North Final days are so special.

Toomevara and Kilruane. He refereed the All Ireland U16 final of 2012 between Limerick and Galway. GAA and refereeing are very strong in his family and he is following in the footsteps of his brother PJ who was previously a prominent referee in North Tipperary. Philip's uncle Michael Carey also refereed the 1964 North Senior Hurling final between Nenagh Eire Og and Roscrea. This

A cracking final in prospect

HIS year's North Tipperary senior hurling championship has provided hurling afficionados with upsets aplenty but few will argue that both sides battling it out for the coveted Frank McGrath cup are not here on merit.

Today the Silvermines will grace a north senior final for the first time since 1975 and will undoubtedly be gunning to cap off what has been a memorable couple of seasons for the men in blue and white. On that day the 'Mines, as reigning champions, faced Moneygall in Cloughjordan but lost out narrowly on a 2-10 to 1-11 scoreline.

Since those halcyon days of the mid-'70s the 'Mines faithful have often dreamed of returning once more to the pinnacle of hurling in North Tipp and following what has been a thoroughly entertaining and convincing campaign they are back for another tilt as they bid to bridge a 39-year gap since their last triumph.

The reigning north, county and Munster intermediate champions are fully capable of capping off what would be a fairytale victory with a side that boast a dearth of experience and a wealth of talent. However, standing in their path are a Kildangan outfit who are no stranger to success themselves, having particularly impressed on the senior scene over recent years with their nadir coming in 2008 when the famously hauled back a seemingly insurmountable deficit to overcome Burgess by 1-17 to 2-12.

Kildangan also earned another tilt at the title two years ago but Toomevara proved that little bit too strong on the day and emerged victorious on a 1-18 to 0-13 scoreline. Many of that team survive to take the field today but over the past two years a noticeable infusion of youth has added balance and poise to a well-drilled Kildangan side.

Their performances to date in the north championship have impressed but undoubtedly their victory over Toomevara in the semi-final displayed the true depth of character in this Kildangan side. For that reason the bookmakers have installed Kildangan as favourites to lift the cup today.

They ably negotiated the group stages and at this juncture the management team of Seamus Gleeson, Johnny Kelly, Eddie Fogarty and Martin Nolan have settled on quite a potent combination of youth and experience.

In defence, the lynchpins are the evergreen Gerry Slattery and Martin Minehan while Tommy Connors has excelled at midfield. In attack, Kildangan possess a wealth of talent with all six forwards capable of picking off their own scores. Brothers, Tadgh and Joe Gallagher along with the jet-heeled Willie Connors have often provided the catalyst for previous victories while the free-taking exploits of Ruairi Gleeson is another string to Kildangan's bow. Furthermore, the feats of Darragh Egan between the sticks this year have been a joy to behold and together with his long-range freetaking abilities he adds yet another dimension to a well-balanced Kildangan side.

However, the 'Mines have been making a habit of 'bookie bashing' over the past two years and possess the strength of character to bring the Frank McGrath Cup back to Bun Ciamalta.

In defence, Brendan Timmons and Ronan Sherlock have commanded their respective lines well throughout the past two seasons. Together with Maurice Leamy, Damien Boland, Noel Quirke and Donal Keogh they for a defensive sextet that has proved extremely difficult to break down. At midfield, Cathal Gleeson and Orrie Ouirke have also excelled while David Boland at centre-forward is the fulcrum around which a dangerous 'Mines attack revolves. Undoubtedly, Jason Forde is their marquee forward, but brothers, Willie, Daniel and David Keogh are well able to chip in with decisive scores while Sean Quirke and Paudie Fogarty have also displayed their prowess in front of goal.

So a cracking final in prospect. Hang on to your seats, hats and everything else because today's clash promises to be one that many will remember for years to come!

Silvermines' only North SHC win

September 8th 1974: Silvermines 4-7 Roscrea 1-10 at Nenagh

Silvermines won the North Senior hurling final to become the latest team to join the list of winners when accounting for Roscrea in an exciting contest at Negarh.

Not since 1947, when Borris-Ileigh first hit the headlines in the North, had new champions been crowned. Mines, only two years after their Intermediate success, became the top team in the division with a victory that was greeted throughout the whole county.

Roscrea were pre-match favourites but Silvermines wasted no time in leading the charge. Three first half goals by John Forde (close in free) after 11 minutes and two more by Maurice Daffey and John Kennedy, close to half time, helped create a heartening 3-5 to 0-3 lead at the break.

As expected, Roscrea, now playing with the breeze,

reduced the margin to five (3-6 to 0-7) but a 46th minute goal by Pat Quinlan and a John Forde free a minute later put Mines on the road to a memorable victory.

Last North Final win for Kildangan

Kildangan presented us with yet another parable, a story of stout resistance in 2008 when facing Burgess in the North Tipperary senior hurling final a wonderful sense of occasion surrounded that decider.

From the start Burgess set about squeezing the life out of Kildangan, one breath at a time. Burgess led 1-10 to 0-7 at the break and with 15 minutes to play the Tony Considine-coached side had extended their lead to eight (2-12 to 0-10) following a Patrick Tucker goal.

But then something happened which felt like a full stop at the end of a sentence: Kildangan had been unlucky with a couple of goal-scoring chances, but following a mix-up in the Burgess full-back line Seánie Kelly pounced for a vital goal.

Four points followed in quick succession thanks to Eoin Kelly, Ruairí Gleeson, Seánie Kelly and a monster from Gerry Slattery before centre-back Dan Hackett grabbed a Shane Maher clearance on the hour mark and drove it over the Burgess bar from 100 yards plus - the sides were now level: 1-15 to 2-12.

Michael Cahill allowed for two minutes of injury

time and Kildangan took full advantage with Eoin Gleeson and Darragh Egan plundering points which ended Kildangan's 65-year search for the Frank McGrath Cup. It finished 1-17 to 2-12. Michael Cusack once wrote a glorious description of hurling on the eve of the first inter-county championship in 1887. His words could hardly been bettered: "a hurling match is like a city on fire where the crackling of burning timber and the hissing of the flames swell into the roar of conflagration. We never heard sweeter music than that of the hurling field".

The 2008 decider was a wonderful occasion and if we are treated to anything like it on Sunday hurling fans in north Tipperary won't have much to be complaining about.

Maurice Davin statue unveiled in Carrick-on-Suir by President Liam O'Neill

or many years, Tipperary man Maurice Devin, cofounder of the GAA was almost forgotten while Clare people proclaimed loudly and often that Michael Cusack was the founder of the GAA. The Cusack Centre in Carron was much publicised and a huge statue was unveiled outside the Cusack Stand in recent years. Seamus Ó Riain, the author of Maurice Davin 1842-1927, helped bring Davin back into the public consciousness. More recently a committee chaired by Bobby Fitzgerald and guided by Sean Nugent set about honoured the world class athlete, farmer, businessman and first President of the GAA.

Saturday June 1st was a wonderful day in Carrickon-Suir when a statue sculpted in Kilkenny limestone was unveiled outside Davin Park. The tasteful work was done by young Clare sculptor, Barry Wrafter. The day began in Churchtown graveyard where Davin rests, beside the banks of the gently flowing Suir with Slievenamon keeping watch on a sunny morning. A beautiful and peaceful setting, his grave was blessed and a wreath laid. The first person we met on arrival was Ralph Callaghan, former Tipperary and New York hurler. Those present included members of the Davin family including his grand nephew Pat Walsh, GAA people led by President Liam O'Neill and County

Chairman Sean Nugent.

It was then back to Carrick for the unveiling of the statue by Liam O'Neill. The three clubs, Davins, Swan and St. Molleran's were involved in organising the event. Former Presidents, Joe McDonagh, Sean McCague and Sean Kelly were present. The band played, the local people turned out in numbers, a fitting tribute to the occasion. Ned Quinn Chairman Kilkenny arrived, as did Robert Frost and Martin McAviney, Ulster Chairman, made the long journey south. Liam O'Neill made a terrific speech, unscripted as previous speakers had stolen most of his lines! A festive atmosphere prevailed.

Later an exhibition of items belonging to Maurice and Pat Davin was on view; they were loaned by South Tipperary county Museum. Refreshments were taken in convivial company. Congratulations to all involved in making it a success. Take a trip to Carrick to see the statue outside Davin Park.

Later my sister Pat and I stopped at Deerpark, where we were born, just across the field from the Davin homestead. As we headed home on a golden evening, Slievenamon was bathed in light. It was if our iconic mountain approved Maurice Davin being honoured. We took the long road home through our lovely county, magnificent Tipperary.

Outside managers' influence

Brian McDonnell matches today's team managers, two men that have come up through the ranks having served their respective clubs very well.

An interesting aspect to this year's Hibernian Innsponsored North Tipperary senior hurling final is the fact that both Kildangan and Silvermines are heavily influenced by outsiders.

Johnny Kelly, who works alongside selector Eddie Fogarty and Martin Nolan plus manager Séamus Gleeson with Kildangan, hardly requires an introduction.

As a player Johnny Kelly endured hardship with his native Portumna at the intermediate grade. Portumna, however, finally made the breakthrough to senior in 2003 and went on to contest seven successive county finals.

Kelly operated as a selector with several of those sides before becoming manager in 2008.

Johnny, working alongside selectors Vincent Treacy, Timmy Walsh and trainer Dinny Cahill, guided his beloved Portumna to county titles in 2008 and 2009. More significantly Kelly was also instrumental in Portumna winning All-Ireland club titles in both 2008 and 2009 - in 2008 Portumna saw off Birr in the decider and a year later defeated De La Salle of Waterford.

In 2010 Portumna, who had not suffered a defeat in twenty-nine competitive matches (2006-2010), found themselves chasing three All-Ireland club titles in-a-row, lost to Kilkenny's Ballyhale Shamrocks.

Kelly stuck with the Portumna seniors until 2011 before challenging for the Galway senior hurling manager's role in 2011. Tony Keady and Dinny Cahill joined Kelly on the ticket, but the County Board opted for Anthony Cunningham.

Following that disappointment Kelly was appointed coach to the Kildangan senior hurlers in 2012. And, while Kildangan got off to a slow start Kelly's influence as a coach soon started to tell. Kildangan were slow starters again this term, but found their feet in no uncertain terms.

Indeed, the campaign of Séamus Gleeson's men has marked by superb victories over Templederry and, especially, Toomevara. Better still the quality of Kildangan's slick stick-passing has really caught the eye. Thurles' Paddy Moore, as manager, guides the fortunes of the 'Mines. He had Declan Corcoran and Anthony McGrath on his management team with assistance from Paddy McCormack and Liam Flannery

Moore, a talented forward who played for Thurles Fennellys, won a county title with Thurles Sarsfields in 1974. Moore has also dedicated a significant part of his coaching career toward the development of players at the much-vaunted Durlas Óg.

In 2012 Moore, with Thurles' Paddy McCormack installed as coach, was appointed manager of Silvermines. And, the scale of the transformation that Moore inspired in the 'Mines has been extraordinary.

Since relegation from the senior grade in 2003 the 'Mines had struggled to find their feet, but once Moore caught a hold of them there was no turning back. Moore worked to transform the mentality of Silvermines and the 'Mines exploded into life and ultimately won their first county intermediate title since 1999 when defeating Ballina in the 2012 county intermediate hurling final at Semple Stadium, Thurles.

However, having achieved their goal Paddy Moore challenged his players to go further, much further. And, following a dramatic provincial campaign the 'Mines were crowned Munster champions following a narrow final win over Kerry's Ballyduff.

The bottle of the Silvermines players had once been challenged, but no longer. Indeed, the 'Mines were very unfortunate to miss out on an All-Ireland title when losing to a hugely-talented Clara (Kilkenny) team at the semi-final stage.

The manner in which the 'Mines have approached the north championship this year has also warmed the heart of Silvermines supporters. Despite being drawn in a difficult group Silvermines got the better of Toomevara and Burgess before seeing off defending champions Portroe en route to today's final.

Those results were impressive in themselves, but the style of them even more so. The 'Mines go for it from start to finish. Paddy Moore's men hurl up a storm and they are a credit to everyone associated with the club.

Hurling is my life . . . Michael Fitzgibbon, Silvermines and Tipperary

ichael Fitzgibbon was a star hurler with Silvermines back in the seventies and eighties. He was an outstanding centre half back. At times he would operate at midfield. He won North and county intermediate medals in 1972. The team joined senior ranks in 1973 and reached the North semi-final losing to Borris-Ileigh before going on to win the North final the following year when defeating a star studded Roscrea side.

In 1972, Michael won a Munster and All-Ireland medal with Tipperary Intermediates. Tipp defeated Galway in Birr. Michael played wing back in place of the injured Willie Moloney. The team and panel included many players from both Kildangan and Silvermines as Tipp created history in becoming the first county to successfully defend their title.

His first played Juvenile hurling in 1963 and won medals in many grades thereafter.

Club Honours North Senior Hurling 1974; North and County intermediate hurling in 1972; Four North senior football in 1973, '74, '75 and '80; North Under -21 football 1969; North Junior Football in 1971.

Inter County Munster/All Ireland Intermediate hurling in 1972. Tipp defeated Kerry and Galway.

When and where did you first play hurling with your club? North Juvenile in 1963.
Silvermines reached the losers group final in under15 that time two years in a row. We defeated
Shannon Rovers both years and I was playing the second year. It was the only age group for juvenile hurling at the time.

Your first mentor? Three men standout. Dan Keogh, uncle of Jim and grand uncle to the Keoghs on today's team. Jim hurled with the Mines and won two intermediate medals in 1945 and '48. Martin Minehan was creamery manager in Silvermines at the time. He also won two intermediate medals. Fr Michael Gilmartin was also involved. We trained in Dolla where the present pitch is.

Who was your biggest influence on career? My club mates. The players I grew up with. I used cycle four miles from Ballinaclough to Dolla to train alongside the Lynchs and John Kennedy -also on

successful Tipp Intermediate Team in 1972.

What was the most you scored in any one game? I played corner forward and scored 1-2 against Moneygall in an under -21 championship game. The game was a replay played in MacDonagh Park. We lost to Moneygall who were strong contenders at the time

What was your most memorable score?

Can't remember any. I usually played midfield or half back so opportunities were rare. Remember the ball was much heavier those days.

What players do you admire and what do you admire about them? Eoin Kelly, Mullinahone. He fulfilled the promise he showed from a very early age. I saw him play under 14 scoring against Nenagh in a county final a number of years ago. He destroyed Nenagh who had a promising team that time. Francis Loughnane, Roscrea was another player I had great admiration for both as a player and an opponent. His sheer strength and ability was a test to any opponent.

A rule you would like to see changed in hurling? Not so much as rule but I would like to a ban on the short puck out. It can be a disaster. Most goalkeepers can reach their opponents forty five and beyond so I don't see the need to shorten

a puck out. The short puckout only puts pressure on his team mate and so much can go wrong if the receiver drops the ball.

A recent rule change that is in your view was wrong for hurling? Again not a rule but the present structure of county v club needs to be rectified in some way so that our club finals will not be played in the depths of winter.

Who is your favourite GAA writer or pundit? Des Cahill from radio and the Sunday game.

Favourite sport other than hurling? All sports. I like tennis, golf but I would prefer horse racing with golf a close second.

Best book read? Not any particular book. I am not an avid reader but I like reading GAA books on statistics and accounts of past games. The newly published Dan Breen book by Jim Fogarty is brilliant. It goes back to 1931 when the Dan Breen was first presented. I attended many finals and it is nice to look back on the players some of whom were boyhood heroes. I have a similar book on Kilkenny county finals which is a nice record to have.

Best film seen? The General.

Best concert or gig you've attended? Christy Moore concerts. I have attended several of his concerts mostly in the Point or in the 02 they call it now.

Hurling person you would most like to meet? Jackie Tyrell, Kilkenny and find out how he operates. I think he is one of the strongest players around today. I saw him play in a recent Kilkenny county final. James Stephens drew with Ballyhale Shamrocks and he was up against Henry Shefflin.

Best hurling memory outside of club? The 1987 Munster hurling Final in Killarney. The fact that Tipperary were down for so long. It was sixteen years since they won.

What was your greatest moment in sport? Winning the 1974 North Senior hurling Final against Roscrea. The lead up to the day was very exciting. We were involved in very exciting games coming up to the final. The late John Doyle, Holycross was the team trainer. We togged out in the old dressing rooms. I played centre back and was marking the late Roger Ryan. Jack and Pat Dunlea were the wing backs. It was bedlam after the game.

Best of luck to Kildangan in today's final

Ruairi Gleeson, Kildangan

It's been a busy year for the Kildangan corner forward, Ruairi Gleeson. The Kildangan top scorer will play in his third North senior final today ten days after collecting a Munster Intermediate winners medal last Friday week sharing honours with fellow club men, Darragh Egan and Martin Minehan. He scored 0-2 in one of his best performances this year.

He made his senior club championship debut against Moneygall in 2008 and featured in every game leading up to a North final success against Burgess. In 2011 he was on the losing side when appearing in his second North final this time beaten by Toomevara but later collected an all-Ireland medal in the Kilmacud sevens.

This year he has varied his play operating at right corner forward and moving out on the wing. As leading marksman he has reached second place in the scoring championship charts with 0-41 (0-30 from frees and 0-4 from 65s), five clear goals behind Jason Forde. He has struggled with hamstring injuries but he made the Tipperary intermediate side that claimed Munster honours against Cork last week

hurling final in 2005. Kildangan defeated Lorrha and added another North under -16 medal in 2007 when Kildangan defeated Nenagh Eire Og in the decider. Kildangan were runners up in the 2009 North Minor A final but collected two North under-21 B medals 2008 and 2010 leading to county memento in 2010.

At divisional and inter county level he won a Tipperary Supporters Under-16 All-Ireland in 2008. He finished runners up in two munster minor finals but collecting a munster intermediate medal last week made up for it somewhat. The odds of another All-Ireland medal in late august? We will have to wait and see.

My hurling life . . . Willie Moloney, Kildangan and Tipperary

School Honours: 1966 played with North Tipp Vocational school when we won the All Ireland Hurling final. The one and only time I played in Croke Park

Club Honours: Played Juvenile, Minor, Intermediate and Senior with Kildangan.

1966 won Intermediate North Final 1971 won Intermediate North and County final

1970 and 1971 Under 21s Naomh Padraig won North & County medals.

Inter County Honours: 1968 - played Minor with Tipperary – on the panel

1970 -Under 21 played on the team

1971 - Played Tipp Intermediate Hurling

1972 - Played Tipp Intermediate Hurling – missed All Ireland final due to broken collar bone.

When and where did you first play hurling for your club? Played Juvenile at under-15 level for three years commencing in 1963. We trained in Puckane. A bunch of us would travel down to Puckane with Jimmy Killeen. I played in the 1965 North final and lost to Borris-lleigh. I missed the 1966 win along with Martin Healy, John Connors and Donie Ryan.

Your first mentor(s): Fr Ml O'Donoghue RIP. Jim Killeen RIP. Michael McGowan RIP and Paddy Hogan N.T four very loyal mentors and very enthusiastic about hurling.

Who was your biggest influence on career? Paddy Kelly, Billy Flannery, & Brian McDonnell. The trio played in the 1966 North final defeating Shannon Rovers after a replay. To me they were hurling giants at the time and I – a sixteen year old – was asked to play in goal in place of Eddie McLoughney. Paddy Kelly had been a very good centre back and Billy Flannery played midfield. Brian McDonnell was always good for a score up in attack.

What was the most you scored in any one game? In the 1970 Under 21 North final against Roscrea I scored 0-9 with Naomh Padraig (Kildangan/Burgess). While playing first at wing forward before moving to midfield.

What was your most memorable score? In 1970, Naomh Padraig against Sean Treacys in the county final. Just after half time we were awarded a 21 yard free. Donal Nealon immediately shouted instructions take my point while he was running towards the goal pointing to the ground and a badly struck ball hit the back of the net. Nealon was one of the best to give a pre-match talk in a dressing room.

What players did you admire and what did you admire about them? John Mackey McKenna, Borrisokane, Jimmy Doyle, Thurles Sarsfields and Frances Loughnane, Roscrea. They all had their own unique style.

McKenna was fearless. Doyle was a genius and Loughnane was a genius as well.

A rule you would like to see changed in hurling. Eliminate the handpass from hurling. Hurling maybe faster now with the handpass but the skill looks more like a throw. In older times, the forward would hurl their way out of difficult positions.

A recent rule change that is in your view wrong for hurling? Not so much to change a rule but the recent rule change in making it compulsory to wear of helmets which I welcome from a player safety point of view but it make it difficult to recognise players during a game. Still safety is number one.

Who is your favourite GAA writer/pundit?

Shane Brophy.

Favourite sport other than hurling?
Munster Rugby. I have attended a few games in
Thomond Park the atmosphere at the games
and Munster had a good run. I liked Ronan
O'Gara and John Hayes. Hayes was a very
under rated player.

Best book read and film watched? Michael Collins. It was a good story. It rekindled an interest in history.

Hurling Person you would most like meet?

Tony Reddan Lorrha former Tipp goalkeeper. I saw the last game he played in Nenagh. I heard so many stories about him. A great goalkeeper by all accounts. Still rated as the best of all time.

Best hurling memory outside of playing? Kildangan Intermediate team winning the All Ireland club final against Carrickshock at Semple Stadium in 2005. The finish was great. Kildangan looked a beaten team especially when Dan Hackett went down injured. After a small delay Kildangan took over with the late goals.

Also. The 1991 Munster final win against Cork at Semple Stadium when Aidan Ryan scored a great goal towards the end. A great game.

What was your greatest moment in sport? 1984: Winning a rowing race from Garrykennedy to Dromineer and being presented with a plaque by Bob Tisdell the former Olympic champion.





Kildangan & Silvermines leading the Bord



Both today's clubs have had people very involved in the Bord over the last 30 years or so. Between them Kildangan and Silvermines have contributed 39 manpower years in that period as Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, Three Kildangan members have held the position of Treasurer for 26 years prior to present incumbent Willie Lennox. Silvermines club have provided the third most recent Chairman and Secretary.

Catherine Gleeson (Kildangan) Treasurer 2001-2010

Catherine Ryan was born in the Moycarkey/Borris parish and deeply involved with her native club and parish. She competed successfully in Scór.

When she moved to Kildangan she threw herself into her new club, filling many roles including Chairperson and Secretary. She was a very hard working Treasurer and performed many tasks outside the traditional role of Treasurer.



She has 3 sons on today's Kildangan panel. In 2008 as Bord Treasurer, she had the distinction of presenting the Frank McGrath Cup to Kildangan captains Brian Kelly and Michael Ryan

Seamus Hogan (Kildangan) Treasurer 1988-1990

Seamus has given a life long service to the


Kildangan club. He has served as a player, administrator and selector. As a player, Seamus'

highlight came with the annexing of the North IHC in 1980. Seamus also provides great service around the Kildangan club grounds at Puckane.

In December 2007, Spike was honoured with a Special Merit Award by the Munster Council in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the 1 | Gaelic Athletic Association.

> During his two terms as Treasurer, Michael brought a lot of self-thought computerisation to the role and set-up many files for tickets and other items. At the time of his death Spike was serving a



second term as County Treasurer. The Minor "A" Hurling Championship trophy is now named after Spike.

Michael O'Brien (Silvermines) Secretary 1990-1999

Michael O'Brien played a big role within the Silvermines club over his lifetime. He won County

Junior Hurling medals with Silvermines, served as chairman & was the founder of Silvermines Juvenile club. He was very involved in the building the handball alley in Dolla.

Michael served as North Bord na nÓg secretary and represented handall at many différent levels. He was also one of the best referees.

Michael was a very organised Secretary and his annual reports were always a very telling, complete and accurate review of the affairs of North Tipperary. Michael went on to be the 16th secretary of the county Bórd and served in that position for 7 years.



John Sherlock (Silvermines) Chairman 2006-2008

John Sherlock played hurling & football for his club & county. He was a member of the Silvermines Senior Hurling

Championship winning side of 1974.

John served as club secretary for many years and is one of a regular band of helpful stewards around Dolla on match days.

John was elected as North Vice-Chairman in 2003 & three years later assumed

the mantle of Chairman. Prior to that he has been a regular volunteer with the Order of Malta & provided assistance when necessary to players of all clubs. As well as being a calm chairman, John will be remembered for his leading role in introducing defribalators to all club grounds in the division.

John will probably be on the sideline today for Silvermines providing medical assistance if necessary. He also has two sons on the Silvermines panel.

Liam Keogh, Silvermines



Liam Keogh captained Silvermines to win the North Intermediate hurling final in 1987. Silvermines defeated Newport. He went on to collect four more North medals – 1994, 1997, 1998 and 1999 culminating in a county medal success the same year.

His sons Willie, David and Daniel will be playing today along side his nephews, Donal Keogh, Sean Orrie and Noel Quirke.

Hurling has been, and still is, a tremendous part of my life. I played juvenile for Silvermines in the late '60s. Friends made through hurling for your club are friends for life. A wind ball bought by Dad in town on mart day was a treat. Hurley a must (made by the late great Paddy Collins -a tradition carried on today by my nephews -the Quirke Bros). However, boots and togs were optional then. Helmets were only worn by men going underground in Garryard.

I played with and trained under tremendous characters of the game. Twelve rounds of Dolla field (before it became a pitch) and the roar would come just before the uphill run at the far right hand side from Don (not his real name): "Lads we will shake it up a bit - run in the opposite direction for 10 more rounds".

To captain Silvermines to Nealon Trophy Minor B success in 1976 and again to lead 'Mines to Intermediate North success in 1987 were great honours. Finally, to win a first county medal with the 'Mines in 1999 at an age when many of my juvenile contemporaries were in their deck chairs on the bank –Ah, that one was sweet.

North finals are unique occasions. They create great memories for family, friends, comrades, community and club. The dedication of players to their club should be celebrated on such momentous occasions as this.



The 39 scores, 4-35 resulted in a grand total of 57 points was also a record with the 1943 decider involving the Kildangan 7-5 v Roscrea 7-4, total 51 points the same as the 1964 encounter between Nenagh Eire Og 5-12

North finals in the last fifteen years has seen very little goals but last year's decider produced four matching the total in 1999 decider Toomevara 2-19 Nenagh Eire Og 2-15 as well as the 2000 final when Toomevara defeated Moneygall 3-13 to 1-10. That's one better than the 2003 decider Toomevara 3-12 Nenagh Éire Og 0-16 and the 2008 decider Kildangan 1-17 Burgess 2-12.


